(a) All moneys payable to an employee shall be paid not later than 9.30 p.m. on Friday night in each week, including those payable in respect of the performance on that night, but where it has been customary to pay employees on Saturday and not on Friday such money may be paid not later than 9.30 p.m. on Saturday, including those payable in respect of the performance on Saturday night.

(b) If the employee to be paid on the Friday does not present himself for the payment at 9.30 p.m. such payment may be deferred until the following day.

(c) Notwithstanding the foregoing, if any employee be

(c) Notwithstanding the foregoing, if any employee be discharged or compelled to leave his employment at any time he shall before 11 p.m. on the day he is discharged or compelled to leave be paid all moneys due to him up to the time of his leaving the employment.

(d) Should any employee be short paid or overpaid in any week, in the case of short payment he shall receive the amount short paid on the following pay-day or as soon thereafter as possible, and in the case of over-payment the amount overpaid shall be deducted from the employee's wages on the payt are as one thereafter as possible. next pay-day or as soon thereafter as possible.

#### TERMINATION, ETC., OF EMPLOYMENT.

3. (a) All employees on the permanent staff shall be engaged by the week unless a longer period of engagement be

agreed to between the parties concerned.

(b) When an employee is engaged by the week the employment shall be terminated on either side only by a week's notice, which may be given at any time during the week, and the employee shall only be entitled to payment up to the time of the expiration of the notice.

(c) When an employee is engaged by the performance the employment shall be terminated on either side only by notice expiring at the expiration of the day following that on which the notice is given, and such notice may be given at any time.

(d) When an employee is engaged by the day or hour the

(d) When an employee is engaged by the day or hour the employment may be terminated without notice on either side subject to the payment of any prescribed minimum amount of wages and to the employee working the time covered by such minimum amount if required to do so.

(e) Nothing in this award shall affect any legal right of an employer to dismiss without notice any employee for whatever period engaged and whether on tour or not, for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct; and in case of such dismissal wages shall be payable for the employment up to but not after the time of dismissal.

(f) Notwithstanding anything contained in this award an employer may deduct payment of wages for any day on which an employee cannot be usefully employed because of—

(i) any strike, or

(i) any strike, or (ii) any breakdown of machinery, or (iii) any stoppage of work unavoidable by the employer.

# HOURS OF WORK AND TIME OFF. (Engaged by the week.)

## Weekly Totals.

4. (a) Except where otherwise prescribed the weekly total

of ordinary hours of work shall be 48.

(b) In the wardrobe department, for female employees (other than the wardrobe mistress) such weekly total shall be 44 hours.

- (c) For stage doorkeepers required to attend to telephone switchboards in direct communication with Central such weekly total shall be 54 hours, and for other stage doorkeepers, 60 hours.

- weekly total shall be 34½ hours.

  (e) For projectionists and projectionists' assistants in continuous picture shows and/or shows giving two performances per day such weekly total of all work shall be 42 hours and of actual operating 36 hours part of the said 42 hours.
- (f) For projectionists and projectionists' assistants in other picture shows such weekly total of all work shall be 38 hours and of actual operating 24 hours part of the said 38 hours.
- (g) For all male cleaners such weekly total shall be 44 hours.
- (h) For all female cleaners such weekly total shall be 36 hours.

#### Daily totals, ranges and stretches of hours, and starting and finishing times.

- (i) As to each employee (not excepted by paragraph (vi) hereof) whose prescribed weekly total of ordinary hours of work is 48:—
  - (i) The daily total of ordinary hours of work shall unless otherwise prescribed herein be 8% on five and 4% on one of the days of the week.
  - and 4½ on one of the days of the week.

    (ii) On one day in each week the employee shall have time-off duty beginning at 1 p.m. and continuing until the commencement of his evening duty or if he have no evening duty beginning not later than 1.15 p.m. and continuing for the rest of the day, and if such time off is allowed the provisions of this award as to intervals for dinner and tea shall not apply to that day.

