PROCLAMATION

Commonwealth of
Australia to wit.
FORSTER,
Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-
General of the Commonwealth
of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Customs Act 1901-1920* it is enacted that all goods the importation of which may be prohibited by Proclamation are prohibited imports:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the thirty-first day of January, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, and published in the *Gazette* on the third day of February, One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, did prohibit the importation into the Commonwealth of Australia of any literature wherein is advocated the overthrow by force or violence of the established government of the Commonwealth or of any State or of any other civilized country or of all forms of law, or wherein is advocated the abolition of organized government, or wherein is advocated the assassination of public officials, or wherein is advocated or taught the unlawful destruction of property:

And whereas it is desirable to revoke the said Proclamation and make other provision in lieu thereof:

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation and do hereby prohibit the importation into the Commonwealth of Australia of any literature wherein is advocated:—

- (a) the overthrow by force or violence of the established government of the Commonwealth or of any State or of any other civilized country;
- (b) the overthrow by force or violence of all forms of law;
- (c) the abolition of organized government;
- (d) the assassination of public officials;
- (e) the unlawful destruction of property; or
- (f) wherein a seditious intention is expressed or a seditious enterprise advocated.

This Proclamation may be cited as Customs Proclamation No. 37 (T. & C. 21/B.5230).

GOD SAVE THE KING!

ORDER.

WHEREAS by Article 14 of the Covenant of the League of Nations it is among other things provided that the Council of the said League shall formulate and submit to members of the said League for adoption plans for the establishment of a Permanent Court of International Justice:

And whereas plans for the establishment of a Permanent Court of International Justice were formulated and submitted to members of the said League at the first session of the Assembly of the said League, held at Geneva, on the thirteenth day of December, 1920, and were unanimously approved in the form of a Statute by members of the said League:

And whereas it is desirable that the said Statute and the jurisdiction of the said Court should be accepted by the Commonwealth.

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby authorize the Right Honorable William Morris Hughes, P.C., K.C., Prime Minister of the Commonwealth of Australia, to declare the acceptance by the Commonwealth of Australia of—

- (a) the said Statute of the Permanent Court of International Justice; and
- (b) the jurisdiction of the said Court in accordance with the terms and subject to the conditions of the said Statute.

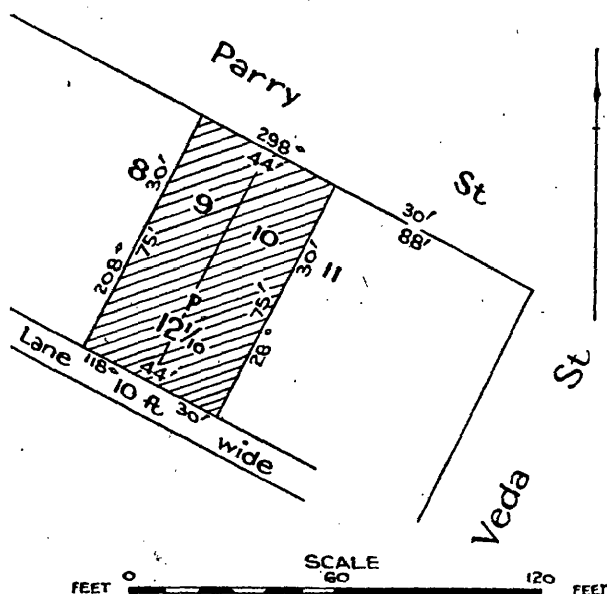

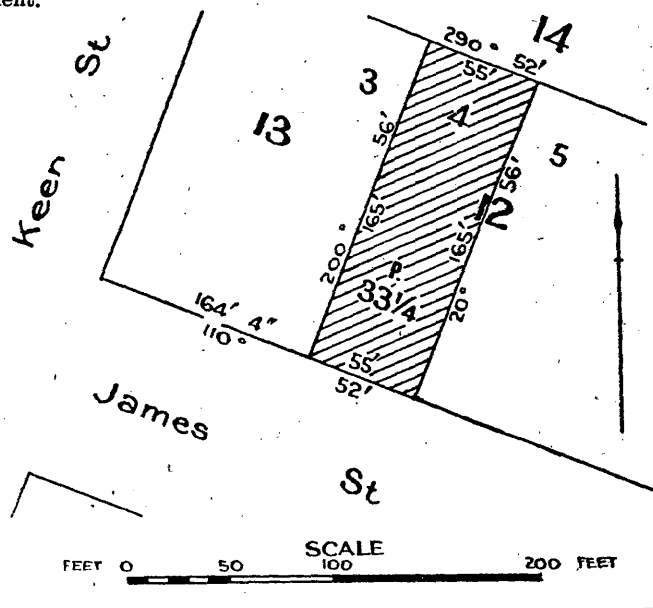

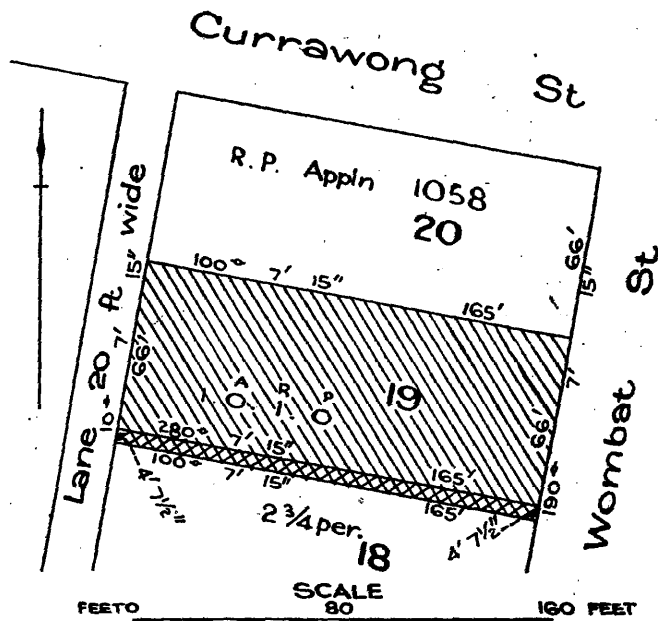
