PROCLAMATION.

Commonwealth of Australia to wit, HUNTINGFIELD Administrator. By His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by section three of the Commons and Public Reserves Ordinance 1936 of Norfolk Island it is provided that the Governor-General may, by proclamation, declare any Crown land to be a common or public reserve, and any such common or public reserve shall be under the care and control of the Administrator:

And whereas by Proclamation dated the third day of February One thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven and published in Commonwealth of Australia Gazette on the fourth of February, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven, the lands specified in the Schedule thereof were declared to be public reserves for the purposes indicated therein:

And whereas certain lands specified in the said schedule thereof were declared to be a public reserve for forestry purposes and known as Mount Pitt Reserve:

And whereas it is desirable that the land specified in the Schedule hereto should be declared to be a public reserve for forestry purposes and that the land be included in the Mount Pitt Reserve:

Now therefore I, William Charles Arcedeckne, Baron Huntingfield, the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby declare the land specified in the Schedule hereto to be a public reserve for forestry purposes and that it be included in the Mount Pitt Reserve.



AN ORDINANCE

To amend the City Area Leases Ordinances 1936.

BE it ordained by the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the

Seat of Government Acceptance Act 1909 and the Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910-1933, as follows:—

- 1.—(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the City Area Leases short title and Ordinance 1938.
- (2.) The City Area Leases Ordinance 1936 is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the City Area Leases Ordinance 1936-1938.
- 2. Section three of the Principal Ordinance is amended by Definitions. inserting the following definition after the definition of "lessee":—
 - "' proper authority' means the proper authority appointed under the Canberra Building Regulations made under the Building and Services Ordinance 1924, or under that Ordinance as subsequently amended;".
- 3. After section nineteen of the Principal Ordinance the following section is inserted:—

"19a.—(1.) Where, upon the expiration of the term of a lease Tenant right in of land upon which there are improvements, the lessee is granted a improvements. further lease of that land, or is granted a lease of any part of that land, he shall not be liable to make any payment to the Commonwealth for the improvements on that land or part.

"(2.) Where, upon the expiration of the term of a lease of land upon which there are improvements, the lessee is not granted a further lease of the land or is granted a lease of part only of the

land, the Commonwealth shall-

(a) in respect of the land or any part of the land not leased to the lessee, where the land or part has not, prior to the expiration of the term of the lease, been declared by the Minister to be available for lease—forthwith;

- (b) in respect of the land or any part of the land not leased to the lessee, where the land or part has, prior to the expiration of the term of the lease, been declared by the Minister to be available for lease and a lease therof is grantd, within six months after the expiration of the term of the lease, to a person other than the lessee—upon the grant of the lease to that person; and
- (c) in any other case—upon the expiration of six months after the expiration of the term of the lease,

be liable to pay to the lessee-

(i) where no part of the land is leased to the lessee, the value of the improvements on the land; or

(ii) where part of the land is leased to the lessee, the value of the improvements on the part of the land not so leased:

Provided that, if the land or any part thereof is, prior to the expiration of the term of the lease, declared by the Minister to be available for lease, and the lessee does not, within six months after the expiration of the term of the lease, elect to take a further lease of the land or of that part, there shall be deducted from the amount payable to the lessee under this sub-section the amount of such expenditure as the Minister determines has been incurred in connexion with the grant to any other person of a lease of the land or that part.

"(3.) Where, between the date of the expiration of the term of a lease of land upon which there are improvements and the date of the grant of a further lease of that land or part thereof, the Commonwealth derives revenue, part or all of which is attributable to the improvements on that land or part thereof, the Commonwealth shall pay to the lessee, from time to time, as the Minister determines, the difference between such sum as the Minister determines is attributable to revenue from those improvements and the amount of such expenditure as the Minister determines has been incurred by the Commonwealth in maintenance and other costs in respect of those improvements.

