(6) Such matters as in the opinion of the Committee ar expedient, in regard to provision and manufacture of materials necessary for the purposes of construction;

and to inquire and report upon any special matter in relation to the lay-out and construction of the Federal Capital City, as and when directed by the Minister for Works and Railways.

Three Members of the Committee to form a quorum—in the event of an equal division, the Chairman to have a casting works.

Any decision of a majority of the Committee shall be deemed to be the decision of the Committee, but any Member who dissents therefrom shall be entitled to make a minority report.

THE NORTHERN TERRITORY OF AUSTRALIA.

No. 1 of 1921.

AN ORDINANCE

To amend the Early Closing Ordinance 1912.

BE it ordained by the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory Acceptance Act 1910-1919 and the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910, as follows:—

Short title and citation.

- 1.—(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the Early Closing Ordinance 1921.
- (2.) The Early Closing Ordinance 1912 is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the *Early Closing Ordinance* 1912–1921.

Definitions.

- 2. Section three of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting the definition of "closing time" and inserting in its stead the following definition:—
 - "'closing time' means the period fixed, in pursuance of this Ordinance, within which shops shall be kept closed;".

Special provision as to certain shops.

- 3. Section four of the Principal Ordinance is amended
 - (a) by omitting sub-section (1.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-section:—
 - (1.) The closing times fixed in pursuance of this Ordinance shall not so far as regards goods usually sold therein apply to shops of the classes set out in the First or Second Schedule, but shall apply as regards other goods:

Provided that shops of the classes set out in the Second Schedule shall close not later than twelve o'clock midnight and remain closed for not less than four hours."; and

(b) by omitting from sub-sections (2.) and (3.) the words "the Schedule" and inserting in their stead the words "the First or Second Schedule".

Powers of Administrator.

4. Section five of the Principal Ordinance is amended by inserting in sub-section (3.), before the words "closing time," the words "commencement of".

Penalty for not keeping shop closed during closing time.

- 5. Section six of the Principal Ordinance is amended-
 - (a) by omitting sub-section (1.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-section:—
 - "(1.) Every shop shall be kept closed on each day during the closing time applicable thereto, and for the remainder of the day no goods shall be sold or offered for sale in the shop.

Penalty: Fifty pounds."; and

(b) by inserting in sub-section (4.), before the words "closing time" (wherever occurring), the words "the commencement of".

- 6. After section six of the Principal Ordinance, the following sections are inserted:—
 - "6A. Any person who, during closing time, purchases or goods not to attempts to purchase goods at any shop to which the during closing closing-time applies shall be guilty of an offence against time. this Ordinance.

Penalty: Fifty pounds.

"6B. No shopkeeper shall use or permit to be used any shop shop not to be as a residence or sleeping apartment for himself or any residence. other person or for any domestic purpose whatsoever.

Penalty: Fifty pounds.

- "6c.—(1.) Every shopkeeper shall place, in a conspicuous Penal provisions of place in his shop, a copy of the penal sections of this ordinance to be posted in shop.
- "(2.) Any shopkeeper who fails to comply, to the satisfaction of the Administrator or a person thereto authorized in writing by the Administrator, with the provisions of the last preceding sub-section shall be guilty of an offence, against this Ordinance.

Penalty: Fifty pounds.

- "6D. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to any office Application in the same premises as a shop as if it were a shop and to offices. whether or not the office is separated from the shop by a partition.".
- 7. Section ten of the Principal Ordinance is repealed.

Repeal of section 10.

8. The Schedule to the Principal Ordinance is repealed, and the The Schedules following Schedules inserted in its stead:—

THE TERRITORY OF NORFOLK ISLAND.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE CENSUS ORDINANCE 1920.

BY virtue of the Census Ordinance 1920, of the Territory of Norfolk D Island, I, ALEXANDER POYNTON, the Minister of State for Home and Territories, hereby make the following Regulations.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE CENSUS ORDINANCE 1920. Short Title.

- 1. These Regulations may be cited as the Census Regulations 1921.
- 2. In these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears-

The Territory "means the Territory of Norfolk Island; The Ordinance" means the Census Ordinance 1920 or any Ordinance in amendment thereof.

Delegation of Powers of Statistician.

- 3.—(1.) The Statistician may, by writing under his hand, delegate any of his powers or functions under these Regulations (except this power of delegation) in relation to any matters or class of matters so that the delegated powers may be exercised by the delegate with respect to the matters or class of matters specified in the instrument of delegation.
- 2.) Every delegation by the Statistician shall be revocable in writing at will, and no delegation shall prevent the exercise of any power or function by the Statistician.

Deputy Supervisor.

