NOTICE BY THE MINISTER.

WHEREAS by the *Mining Ordinance* 1922 and the *Mining Ordinance* (No. 2) 1922 it is provided that those Ordinances shall commence on a day to be fixed by the Minister by notice in the *Gazette*: Now therefore I, John Earle, a member of the Executive Council, acting for and on behalf of the Prime Minister, do hereby fix Monday, the first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, as the day upon which the *Mining Ordinance* 1922 and the *Mining Ordinance* (No. 2) 1922 shall commence.

REVOCATION OF PROCLAMATION RELATING TO THE PROHIBITION OF IMPORTATION OF BIBLES, PRAYER BOOKS, HYMN BOOKS, OR OTHER BOOKS OR PRINTED MATTER PRINTED IN THE GERMAN LANGUAGE AND INTENDED FOR USE IN THE LUTHERAN CHURCH OF AUSTRALIA.

PROCLAMATION

Australia to wit.
FORSTER,
Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Customs Act* 1901-1922 it is enacted that all goods the importation of which may be prohibited by Proclamation are prohibited imports, and that the power of prohibiting importation of goods shall authorize prohibition, subject to any specified conditions or restrictions, and that goods imported contrary to any such condition or restriction shall be prohibited imports:

And whereas by Proclamation issued on the thirtieth day of June, 1920, and published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* of the eighth day of July, 1920, the importation into the Commonwealth of Australia of any Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymn Books, or other books or printed matter, printed in the German language and intended for use in the Lutheran Church of Australia, was prohibited unless the consent in writing of the Minister of State for Trade and Customs had first been obtained:

And whereas it is desired to revoke the said Proclamation:

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby revoke the aforesaid Proclamation.

This Proclamation may be cited as Customs Proclamation No. 71.
