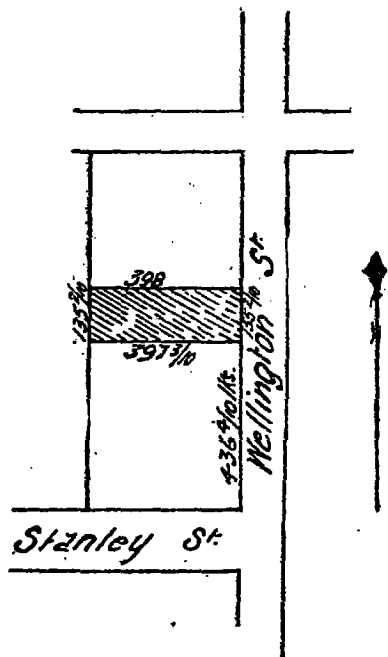

## TRANSFER TO THE GOVERNMENT OF THE STATE OF QUEENSLAND OF PORTION OF DRILL GROUND AT EAST BRISBANE.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, has been pleased to approve of the transfer of the following land:—

All that piece of land being portion of the "Reserve for Drill-shed" situated in the City of Brisbane, at South Brisbane, and commencing at a point on the western boundary of Wellington-street, bearing  $360^{\circ} 13'$  distance  $436\frac{1}{4}$  links from the north-western corner of Stanley-street and Wellington-street; thence by a line bearing  $269^{\circ} 56'$  distance 3 chains  $97\frac{3}{4}$  links; thence by a line bearing  $359^{\circ} 55'$  1 chain  $35\frac{1}{4}$  links; thence by a line bearing  $89^{\circ} 56'$  3 chains 98 links; thence by the western boundary of Wellington-street bearing  $180^{\circ} 13'$  1 chain  $35\frac{1}{4}$  links to the point of commencement, and containing an area of 2 roods 6 perches, as indicated by hatched portion of following sketch—

## NEW REGULATION UNDER COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE ACT 1902, IN RELATION TO BOARDS OF INQUIRY.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, has been pleased to approve of the inclusion in the Regulations made under the provisions of the *Commonwealth Public Service Act 1902*, of the following Regulation, to be numbered 267 (a):—

267 (a) "Where a charge against an officer has been referred to a Board of Inquiry, and the officer is stationed in a locality far removed from the capital of a State, or would be subjected to considerable expense in travelling to appear before the Board of Inquiry, the Commissioner may appoint a competent person or persons to take evidence on oath, at the place where the offence is alleged to have been committed, concerning the inquiry, and such evidence shall be forwarded for consideration of the Board of Inquiry, who, after considering such evidence, shall report to the Chief Officer the proceedings and evidence taken, and their opinion thereon."

REGULATIONS FOR MEDICAL ATTENDANCE.—PERMANENT FORCES.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, in exercise of the powers conferred by the undermentioned State Acts, namely:—

and by the Constitution of the Commonwealth, has been pleased to make the following Regulations, under the provisions of the said Acts, to take effect on and from the 1st July, 1903:—

### I.—GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

1. Medical attendance will be granted to the undermentioned Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and men of the Permanent Military Forces of the Commonwealth, under the regulations and conditions hereafter defined:—

- (1) Officers of the General and Instructional Staff, with the Warrant Officers and Non-commissioned Officers attached thereto, including Military Clerks when duly enlisted as such.
- (2) Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Men of—
 

(a) Royal Australian Artillery Regiment.	}	Permanent Establishments.
(b) Australian Corps of Engineers		
(c) Australian Army Service Corps		
(d) Australian Army Medical Corps		

2. *Definition of the term "Medical Attendance."*—The term "Medical Attendance" throughout these regulations means the professional advice and care during sickness or injury afforded in Hospital or out of Hospital by a Military Medical Officer appointed for the duty, or by a Civilian Medical Practitioner who has been appointed to take medical charge of troops.

Medical attendance does not, however, include surgical operations, except those of a minor character, and which do not involve the administration of an anæsthetic, unless such operations are performed in a Military Hospital by a Medical Officer duly appointed to take charge of troops.

Medical attendance will be restricted to the persons detailed in the following regulations, and subject to the conditions therein laid down—it will include the supply of medicines, &c., prescribed by the Military Medical Officer in charge of the case and ordered by him from a Military Hospital.

