REVOCATION OF PROCLAMATION RELATING TO THE EXPORTATION OF BRITISH AND AUSTRALIAN SILVER COIN.

PROCLAMATION

Australia to wit
FORSTER,
Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-
General of the Commonwealth of
Australia.

WHEREAS by the *Customs Act 1901-1920* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor-General may, by Proclamation, prohibit the exportation of any goods the exportation of which would, in his opinion, be harmful to the Commonwealth, and that the power above mentioned extends to authorize the prohibition of the exportation of goods generally or to any specified place, and either absolutely or so as to allow of the exportation of the goods subject to any condition or restriction:

And whereas by a Proclamation issued on the twentieth day of December, 1919, and published in the *Commonwealth Gazette* of the twenty-fourth day of December, 1919, the exportation of British and Australian silver coin from the Commonwealth was prohibited unless the consent in writing of the Minister of State for Trade and Customs had first been obtained:

And whereas it is desirable to revoke the said Proclamation:

Now therefore I, Henry William, Baron Forster, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation:

This Proclamation may be cited as *Customs Proclamation No. 63.* (T. & C. 22/E.2108.)

Vunakambi A and B.—A coconut plantation situated about 23 miles from Rabaul on the north coast motor road. The property consists of a total planted area of 160.15 hectares (approximately 395½ acres), with approximately 20,500 coconut palms, of ages from one to six years old. The land is entered in the Ground Book, vol. 3, folios 299 and 300. A well-furnished substantial European bungalow is situated on the estate, together with offices and labour houses, all of these buildings being in good order. There is a fine anchorage, and trading and recruiting possibilities are considered good.

Vunacoco.—This estate adjoins the above-mentioned property, and consists of 350 hectares of good arable land. There is an area of 30 hectares planted with cacao trees, ranging from one to two years old, and an area of 20 hectares of secondary scrub.

EXCISE BY-LAW No. 2.

Excise Tariff 1921, Item 3(B).

DENATURATION OF AMYLIC ALCOHOL AND FUSEL OIL.

Amylic alcohol and fusel oil, when denaturated in accordance with the provisions hereunder mentioned, may be delivered free of duty in accordance with *Excise Tariff*, Item 3(B):—

(1) If for use in the manufacture of paint, varnish, lacquer, and pyroxylin varnish;—

By the addition of—

2 per cent, wood naphtha,

½ per cent, pyridine;

or, by the addition of an equal volume of—

(a) commercial methyl alcohol; or

(b) wood naphtha; or

(c) purified acetone.

(2) If for use in the manufacture of esters (or ethers) and paint removers;—

By the addition of not less than 3 lbs. of glacial acetic acid and 2½ lbs. concentrated sulphuric acid (specific gravity not below 1.84), or when sodium acetate is used, not less than 7½ lbs. of dried sodium acetate and 4½ lbs. of concentrated sulphuric acid (specific gravity not below 1.84) to each gallon of amyl alcohol or fusel oil.

(3) Any additional formula of denaturation which may be approved by the Comptroller-General.

(4) The denaturants shall be of Australian origin when obtainable, and shall be of such standard as may be approved by the Comptroller-General.

(5) The manufacturer to declare on the face of the entry that the denaturated amyl alcohol or fusel oil will be used only for the purpose for which it was denaturated. (T. & C. 22.E.1760.)

