REPEAL OF PUBLIC SERVICE REGULATION No. 66—PAYMENT FOR SUNDAY WORK—AND SUBSTITUTION THEREFOR OF A NEW REGULATION.

Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 80 of the Public Service Act 1902, has approved of the repeal of Regulation No. 66, and of the substitution therefor of a new Regulation, as set forth in the accompanying schedule; such new Regulation to take effect on and from the 1st January, 1904.

PAYMENT FOR SUNDAY WORK.

66. "Where an officer, having already worked six days during the week, is necessarily required in addition thereto to attend on a Sunday for a whole day, the Permanent Head or Chief Officer may authorize the grant of one and a half day's pay, or if employed for less than a whole day a sum proportionate to the time so employed. No allowance shall be paid for Sunday duty where an officer is in residence and where his attendance is intermittent and for brief periods.

No officer or employé in the Public Service shall be liable to dismissal or punishment or other disability for refusing on conscientious grounds to work on Sunday if he has previously notified the Chief Officer that he has conscientious scruples against so working; but he shall not refuse when called upon by his immediate superior to perform Sunday duty in cases of necessity. If it should subsequently be found that an officer has improperly made use of this Regulation to avoid the performance of his duties, his conduct shall be regarded as a breach of Regulations under the Act."

REGULATIONS FOR THE USE OF SUBSCRIBERS'
TELEPHONES BY THE PUBLIC ON THE TICKET
SYSTEM.

1. These regulations shall take effect on the 14th day of

January, 1904.

2. Any subscriber to a telephone exchange who pays a subscription at the business rate may apply to the Deputy Postmaster-General for permission to place his telephone at the service of the public.

3. The Deputy Postmaster-General may, if he thinks fit, grant the permission applied for, and thereupon the telephone shall be available for public use, subject to these regulations.

4. The subscriber shall, if the permission is granted, exhibit a plain and legible notice in a prominent position on his premises indicating that the telephone is available for public

5. A charge of threepence (3d.) for each conversation of three minutes or part of three minutes shall be made and shall be paid by ticket as herein provided.

6. Tickets for the payment of conversation charges shall be issued by the Postmaster-General's Department and sold at the price of threepence each. Books containing twelve tickets each may be purchased on application at the General l'ost Office.

7. Any person who desires to use the telephone shall place a ticket in a locked box, to be provided and kept by the subscriber, but opened and cleared only by an officer of the Postmaster-General's Department, and may then use the telephone.

8. An additional ticket must be placed in the box for each three minutes or part of three minutes by which the conversational ticket three minutes

tions exceed the first three minutes.

9. The subscriber shall be entitled to receive one penny from the Postmaster-General for each ticket removed from the box

by the officer who opens it.

10. Nothing in these regulations shall affect the use of the telephone by the subscriber, his family, or employés in his busi-

ADDITION TO REGULATION UNDER HEADING "REPLIES MAY BE PREPAID."

(On Page 257 of Gazette copy.)

A telegram containing in the text thereof the words "reply paid" or the indication "R.P." (either of which must be paid for by the sender as part of the message) shall not be accepted for transmission unless an amount in prepayment of the desired reply has actually been lodged by the sender of such telegram.

MONEY ORDERS.

The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 21 under the head "Money Orders" of the Regulations made under the Post and Telegraph Act 1901, and published in the Gazette on the 5th June, 1902:—

21. If payment of an order, whether issued in the Commonwealth or elsewhere, be not obtained before the end of the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in January, and not paid before the end of the following January) all claim to the money will be lost. Nevertheless, when a good reason can be given for delay in presenting the order, an application for payment, subject to a deduction at the rate of 6d. for every £5 or fraction thereof, will be considered.

This regulation shall take effect from the fourteenth day of January, 1904.