When medical attendance is given in a district where there is no Military Hospital, either by a Military Medical Officer or by a Civilian Medical Practitioner in medical charge of troops as laid down above, all medicines, &c., will be supplied by those officers in accordance with the Government Medical Regulations of their respective States, and at Government contract rates; these drugs will be confined to those of the British Pharmacopœia; patent or proprietary medicines will not be recognised.

All such attendance must be notified the day the attendance commences, for the information of the Principal Medical Officer of the State. The cessation of the attendance will also be notified in a similar manner.

In all cases where there may be a Military Medical Officer resident within a district or town, for which medical attendance has been approved, the attendance will be carried out by that officer.

3. *Admission into Hospital.*—No person, unless authorized by regulations, will be admitted as a patient into a Military Hospital without the special sanction of the State Commandant, and any departure from this rule will render the officer authorizing such deviation liable for all expenses which may be incurred.

4. *Issue of Medical Comforts, Diets, or Extras.*—Medical comforts, diets, or extras will only be issued to members of the Permanent Military Forces of the Commonwealth when admitted for treatment at a recognised military hospital, or as specified in paragraph 13 of these regulations; and any such issue made to any person or persons not so entitled, or ordered on the authority of Commanding Officers, Military Medical Officers, or Civilian Medical Practitioners in medical charge of districts or troops, will not be sanctioned as a charge against the public, and the value of all articles so issued will be recovered from those on whose certificates the issues were made.

5. *Attendance cannot be claimed in cases of Child Birth.*—Attendance cannot be claimed during their confinement for the wives of officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, or soldiers.

6. *Nominal Rolls.*—Nominal rolls of all persons entitled to medical attendance, giving the rank and address of each person, will be furnished by the Officer Commanding, or the head of the Department, on the first day of each quarter to the State P.M.O., and no person other than an enlisted soldier will be considered entitled to medical attendance whose name is not included in this roll.

### II.—OFFICERS, THEIR WIVES AND CHILDREN.

7. *Conditions entitling to Attendance.*—Officers are entitled to medical attendance at the public expense only under the following conditions:—

(a) That the officer is at a station where there is a Military Medical Officer appointed for the duty, or a Civilian Medical Practitioner who has been appointed to take medical charge of troops, as laid down in para. 2.

(b) Officers not living in barracks will be entitled to medical attendance, provided they reside within a radius of 2 miles from barracks.

In all cases of attendance at Head-Quarters the medicines must be supplied from the Military Hospital, where such exists, on a written order of the Medical Officer in charge of the case.

8. *Recovery of Expenses when Injured on Duty.*—An officer or soldier injured in the execution of his duty may (subject in each case to the regulations regarding "Compensation for injuries received on duty," published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette*, No. 50, of the 24th October, 1902) be entitled to recover any reasonable expenses for his medical attendance, should the services of a Military Medical Officer or a Civilian Medical Practitioner in medical charge of troops be not available; provided that in each case the commencement of the attendance is reported within 72 hours, and the Civilian Medical Practitioner so employed is approved of by the State Principal Medical Officer.

9. *Admission under urgent circumstances.*—In cases of great urgency an officer may, on the recommendation of the State Principal Medical Officer or his representative (who will first ascertain whether there is accommodation vacant), be at once admitted for treatment into a Military Hospital, if accommodation is available, pending sanction from higher authority.

10. *Attendance on Officers' Wives and Children.*—The wives and children of officers (up to fourteen years of age) are entitled to medical attendance at the public expense only when the officers are serving under the conditions stated in paragraph 7.

11. *Claims for Medical Practitioners privately employed by Officers.*—Except as before specified, claims for reimbursement on account of the services of Civilian Medical Practitioners employed privately by officers for attendance on themselves, their wives, and children, or for medicines purchased by them, will not under any circumstances be entertained.

### III.—WARRANT OFFICERS, THEIR WIVES AND CHILDREN.

12. *Regulations for Attendance on Warrant Officers.*—Warrant officers will, under ordinary circumstances, when requiring medical attendance present themselves at a Military Hospital or Dispensary at 10 a.m., unless their illness be of such a nature as to prevent their doing so, in which case they will be visited in their own quarters, or their own residence, provided that they reside within a radius of 2 miles from barracks or Head-Quarters.

13. *Admission into a Military Hospital.*—When it is considered absolutely necessary by the Medical Officer in attendance, warrant officers will be admitted to a Military Hospital when available, separate accommodation being afforded them when practicable. When under treatment in their own quarters or residence, medical comforts will only be allowed in cases where it is certified that the illness is due to injury on duty.