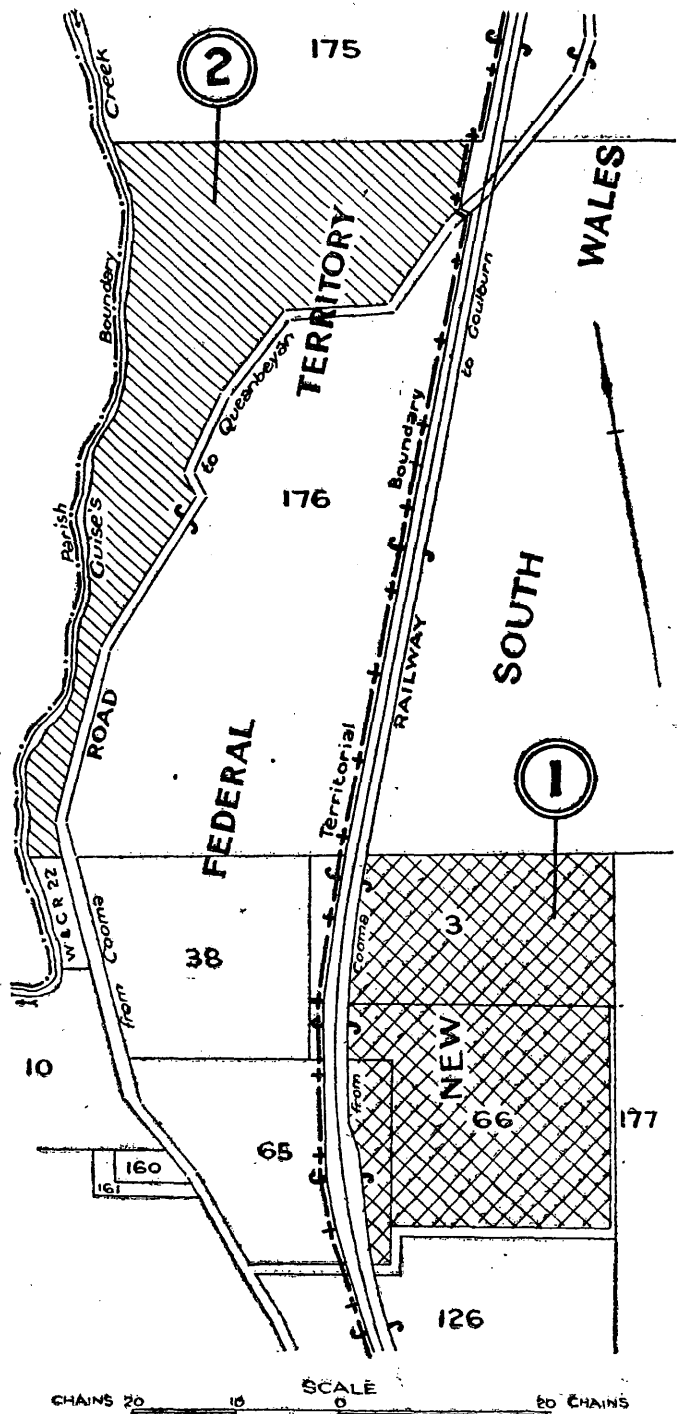

COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE.

Examination No. 1074.

FOR APPOINTMENT AS TELEGRAPH MESSENGER.

Held 6th May, 1922.

THE candidates named hereunder were successful at the above examination, and have thereby qualified for appointment to the position of Telegraph Messenger at the places under which their names respectively appear:—

The following should be noted:—

- (1) The names will remain on the Register of Qualified Candidates for eighteen months, that is, until and including 24th November, 1923, when they must, in accordance with the law, be removed therefrom.
- (2) A candidate, though successful, will cease to be eligible for appointment upon reaching the age of sixteen years, provided, however, that a successful candidate who has reached the age of sixteen years may be appointed to a vacancy which occurred prior to his reaching that age.

- (3) A candidate passes this examination if he secures at least half marks each in Handwriting and in Spelling, but those who have also gained half marks in Arithmetic at this examination will, if appointed, be eligible for promotion to a higher position in the General Division without further examination.
- (4) Those who have not secured at least 100 marks in Arithmetic will be required to pass a further examination in that subject after appointment, in order to become eligible for promotion. Promotion examinations are held half-yearly.
- (5) Unless a Telegraph Messenger qualifies for promotion to a higher position before reaching the age of eighteen years, he must retire from the Service on attaining that age.
- (6) Upon appointment, a successful candidate must produce evidence of the date of his birth, and a medical certificate satisfying the Commissioner in whatever particulars he may determine as to the appointee's sound bodily health and freedom from physical defects. A successful candidate should not undergo medical examination until instructed by the Commissioner to do so.
- (7) Before a successful candidate who is liable for training under the compulsory clauses of the *Defence Act 1903-18* can receive appointment, he must produce evidence from his Area Officer that he has rendered the personal service required, or has been granted a temporary exemption.
- (8) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to him, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner or a Public Service Inspector, respecting his nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (9) Should a successful candidate change his address, he should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector of his State.

- (4) Every person appointed to the position of Telephonist shall, after the expiration of three months from the date of appointment, be tested in clearness of speech and acuteness of hearing over a telephone line, and in practical efficiency in the operation of a telephone switchboard. If an appointee fail to pass this test her services will be dispensed with.
- (5) If a successful candidate decline to accept an appointment offered to her, or fail to reply within seven days to a communication from the Commissioner, or a Public Service Inspector, addressed to her at her last-known place of residence, respecting her nomination to the Public Service, her name may be removed from the "Register of Qualified Candidates."
- (6) If a successful candidate change her address she should immediately notify the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Commonwealth Bank Buildings, Martin-place, Sydney.

Copies only of diplomas, references, testimonials, or certificates should be forwarded. If the originals are required they will be asked for.

Fares to locality of appointment of persons appointed from outside the Service will not be paid by the Commonwealth unless such fare exceeds £3, when such allowance as the circumstances justify may be granted.

The range of salary indicates the classified value of a position, but appointments may be made at any salary within such range. Cost of living allowances are subject to review by the Arbitration Court from time to time. Successful appointees must comply with the life assurance provisions of the Public Service Act and Regulations.

Officers promoted to positions in the Fourth Class, which come within the scope of the award of the Australian Commonwealth Public Service Clerical Association, may be retained at the salary of £245 where, in the opinion of the Acting Commissioner, the fixing of that salary as a maximum is justified.

Officers who may be transferred without promotion or increase of salary, as the result of an application for an advertised vacancy, will be required to pay their own expenses of removal unless the transfer comes within the conditions prescribed in Public Service Regulation No. 54.
