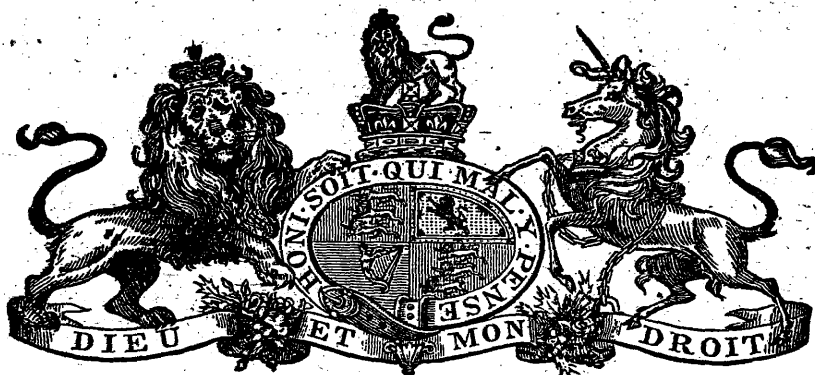

GREETING:

WHEREAS by the *Judiciary Act* 1903-1915 it is enacted that indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth shall be prosecuted by indictment in the name of the Attorney-General of the Commonwealth or of such other person as the Governor-General appoints in that behalf and that any such appointment shall be by Commission in the King's name and may extend to the whole Commonwealth or to any State or part of the Commonwealth: And whereas it is desirable to appoint some person to prosecute indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth triable within Our State of Queensland: Now, therefore, We do hereby appoint you to prosecute by indictment in your name indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth triable within Our State of Queensland as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as Our Attorney-General of Our Commonwealth of Australia could prosecute those offences: And We give and grant to you all such powers and authorities of Our said Attorney-General in relation to those offences as are capable of being granted by this Commission, including the power, when any person is under commitment upon a charge of any such offence, to decline to proceed further in the prosecution, and, if the person is in custody, by warrant under your hand to direct the discharge of the person from custody: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the power of Our Attorney-General of Our Commonwealth of Australia or of any other person appointed by Us in that behalf to prosecute by indictment in his name any indictable offence against the laws of the Commonwealth triable within Our said State: And We declare that this Our Commission shall continue in force so long as you hold the office of Minister for Justice for Our said State unless sooner revoked by Our Governor-General in and over Our Commonwealth of Australia.

Witness Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Sir Ronald Craufurd Munro Ferguson, a Member of Our Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Commonwealth of Australia, this twenty-fifth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty, and in the tenth year of Our reign.

DETERMINATION OF MAXIMUM PRICES.

ORDER No. 641.

BUTTER.—VICTORIA AND SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

Melbourne, 15th March, 1920.

I, WALTER MASSY GREENE, acting for the Minister of State for Defence, in pursuance of the War Precautions (Prices) Regulations 1916, and on the recommendation of the Chief Commissioner for Prices, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Order No. 641, and shall come into force on the 16th day of March, 1920.

2. Prices Order No. 637, made on the 21st day of February, 1920, is hereby amended by substituting in the Schedule to the said Order, relating to Victoria, for the figures 200s. 8d. and 2s., the figures 214s. 8d. and 2s. 3d. respectively, and in the Schedule to the said Order relating to South Australia, for the figures 224s. and 2s. 2½d., the figures 233s. 4d. and 2s. 5½d. respectively.

APPLICATIONS CLOSE.—Applications, stating both home address and present place of residence, must be lodged not later than Wednesday, the 7th April, 1920, with the Secretary, Commonwealth Public Service Commissioner, Customs House, Melbourne, from whom printed forms of application may be obtained either by written or personal request.

A Telegraph Messenger on attaining the age of 18 years must retire from the Service unless he has qualified for promotion. Promotion examinations are held half-yearly.

Officers of the Public Service should note that in any case where the minimum salary of a position in the Clerical Division is not the minimum salary of a Class, and the successful applicant is not eligible for the former by reason of not having received the salary of the next lower subdivision for twelve months, he will be granted an allowance equal to the difference between the salary for which he is eligible and the minimum salary of the position until he can be advanced by annual subdivisional increments to the latter salary.

Where vacancies are notified in positions which have been the subject of award, the minimum and maximum salaries shown are those prescribed by the award. If the officer appointed to any such position is eligible to become, but is not, a member of the organization which obtained the award, he can only be paid the rates of salary prescribed in the Public Service Act or Regulations for the position to which he has been appointed, unless and until he becomes a member of the organization, when the award rates shall apply.

Officers promoted to positions in the Fourth Class, which come within the scope of the award of the Australian Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association, may be restrained at the salary of £245 where, in the opinion of the Acting Commissioner, the fixing of that salary as a maximum is justified.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or increase of salary, as the result of an application for an advertised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions prescribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.

Particulars of existing quarters are furnished merely for the information of officers. It is not incumbent on Departments to provide quarters, which, if provided, may be wholly or partially withdrawn at any time.
