4 Preamble

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The Parliament of Australia acknowledges the following matters.

All students in all schools are entitled to an excellent education, allowing each student to reach his or her full potential so that he or she can succeed and contribute fully to his or her community, now and in the future.

The quality of a student's education should not be limited by where the student lives, the income of his or her family, the school he or she attends, or his or her personal circumstances.

1 2	The quality of education should not be limited by a school's location, particularly those schools in regional Australia.
3	It is essential that Australian schooling be of a high quality and be
4	highly equitable in order to create a highly skilled and successful
5	workforce, strengthen the economy, and increase productivity,
6	leading to greater prosperity for all.
7	If Australia is to be a prosperous nation with a high standard of
8	living in the 21st century, the performance of Australia's schools,
9	and school students, must continuously improve, particularly as
10	school performance in countries around the world and in
1	Australia's region is also improving.
12	It is also essential that Australian schooling provide school
13	students with opportunities to engage with Australia's region.
14	Through this engagement, Australia can maximise economic,
15	cultural and social opportunities during the Asian century.
16	To address these matters, future arrangements will be based on the
17	needs of Australian schools and school students, and on evidence
18	of how to provide an excellent education for school students. These
19	arrangements will build on successful reforms to date.
20	Schools will also need to adopt the opportunities offered by digital
21	education and new evidence-based methods of teaching and
22	learning.
23	Strong partnerships across the broader community are necessary to
24	support all school students, including partnerships between
25	teachers, parents and families, and employers.
26	As Australia's schools are diverse, the Australian Government will
27	recognise the role of the Governments of the State and Territories,
28	non-government education authorities, other partners and schools
29	in delivering school education, and work with them to support and
80	lift the performance of schools and school students.

5	This Part sets out how the Commonwealth will address the matters

8	6 Developing a national plan
9	The Commonwealth will work with the Governments of the States
10	and Territories, and non-government education authorities, to develop, and implement, a national plan to:
12	(a) improve school performance and the educational outcomes of
13	school students; and
4	(b) drive continuous school improvement; and
15 16	(c) provide opportunities for school students to develop capabilities to engage with Asia;

18 19 20	Note: States and Territories, and non-government education authorities, that agree to implement the national plan will be provided with school funding in accordance with section 9.
21	7 Reform directions for the national plan
22	Quality teaching
23	(1) All teachers will have the skills, and support they require, to
24	improve their performance over time and to deliver teaching of a
25	high quality to all of their school students. The work of teachers will:
26	(a) reflect rigorous professional standards and best practice; and
27 28	(b) be based on evidence of successful teaching methods.

2 3 4	(2) Australian schooling will provide a high quality educational experience with an environment and curriculum that supports all school students to reach their full potential.
5	Empowered school leadership
6 7 8 9	(3) Leaders in schools will have the resources, the skills, and greater power, to make decisions and implement strategies at the local level to obtain the best outcomes for their schools and school students.
10	Transparency and accountability
1 2	(4) Support will be provided to schools to find ways to improve continuously by:
13 14 15	 (a) analysing and applying data on the educational outcomes of school students (including outcomes relating to the academic performance, attendance, behaviour and wellbeing of school students); and
17 18 19	(b) making schools more accountable to the community in relation to their performance and the performance of their school students.

27	(6) Australian schooling will place the highest priority on:

1	8 Developing benchmarks and supporting improvement
2 3	The Commonwealth will work with the Governments of the States and Territories, non-government education authorities, and other
4	partners, to do the following:
5 6	 (a) develop benchmarks for assessing the performance of schools and school students;
7	(b) implement arrangements to support the following:
8	(i) increased transparency in relation to schools;
9	(ii) assessing and improving school performance;
10	(iii) gathering and sharing evidence about the most effective
11	methods of improving the performance of schools and
12	school students.
13	9 School funding
14	For any Government of a State or Territory, or non-government
15	education authority, that reaches agreement with the
16	Commonwealth on its implementation of the national plan referred
17	to in section 6, the Commonwealth will provide funding for
18	schools or school systems, through grants of financial assistance to
19	States and Territories, based upon the following principles:
20	(a) every school student will have the opportunity to have an excellent education;

22	(b) base recurrent funding will be allocated according to a formula that calculates an appropriate amount for every
23 24	school in recognition of the costs of providing a high quality
25	education;
26	(c) educational disadvantage associated with any of the
27	following circumstances will be recognised and addressed
28	through providing additional recurrent funding in the form of
29	loadings:
30	(i) having a disability;
31	(ii) being an Aboriginal person or a Torres Strait Islander;
32	(iii) having a low socioeconomic status;
33	(iv) not being proficient in English as a result of the ethnic
34	background or immigration status of a student or a

1 2	Part 3—Miscellaneous
3	10 Act does not create legally enforceable obligations etc.
4 5	(1) This Act does not create rights or duties that are legally enforceable in judicial or other proceedings.
6 7 8	(2) A failure to comply with this Act does not affect the validity of any decision, and is not a ground for the review or challenge of any decision.
9	11 Regulations
10	The Governor-General may make regulations prescribing matters:
11	(a) required or permitted by this Act to be prescribed; or
12	(b) necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying out or
13	giving effect to this Act.
