



CADETSHIPS IN THE ROYAL NAVY. REVISED REGULATIONS.

THE following particulars are published for the in-formation of parents who desire their sons to secure nominations for Cadetships in the Royal Navy:—

The Commonwealth is granted eight nominations for Cadetships in the Royal Navy annually.
 Applications for nomination should be made to the Governor-General or to the Governor of the State in which the applicant resides.

3. Candidates must be of pure European descent, and the sons either of natural born or of naturalized British subjects.

4. Candidates must pass a qualifying examination in educational subjects, which will, when necessary, be held in the capital of each State in the months of February, June, and October of each year.
5. Candidates for examination in-

February must be more than 13 years and 4 months but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the following 1st April.

June must be more than 13 years and 4 months but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the following 1st August.

October must be more than 13 years and 4 months but not more than 13 years and 8 months of age on the following 1st December.

6. Applications must be lodged (1) before the 1st August for the first examination; (2) before the 1st December for the second; and (3) before 1st April for the third.

7. Candidates must also pass a medical examination.

Candidates must also pass a medical examination.
 If the nomination is approved, and the candidate passes the qualifying and medical examinations, he will be sent to England for a four years and eight months' period of training.
 The fees payable to the College are £75 per annum, exclusive of expenses for clothing, books,

and other requisites, pocket money, &c.

10. Parents or guardians are required to undertake to pay to the Admiralty, if demanded, in the event of a Cadet withdrawing or being withdrawn from the College, or from the Navy, before being confirmed as a Sub-Lièutenant, £25 per term in respect of each term passed by him at the R. N. Colleges, Osborne and Dartmouth, from the date of his entry to the date of his withdrawal. This undertaking does not apply to Cadets withdrawn at the request of the Admiralty under certain conditions.

The College fees cease on the Cadet joining the Training Cruiser, i.e., after four years.

- A private allowance of £50 per annum is then required to be made to Cadets until they reach the rank of Acting Sub-Lieutenant.