- 4. For the Territory of Norfolk Island there shall be an officer called the Deputy Supervisor, who shall be appointed by the Minister, on the recommendation of the Statistician, and shall hold office from the date of appointment until the thirtieth day of September, 1921, or until the termination of the appointment by the Minister, whichever first happens.
- 5. Subject to the Ordinance and these Regulations and to the directions of the Statistician, it shall be the duty of the Deputy Supervisor
 - (i) to make all necessary arrangements for the taking and collection of the census in the Territory.
 - (ii) to obtain an accurate record of the population of the Territory; and
 - (iii) to promptly forward such record, together with such summaries or reports relative thereto as may be directed by the Commonwealth Statistician.
- 6. The Deputy Supervisor shall, in addition to any emolument which he is otherwise receiving, receive such payment as the Minister, on the recommendation of the Statistician, approves.

Collectors' Districts.

- 7. The Territory shall be divided into as many Collectors' Districts as the Statistician deems necessary.
- 8. For each Collector's District, there shall be an officer called a Collector, who shall, in relation to that district, carry out such duties in connexion with the taking and collection of the Census as are prescribed or as are assigned to him by the Statistician.
- 9. Each Collector shall, in addition to any emolument which he is otherwise receiving, receive such payment as the Minister, on the advice of the Statistician, approves.
 - 10. Each Collector shall be appointed by the Deputy Supervisor.
- 11. Each Collector shall hold office during the pleasure of the Statistician, but not longer than is necessary to finish the work for which he is appointed.
- 12. Each Collector shall, before his appointment, or before he commences duty, sign, in the presence of a witness, an undertaking in accordance with the following form:

by the Commonwealth Statistician; or by the Deputy Supervisor of the said Territory, and that I will not desert from my duty, or will not refuse or neglect, without just excuse, to perform the duties of the office of Collector or wilfully, or without lawful authority, alter any document or form under the above-named Ordinance or the Regulations thereunder, or wilfully sign any untrue document or form, or, except as allowed by the said Ordinance or Regulations, divulge the contents of any form filled up in pursuance of the said Ordinance.

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Householders' Schedule.

- 13. The Householders' Schedule shall consist of a Dwelling Card or Slip in respect of the Dwelling, as well as one Personal Card or Slip in respect of each person resident therein.
- 14. The Dwelling Card or Slip and the Personal Card or Slip shall be in such forms as the Statistician deems appropriate.

Distribution of Schedules.

- 15. Prior to Census Day each Collector shall, in accordance with his instructions, leave a householder's schedule at each occupied dwelling within the Collector's district allotted to him.
- 16. Except under special instructions from his Enumerator or Subenumerator, a Collector shall not leave a householder's schedule at any dwelling earlier than seven days nor later than one day before Census Day.
- 17. The householder's schedule should be left with the occupier of the dwelling, or, in the absence of the occupier, with the person apparently in charge of the dwelling. If no person is in when the Collector calls, a householder's schedule, comprising a dwelling card or slip, and as many personal cards or slips as there are, in the Collector's opinion, persons usually resident in the dwelling, may be placed in a letter-box, put under the door, or put in some other place where it is likely to come under the notice of the occupier.
- 18. It shall be the duty of every person (other-than the occupier) who receives a householder's schedule, or to whose hands or notice a householder's schedule comes, to deliver it or bring it to the notice of the occupier for whom it is intended.

Penalty: Five pounds.

19. Where a house is let, sub-let, or held in different apartments, and occupied by different persons or families, a householder's schedule shall be left for each part so let, sub-let, or held in different apartments.

Duty to Supply Required Particulars.

20. Every occupier of a dwelling is required to supply, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the particulars asked for in the householder's schedule to sign the schedule, and to deliver it to the Collector.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

21. Every person who spent the night prior to Census Day in any dwelling, or who, being absent on that night, returned thereto on Census Day without being counted elsewhere, is required to fill in the particulars asked for on the personal card or slip relating to himself, and to hand the completed card or slip to the occupier, or to furnish to the occupier all information necessary to enable him to fill in such particulars.

. Penalty: Ten pounds.

Householder's Schedules for Ships.

- 22. In the case of a ship or vessel in any port of the Territory the house-holder's schedule shall be delivered to the master of the ship, who shall be deemed to be the occupier.
- 23. Where a ship or vessel is on a passage between any two ports of the Territory on Census Day, and a householder's schedule for the ship was not left with the master before Census Day, a householder's schedule shall be left with him immediately on arrival of the ship at the first port of call on or after Census Day.
- 24. The master of a ship or vessel with whom a householder's schedule is left, in pursuance of either of the last two preceding regulations, shall, to the best of his knowledge and belief, fill up and supply therein, in accordance with the instructions contained in or accompanying the schedule, all the particulars specified therein, and shall sign his name thereto, and shall deliver the schedule so filled up and signed to the Collector authorized to receive it.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

25. Every person who spent the night prior to Census Day on the ship, or who, being absent on that night, returned thereto on Census Day without being counted elsewhere, is required to fill in the particulars asked for on the

personal card or slip relating to himself, and to hand the completed card or slip to the master of the ship, or to furnish to the master all information necessary to enable him to fill in such particulars.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

Persons not in any Dwelling or Ship.