    (iii) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, an employer may as to employees in the mechanical, property and light departments require the daily total of ordinary hours of work to be 8 in each of the six days of the week instead of as in paragraph (i) hereof.

    (iv) Such daily total of eight hours shall be worked in not more than two periods, each period to be continuous except as to meal hours occurring therein, which meal hours are not to be counted as time worked nor as part of the daily total.

(v) Both the two aforesaid periods shall be completed within a stretch of ten hours from the time the

employee starts work.

(vi) The provisions of paragraph (ii) hereof as to time off shall not apply where such daily totals of eight hours are worked in lieu of those prescribed in paragraph (i) hereof but the employer and the employee concerned shall be deemed to have agreed

employee concerned shall be deemed to have agreed that a full fortnight's holiday per year be allowed in accordance with sub-clause (kk) hereof.

(p) As to stage doorkeepers, the daily ordinary hours of work shall be so arranged that the employees shall have two hours relief a day other than meal intervals.

# (Engaged by the day.)

(q) For all employees engaged by the day the daily total of ordinary hours of work shall be 8.

#### (Engaged by the performance.)

(r) For ordinary night hands the hours of performance duty shall commence half an hour before the rising of the curtain and continue until the falling thereof and the clearing of the stage.

As to the following classes of employees not employed in continuous picture shows or palais de danse the hours of

duty shall be:

(i) For ticket sellers-

Ordinary evening performances, 6.45 p.m. to 9.15 p.m. or 7.30 p.m. to 10 p.m.
Ordinary matinees, 12.45 p.m. to 3.15 p.m.
Holiday evening performances, 6.30 p.m. to 9.15 p.m. Holiday matinees, 12.30 p.m. to 3.15 p.m.

(ii) For ushers, gallery ushermen, ticket takers, cloak-room attendants and barrier men— Ordinary week nights, 6.45 p.m. until clearing of house and the covering of the seats.

Saturday and holiday performances, 6.30 p.m. until clearing of house.

Ordinary matinees (week days), 12.45 p.m. until

clearing of house. Holiday matinees, 12.30 p.m. until clearing of

house.

(iii) For commissionaires-

Ordinary week nights, 6.45 p.m. until clearing of house.

Saturday and holiday performances, 6.30 p.m. until clearing of house

Ordinary matinees (week days), 12.45 p.m. until clearing of house.

Holiday matinees, 12.30 p.m. until clearing of

house. (iv) For spruikers, three hours.(v) For stage doorkeepers—

At night performances from 6.30 p.m. until relieved by the fireman or watchman immediately after the stage is clear.

At matinees from 12.30 p.m. until so relieved.

(vi) For dressers.—From half an hour before the rise of the curtain until fifteen minutes after the final fall thereof.

(t) As to the following classes of employees employed at a palais de danse, the hours of duty shall be—

(i) For ticket sellers-

Ordinary week night, 7.45 p.m. to 10.30 p.m., or 8.15 p.m. to 11 p.m.
Saturdays or holidays, 7.30 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.,

or 8 p.m. to 11 p.m.

(ii) For ushers, commissionaires, cloakroom attendants and ticket takers—

Ordinary week nights, 7.45 p.m. until clearing of house.

Saturdays and holidays, 7.30 p.m. until clearing of house.

# Definitions.

(u) The terms "actual operating," and "continuous picture show" are for the purpose of this clause defined as in clause 1 of this award, and the term "holidays" means the public provided for in clause 8 of this award.

#### Overtime.

(Employees engaged by the week or day.)

5. (a) Except where otherwise prescribed in this award employees for all work done over or outside the prescribed employees for all work done over or outside the prescribed daily, weekly or fortnightly total of ordinary hours of work, or outside the prescribed stretch or range of hours, or after a break in working hours or working time prescribed to be worked consecutively or continuously, shall be paid at the rate of time and a half; but this sub-clause does not apply to any of the heads of departments referred to in sub-clauses (h) any of the heads of departments referred to in sub-clauses (b) and (c) hereof if engaged by the week.

