





THE candidates named hereunder were successful at the above Examination, having obtained at least half marks in each subject, and have thereby qualified for appointment to the position of Telephonist at the places under which their names respectively appear.

If an appointee fail to pass this test her services will be dispensed with.
- (4) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to her, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner, or a Public Service Inspector, addressed to her at her last-known place of residence, respecting her nomination to the Public Service, her name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (5) If a successful candidate change her address she should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of her State.

NOTIFICATION OF VACANCIES.

Minimum and maximum salaries where shown indicate the limits of the class or grade in which the position is classified. Subject to the provisions of the Public Service Act appointments may be made at any salary within those limits. Cost of living allowances are subject to review by the Arbitration Court from time to time. Successful appointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.