26. Every person who spent the night prior to Census Day elsewhere than in a dwelling or on a ship, and who did not return to a dwelling or a ship on Census Day, and who was not otherwise counted, is required to immediately report at the nearest post office or police station on or after Census Day, and to furnish there the particulars asked for on the personal card or slip.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

27. If a Collector comes in contact with any person camping out in his district on the night prior to Census Day, or meets on or after Census Day any person who camped out on that night, and who at the time of meeting had not been recorded, he shall require that person to fill in forthwith the requisite personal cards or slips, or to furnish the Collector forthwith with all informatien necessary to enable the Collector to fill in the cards or slips himself, and any person who refuses or fails to comply with any requirement of the Collector under this regulation shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

Collection of Schedules.

28. On or after Census Day each Collector shall, in accordance with his instructions, call at each dwelling within the Collector's district or districts allotted to him, and shall obtain therefrom the appropriate householder's schedule duly filled in.

Houses "Uninhabited" and "Being Built."

29. In the case of a building or part of a building ordinarily used for human habitation, but uninhabited at the date of the Census, the Collector shall supply on a "dwelling" card or slip such of the particulars as are required to be filled in on the card or slip as he can ascertain by observation and inquiry, and shall himself sign the card or slip, writing the word "unoccupied "across the face of it.

30. In the case of a house intended for human habitation which is in course of erection at the date of the Census, the Collector shall supply on a "dwelling" card or slip such of the particulars as are required to be filled in on the card or slip as he can ascertain by observation and inquiry, together with an estimate of the probable date of completion, and shall himself sign the card or slip writing the words "being built" across the face of it.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all to whom these Presents shall Greeting:

whereas We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual, dated 28th December, 1914, institute and create a new Decoration, entitled "The Military Cross," to be awarded to Officers of certain ranks in Our Army in recognition of distinguished and meritorious services in time of War, and did make, ordain, and establish certain rules and ordinances for the governance of the same, which rules and ordinances were subsequently amended by Royal Warrants, dated the 23rd day of August, 1916, and the 25th day of June, 1917:

And whereas it is expedient that our said Royal Warrants should be further amended:.

should be luriner amended:

Now therefore We do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances contained in Our said Royal Warrants shall be abrogated, cancelled, and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain, and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept:—

Firstly.—It is ordained that the Cross shall be designated "The Military Cross."

Secondly.—It is ordained that the Military Cross shall consist of a Cross of Silver having on each arm the Imperial Crown, and bearing in the centre the Royal and Imperial

Thirdly.—It is ordained that the Military Cross may be awarded to a Captain, a Commissioned Officer of a lower grade, or a Warrant Officer, Class I. or II., in any of Our Military Forces, and that the Military Cross shall be awarded only to Officers of the above ranks for gallant and distinguished services in action, on a recommendation to us by Our Principal Secretary of State for War. Officers not above the substantive rank of Captain who hold the acting or temporary rank of Major, and acting or temporary Chaplains, 3rd Class, shall also be eligible.

Fourthly.—It is ordained that Foreign Officers of an equivalent rank to those abovementioned who have been associated in Military Operations with Our Military Forces shall be eligible for the award of the Military Cross.

Fifthly.—It is ordained that any one who, after having performed services for which the Military Cross is awarded, performed services for which the Military Cross is awarded, subsequently performs an approved act of gallantry in action which, if he had not received the Cross, would have entitled him to it, shall be awarded a Bar to be attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, and for every additional such act an additional Bar may be added.

Sixthly.-It is ordained-

(1) that a Warrant Officer, Class I. or II., of any of Our Military Forces who has been awarded the Military Military Forces who has been awarded the Military Cross shall be paid a gratuity of £20 on promotion to a Commission, on transfer to Our Army Reserve, or on discharge without pension;

(2) that if he is discharged with a pension he shall be eligible for the additional pension of 6d. a day for Europeans, and 3d. a day for non-Europeans, if not already in receipt of such additional pension;

(3) that if he is awarded a Bar or Bars to his Military Cross, and he comes under sub-paragraph (1) of this clause, each Bar shall, for gratuity purposes, be regarded as an original award of the decoration. If however, he comes under sub-paragraph (2) of

- If, however, he comes under sub-paragraph (2) of this clause, no gratuity or further addition to pension shall be issuable in respect of a Bar or Bars;
- (4) that awards of the Military Cross to officers of an Allied or associated Army, which may be granted under the fourth clause of this Our Royal Warrant, shall not entitle the recipient to any pension or gratuity in respect thereof.

Seventhly.—It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer this Decoration shall be published in the London Gazette, and that a Register thereof shall be kept in the Office of Our Principal Secretary of State

-It is ordained that the Military Cross shall be worn before Medals in such position in regard to other Decorations as We may from time to time assign to it, and shall be worn on the left breast pendent from a riband of 1 inch and 3 in width, which shall be in colour white with a purple stripe—watered.

Ninthly.—It is ordained that the Military Cross shall not confer any individual precedence, but shall entitle the recipient to the addition after his name of the letters, "M.C."