14. *Attendance on Wives and Families of Warrant Officers.*—The wives and children (up to fourteen years of age) of warrant officers, will receive medical attendance in their quarters. When not residing in quarters they will be entitled to medical attendance as laid down in paragraph 12.

### IV.—NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND MEN.

15. *Admission to a Military Hospital or Attendance.*—Non-commissioned officers and men will, when sick, be admitted to a Military Hospital where available. Where there is no Military Hospital they will be entitled, whether on duty or on sick furlough, to admission to a civil hospital which has been duly approved of, and to medical attendance at the public expense, provided they are attended by a Military Medical Officer or a Civilian Medical Practitioner, duly appointed to the medical charge of troops of the district they may happen to be in. This does not apply, however, to soldiers on ordinary furlough, or to deserters. Non-commissioned officers of the Staff will not, as a rule, be admitted to a Military Hospital for treatment, but may be so on the recommendation of a State Principal Medical Officer.

### V.—THE WIVES OF NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND MEN.

16. *Attendance for Wives and Children.*—The wives of non-commissioned officers and men, who are borne on the married roll, with their children and step children (up to fourteen years of age), will be allowed medical attendance only at Head-Quarters, where there is a Military Medical Officer in medical charge of troops, or when doing duty on detachment where there is a Military Medical Officer duly appointed, or a Civilian Medical Practitioner appointed to take medical charge of troops, as laid down in paragraph 12.

NOTE.—Any regulations in force in any State under any of the State Acts hereinbefore mentioned regarding medical attendance to members of the Permanent Military Forces, are hereby repealed from the 1st July, 1903, inclusive.

HIS Excellency the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, in exercise of the powers conferred by the undermentioned State Acts, namely:—

and by the Constitution of the Commonwealth, has been pleased to make the following Regulations under the provisions of the said Acts, to define the duties of Officers of the Australian Army Medical Corps, Militia or Partially Paid, and Volunteer Establishments; to take effect on and from the 1st day of July, 1903:—

(A) MILITIA OR PARTIALLY PAID ESTABLISHMENT.

*I. Regular Duties.*

1. Medical examination of all recruits, or, when necessary, of any men duly enlisted, for the Regiments and Corps in the respective Districts or Localities to which they may be attached.
2. Instruct their Regimental Stretcher-bearers in First Aid and Stretcher Exercises.
3. Attend such parades of their Regiments and Corps as may be laid down in the programme of parades.
4. Attend Camp of continuous training.
5. Attend as Medical Officer the Annual Meetings of the National or Defence Force Rifle Association or Artillery Association when detailed by the Principal Medical Officer of the District.
6. Attend Medical Boards on Militia or Partially Paid Services.
7. To make sanitary inspection and furnish reports on Barracks and Fortifications in their respective Districts or Localities, when so detailed by the Principal Medical Officer of the District.

*II. Special Services.*

1. Attendance at a Military Hospital, where such exists, for the accommodation and treatment of Permanent Troops during absence on duty of the Officer in Medical Charge of Permanent Troops, at £1 ls. per diem, when so detailed.
2. Administration of Anæsthetics, or consultation with, or assisting at an operation with the Medical Officer in charge of Hospital for Permanent Troops, at £2 2s.
3. Medical Boards on Permanent Services, at £2 2s.

(B) VOLUNTEER ESTABLISHMENT.

1. Attend, without remuneration, such parades of the Units to which they are attached as may be ordered, and also undertake the instruction of the Regimental Stretcher-bearers.
2. Medical examination of Recruits for Militia or Partially Paid Regiments and Corps to which they may be attached, in those Districts or Localities where no Medical Officer of the Militia or Partially Paid Establishments exists, at a fixed rate of 2s. 6d. per each recruit examined. To be charged to "Medical examination of recruits."
3. Attend Camps of continuous training, or any local Camp, if specially detailed for same, in which case they may receive the daily rate of pay of their rank as laid down in Financial Instructions. To be charged to Camp Vote.
4. Attend Medical Boards when detailed by the District Principal Medical Officer, at rates of remuneration similar to those laid down for Officers on the Militia or Partially Paid Establishments as regards Permanent Services.

NOTE.—Any Regulations in force in any State under any of the State Acts hereinbefore mentioned, which are inconsistent with these Regulations, are hereby revoked to the extent of such inconsistency.