"(4.) Notwithstanding anything contained in any lease, and subject to the covenants (if any) of the lease with respect to the erection of a building on the land having fully been observed or

performed, where the lease is determined or surrendered by virtue of any provision contained in the lease, the provisions of this section relating to the payment to the lessee of the value of the improvements on the land comprised in a lease upon the expiration of its term shall (so far as applicable) apply as if the term of the lease had expired on the date of the determination or surrender:

Provided that there shall be deducted from any sum payable in respect of the value of the improvements on the land the amount of such expenditure as the Minister determines has been incurred by the Commonwealth in connexion with the determination or surrender of the lease and the grant (if any) of a further lease of the land or any part thereof.

(7.) For the purposes of this section—

improvements' includes buildings and erections, but does not include improvements effected at the cost of the Commonwealth for which the Commonwealth has not received, or is not entitled to receive, payment;

'lessee', in relation to a lease the term of which has expired or which has been determined or surrendered, means the person who was the lessee under the lease at the date of the expiration of the term or at the date of the determination or surrender of the lease, as the case may be; and

'value of the improvements' means-

- (a) where a lease of any land or any part thereof is granted to the successful bidder at an auction of the right to the lease (held within six months after the expiration, determination or surrender of the previous lease) at which the bidding was by capital sum representing the value of the improvements—the amount payable for the improvements on that land or part in accordance with the provisions of section nineteen of this Ordinance; and
- (b) in all other cases—such amount as is agreed upon by the Minister and the lessee, or, in default of agreement, as is determined by arbitration under the laws in force in the Territory relating to arbitration.".

4. Section twenty-eight of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting the word "Minister" (first and fifth occurring) and inserting in its stead the words "proper authority".

5. Section thirty-one of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting from sub-section (5.) the word "Minister" and inserting in its stead the words "proper authority".

6. Section thirty-two of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting from sub-section (2.) the word "Minister (first occurring) and inserting in its stead the words "proper authority".

7. After section thirty-seven of the Principal Ordinance the following section is inserted:—

"37A. Where, prior to the commencement of this section, the plans and specification of a building have been prepared by a lessee and submitted to, and approved by, the proper authority appointed under the Canberra Building Regulations made under the Building and Services Ordinance 1924, or under that Ordinance as amended from time to time, the lessee shall be deemed to have fulfilled so much of the covenant in his lease as relates to the erection of a building in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by him and previously submitted to and approved in writing by the Minister if he has erected the building in accordance with any plans and specification so submitted to, and approved by, the proper authority.".

AN ORDINANCE

To amend the Hospital Tax Ordinance 1935-1936.

B E it ordained by the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Seat of Government Acceptance Act 1909 and the Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910-1933, as follows:—

- 1.—(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the Hospital Tax short title Ordinance 1938.
- (2.) The *Hospital Tax Ordinance* 1935-1936 is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the *Hospital Tax Ordinance* 1935-1938.
- 2. This Ordinance shall commence on the first day of July, commencement. One thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight.
 - 3. Section four of the Principal Ordinance is amended—

Offinitions.

(a) by omitting the definition of "the Commissioner" and inserting in its stead the following definition:—"'the Commissioner' means the Commissioner of

Taxation referred to in section eight of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1936-1937;"; and

- (b) by omitting from the definition of "the Hospital" the words "maintained under the Canberra Community Hospital Board Ordinance 1935".
- 4. Section six of the Principal Ordinance is amended—

Imposition of tax.

- (a) by omitting paragraphs (a) and (b) of sub-section (1.) and inserting in their stead the following paragraph:—
 - "(a) all employees who are in receipt of income at a rate of not less than One pound per week; and";
- (b) by omitting from paragraph (c) of sub-section (1.) the word and letter "or (b)"; and
- (c) by omitting from paragraph (c) of sub-section (1.) the words "One hundred and four" and inserting in their stead the words "Fifty-two".

5. Section seven of the Principal Ordinance is amended by Liability to omitting sub-sections (1.), (2.) and (2a.) and inserting in their stead the following sub-sections:—

"(1.) Every employee specified in paragraph (a) of subsection (1.) of the last preceding section shall pay to the Commissioner, in the prescribed manner, hospital tax at the rates specified in the following Table for every week in respect of which the employee receives income at a rate of not less than One pound per week:—

One pound or more but less than One pound ten shillings ... Threepence per week One pound ten shillings or more but less than Two pounds ... Sixpence per week Ninepence per week

"(2.) Every person specified in paragraph (c) of sub-section (1.) of the last preceding section shall pay to the Commissioner hospital tax at the rate specified in the Table contained in the last preceding sub-section which is applicable to the average weekly income of that person.".