Tenthly.-It is ordained-

- (1) that a recipient of the Military Cross who suffers death by sentence of Court Martial; or, if an Officer, is cashiered, dismissed, or removed from Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces for misconduct; or if a sailor, soldier, or airman, is discharged from Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces with ignominy, or for misconduct, or on account of a conviction by the Civil Power, or for having been sentenced to penal servitude, shall forfeit the Military Cross (unless otherwise recommended by the Army Council): Council);
- (2) that if a recipient of the Military Cross is convicted by the Civil Power, or is dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act 1907, he shall be liable to a like forfeiture on the recommendation of Our Army Council;

(3) that the forfeiture shall be carried out under an authority bearing Our Royal Sign Manual; and shall involve

(a) the erasure of the recipient's name from the Register of those persons upon whom the Military Cross has been conferred; and

(b) the cessation of any pension or gratuity to
which the possession of the decoration might
entitle the recipient, but no such forfeiture
shall extend to any sum of money which
has already been paid;

(4) that We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall at all times
have power to restore a forfeited Military Cross,
and with it such pension or gratuity as may have
been forfeited:

been forfeited;
(5) that a notice of forfeiture or of restoration shall in every case be published in the London Gazette.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our Heirs, and Successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Regulations, or any part thereof, by a notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come. Greeting:

Whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, by a Warrant dated the 23rd day of April, 1883, did institute, constitute, and create a Decoration designated "The Royal Red Cross," to be awarded in recognition of special services rendered in nursing the sick and wounded of Our Army and Navy, and nursing the sick and wounded of our Army and Navy, and did make, ordain, and establish certain rules and ordinances for the governance of the same, which rules and ordinances were subsequently amended by Royal Warrants, dated the 11th day of December, 1897, the 24th day of July, 1902, the 8th day of September, 1909, the 10th day of November, 1915, the 15th day of Becember, 1917, and the 30th day of April, 1918

And whereas it is expedient that Our said Royal Warrants should be amended and consolidated.

Now therefore We do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances contained in Our said Royal Warrants shall be abrogated, cancelled, and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain, and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept:—

Firstly.-It is ordained-

- (i) that the Decoration shall be styled and designated "The Royal Red Cross," and that it shall be divided into two classes;
- (ii) that the First Class shall consist of a Cross, enamelled red, edged with gold, having on the arms thereof the words Faith, Hope, Charity, with the date of the institution of the Decoration; the centre having thereon in relief the Royal and Imperial Effigy, and that on the reverse thereof the Royal and Imperial Cipher and Crown shall be shown in relief on the centre; and
- on the centre; and

 (iii) That the Second Class shall consist of a Cross of the same form and size as the First Class, but of frosted silver, with a Maltese Cross enamelled red not exceeding half its dimensions superimposed thereon, the centre having thereon in relief the Royal and Imperial Effigy, and that the reverse shall have inscribed on the arms thereof the words Faith, Hope, Charity and the date of institution of the original Decoration, the centre having thereon in relief the Royal and Imperial Cipher and Crown.

Secondly.—It is ordained that the Cross in either class shall be attached to a dark-blue riband edged red, of one inch in width, tied in a bow, and worn on the left shoulder.

Thirdly.—It is ordained that the Decoration may be by the Queen Regnant, the Queen Consort, or the Queen Dowager of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and that it shall be competent for Us, Our Heirs, and Successors to confer either class of the Decoration upon any of the Princesses of the Royal Family of Great Britain and Ireland; also upon the Queens or Princesses of Foreign Countries who may have specially exerted themselves in providing for the nursing of the sick and wounded of Foreign Armies and Navies.

Fourthly.—It is ordained that the First Class of the Decoration may be conferred upon a fully trained Nurse who is a member of one of the officially recognised Nursing Services, and who has shown exceptional devotion and competency in

the performance of actual nursing duties with Our Army in the rield, or in Our Naval, Military, or Air Force Hospitals, or in an Auxiliary War Hospital, over a continuous and long period, or who has performed some very exceptional act of bravery and devotion at her post of duty, and whose name has been brought to Our notice by Our Secretary of State for War, Our First Lord of the Admiralty, or Our Secretary of State for Air.

Fifthly.—It is ordained that the Second Class of the Decoration may be conferred upon a fully trained Nurse, or an Assistant Nurse, Probationer; or V.A.D. Nursing Member, who belongs to one of the officially recognised Nursing Services, and who has shown special devotion and competency in the performance of actual nursing duties with Our Army in the Field. or in Our Naval, Military, or Air Force Hospitals, or in an Auxiliary War Hospital, over a continuous and long period, or who has performed some very exceptional act of bravery and devotion at her post of duty, and whose name has been brought to Our notice by Our Secretary of State for War, Our First Lord of the Admiralty, or Our Secretary of State for Air.

Sixthly.—It is ordained that the number of awards in the First Class of the Decoration shall not exceed two per cent. of the total establishment of Nurses, and that the number of awards in the Second Class of the Decoration shall not exceed five per cent. of the total establishment of Nurses, the allotments to be proportionate to the number of each Nursing Service; provided, nevertheless, that it shall be competent for Us, Our Heirs, and Successors to make such additions as, under exceptional circumstances, We may deem fitting.