(b) The head carpenter or mechanist, head property master

or the head electrician, whether or not on tour, if required to be on duty over 48 hours and not exceeding 54 hours in any week, shall be paid 14s. in addition to the prescribed weekly wage, and if required to be on duty over 54 hours and not exceeding 60 hours shall be paid 30s. in addition to his prescribed weekly wage.

prescribed weekly wage.

(c) The wardrobe master or wardrobe mistress, whether or not on tour, if required to be on duty over 48 hours and not exceeding 54 hours, shall be paid 10s. in addition to the prescribed weekly wage, and if required to be on duty over 54 hours and not exceeding 60 hours shall be paid 22s. in addition to the prescribed weekly wage.

(d) If any of the heads of departments referred to in which classes (h) and (c) hereaf is required to be on duty for

sub-clauses (b) and (c) hereof is required to be on duty for any extra time beyond 60 hours, he or she shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half per hour.

such extra time at the rate of time and a half per hour.

(e) Where employees other than the aforesaid heads of departments are taken on tour and their prescribed weekly total of ordinary working hours is 48 they may be employed on the basis of 48 hours per week, or of 54 hours per week, or of 60 hours per week. Where they are employed on the basis of 48 hours per week, they shall be paid at the prescribed rate of pay; where employed on a 54-hour basis, they shall receive the sum of 12s. per week in addition to the prescribed rate of pay; and where employed on a 60-hour basis they shall receive the sum of 25s. per week in addition to the prescribed rate of pay, and if while employed on a 54-hour or a 60-hour basis they are required to work for any extra time beyond 54 hours in the first case, or 60 hours in the second case, they shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half per hour. a half per hour.

a half per hour.

(cc) If an employee engaged by the week is on tour and, on any calendar day on which he is required to work at a performance held on that day, is also required to travel during any time between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., one-half, not exceeding four hours of such time of travelling, or four hours thereof if the half exceed four hours, shall for the purpose of computing the amount of work (if any) done over the prescribed weekly total of ordinary hours of work be counted as time worked.

(f) Projectionists and their assistants in continuous picture shows and/or shows giving two performances per day for a

(f) Projectionists and their assistants in continuous picture shows and/or shows giving two performances per day for a week not exceeding 42 hours including not more than 36 hours actual operating shall receive overtime at the rate of time and a half for each hour worked at operating over and above 36 hours per week at an hourly rate based upon one-thirty-sixth of their weekly wage and for each hour's overtime on maintenance at a rate based upon one-forty-second

of their weekly wage.

(ff) Weekly employees (except cleaners) called upon to work between midnight and 8 a.m., other than for a midnight performance (for which the award already provides) shall be

(g) If any ticket seller, usher, commissionaire, cloakroom attendant or ticket-taker employed at a palais de danse is detained at the place of employment by the employer or his representative after 11.30 p.m. he or she shall be paid for the time so detained after 11.30 p.m. at the rate of double time, and if so detained until too late to travel by the last train, tram, or vessel to his or her home, the employer shall provide proper conveyance for the employee so detained if a female to her home, or a male to his home in case such home is more

# Employees Engaged by the Performance.

(h) Employees engaged by the performance if required to continue work in respect of the performance after 11.30 p.m. shall be paid as follows for the performance:

Continued not later than midnight-Performance rate plus one-sixth thereof.

Continued after midnight but not later than 12.30 a.m.

—Performance rate plus one-third thereof.
Continued after 12.30 a.m., but not later than 1 a.m.—
Performance rate plus two-thirds thereof.

### All Employees.

(i) Where an employee is detained at work until it is too (1) Where an employee is detained at work until it is too late to travel by the last train, tram, vessel or other regular public conveyance to the employee's home the employer shall provide proper conveyance for the employee so detained if a female to her home, or if a male to his home in case such home is more than a mile from his place of employment.

(j) Where an employee is required to work all night after the evening performance he shall wherever possible be given 24 hours' notice that he will be so required and the burden of proving impossibility shall rest upon the employer.