Contributions Commonwealth employees.

6. Section eight of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting from sub-section (1.) the words "Two pounds" and inserting in their stead the words "One pound".

Contributions

- 7. Section nine of the Principal Ordinance is amended-
- (a) by omitting from paragraph (a) of sub-section (1.) the words "Two pounds" and inserting in their stead the words "One pound";
 - (b) by omitting from paragraph (b) of sub-section (1.) the words "Two pounds per week the sum of ninepence"and inserting in their stead the words "One pound per week the amount of tax due by him"
 - (c) by omitting from paragraph (c) of sub-section (1.) the words "ninepence for" and inserting in their stead the words "the amount of tax due by"; and
 - (d) by omitting from sub-section (2.) the words "Two . pounds?" and inserting in their stead the words "One pound ".

Regulations under the Exportation of Fruit Ordinance 1933 as amended by the Ordinances Revision Ordinance 1934.

WILLIAM MORRIS HUGHES, Minister of State for External Affairs, acting for and on behalf of the Prime Minister in pursuance of the powers conferred upon the Minister by the Exportation of Fruit Ordinance 1933 as amended by the Ordinances Revision Ordinance 1934, hereby make the following Regulations.

FRUIT EXPORTATION (BANANA) REGULATIONS.

Short title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Fruit Exportation (Banana) Regulations.

Repeal.

2. The Fruit Exportation (Banana) Regulations made on the 5th March, 1936, and the 2nd July, 1937, are repealed.

Definitions

- 3. In these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears-
 - "sound" means free from disease and from damage, decay, dirt, insects, abnormal conditions or other defect rendering the fruit unsuitable for export and "soundness" has a corresponding meaning;

"cluster" means a group of at least three bananas attached to the one stem.

4. The exporter shall pay a fee of one-half penny per bunch or one penny per case or crate in respect of the inspection of bananas.

Grade standards for singles pack.

5.—(1.) Bananas, if packed in singles, shall be graded as "Small", Sixes", "Sevens", "Eights" or "Nines".
(2.) Bananas graded as "Small" shall consist of bananas which

are not less than five inches but are less than six inches in length, and not less than four inches in circumference.

(3.) Bananas graded as "Sixes" shall consist of bananas which are not less than six inches but are less than six and one-half inches

in length and not less than four inches in circumference.
(4.) Bananas graded as "Sevens" shall consist of bananas which are not less than six and one-half inches but are less than seven and one-half inches in length and not less than four inches in circum-

- (5.) Bananas graded as "Eights" shall consist of bananas which are not less than seven and one-half inches but are less than eight and one-half inches in length and not less than four and one-quarter inches in circumference.
- (6.) Bananas graded as "Nines" shall consist of bananas which are not less than eight and one-half inches in length and four and three-quarter inches in circumference.
- (7.) Bananas in a package shall be deemed to be packed in singles unless at least ninety per centum by number of such bananas are combined in clusters.
- 6.—(1.) Bananas if packed in clusters shall be graded as Grade standards grade or "Large" grade.

 (2.) Bananas graded as "Standard" grade shall consist of bananas

which are not less than six inches but are less than seven and one-half

inches in length and not less than four inches in circumference.

(3.) Bananas graded as "Large" grade shall consist of bananas which are not less than seven and one-half inches in length and not less than four and one-half inches in circumference.

(4.) Bananas in a package shall be deemed to be packed in clusters if not less than ninety per centum by number of such bananas are combined in clusters.

7. For the purposes of these Regulations—

- (a) the length of a banana is the length measured on the outside of bananas.

 of the curve, from the innetion of the ferror of the curve, from the junction of the fruit at the stem end of the banana to its apex; and
- (b) the circumference of a banana is the greatest circumference.

8. A person shall not pack for export-

(a) bananas which are not graded as specified in regulations five export.

and six of these Regulations.