Seventhly.—It is ordained that a recipient of the First Class of the Decoration shall not afterwards be awarded the Second Class; that recipients of the Second Class of the Decoration, if trained nurses, shall be eligible for advancement to the First Class as vacancies may arise; and that on such advancement the Second Class Decoration shall be returned to the office of Our Secretary of State for War.

Eighthly.—It is ordained that recipients of the First Class of the Decoration, who are Our Subjects, shall be designated Members of the Royal Red Cross, and shall be entitled to the letters R.R.C. following their names; and that recipients of the Second Class of the Decoration, who are Our Subjects, shall be designated Associates of the Royal Red Cross, and shall be entitled to the letters A.R.R.C. following their names.

Ninthly.-It is ordained-

- (1) that either Class of the Decoration may be conferred upon ladies (other than those referred to in the 4th and 5th clauses of this Our Royal Warrant), whether subjects or foreign persons, who may be recommended to Our notice by Our Secretary of State for War, Our First Lord of the Admiralty, or Our Secretary of State for Air, as having voluntarily undertaken nursing duties and shown special devotion and competency in the performance of such duties, over a continuous and long period, in hospitals which have been specially established for the treatment of sick and wounded personnel of Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces—including our Indian Forces and the Forces of Our self-governing Dominions beyond the seas; but the First Class of the Decoration shall be conferred only upon a fully trained nurse;
- (ii) that any foreign lady upon whom the First Class of the Decoration is conferred under this Our Royal Warrant shall be regarded as an "Honorary Member," and that such person upon whom the Second Class is conferred shall be regarded as an "Honorary Associate"; and
- (iii) that the numbers of each class of the Decoration which may be conferred under this clause shall be additional to the Establishment ordained in the sixth clause of this Our Royal Warrant.

Tenthly.—It is ordained that if any one upon whom the First Class of the Decoration has been conferred is subsequently recommended for such approved service as would have rendered her eligible for the Decoration, had she not already received it, she shall be awarded a Bar, to be attached to the Decoration.

Eleventhly.—It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer the Decoration shall be published in the London Gazette, and a register thereof kept in the office of Our-Secretary of State for War.

Twelfthly.—In order to make such additional provision as shall effectually preserve pure this honorable distinction, it is ordained—

(1) that if any person upon whom such distinction shall be conferred shall, in the opinion of Our Army Council, Our Board of Admiralty, or Our Air Council, so conduct herself as to become unworthy of it, she shall forfeit the Decoration;

- (2) that if the recipient of this Decoration is convicted by the Civil Power, or is dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act 1907, she shall be liable to a like forfeiture on the recommendation of Our Army Council:
- (3) that the forfeiture shall be carried out under an authority bearing Our Royal Sign Manual, and that the recipient's name shall thereupon be erased from the register of those upon whom the said Decoration shall have been conferred;
- (4) that we, Our Heirs, and Successors shall at all times have power to restore a forfeited Royal Red Cross; and
- (5) that a notice of forfeiture or of restoration shall in every case be published in the London Gazette.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our Heirs, and Successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Regulations, or any part thereof, by a notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.

THE DISTINGUISHED CONDUCT MEDAL.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come. Greeting:

Whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, by a Warrant under her Royal Sign Manual, dated 30th September, 1862, did institute and create a silver medal bearing the words "For Distinguished Conduct in the Field," to be granted to sergeants, corporals, and privates of the Regular Army, for individual acts of distinguished conduct in the Field in any part of the world:

And whereas the rules and ordinances for the governances of the same have been amended from time to time:

And whereas We deem it expedient that the said Royal Warrant, as well as amendments thereto, which have been heretofore promulgated, or are now to be promulgated, shall be incorporated in a Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual:

Now therefore We do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances heretofore in force shall be abrogated, cancelled, and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain, and establish the folowing rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept:—

Firstly.—It is ordained that the medal, which shall be of silver, shall be designated "The Distinguished Conduct Medal," and shall bear on the obverse the Royal Effigy, and on the reverse the words, "For Distinguished Conduct in the Field."

Secondly.—It is ordained that the Distinguished Conduct Medal may be awarded on the recommendation of a Commander-in-Chief in the Field to Warrant Officers, Classes I. and II., Non-commissioned Officers, and Men, serving in any of Our Military Forces, for distinguished conduct in action in the Field.

Thirdly.—It is ordained that should any one who has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal be subsequently recommended for such approved act or acts of distinguished conduct in action in the Field as would have rendered him eligible for the Medal, had he not already received it, may be awarded a Bar to be attached to the riband by which the Medal is suspended, and that for every additional such act or acts of distinguished conduct an additional Bar may be awarded.

Fourthly.—It is ordained that the Distinguished Conduct Medal shall not confer any individual precedence, but shall entitle the recipient to the addition after his name of the letters "D.C.M."

