PROCLAMATION

Australia to wit.
FORSTER,
Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Customs Act* 1901-1920 it is enacted that the Governor-General may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of any goods the exportation of which would, in his opinion, be harmful to the Commonwealth:

And whereas by Proclamation dated the twenty-eighth day of August, 1918, and published in the *Gazette* of the twenty-ninth day of August, 1918, the exportation of butter from the Commonwealth was in certain cases prohibited:

And whereas it is desirable to revoke the said Proclamation and to prohibit the exportation of butter from the Commonwealth unless certain conditions are complied with:

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation and do prohibit the exportation of butter unless the following conditions are complied with:—

(1) The butter must first be graded by an officer of Customs in accordance with the following provisions:—

(a) The flavour and aroma, texture and condition of the butter shall be taken into consideration and the maximum points to be awarded in respect of those qualities shall be as follow:—

Flavour and aroma, 50 points.

Texture, including body, grain, and moisture, 30 points.

Condition, including colour, salting, packing, and covering, 20 points; and

(b) The butter shall be graded as follows:—

Choicest—Pure creamery butter, graded at 92 to 100 points.

First Grade—Pure creamery butter, graded at 90 to 91 points.

Second Grade—Pure butter, graded at 86 to 89 points.

Third Grade—Pure butter, graded at 82 to 85 points.

Pastry Butter—Non-rancid butter, graded below 82 points; and

(2) There must not be applied to the butter or to any container thereof any grade mark or indication of quality as to the butter other than that affixed by an officer of Customs. Provided that this paragraph shall not apply to any mark applied by the manufacturer at the time of manufacture.

EXEMPTION AS TO REFRIGERATING CHAMBERS.—SECTION 122A.

- Repairing and making parts of Wheatstone and other automatic instruments, including transmitters, receivers, keyboard, hand and electro-magnetic perforators and other associated apparatus.
- Making workshop tests of all telegraph, telephone, or other apparatus used by the Department.
- Ability to understand and work to dimensioned drawings.

II. Oral Examination. Maximum marks, 200. Pass marks, 120.

Questions will be asked regarding any of the items covered by the above syllabus of Practical Tests.

TEXT BOOKS.—The following text books are recommended for study or reference (the latest editions in each case being used):—

Horner: *The Principles of Fitting.*

Jenvey: *Practical Telegraphy.*

Herbert: *Telegraphy* (so far as it refers to telegraph apparatus).

III. Educational Examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic (first four rules, simple and money). This section of the Examination, which is merely qualifying, will be of an elementary character.

This section (III.) does not apply to an officer already in the Service.

COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE.

Examination No. 1003 (Additional Results).

FOR APPOINTMENT AS TELEGRAPH MESSENGER.

Held 3rd September, 1921.

IN addition to the names published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* of 29th September, 1921, the candidates named hereunder were successful at the above examination, and have thereby qualified for appointment to the position of Telegraph Messenger at the places under which their names respectively appear.

The following should be noted:—

- The names will remain on the Register of Qualified Candidates for eighteen months, that is, until and including 5th March, 1923, when they must, in accordance with the law, be removed therefrom.
- Where two or more candidates secure the same number of marks, their order of merit is determined by the number of marks obtained for (a) Arithmetic, and (b) Handwriting, and, where these numbers are also equal, then by ballot.
- A candidate, though successful, will cease to be eligible for appointment upon reaching the age of sixteen years, provided, however, that a successful candidate who has reached the age of sixteen years may be appointed to a vacancy which occurred prior to his reaching that age.
- A candidate passes this examination if he secures at least half marks each in Handwriting and in Spelling, but those who have also gained half marks in Arithmetic at this examination will, if appointed, be eligible for promotion to a higher position in the General Division without further examination.
- Those who have not secured at least 100 marks in Arithmetic will be required to pass a further examination in that subject after appointment, in order to become eligible for promotion. Promotion examinations are held half-yearly.
- Unless a Telegraph Messenger qualifies for promotion to a higher position before reaching the age of eighteen years, he must retire from the Service on attaining that age.
- Upon appointment, a successful candidate must produce evidence of the date of his birth, and a medical certificate satisfying the Commissioner in whatever particulars he may determine as to the appointee's sound bodily health and freedom from physical defects. A successful candidate should not undergo medical examination until instructed by the Commissioner to do so.
- Before a successful candidate who is liable for training under the compulsory clauses of the *Defence Act 1903-18* can receive appointment, he must produce evidence from his Area Officer that he has rendered the personal service required, or has been granted a temporary exemption.
- If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to him, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or a Public Service Inspector, respecting his nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- Should a successful candidate change his address, he should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of his State.

NOTIFICATION OF VACANCIES.

APPPLICATIONS will be received from persons qualified for appointment to the positions specified below.

Applicants outside the Public Service are eligible for appointment to (1) the Administrative Division, (2) the Professional Division, and (3) to the General Division where indicated, but are not eligible for appointment to the Clerical Division unless qualified under the provisions of the Public Service Act.

Applications must be in the applicant's handwriting, should show fully qualifications for the position sought, and must, to insure consideration, be forwarded to the Public Service Inspector in the State in which the vacancy exists in time to reach the office of the Public Service Inspector not later than the date shown in each case.

In the case of officers of the Commonwealth Public Service applications should be forwarded through the Department to which the officer is attached.

In the case of applicants who are officers of the Public Service of the Commonwealth or of a State the following particulars should be set out at the foot of the application:—

Age last birthday (in years)
Length of service (in years)
Salary (per annum)
Date of receipt of present salary.....

Applicants from outside the Service should state full name and date and year of birth, also place of birth and whether they are natural-born or naturalized British subjects. Copies only of diplomas, references, testimonials, or certificates should be forwarded. If the originals are required they will be asked for.

Fares to locality of appointment of persons appointed from outside the Service will not be paid by the Commonwealth unless such fare exceeds £3, when such allowance as the circumstances justify may be granted.

The range of salary indicates the classified value of a position, but appointments may be made at any salary within such range. Cost of living allowances are subject to review by the Arbitration Court from time to time. Successful appointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.

Officers promoted to positions in the Fourth Class, which come within the scope of the award of the Australian Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association, may be retained at the salary of £245 where, in the opinion of the Acting Commissioner, the fixing of that salary as a maximum is justified.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or increase of salary, as the result of an application for an advertised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions prescribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.

Particulars of existing quarters are furnished merely for the information of officers. It is not incumbent on Departments to provide quarters, which, if provided, may be wholly or partially withdrawn at any time.