(k) Employees, with the exception of those mentioned in sub-clauses A9, B6, C16, F17, F18, F19, J5, J6, and K3, of clause 1 of this award, doing work at performances which begin at or about 11 p.m. or later shall be paid in the case of hourly employees double the hourly rate with a minimum payment as for two hours or double daily or per performance rate as the case may be, and in the case of weekly employees one-third of his prescribed per week rate in addition to his payment for the week.

#### Definitions.

(1) The terms "head carpenter or mechanist", "head property master", "head electrician" "wardrobe master" and "wardrobe mistress" are defined as in clause 1 of this award.

"Time and a half" means in the case of an employee engaged by the week one and a half times the prescribed rate per week divided by the number of the prescribed total weekly ordinary hours of work, and in the case of an employee engaged by the day one and a half times the prescribed rate per day divided by eight and in the case of an employee engaged by the hour one and a half times the prescribed rate per hour.

### MEAL INTERVALS.

6. (a) Meal intervals shall be as follows:-

Dinner, one hour continuous between noon and 2 p.m., but for female employees in the wardrobe department (except the wardrobe mistress), lunch, Monday to Friday, 12.30 p.m. to 1 p.m., and on Saturday nore.

Supper, half an hour between 11 p.m. and midnight.

Breakfast, from 7 a.m. to 8 a.m., but for cleaners half an hour between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m.

The dinner hour shall not be varied during any one week except when occasional rehearsals are in progress. shall the dinner hour commence before noon or end after 2 p.m., or the tea hour before 5 p.m. or after 7 p.m.

- (b) If employees are required to work during the time when a meal interval should be allowed pursuant to this clause, they shall be paid for such time worked at the rate of time and a half as defined in clause 5 of this award.
- (c) No part of the time that should be allowed as a meal interval shall be counted as part of the ordinary hours of work within the meaning of clause 4 of this award.

# ABSENCE FROM DUTY.

- (a) Any employee engaged by the week absent from duty shall lose pay proportionate to such absence unless he provides or forwards to his employer within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that the absence was reasonable because of either-
  - (i) any illness of himself due neither to his own default nor to accident arising otherwise than out of and in the course of his employment; or
  - (ii) any bodily injury to himself caused by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment.
- (b) If any dispute shall arise as to the deduction of pay on the ground that satisfactory evidence has not been produced or forwarded, the question whether the evidence should have been accepted by the employer as satisfactory may be determined by the local secretary or other authorized representative of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association and the employer or his representation and if of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association and the employer or his representative, and if they do not agree shall be determined by the Board of Reference appointed hereunder, and the employer and employee shall treat the evidence as satisfactory or not satisfactory for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof according to the tenor of the determination, which determination shall be conclusive and not subject to appeal.
- (c) This clause shall not affect any right of the employer determine the employment in accordance with clause 3 of this award.

# SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

8. (a) For any work done on Sundays or public holidays payment shall be made at least as follows:

(i) On Sundays-

If the employee is engaged by the week, payment of one-third of his prescribed per week rate in addition to his payment for the week, and for work in excess of eight hours or done in such manner as would have entitled him under sub-clause (a) of clause 5 of this award to be paid at the rate of time and a half if the work were done upon an ordinary full working week day, payment at the rate of double the said ordinary prescribed rate shall be paid.

If he is not so engaged, double his ordinary prescribed rate: Provided that this clause shall not apply to the case of an employee employed on Saturday night continuing his work to any time not later than 2 a.m. on the Sunday, or than 2.30 a.m. if he has had his supper interval between 11 p.m. and 11.30 p.m.

(ii) On Good Friday, Christmas Day, and Eight Hours

Day

If the employee is engaged by the week, payment of one-sixth of his prescribed per week rate in addition to his payment for the week and for work on any of the said days done in excess of the number of hours prescribed for such day if it were an ordinary week day, part of the employee's working week, or done in such a manner as would have entitled him under sub-clause (a) of clause 5 of this award to be paid at the rate of time and a half if the work had been done upon an ordinary full working week day, payment at the rate of double the said ordinary prescribed rate shall be paid.