Fifthly.—It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer the Distinguished Conduct Medal shall be published in the London Gazette, and that a register thereof shall be kept in the office of Our Principal Secretary of State for War.

Sixthly.—It is ordained that the Distinguished Conduct Medal shall be worn before war medals in such order as We may from time to time assign to it, and that it shall be worn on the left breast pendent from a riband of one inch and one-quarter in width, which shall-be in colour crimson, having in the centre a dark-blue stripe of a width equal to the crimson stripes on each side of it.

Seventhly.-It is ordained-

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eventhly.—It is ordained—

(1) that a Warant Officer, Class I. or II., Non-commissioned Officer, or Man belonging to any of Our Military Forces who has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal shall be paid a gratuity of £20 on promotion to a Commission, on transfer to Our Army Reserve, or on discharge without pension.

(2) that if he is discharged with a pension, he shall be eligible for an additional pension of 6d. a day for Europeans, and 3d. a day for non-Europeans, if not already in receipt of such additional pension;

About if he is awarded a Bar or Bars to his Distin-

- already in receipt of such additional pension; that, if he is awarded a Bar or Bars to his Distinguished Conduct Medal, and he comes under subparagraph (1) above, each bar shall, for gratuity purposes, be regarded as an original award of the Medal. - (1) that a recipient of the Distinguished Conduct Medal who suffers death by sentence of Court Martial, cr, if an officer, is cashiered, dismissed, or removed from Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces for misconduct,
 - Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces for misconduct, or, if a soldier, sailor, or airman, is discharged from Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces with ignominy, or for misconduct, or on account of a conviction by the Civil Power, or for having been sentenced to penal servitude, shall forfeit the Distinguished Conduct Medal (unless otherwise recommended by Our Army Council);
- (2) that if a recipient of the Distinguished Conduct Medal is convicted by the Civil Power, or is dealt with under the *Probation of Offenders Act* 1907, he shall be liable to a like forfeiture at the discretion of Our Army Council;
- (3) that the forfeiture of the Distinguished Conduct Medal
 - (a) the erasure of the recipient's name from the register of persons upon whom the Distin-guished Conduct Medal has been conferred; and
 - (b) the cessation of any pension or gratuity to which the possession of the medal might entitle the recipient, but no such forfeiture shall extend to any sum of money which has already been paid;
- (4) That a forfeited Distinguished Conduct Medal and any forfeited annuity, pension, or gratuity attaching to it, may be restored to its former holder under regulations approved by Our Army Council:

Provided that We, Our Heirs, and Successors shall at all times have power to restore a forfeited Distinguished Conduct Medal, and with it such pension or gratuity as may have been forfeited; hat a notice of forfeiture and of restoration under this clause shall in every case be published in the London Grante

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our Heirs, and Successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Regulations, or any part thereof, by a notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come. Greeting:

Whereas We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual, dated 25th March, 1916, institute and create a silver medal entitled "The Military Medal," to be awarded to Non-commissioned Officers and Men for bravery in the Field, and did make, ordain, and establish certain rules and ordinances for

the governance of the same, which rules and ordinances were subsequently amended by Royal Warrants, dated the 21st day of June, 1916, the 1st day of August, 1918, and the 24th day of March, 1919:

And whereas it is expedient that Our said Royal Warants should be further amended:

Now therefore We do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances contained in Our said Royal Warrants shall be abrogated, cancelled, and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain, and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept:—

Firstly.—It is ordained that the medal shall be designated "The Military Medal."

Secondly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal shall bear on the obverse the Royal Effigy, and on the reverse the words, "For Bravery in the Field," encircled by a wreath surmounted by the Royal Cipher and a Crown.

Thirdly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal may be awarded to Warrant Officers, Classes I. and II., Non-commissioned Officers, and Men serving in any of Our Military Forces for individual or associated acts of bravery in the Field, on the recommendation of a Commander-in-Chief in the Field.

Fourthly.-It is ordained that in cases where Warrant Officers, Classes I. and II., Non-commissioned Officers, and Men who have been awarded the Military Medal shall be recommended by a Commander-in-Chief in the Field for further acts of bravery, a Bar or Bars may be added to the medal already conferred.

-It is ordained that the Military Medal may, under exceptional circumstances, on the special recommendation of a Commander-in-Chief in the Field, be awarded to women, whether subjects or foreign persons, who have shown bravery and devotion under fire, and a Bar or Bars may be added for further such acts.

Sixthly.—It is ordained that soldiers of an Allied or Associated Army of ranks equivalent to those of Our Military Forces specified in the third clause of this Our Royal Warrant, who have been associated in operations with Our Military Forces shall be eligible for the award of the Military Medal.

Seventhly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal shall not confer any individual precedence, but shall entitle the recipient to the addition after his or her name of the letters "M.M."

Eighthly.—It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer the Military Medal shall be published in the London Gazette, and that a Register thereof shall be kept in the office of Our Principal Secretary of State for War.

Ninthly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal shall be worn before war medals in such order as We may from time to time assign to it, and that it shall be worn on the left breast pendent from a ribbon of one inch and one quarter in width, which shall be in colour dark blue, having in the centre three white and two crimson stripes alternating.

