AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

THE 30TH DAY OF MARCH, 1916.

Present:

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas by the Declaration of London Order in Council No. 2, 1914, His Majesty was pleased to direct that during the present hostilities the provisions of the Convention known as the Declaration of London should, subject to certain omissions and modifications therein set out, be adopted and put in force by His Majesty's Government; and

Whereas doubts have arisen as to the effect of Article I (iii) of the said Order in Council on the right to effect the capture of conditional contraband on board a vessel bound for a neutral port; and

Whereas it is expedient to put an end to such doubts and otherwise to amend the said Order in Council in the manner hereinafter appearing; and

Whereas by Article 19 of the said Declaration it is provided that whatever may be the ulterior destination of a vessel or of her cargo, she cannot be captured for breach of blockade if, at the moment, she is on her way to a non-blockaded port; and

Whereas it is no longer expedient to adopt Article 19 of the said Declaration; C.7038.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. The provisions of the Declaration of London Order in Council No. 2, 1914, shall not be deemed to limit or to have limited in any way the right of His Majesty, in accordance with the law of nations, to capture goods upon the ground that they are conditional contraband, nor to affect or to have affected the liability of conditional contraband to capture, whether the carriage of the goods to their destination be direct or entail transhipment or a subsequent transport by land.
- 2. The provisions of Article 1 (ii) and (iii) of the said Order in Council shall apply to absolute contraband as well as to conditional contraband.
- 3. The destinations referred to in Article 30 and in Article 33 of the said Declaration shall (in addition to any presumptions laid down in the said Order in Council) be presumed to exist, if the goods are consigned to or for a person who, during the present hostilities, has forwarded imported contraband goods to territory belonging to or occupied by the enemy.
- 4. In the cases covered by Articles 2 and 3 of this Order, it shall lie upon the owner of the goods to prove that their destination was innocent.
- 5. From and after the date of this Order, Article 19 of the Declaration of London shall cease to be adopted and put in force. Neither a vessel nor her cargo shall be immune from capture for breach of blockade upon the sole ground that she is at the moment on her way to a non-blockaded port.
- 6. This Order may be cited as "The Declaration of London Order in Council, 1916."

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and each of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the President of the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division of the High Court of Justice, all other Judges of His Majesty's Prize Courts, and all Governors, Officers and Authorities whom it may concern, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY ACT 1914.

THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY ACT 1914.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation dated the seventh day of July, One thousand nine hundred and fifteen, made under the Trading with the Enemy Act 1914, and published in the Gazette of the seventh day of July, the Governor-General proclaimed that any transaction with or for the benefit of a company to which the Proclamation applies is thereby declared to be trading with the enemy, and is prohibited, and that the Proclamation applies (inter alia) to any company, whether incorporated in any enemy country or not, which the Attorney-General, by notice published in the Gazette, declares to be, in his opinion, managed or controlled, directly or indirectly, by or under the influence of, or carried on wholly or mainly for the benefit or on behalf of, persons of enemy nationality, or resident or carrying on business in an enemy country:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the twenty-second day of December, One thousand nine hundred and fifteen, made under the said Act and published in the Gazette of the twenty-third day of December, One thousand nine hundred and fifteen, the Governor-General proclaimed that any transaction with or for the benefit of—

(a) any firm carrying on business in the Common-

benefit of—

(a) any firm carrying on business in the Commonwealth or elsewhere which the Attorney-General, by notice published in the Gazette, declares to be, in his opinion, managed or controlled, directly or indirectly, by or under the influence of, or carried on wholly or mainly for the benefit or on behalf of, persons of enemy nationality, or resident or carrying on business in an enemy country; or (b) any person carrying on business in the Commonwealth or elsewhere whom the Attorney-General, by notice published in the Gazette, declares to be, in his opinion—

(i) a person who is or has at any time been a subject of a State which is now at war with the King; or

(ii) a person, whether a British subject or not, who is carrying on business on behalf or in the interests of a company, firm, or person with which or with whom trading is prohibited, thereby declared to be trading with the enemy, and

Now therefore I, Hugh Mahon, Acting Attorney-General of the Commonwealth, do hereby declare the companies and firms mentioned in the Schedule hereto to be, in my opinion, managed or controlled, directly or indirectly, by or under the influence of, or carried on wholly or mainly for the benefit or on behalf of, persons of enemy nationality, or resident or carrying on business in an enemy country, and the persons mentioned in the said Schedule to be, in my opinion, persons who are or have at any time been subjects of a State which is now at war with the King; or persons, whether British subjects or not, who are carrying on business on behalf or in the interests of a company, firm, or person with which or with whom trading is prohibited.





In the case of applicants who are officers of the Public Service of the Commonwealth or of a State the following particulars should be set out at the foot of the application:—

Designation
Office or Branch
Age last birthday (in years)
Length of service (in years)
Salary (per annum)
Date of receipt of present salary

Applicants from outside the Service should state full name and date and year of birth. Copies only of diplomas, references, testimonials, or certificates should be forwarded. If the originals are required they will be asked for.

Applications should be addressed to the "Commonwealth Public Service Inspector" of the State in which the vacancy exists. If the applicant is an officer of the Commonwealth Public Service the application should be forwarded to the Inspector through the principal officer of the Department in the State in which the officer is located, except when the vacancy is in another State, when the application should be forwarded direct by the applicant to the Inspector, a copy at the same time being forwarded to the principal officer of the Department.

Minimum and maximum salaries where shown indicate the limits of the class or grade in which the position is classified. Subject to the provisions of the Public Service Act appointments may be made at any salary within those limits. Successful appointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.

Officers of the Public Service should note that in any case where the minimum salary of a position in the Clerical Division is not the minimum salary of a Class, and the successful applicant is not eligible for the former by reason of not having received the salary of the next lower subdivision for twelve months, he will be granted an allowance equal to the difference between the salary for which he is eligible and the minimum salary of the position until he can be advanced by annual subdivisional increments to the latter salary.

Where vacancies are notified in positions which have been the subject of award, the minimum and maximum salaries shown are those prescribed by the award. If the officer appointed to any such position is eligible to become, but is not, a member of the organization which obtained the award, he can only be paid the rates of salary prescribed in the Public Service Act or Regulations for the position to which he has been appointed, unless and until he becomes a member of the organization, when the award rates shall apply.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or increase of salary, as the result of an application for an advertised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions prescribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.

Particulars of existing quarters are furnished merely for the information of officers. It is not incumbent on Departments to provide quarters, which, if provided, may be wholly or partially withdrawn at any time.