(iii) On other public holidays-

If the employee is engaged by the week, payment of one-twelfth of his prescribed per week rate in addition to his payment for the week.

If he is not so engaged, one and a half times his

If he is not so engaged, one and a half times his ordinary prescribed rate.

The said other holidays are the days observed in the State where the employment occurs, as New Year's Day, Anniversary Day (26th January), Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Boxing Day, and all other days regarded and observed as holidays throughout the Commonwealth, but when any of the holidays named are observed on different days in different States, or different parts of a State, employees shall only be entitled to extra payment from the one employer for one of such days in each year.

(iv) Where any of the days specified as holidays in paragraphs (ii) or (iii) hereof fall on a Sunday and in consequence a holiday is generally observed on

in consequence a holiday is generally observed on an ordinary week-day which would not otherwise be kept as a holiday, work done on such ordinary week-day shall be deemed to be done on one of the days to which the said paragraph hereof applies and shall be paid for accordingly.

(b) If an employee engaged by the week is required by his employer to travel on a Sunday he shall, unless he is paid in pursuance of this clause for working on a Sunday, receive for such travelling one-twelfth of his prescribed per week rate in addition to the travelling allowance payable in respect of the Sunday the Sunday.

(c) In the case of employees engaged by the week, if by reason of any of the public holidays referred to in this clause being a holiday no work is done thereon the employees pre-scribed rate for the week shall nevertheless be paid.

(d) All work done between midnight on Sunday and 6 a.m. on Monday shall be engaged for by the hour and paid for at not less than double the rate, if any, prescribed per hour for such work done between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., or if there be no such rate per hour, at a rate per hour of not less than double the prescribed per week rate divided by the number of the autropriate prescribed weekly total of ordinary hours of the appropriate prescribed weekly total of ordinary hours of

# ANNUAL OR OTHER LEAVE.

Annual or Other Leave.

9. (a) All employees engaged by the week shall have two weeks' holiday on full pay, or in lieu thereof a full fortnight's pay in respect of each year of service with the one employer.

(b) If the fortnight's holiday or pay due under sub-clause (a) hereof shall not have been given at the expiration of the year the employee's right thereto shall continue and accumulate in respect of each year's service but only to the extent of two years other than those for which a claim in writing for the holiday or pay shall have been made not later than fourteen days after such expiration.

(c) No employer shall be liable to a penalty for breach of this award in respect of the omission to give any such holiday or to make any such payment, until the employee shall have notified him in writing of the omission nor until the employer shall have failed within a fortnight of the receipt of the notification to give the said holiday or the beginning of the said holiday or to make the said payment in full.

(d) If the employment of any weekly employee be terminated such employee shall be entitled to one day's pay for each month of service that has been rendered during the employment, unless in respect of such service a holiday or payment has been given or made by the employer or the employee has lost his right thereto under the provision of this clause. (This pro rata payment shall only be due after six months' service in each year of service.) Such payment shall be paid within fourteen days of the termination of the employment.

(e) In each of the foregoing cases of payment the amount thereof shall be adjusted according to the index number current at the time of payment.

10 (a) An employee engaged by the week when travelling on duty shall be provided by his employer with first class accommodation both by rail and boat except when travelling between Port Augusta and Kalgoorlie, and except when travelling by a boat of at least 6,000 tons carrying first, second and third class passengers, when if required he shall accept except class agreementation second class accommodation.

(b) Such an employee when travelling on duty at night by train shall be provided with sleeping berths where possible.

by train shall be provided with sleeping berths where possible.

(c) Such an employee when travelling on duty shall be paid the fu'l prescribed rate for the whole time of the tour from when he leaves the place of engagement at the beginning until he returns to that place at the end of the tour, broken weeks at the beginning or end to be paid for pro rata, and the days of departure and return other than Sunday to be each counted as one day worked:

Provided that if either of such days be a Sunday sub-clause (h) of clause 8 of this award shall apply to that day.

Provided that if either of such days be a Sunday sub-clause (b) of clause 8 of this award shall apply to that day.