Tenthly.-It is ordained-

- (1) That a recipient of the Military Medal who suffers death by sentence of Court Martial; or, if an officer, is cashiered, dismissed or removed from Our Naval, Military, or Air Forces for misconduct; or, if a sailor, soldier or airman, is discharged from Our Naval, Military or Air Forces with important or for misconduct or on account or airman, is discharged from Our Naval, Military or Air Forces with ignominy, or for misconduct, or on account of a conviction by the Civil Power, or for having been sentenced to penal servitude; or, if a woman, shall, in the opinion of Our Army Council, Our Board of Admiralty or Our Air Council, as the case may be, so conduct herself as to be unworthy of it, shall forfeit the Military Medal unless otherwise recommended by Our Army Council.
- (2) That if a recipient of the Military Medal is convicted by the Civil Power, or is dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act 1907, he or she shall be liable to a like forfeiture at the discretion of Our Army Council.
- (3) That a forfeited Military Medal may be restored to its former holder under regulations approved by Our Army Council; provided that We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall at all times have power to restore a forfeited sors, shall at an Military Medal.
- (4) That a notice of forfeiture and of restoration shall in every case be published in the London Gazette.

whereas Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, by a Warrant under Her Sign-Manual, dated 19th December, 1845, did ordain (a) that a certain sum of public money (£2,000) should be expended annually in awarding annuities of £20 to Sergeants of the Regular Army as a reward for their good, faithful, and efficient service; (b) that the recipients of these annuities should be selected by the Commander-in-Chief of the Army; and (c) that the Sergeants so selected to receive the annuities should also receive the Meritorious Service Medal: and did by Royal Warrant dated 10th June, 1884, apply the conditions of Her previous Royal Warrants regarding these medals and annuities to all soldiers above the rank of corporal. of corporal.

And whereas the sum of £2,000 has been increased from

And whereas by a Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated 4th October, 1916, We did ordain that the grant of the Meri-torious Service Medal should be extended to non-commissioned torious Service Medal should be extended to non-commissioned officers and men in our Military Forces below the rank of sergeant for valuable and meritorious service; and by Our Royal Warrant dated 23rd November, 1916, We did institute a bar or bars which might be awarded to recipients of the Meritorious Service Medal for subsequent approved acts of gallantry in the performance of military duty (not necessarily on active service), or in saving or attempting to saye the life of an officer or soldier; and by Our Royal Warrant dated 3rd January, 1917, We did still further extend the conditions under which the Meritorious Service Medal might be awarded to soldiers in Our Military Forces who were duly recommended for acts of gallant conduct while performing military duty otherwise than in action or for devotion to duty in a theatre of war:

And whereas We deem it expedient that all the aforesaid

And whereas We deem it expedient that all the aforesaid Royal Warrants, as well as all amendments thereto which have been heretofore promulgated, or are now to be promulgated, shall be incorporated in a Warrant under Our Sign

Now therefore we do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances heretofore in force shall be abrogated, cancelled, and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain, and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and

Firstly.—It is ordained that the medal shall be of silver and designated "The Meritorious Service Medal," and shall bear on the obverse the Royal Effigy, and on the reverse the words "For Meritorious Service" encircled by two laurel leaves and surmounted by the Imperial Crown.

Secondly.-It is ordained-

(a) That a fixed sum of £7,500, part of the public moneys for the upkeep of Our Army, shall be devoted to the purpose of awarding Meritorious Service Annuities of not more than £10 in any one case.

(b) That every Warrant Officer, Classes 1 and 2, and every non-commissioned officer above the reply of council.

(0) Inat every Warrant Officer, Classes 1 and 2, and every non-commissioned officer above the rank of corporal who has served with the Colours in Our Regular Army for 21 years, or who has been invalided from Our Regular Army after 18 years' Colour Service, shall be eligible to be considered for the grant of a Meritorious Service Annuity provided:

(i) that he served in or above the rank of Sergeant in

(c) That instructions as to procedure in submitting such applications for registration for the medal and annuity shall be laid down in the "King's Regulations for

(d) That the names of candidates for the Meritorious Service Annuity who are recommended and accepted shall be entered, in the order in which such acceptance is approved, in a register which shall be kept in the office of Our Principal Secretary of State for War.

(e) That the Military Secretary to Our Principal Secretary of State for War shall select from the list of registered candidates the names of those whom he considers to be most deserving to receive any annuities that may fall vacant.

may fall vacant.

(f) That a Regular Warrant Officer or Non-Commissioned Officer who is thus selected for the grant of a Meritorious Annuity shall also be awarded the Meritorious Service Medal, except that a candidate who is already in possession of the Meritorious Service Medal shall receive the annuity only.

(g) That a Meritorious Service Annuity may be held in addition to ordinary pension, and in conjunction with any additional pension to which the annuitant may be

addition to ordinary pension, and in conjunction with any additional pension to which the annuitant may be entitled.