(b) in packages any bananas having a cubic capacity of one-half bushel or more

(i) unless such bananas are sound;

(ii) unless such bananas if of "Large" grade do not vary in length by more than one and one-half inches;

(iii) unless such bananas are of one variety;

(iv) if such package contains any foreign substance in an amount exceeding one per centum of the package;

(v) if such package is marked or branded with any misdescription of any of the bananas therein contained;

(vi) unless such package is legibly and indelibly marked on one end on the outside thereof in letters not less than half an inch in height with the following particulars:-

(a) the name and address of the person, firm or corporation by whom the bananas were packed; and

(b) the grade of the bananas in the package: Provided that, if the foregoing particulars are printed on a label which is securely pasted on one end on the outside of the package they may be shown in letters not less than one-quarter of an inch in height.

9. These Regulations shall not apply to bananas not intended for Exemption. sale, provided that the package containing the bananas is legibly marked with the words "Not for sale" in letters not less than two inches in height.

10. Bananas intended for export shall be made available for Time for inspection and examination at the appointed place—

(a) in the case of a vessel departing in the forenoon, not later than 5 p.m. on the preceding day; and
(b) in the case of a vessel departing in the afternoon, not later

than 10 a.m. on the day of departure.

11. Any person who acts in contravention of these Regulations Penalty. shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

AMENDMENT OF ADVISORY COUNCIL ELECTIONS REGULATIONS.

1. After regulation 11 of the Advisory Council Elections Regulations the following regulations are inserted:-

Special vote.

"11A. An elector who is seriously ill or infirm, and by reason of such illness or infirmity will be precluded from attending at any polling place to vote, or, in the case of a woman, will by approaching maternity be precluded from attending at any polling place to vote may make application to the Returning Officer for a special vote certificate and special ballot-paper.

Application for special vote.

- "11B.—(1.) Application for a special vote certificate and a special ballot-paper shall be made by an elector in accordance with Form C in the Schedule.
- (2.) The application shall be witnessed by a person who is enrolled as an elector.

Issue of certificates and ballot

11c. The Returning Officer upon receipt of the application shall. if he is satisfied that it is properly signed by the applicant elector and is properly witnessed deliver to the elector a special vote certificate and and a special ballot-paper.

Special vote certificate.

"11n. The special vote certificate shall be in accordance with Form D in the Schedule and may be printed, typewritten or written on an envelope addressed to the Principal Presiding Officer for the ward in respect of which the elector is entitled to votc.

Special ballot papers.

- "11E.—(1.) Special ballot-papers shall be in accordance with Form E in the Schedule.
- (2.) Before issuing a special ballot-paper the Returning Officer shall, if the particulars are not already printed, typewritten or written thereon, insert therein-
 - (a) the ward in respect of which the elector claiming the special vote is entitled to vote; and

(b) the names of the candidates for that ward.

Despatch of special votes.

"11r. Delivery to an elector of a special vote certificate and special ballot-paper shall be made at the office of the Returning Officer either to the elector personally or to a person authorized in writing by the elector to accept delivery of the special vote certificate and special ballot-paper on his behalf.

- "116.—(1.) The Returning Officer shall number all applications Numbering of applications and for special vote certificates and special ballot-papers received by him in consecutive order and shall number each special vote certificate with a number corresponding with the number on the application.
 - (2.) The Returning Officer shall initial on the back all special ballot-papers issued. The initials should be placed in such a position as to be easily seen when the ballot-paper is folded so as to conceal the vote.

Authorized witnesses.

"11n.—(1.) Subject to sub-regulation (2.) of this regulation the following persons are authorized witnesses within the meaning of these Regulations:

Clergymen;

Constables of Police;

Justices of the Peace;

School teachers.

(2.) No person who is a candidate at any election shall be an authorized witness at that election.

