PROCLAMATION

Australia to wit.
A. L. STANLEY,
Deputy of the
Governor-General.

By His Excellency Sir Arthur
Lyulph Stanley, the Deputy of
the Governor-General of the
Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS the state of war which recently existed between His Majesty the King and the German Emperor has been brought to a victorious conclusion and a treaty in accordance with terms laid down by Great Britain and her Allies has been signed by the plenipotentiaries of the German people:

And whereas it is desirable that a day of public rejoicing be appointed to celebrate the conclusion of peace:

Now therefore I, Sir Arthur Lyulph Stanley, Deputy of the Governor-General aforesaid, do hereby appoint Saturday, the nineteenth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, as the day for the holding of the public celebrations in connexion with peace.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Commonwealth, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of July, in the year of (L.S.) our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the tenth year of His Majesty's reign.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by section seventy-two of the *Commonwealth Public Service Act 1902-1918* it is among other things provided that the Governor-General may by Proclamation at any time for any special occasion appoint, in addition to the days named in the said section, any specified day to be observed as a holiday in the public offices of the Commonwealth or in any part thereof:

And whereas Saturday, the nineteenth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, has been set apart as the day for the celebration of peace:

Now therefore I, Sir Arthur Lyulph Stanley, Deputy of the Governor-General aforesaid, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the said Act, do hereby appoint Saturday, the nineteenth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, to be observed as a holiday in all the public offices of the Commonwealth.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Commonwealth, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of July, in the year of (L.S.) our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the tenth year of His Majesty's reign.
