WAR PRECAUTIONS (COAL) REGULATIONS.

I, ALEXANDER POYNTON, Acting Minister of State for the Navy, in pursuance of the War Precautions (Coal) Regulations (Statutory Rules 1917, No. 195, as amended by Statutory Rules 1917, No. 240 and No. 252), and on the recommendation of the Central Coal Board, do hereby order as follows:—

Coal Stocks in Victoria.

Any person, firm, or company, and any authority constituted under the Commonwealth or any State, possessing, in the State of Victoria, whether for industrial purposes or not, more than five tons of coal or coke, shall, not later than Wednesday, 4th June, 1919, submit to the Director of Navy Contracts, Navy Office, Melbourne, a return, verified by statutory declaration, setting forth the quantity and nature of the coal or coke possessed by him or it, and the place at which such coal or coke is stored.

WAR PRECAUTIONS (COAL) REGULATIONS.

I, ALEXANDER POYNTON, Acting Minister of State for the Navy, in pursuance of the War Precautions (Coal) Regulations (Statutory Rules 1917, No. 195, as amended by Statutory Rules 1917, No. 240 and No. 252), and on the recommendation of the Central Coal Board, do hereby order as follows:—

Use and Consumption of Gas and Electric Current in the State of South Australia.

1. On and after Thursday, 5th June, 1919, the use and consumption of gas and electric current are prohibited in hotels, boarding-houses, restaurants, and shops between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day.

2. On and after Thursday, 5th June, 1919, the use and consumption of gas and electric current are prohibited for all purposes in private houses on each day, except between the hours of 5 a.m. and 8 a.m., and between the hours of 5 p.m. and 10.30 p.m.

3. Gas to the extent to which its use and consumption are permitted may be used only upon the condition that the stop-cocks at the meter are turned off and kept turned off during the prohibited hours.

4. Electric current to the extent to which its use and consumption are permitted may be used only upon the condition that the current is cut off at the main or service switches and kept off during the prohibited hours.

I, ALEXANDER POYNTON, Acting Minister of State for the Navy, in pursuance of the War Precautions (Coal) Regulations (Statutory Rules 1917, No. 195, as amended by Statutory Rules 1917, No. 240 and No. 252), and on the recommendation of the Central Coal Board, do hereby order as follows:—

Coal Stocks in Western Australia.

Any person, firm, or company, and any authority constituted under the Commonwealth or any State, possessing in the State of Western Australia, whether for industrial purposes or not, more than five tons of coke or New South Wales coal shall, not later than Saturday, 7th June, 1919, submit to the District Naval Officer, Naval Staff Office, Fremantle, a return verified by statutory declaration setting forth the quantity and nature of the coal or coke possessed by him or it at Noon on Friday, 6th June, 1919, and the place at which such coal or coke is stored.