(h) That when a Meritorious Service annuitant is promoted to a Commission the annuity shall be surrendered, but he shall receive annually in lieu thereof pay equivalent to such annuity.

Thirdly .- It is ordained-

hirdly.—It is ordained—

(a) That the Meritorious Service Medal may be awarded to Warrant Officers, Classes I. or II., non-commissioned officers and men of Our Military Forces who are duly recommended for the medal by a Commander-in-Chief for gallant conduct in the performance of military duty (not necessarily on active service) or in saving or attempting to save the life of an officer or soldier, or for devotion to duty in a theatre of war.

(b) That a Commander-in-Chief when recommending a soldier of Our Military Forces for the Meritorious Service Medal (or for a Bar to the same under (e) of this clause) for gallant conduct shall record his opinion whether the case merits the grant of an additional pension—6d. a day for Europeans and 3d. a day for non-Europeans—should the soldier be discharged with a pension.

(c) That the additional pension referred to in (b) of this clause may be awarded if the services are duly recommended by a Commander-in-Chief, and deemed to merit the additional pension; provided that this additional pension has not been previously awarded to the soldier.
(d) That in no circumstances shall the award of the

Meritorious Service Medal for gallant conduct or devo-tion to duty carry with it any claim to the annuity granted under the second clause of this Our Royal War-

(e) That should a soldier of any of Our Military Forces who has been awarded the Meritorious Service Medal (either with or without annuity) subsequently perform an approved act of gallantry (not necessarily on active service) in the performance of military duty or in saving or attempting to save the life of an officer or soldier, which, had he not already received the Meritorious Service Medal, would have rendered him eligible for it, may be awarded a Bar; and for every additional such act of gallantry an additional Bar may be awarded.

(f) That any soldier of Our Regular Army who is granted the Meritorious Service Medal for gallant conduct or devotion to duty in accordance with the conditions laid down in this clause of this Our Royal Warrant shall, if subsequently recommended and approved

Fifthly.—It is ordained that the Meritorious Service Medal shall be worn after war medals, in such order as We may from time to time assign to it, and that it shall be worn on the left breast, pendent from a riband of one inch and a quarter in width, which shall in colour be erimson with white edges, and a white line down the centre.

Sixthly.-It is ordained-

(1) That if a recipient of the Meritorious Service Medal suffers death by sentence of Court Martial, or, being an officer, is cashiered, dismissed, or removed from Our Military Forces for misconduct, or, being a soldier, is discharged from Our Military Forces with ignominy, or for misconduct, or on account of a conviction by the civil power, or for having been sentenced to penal servitude, he shall forfeit the Meritorious Service Medal (unless otherwise recommended by Our Army Council).

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(2) That is a recipient of the Meritorious Service Medal is convicted by the civil power, or is dealt with under the *Probation of Offenders Act* 1907, he shall be liable to a like forfeiture at the discretion of Our Army Coun-

That the forfeiture of the Meritorious Service Medal shall involve

(a) The erasure of the recipient's name from the register of persons upon whom the Meritorious Service Medal has been conferred; and

(b) the cessation of any annuity or pension to which the possession of the medal might entitle the recipient; but no such forfeiture shall extend to any sum of money which has been already

(4) That a forfeited Meritorious Service Medal and any forfeited annuity or pension attaching to it may be restored to its former holder under regulations approved by Our Army Council.

Provided that We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall at all times have power to restore a forfeited Meritorious Service Medal and with it such annuity or pension as may have been forfeited.

(5) That a notice of forfeiture and of restoration shall in every case be published in the London Gazette.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our Heirs and Successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Regulations, or any part thereof, by a notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.





Any lands not taken up on or before the 21st day of May, 1921, shall remain open to application as advertised at the rentals and on the conditions as set out in Schedules hereto Nos. 1 and 2 until such time as notification of their withdrawal shall be made in both the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory Gazettes.

 (6) Upon appointment, a successful candidate must produce evidence of the date of his birth, and a medical certificate satisfying the Commissioner in whatever particulars he may determine as to the appointee's sound bodily health and freedom from physical defects. A successful candidate should not undergo medical examination until instructed by the Commissioner to do so.
- (7) Before a successful candidate who is liable for training under the compulsory clauses of the *Defence 'Act* 1903–18 can receive appointment, he must produce evidence from his Area Officer that he has rendered the personal service required, or has been granted a temporary exemption.
- (8) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to him, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or a Public Service Inspector, respecting his nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (9) Where a successful candidate for appointment at Hobart and Suburbs does not reside within a reasonable distance of a suburban office at which a vacancy exists, the Commissioner reserves the right to appoint another boy, who, though having obtained less marks at the examination, resides in closer proximity to the post-office referred to.
- (10) Should a successful candidate change his address, he should iffimediately notify the Secretary, Commonwealth Public Service Commissioner, Customs-house, Mel-

- (5) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to her, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or, a Public Service Inspector, addressed to her at her last-known place of residence, respecting her nomination to the Public Service, her name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (6) If a successful candidate change her address she should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of her State.
