An Act to amend the Post and Telegraph Rates Act 1902-1941.

[Assented to 30th June, 1949.]

E it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate, and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, as follows:-

1.—(1.) This Act may be cited as the Post and Telegraph Rates Short title and citation. Act 1949.

- (2.) The Post and Telegraph Rates Act 1902-1941* is in this Act referred to as the Principal Act.
- (3.) The Principal Act, as amended by this Act, may be cited as the Post and Telegraph Rates Act 1902–1949.
- 2. This Act shall come into operation on the first day of July, commencement. One thousand nine hundred and forty-nine.
 - Section six A of the Principal Act is repealed.

- 4. Section eight of the Principal Act is repealed and the following section inserted in its stead :-
- "8. All Braille and Moon postal articles, and such other postal Braille and articles for the use of the blind as are prescribed, shall, if posted as articles free. prescribed, be conveyed without charge.".

(2.) The Second Schedule to the Principal Act is amended by omitting paragraph (b) of Part II. and inserting in its stead the following paragraph:—

"(b) Other telegrams, accepted for transmission subject to the prescribed conditions—

(3.) The Second Schedule to the Principal Act is amended by omitting Part IV. and inserting in its stead the following Part:—

Telegrams, accepted for transmission subject to the prescribed conditions—including address and signature, One shilling and sixpence for the first thirty words and one half-penny for each additional word.".
