

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

### The Northern Territory of Australia.

AGRICULTURAL LANDS AVAILABLE FOR LEASING IN TERMS OF THE CROWN LANDS ORDINANCE 1924.

PPLICATIONS for leases of lands as set out in Schedule A Nos. 1 and 2, as cultivation farms, will be received at the Lands Department, Darwin, or the Department of Home and Territories, Melbourne, on or before the 25th July, 1925.

The lands available are situated in the Darwin and Gulf District.

Cultivation farms are granted as leases in perpetuity.

Any lands not allotted shall remain open to application at the rentals and conditions set out in the schedule of conditions under which the land will be leased until such time as notification of their withdrawal shall be made both in the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Gazettes.

All applications shall be accompanied by a lease and registration fee of Thirty shillings.

### Schedule of Conditions under which the Lands will be Leased.

1. Rent.—No rent will be payable for the first period of the lease, which continues for the applicant's life, or for a period of 21 years from the commencement of the lease, whichever After the first period an annual rent is the longer. period is the longer. After the first period an annual rent will be payable as fixed on appraisement by the Land Board, and thereafter at an annual rent fixed by re-appraisement every 21 years, in pursuance of the said Ordinance. A provision will be inserted in the lease that if the rent is not paid on or before the expiry of three months from the date on which it becomes due, an addition of 6 per cent. per annum may be made in respect of the rent overdue, and that the lease shall be liable to forfeiture if the rent is unpaid for six months or more. months or more.

2. Reservations.—The lease will contain the reservations provided for in the said Ordinance, being—

(a) a right of entry and inspection;

(b) all minerals; and
(c) a power of resumption to resume the whole or any portion of the leased land required for naval or military purposes, and without compensation for any improvements erected by the lessee without permission of the Board.

If the land is required for public purposes, such as railways, tramways, roads, water conservation works, sites for towns recreation grounds, cemeteries, commons, reserves, public buildings, or other like purposes, the power of resumption can be exercised on six months' notice, and on two years' notice where the land is required for any other purpose.

- 3. Covenants and conditions will be inserted in the lease as follows ..
  - (a) To pay the rent (when it becomes payable) annually in advance.
  - (b) To use the land only for the purposes for which it is leased.
  - (c) That the lessee will enter into occupation of the land (d) That the lessee will enter into occupation of the land within eight months from the notification that the lease has been allotted, and will establish a home within two years after the commencement of the lease, and, subject to any exemption granted by the Land Board for cause shown, will thereafter reside on the land for a period of six months in each year, (d) That the lessee shall enclose the land with a substantial farca within the first four years of the lease.

(e) That the lessee will observe and comply with the regulations under the said Ordinance for the time being in force.

### 4. Other provisions-

(a) That the lessee may, subject to the consent of the Minister, assign, transfer, mortgage, or sub-let the land included in the lesse, or any portion of it; but may sub-let the land, or any portion of it, for any

period not exceeding two years, without first obtaining the consent of the Minister, provided that the sub-lease is made without the right of renewal. Every lessee who sub-lets the leased land, or any portion of it, for any period exceeding six months and not exceeding two years, shall give notice of the sub-lease to the Land Board.

Exemptions.—A candidate who passed in General Engineering at Examination No. 1129, held on the 23rd and 24th January, 1923, or Examination No. 1265, held on the 21st, 22nd, and 23rd August, 1924, will not be required to undergo examination in Natural Science, and Transmission (Telephone and Telegraph), and a candidate who passed in Line Construction or Telephone Equipment or Telegraph Equipment at either of the examinations mentioned will be exempted from examination in the subjects in which he passed.

POR the information of officers concerned it is hereby notified that tests for advancement of Mail Officers from Grade 1 to Grade 2 will be held in all States as soon as practicable after 30th June, 1925.
