REVOCATION OF LICENCE.

PROCLAMATION

Australia to wit.
FORSTER,
Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation relating to Trading with the Enemy, issued by His Majesty the King in Council, on the ninth day of September, One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* of the twelfth of September, One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, it is amongst other things declared

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that nothing in that Proclamation shall be taken to prohibit anything which shall be expressly permitted by licence given by His Majesty or by the licence given on behalf of His Majesty by a Secretary of State or the Board of Trade, whether such licences be especially granted to individuals or be announced as applying to classes of persons:

And whereas by a further Proclamation issued by His Majesty the King in Council on the eighth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* on the twelfth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, it is amongst other things provided that the power to grant licences on behalf of His Majesty vested by the first-recited Proclamation in a Secretary of State may be exercised in Australia by the Governor-General:

And whereas on the sixteenth day of July, 1919, the Governor-General, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, did give and grant licence to all persons residing, carrying on business, or being in the Commonwealth, to insure the hull, machinery, and cargo of any enemy merchant ship that is for the time being under the control of the Allied Maritime Transport Council; provided that such insurance is made subject to the following warranties, namely:—

- (1) Warranted trading under the control of the Allied Maritime Transport Council;
- (2) Warranted that no claim shall be paid under this policy unless and until the name of the payee shall have been submitted to and approved by the Board of Trade.

And whereas it is desirable to revoke the said Licence.

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Licence.

NOTICE OF TARGET PRACTICE.

TARGET Practice will be carried out from Fort Queens-
cliff during the period 25th November, 1921, to 2nd De-
cember, 1921.

DIRECTION OF FIRE.

E.N.E., S.S.W., and S.E. by E.

All forts from which practice is carried out will fly a Red
Flag from the masthead of flagstaff.

Shipping should be kept 1 mile to the right and left of line
of fire for a distance of 6,500 yards from the battery.

Occupants of buildings in the vicinity should open doors and
windows.

NOTE.—Section 72 of the *Defence Act 1903-1917* reads—

“No ships, boats, or persons shall come or remain within
the prescribed distance of any ship, battery, gun, or
person engaged in artillery or rifle practice, or shall
remain in any position so as to obstruct such practice.
Penalty: Fifty pounds.”

For the purpose of section 72 of the *Defence Act*, a ship,
boat, or person shall be deemed to have come or remained
within the prescribed distance of a battery or gun engaged in
artillery practice if it or he comes or remains within the
following:—

A rectangular area measuring in length 11,000 yards
from the battery or gun engaged in practice in the direc-
tion of the line of fire, and in breadth 2 miles, being 1
mile on each side of the line of fire.



COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE.

Examination No. 1032.

FOR APPOINTMENT AS TELEGRAPH MESSENGER.

Held 5th November, 1921.

THE candidates named hereunder were successful at the above examination, and have thereby qualified for appointment to the position of Telegraph Messenger at the places under which their names respectively appear.

The following should be noted:—

- (1) The names will remain on the Register of Qualified Candidates for eighteen months, that is, until and including 23rd May, 1923, when they must, in accordance with the law, be removed therefrom.
- (2) Where two or more candidates secure the same number of marks, their order of merit has been determined by the number of marks obtained for (a) Arithmetic, and (b) Handwriting, and, where these numbers are also equal, then by ballot.
- (3) A candidate, though successful, will cease to be eligible for appointment upon reaching the age of sixteen years, provided, however, that a successful candidate who has reached the age of sixteen years may be appointed to a vacancy which occurred prior to his reaching that age.
- (4) A candidate passes this examination if he secures at least half marks each in Handwriting and in Spelling; but those who have also gained half marks in Arithmetic at this examination will, if appointed, be eligible for promotion to a higher position in the General Division without further examination.
- (5) Those who have not secured at least 100 marks in Arithmetic will be required to pass a further examination in that subject after appointment, in order to become eligible for promotion. Promotion examinations are held half-yearly.

- (6) Unless a Telegraph Messenger qualifies for promotion to a higher position before reaching the age of eighteen years, he must retire from the Service on attaining that age.
- (7) Upon appointment, a successful candidate must produce evidence of the date of his birth, and a medical certificate satisfying the Commissioner in whatever particulars he may determine as to the appointee's sound bodily health and freedom from physical defects. A successful candidate should not undergo medical examination until instructed by the Commissioner to do so.
- (8) Before a successful candidate who is liable for training under the compulsory clauses of the *Defence Act 1903-18* can receive appointment, he must produce evidence from his Area Officer that he has rendered the personal service required, or has been granted a temporary exemption.
- (9) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to him, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or a Public Service Inspector, respecting his nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (10) Should a successful candidate change his address, he should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of his State.

NOTIFICATION OF VACANCIES.

A PPLICATIONS will be received from persons qualified for appointment to the positions specified below.

Applicants from outside the Service should state full name and date and year of birth, also place of birth and whether they are natural-born or naturalized British subjects. Copies only of diplomas, references, testimonials, or certificates should be forwarded. If the originals are required they will be asked for.

Fares to locality of appointment of persons appointed from outside the Service will not be paid by the Commonwealth unless such fare exceeds £3, when such allowance as the circumstances justify may be granted.

The range of salary indicates the classified value of a position, but appointments may be made at any salary within such range. Cost of living allowances are subject to review by the Arbitration Court from time to time. Successful appointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.

Officers promoted to positions in the Fourth Class, which come within the scope of the award of the Australian Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association, may be retained at the salary of £245 where, in the opinion of the Acting Commissioner, the fixing of that salary as a maximum is justified.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or increase of salary, as the result of an application for an advertised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions prescribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.