(d) On the day such a tour's journey begins the employer shall be entitled to the ordinary service of such employee during so much of the day as he is not travelling, but such service shall not continue later than one hour before the scheduled starting time of the train or boat.

(c) On the day such a tour's journey ends the employer shall be entitled to the ordinary services of such employee up to 5 p.m. during so much of the day as he is not travelling, and if the employee fails without reasonable cause to attend when requested to attend for such service, the employer shall be entitled to deduct payment proportionate to the time during be entitled to deduct payment proportionate to the time during

which the employee so fails to attend.

(f) (i) To an employee engaged by the week who while travelling on duty has to provide his or her own board and lodging, a travelling allowance as hereunder shown shall be paid by the employer in addition to the prescribed wage:

(ii) The allowance per day shall be paid for each of the whole days less in number than seven which the employee

spends in any one city or town.

(iii) The allowance per week shall be paid for each seven consecutive whole days which the employee spends in any

consecutive whole days which the employee spends in any one city or town.

(iv) If the employee spends in any one city or town more than seven or any other multiple of seven whole days he or she shall for each whole day not part of the seven or other such multiple be paid one-fifth of the said allowance per week.

(v) The al'owance for bed or meal shall be paid for each ordinary bed or meal which the employee needs during any part of a day not being part of a whole day spent in any one

part of a day not being part of a whole day spent in any one

(vi) The appropriate allowance herein prescribed shall be paid in respect of the whole time of the travelling including the days whether Sundays or not on which a journey begins

or ends.

(g) If an employer shall have provided for the board and/or lodging of the employee for any week or day or part of a day no travelling allowance shall be payable to the employee in respect of such week or day or part of a day.

(h) No employee who pays his or her own fare for travelling while on duty shall be engaged to travel.

# MATERIAL, ETC., TO BE PROVIDED BY EMPLOYERS.

11. (a) All mechanical property or light requirements are to be provided by the employer.

(b) Any special uniform or staff dresses required to be worn by employees shall be provided by the employer.

(c) Cleaners shall be provided with all materials and implements necessary for their work and with hot water for cleaning and scrubbing in cold weather.

# ACCOMMODATION FOR EMPLOYEES.

(a) In theatres and picture shows the employer shall provide a suitable room or accommodation for employees to change and keep their clothes in while on duty.

(b) In continuous picture shows the employer shall provide suitable meal room with the necessary heating and cooking ntensils.

(c) In continuous picture shows the employer shall provide mats for employees on the doors to stand on.

(d) In continuous picture shows female ticket takers and female ushers shall be provided with suitable seating accommodation near the door for use by them when they are not required by their work to be standing or walking.

(e) In this clause the term "continuous picture shows" has the same meaning as in clause 1 of this award.

# SPECIAL COSTUMES FOR FEMALE EMPLOYEES.

- 13. (a) No female employee shall be required to wear a special costume or uniform unless it has been approved as not indecent, grotesque or ridiculous by the authorized representative of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association or in the absence of his approval by a Board of Reference appointed hereunder subject to appeal to the Court or a Judge thereof.
- (b) If any female employee is required to wear a costume or uniform more unusual than is reasonably necessary for the performance of her work having regard to all the circumstances, she shall therefor if engaged by the week be paid £1 10s. per week, and if engaged otherwise be paid 6s. per performance in addition to any other moneys payable under this award. If any question arises as to whether such costume or uniform is so more unusual, it shall be determined by a Board of Reference appointed hereunder subject to appeal to the Court or a Judge thereof.

# TIME BOOKS TO BE KEPT, ETC.

14. (a) The employer shall keep a time book or time sheet, properly posted in ink, showing the names of and the time worked by each employee, and the wages paid to each employee from week to week, and shall retain such time book or sheet in good condition and unaltered for at least nine months from the time in respect of which any entry therein was made the time in respect of which any entry therein was made.

