STATUTORY RULES.

PROVISIONAL REGULATION UNDER THE CUSTOMS ACT 1901-1910.

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby certify that, on account of urgency, the following Regulation under the Customs Act 1901-1910, should come into immediate operation, and make the Regulation to come into operation forthwith as a Provisional Regulation.

The Customs Regulations 1909 (Statutory Rules 1909, No. 126) are hereby amended as follows :--

Regulation 31. By the addition of the following words:-" A list of Customable articles and opium owned by the master, officers, and crew of the ship shall also accompany Form 8, and shall be in accordance with Form 9B."

Form 9. By the deletion of the following words:

- "Note.-Dutiable goods in possession of the crew must be shown on the back of this list;"
- "Officers' and crews' private stores;" and
- "Officers' and crews' private trade."

INSTRUCTIONS TO MASTERS.

1. This list must be completed in readiness to be handed to the Customs Officer who first visits the vessel. It must be signed by every member of the crew (including the master and officers). Each man must state opposite his signature the quantity of dutiable articles in his possession. If he has nothing he must state "nil" or "nothing."

2. Any dutiable article, the property of the master or any member of the crew, found

in the vessel and not enumerated in this list, will be liable to forfeiture, and the owner

thereof to prosecution.

3. All articles reported on this list must be produced, and, if necessary, placed in a secure place to be sealed up by a Customs Officer.
