P URSUANT to the powers conferred on me by the Quarantine Act 1908-1920, I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby declare the ports of Derby and Carnarvon, in the State of Western Australia, to be first ports of entry for vessels arriving from overses. arriving from oversea.

This Proclamation may be cited as Quarantine Proclamation

W HEREAS by the Judiciary Act 1903-1920 it is enacted that indictable offences against the laws of the Comww that indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth shall be prosecuted by indictment in the name of the Attorney-General of the Commonwealth or of such other person as the Governor-General appoints in that behalf and that any such appointment shall be by Commission in the King's name and may extend to the whole Commonwealth or to any State or part of the Commonwealth: And whereas it is desirable to appoint some person to prosecute indictable. it is desirable to appoint some person to prosecute indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth triable within Our State of South Australia: Now, therefore, We do hereby appoint you to prosecute by indictment in your name indictable offences against the laws of the Commonwealth triable

within Our State of South Australia as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as Our Attorney-General of Our Commonwealth of Australia could prosecute those offences: And we give and grant to you all such powers and authorities of Our said Attorney-General in relation to those offences as are capable of being granted by this Commission, including the power, when any person is under commitment upon a charge of any such offence, to decline to proceed further in the prosecution, and, if the person is in custody, by warrant under your hand to direct the discharge of the person from custody: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the power of Our Attorney-General of Our Commonwealth of Australia or of any other person appointed Commonwealth of Australia or of any other person appointed by Us in that behalf to prosecute by indictment in his name any indictable offence against the laws of the Commonwealth triable within Our said State: And We declare that this Our Commission shall continue in force so long as you hold the office of Our Acting Attorney-General for Our said State unless sooner revoked by Our Governor-General in and over Our Commonwealth of Association Commonwealth of Australia.

AN ORDINANCE

To amend the Necessary Commodities Ordinance 1920.

) E it ordained by the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory Acceptance Act 1910-1919 and the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Necessary Commodities short title. Ordinance 1922.
- 2. After section five of the Necessary Commodities Ordinance 1920 the following section is inserted:-
- "5A. DECLARATION BY WAR SERVICE HOMES COM-MISSIONER OF THE REVOCATION OF NOTIFICATION OF THE ACQUISITION OF LAND.

OF THE ACQUISITION OF LAND.

Whereas by the War Service Homes Regulations 1919 made under the War Service Homes Act 1918-1920 it is provided that section 19 of the Lands Acquisition Act 1906-1916 in its application in relation to land acquired by the Commissioner for the purposes of the Act shall be so modified as to empower the Commissioner, by declaration published in the Gazette within six months after the date of the publication in the Gazette of the notification of the acquisition by him of any lands, to revoke the notification of acquisition either wholly or as to any part of the land acquired, and that thereupon, to the extent specified in the declaration of revocation, the notification of acquisition shall be void and of no effect, and the land shall be deemed not to have been vested in the Commissioner. 