(b) The time book or time sheet shall, after all the time worked previous to the entry by any employee has been entered therein, be produced to such employee, and such entry if correct shall be vouched by his signature in the book or

(c) The time book or time sheet, with all the entries therein, shall, on demand, be produced by the employer for inspection at the place where it is kept at any time between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. during any day except pay day, to the general secretary or a branch or sub-branch secretary of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association or an official of such association who has ployees Association or an official of such association who has been authorized in writing by such general secretary or branch or sub-branch secretary to inspect the time books or time sheets of such employer, and such general secretary or branch or sub-branch secretary or official may thereupon inspect and make a copy of such time books or time sheets or make extracts therefrom.

One clear days notice shall be given to the employer of any

intended inspection.

No inspection shall be made and no authority to inspect shall be given unless the general secretary or branch or sub-branch secretary proposing to make the inspection or to give the authority has good reason to suspect that a breach of the award has been committed by the employer whose time healt or time sheat is to be inspected. book or time sheet is to be inspected.

# AWARD TO BE POSTED UP.

15. Each respondent shall cause a copy of this award to be posted up in a suitable conspicious place in his theatre, hall or other place of amusement.

# POSTING AWARD AND NOTICES.

16. With the permission of the employer, a representative of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association may post notices and a copy of this award on a board in each theatre in a reasonable manner.

# EMPLOYMENT BUREAU TO BE ESTABLISHED.

17. The Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association shall establish in each of the State capitals a bureau where a list of all available employees seeking employment shall be kept, and the said association shall facilitate the engagement of suitable men by the employers through these offices as far as possible.

# SUB-CONTRACT, ETC.

18. (a) If work of any of the kinds covered by this award is done by an employee or arranged to be so done in the interest in any way of an employer this award shall apply to such work, employee, and employer, notwithstanding that the employer causes or permits such work to be done for or through or by means of a contractor or other person, and the employer and employee shall have the same rights and obliga-tions as if they were in respect of such work directly employer and employee.

(b) An employer shall not permit any of the work covered by this award to be done by employees in any place under his control through a contractor or other person except in accordance with the terms and conditions of this award as if the contractor or other person or the conditions of this award as if the contractor or other person were himself a party to and bound by this award.

(c) No employer shall enter into any contract for the carrying on of any of the work covered by this award by means of employees unless the contract contains a clause binding the contractor to pay the rates and observe the conditions prescribed in this award in respect of the work contracted for so long as this award remains in operation.

#### DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE.

19. The employer-

(a) Shall not discriminate in the selection or retention of employees against members of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association on the ground of such membership or because they members of any other organization, union or association.

(b) Shall not directly or indirectly or through his servants or agents seek to induce an employee who is a member of the said association to cease to become a member or to become a member of

any other organization, union or association.

(c) Shall not displace in the course of any engagement undertaken any member of the said association for the purpose of providing work for any other

person.

(d) Shall not as a condition of employment ask or require any person or persons to say whether he belongs to the said association or any other organization.

#### INTIMIDATION CLAUSE.

20. The Australian Theatrical and Amusement employees Association, its officers, and its members shall not with a view to compel any employee of an employer or any person who is willing to accept employment from an employer to join the said association or to end his employment with the employer or to refuse to accept employment from the employer:-

(a) use violence to or intimidate such employee or person or his wife or children or injure his property.

person or his wife or children or injure his property.

(b) persistently follow such employee or person about from place to place.

(c) hide his clothes or other property owned or used by such employee or person or deprive him of or hinder him in the use thereof.

(d) watch or beset the house or other place where such employee or person resides or happens to be, or the approach to such house or place.

(e) use threatening abusive, obscene, indecent or insult-

(e) use threatening, abusive, obscene, indecent or insulting words towards such employee or person, his wife or children.

# CANCELLATION, ETC., OF AWARD.

21. (a) If it appears to the Court, on the application of any employer or of the Industrial Registrar that the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association-

has done anything in the nature of a strike; or

(ii) has committed any other breach or non-observance of the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration

Act 1904-1934 or this award; or (iii) that any number of members of the said association

- (iii) that any number of members of the said association sufficiently large to form a substantial part of the said association, refuses to accept employment either at all or in accordance with this award; or
  (iv) that for any other reason this award ought to be suspended or cancelled in whole or in part, the Court may by order, subject to such conditions as it thinks fit, suspend or cancel for such period as it thinks fit, all or any of the terms of this award, so far as it applies to or is in favour of the said association and its members.
- (b) During the period of suspension or cancellation, no person affected as a present or past member of the said Association by the suspension or cancellation shall be entitled to the benefit of any other order or award in force, and such order or award shall cease to apply to the employment of those persons.