"111. The following directions for regulating voting by means of Directions for special voting. special ballot-papers are to be substantially observed:

- (a) The elector shall exhibit his special ballot-paper (unmarked) and his special vote certificate to an authorized witness;
- (b) The elector shall then and there, in the presence of the authorized witness, sign his name in his own handwriting on the special vote certificate in the place provided for the signature of the voter;
- (c) The authorized witness shall then and there sign his name in his own handwriting on the special vote certificate in the place provided for the signature of the authorized witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness and the date;
- (d) The elector then and there; in the presence of the authorized witness, but so that the authorized witness cannot see the vote, mark his vote on the ballot-paper in the prescribed manner and shall fold the ballot-paper so that the vote cannot be seen and hand it so folded to the authorized witness;
- (e) The authorized witness shall then and there place the ballot-paper in the envelope addressed to the Principal Presiding Officer, fasten the envelope, and hand it to the voter who shall forthwith cause it to be delivered to the Principal Presiding Officer for the ward in respect of which the elector is entitled to vote;
- (f) If the elector's sight is so impaired that he cannot vote without assistance, a person appointed by the elector shall mark the elector's vote on the ballot-paper in the presence of the authorized witness, and shall then and there fold the ballot-paper so that the vote cannot be seen, place it in the envelope addressed to the Principal Presiding Officer, fasten the envelope, and hand it to the voter, who shall forthwith cause it to be delivered to the Principal Presiding Officer for the ward in respect of which the elector is entitled to vote:

Provided that if no person is appointed by the elector, the authorized witness, if so requested by the elector, shall take the action required by this paragraph to be taken by a person appointed by the elector;

- (g) The authorized witness shall not, unless the elector's sight is so impaired that he cannot vote without assistance and no person is appointed by the elector to mark his vote for him, look at or make himself acquainted with the vote given by the elector, and, except as provided in paragraph (f) of this regulation, shall not suffer or permit any person (other than the elector) to see or become acquainted with the elector's vote, or to assist the elector to vote, or to interfere in any way with the elector in relation to his vote.
- "111.-(1.) Every authorized witness shall-

(a) comply with the preceding regulation in so far as it is witne to be complied with on his part;

(b) see that the directions in the preceding regulation are complied with by every elector exercising a special vote before him, and by every person present when the eletcor votes; and

(c) refrain from disclosing any knowledge of the vote of any elector exercising a special vote before him.

Penalty: Two pounds.

- (2.) An authorized witness shall not influence, or attempt to influence, in any way, the vote of an elector exercising a special vote before him.
 - "11k. No person other than-
 - (a) the elector to whom the special ballot-paper has been marking issued; or Penalty for unlawfully marking special ballot-paper has been marking
 - (b) a person appointed by the elector or an authorized witness, acting in pursuance of paragraph (f) of regulation 111. of these Regulations, assisting an elector whose sight is so impaired that he cannot vote without assistance,

shall mark a vote upon the ballot-paper.

Penalty: Two pounds.

Unlawfully opening special ballot-paper.

"11L. No person other than the Principal Presiding Officer for the ward in respect of which a special hallot-paper has been issued or an officer acting under his directions shall open the envelope in which the special ballot-paper has been placed pursuant to paragraph (e) of Regulation 111. of these Regulations and which has been fastened by an authorized witness in accordance with the provisions of that paragraph.

· Penalty: Two pounds.

Penalty for failure to deliver application or special ballot-paper.

"11M. Any person to whom an application for a special vote certificate and special ballot-paper or an envelope containing or purporting to contain a special ballot-paper is entrusted by a voter for the purpose of delivery to the Returning Officer or to the Principal Presiding Officer for the ward in respect of which the elector is entitled to vote, as the case may be, and who fails to deliver the application or envelope forthwith, shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Two pounds.

Special vote ballot-box.

"11N. The Principal Presiding Officer for each ward shall keep a locked and sealed ballot box with the words "Special Vote Ballot Box" marked thereon and shall place and keep therein until the scrutiny all envelopes containing special ballot-papers received up to the close of the poll.".

Scrutiny of ballot-papers.

- 2. Regulation 19 of the Advisory Council Elections Regulations is amended-
 - (a) by omitting sub-regulation (2.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-regulation:

 "(2.) In the event of an equality of votes, the Principal Presiding Officer shall decide by lot which (if any) of the candidates shall be excluded."; and
 - (b) by omitting from sub-regulation (3.) the words "The candidate" and inserting in their stead the words "Subject to the last preceding sub-regulation, the candidate".