(c) The order for suspension or cancellation may be limited

(c) The order for suspension or cancellation may be limited to persons named therein, to classes of persons, to any branch of the said association or to particular localities.

(d) For the purpose of this clause the expression "strike" includes the total or partial cessation of work by employees acting in combination, as a means of enforcing compliance with demands made by them or other employees on employers and the total or partial refusal of employees, acting in combination, to accept work, if the refusal is unreasonable.

# BOARD OF REFERENCE.

BOARD OF REFERENCE.

22. (a) For the purposes of this award, this Court gives power to the Industrial Registrar to appoint a separate Board of Reference for each State of the Commonwealth.

(b) Each of such Boards shall consist of three representatives nominated by the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association, and in default of such nomination appointed by the Industrial Registrar, and three representatives of the employers nominated by them, and in default of such nomination appointed by the Industrial Registrar, with the addition of the Industrial Registrar or of such person as he may nominate in case the votes are equally divided, or the members invite the assistance of the Industrial Registrar or the person nominated by him. the person nominated by him.

(c) Either the said association or the said employers may at any time fill any vacancy or vary its representation.

(d) Any person appointed a member of a Board by the Industrial Registrar may appoint a substitute to act in his stand at any time. stead at any time.

stead at any time.

(e) Three members, one of whom may be the Industrial Registrar. or his deputy, shall constitute a quorum.

(f) A Board of Reference may sit at such times and places as the members may agree or the Industrial Registrar may fix, and may adjourn from time to time and from place to place to place.

to place.

(g) The functions of the Board shall be to allow, approve, fix. determine or deal with any matters or things which under this award may require from time to time to be allowed, approved, fixed, determined or dealt with by the Board, or which may effect the amicable relations of the parties with reference to this every

which may effect the amicable relations of the parties with reference to this award.

(h) The decision of the Board of Reference may be reviewed and altered by the Court on the application of any party to this award: Provided that notice of an application to the Court to review such decision be given within twenty-one days of such decision, and an application be lodged with the Industrial Registrar asking for such review within twenty-one days of such decision, but the Court may give extended time for such notice and application at any time.

(i) Nothing in this clause shall take away from any party the right to apply to the Court given by the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1904-1934, whether for a variation or an interpretation of this award.

(d) Wet nights.—If the employee reports for duty and the park opens, and the employer is compelled to close on account of the night being wet, the employee shall be paid full performance rate. If the employer advises the secretary of the claimant organization by telephone or otherwise that the performance is It the employer advises the secretary of the claimant organization by telephone or otherwise that the performance is not going to take place on account of wet weather, any employee shall be excused from attending the performance.

(e) Except as otherwise provided by this clause the said respondent shall be bound by the conditions of this award as applicable to such respondent and adjustment clause shall apply to the rates of this clause.

# APPLICATION OF AWARD AND RESERVATION.

24. (a) This award shall apply in all the States of the Commonwealth to all the members of the Australian Theatrical and Amusement Employees Association as employees and to all the persons comprised in schedule "A" hereto as employers except as provided in sub-clause (c) hereof and except in respect of the employment in Queensland of such employees engaged in that State for employment there.

(b) This award supersedes all previous awards to which the said Association and any of the said persons were parties, but no right, obligation or liability already accrued or incurred under any previous award shall hereby be affected.

(c) Until further order this award shall not apply to respondents members of the Cinematograph Distributors Association or the Victorian Independent Exhibitors Association carrying on business in country districts in the State of Victoria other than the Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong and Wontbergi districts Wonthaggi districts.

a) Superior efficiency; or

(b) Equal efficiency combined with seniority.
