NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 1947.

Milk—Queensland.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Acting Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 1947.

Application.

2. The provisions of this Order shall not apply to any sales of milk for delivery to or by a retailer whose premises are situated within the Brisbane metropolitan area.

Definitions and Interpretations.

3.—(1.) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—

“Atherton Tableland” means all that area comprised within the Shires of Atherton and Eacham;

“the Brisbane metropolitan area” means all that area comprised within a radius of ten miles from the General Post Office, Brisbane, and includes the town of Redcliffe;

“by retail” or “by wholesale” means, in relation to any sale of milk, that such sale is a sale by retail or by wholesale, as the case may be, but is not a sale by “semi-wholesale”;

“by semi-wholesale” means, in relation to any sale of milk—

(a) that such milk is sold by a retailer to a person to whom the retailer has, on the date of the sale, sold a quantity of milk (including that comprised in such first-mentioned sale) exceeding two gallons; or

(b) that such sale is a sale to a person who conducts a shop where milk is sold separately from any milk round;

“Northern Coastal Queensland”, means all that area of Queensland comprised within the cities of Cairns and Mackay, the town of Bowen and the Shires of Ayr, Broadsound, Cardwell, Hinchinbrook, Johnstone, Mirani, Mulgrave, Nebo, Pioneer, Proserpine, Sarina, Thuringowa and Wangaratta;

“South-eastern Queensland” means all that area of Queensland comprised within the cities of Ipswich, Toowoomba, Warwick, Gympie, Maryborough, Bundaberg and Rockhampton, the towns of Coolangatta, Southport, Dalby and Gladstone, and the following Shires:—

“treatment” includes pasteurization, cooling, chilling and refrigerating of milk and “treated” has a corresponding meaning;

“Western Queensland” means all that area of Queensland not included in “South-eastern Queensland”, “Northern Coastal Queensland”, “Atherton Tableland”, “Brisbane metropolitan area”, and includes the city of Townsville.

(2.) For the purpose of this Order where any Post Office or principal post office of any place is situated less than one-half mile from any boundary line of any area defined in this Order, then all places within one-half mile of that post office or principal post office, as the case may be, shall be deemed to be within the area in which that post office or principal post office is situated.

Maximum prices—Specified areas.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold for delivery in any of the areas specified in the first column of the Schedule to this Order to be—

(a) in respect of sales to retailers (excluding semi-wholesale sales)—

(i) where delivery is taken at the retailer's premises—the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area; or

(ii) where delivery is taken at any other place—the price specified in (i) of this sub-paragraph less the cost which would be incurred in transporting the milk to the retailer's premises;

(b) in respect of sales by retail—

(i) where such milk is not sold in a sealed container—

(A) the price specified in the fourth column of that Schedule opposite such area, or

(B) the price paid or payable by the retail seller for such milk plus an amount computed at the rate of 1s. 0d. per gallon, plus any cost incurred in transporting that milk to his premises,

whichever is the lesser; or

(ii) where such milk is sold in a sealed container—the price specified in (i) of this sub-paragraph, plus an amount computed at the rate of 1d. per quart; and

(c) in respect of sales by semi-wholesale—

(i) where such milk is not sold in a sealed container—

(A) the price specified in the third column of that Schedule opposite such area, or

(B) the price paid or payable for such milk by the semi-wholesaler plus an amount calculated at the rate of 6d. per gallon,

whichever is the lesser; or

(ii) where such milk is sold in a sealed container—the price specified in (i) of this sub-paragraph, plus an amount computed at the rate of 4d. per gallon.

Maximum prices—Treatment depots.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold to any person other than to a retailer for treatment in any area specified in the Schedule to this Order to be the maximum price for the sale of that milk to a retailer in that area less an amount computed at the rate of 1½d. per gallon.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold to a retailer by any person who has purchased that milk and treated that milk in any area specified in the Schedule to this Order to be the maximum price fixed for the sale of that milk to a retailer in that area plus an amount computed at the rate of 1½d. per gallon.

Fixation of maximum prices by notice.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which milk specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS
PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 1948.

Eucalyptus Oils.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Acting Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 1948.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 1847 is hereby revoked.

Maximum Prices.

3. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which crude or refined eucalyptus oils of the kinds specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold to be—

- (a) delivered free on rail at railway siding or station nearest to the seller's premises—the prices specified in that Schedule;
- (b) delivered at the seller's premises—the prices specified in (a), less the usual cost of transport from the seller's premises to the railway siding or station nearest to those premises; or
- (c) delivered at any other place—the prices specified in (b) plus cost actually incurred in transporting the eucalyptus oil from the seller's premises to the point of delivery:

Provided that if the purchaser of any eucalyptus oil is required to pay any amount in relation to agency charges in excess of 5 per centum of the maximum price fixed for its sale, such maximum price shall be reduced by the amount of such excess.

Variation of maximum prices by notice.

4. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which eucalyptus oil specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 1949.

Spirituuous Liguors and Aerated Waters—Retail Prices in the Rockhampton Area—Queensland.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Acting Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 1949.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 1761, as amended by Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 1814 and 1883, is hereby further amended—

(a) By omitting sub-paragraph (g) of paragraph 3, and inserting in its stead the following sub-paragraph:—

"(g) In relation to the sale of draught beer—

- 'Bottle', unless otherwise stated, means a bottle containing a reputed quart (26 fluid oz.);
- '16-oz. schooner' means any glass or similar container containing not less than 16 oz.;
- '11-oz. pot' means any glass or similar container containing 11 oz. or more but less than 16 oz.;
- '8-oz. glass' means any glass or similar container containing 8 oz. or more but less than 11 oz.;
- '7-oz. glass' means any glass or similar container containing 7 oz. or more but less than 8 oz.;
- 'Small 7-oz. glass' means any glass or similar container containing less than 7 oz."

(b) By omitting from the Schedule the items and prices appearing under the sub-heading "Draught Beer" and inserting in their stead the items and prices appearing under that sub-heading in the Schedule to this Order.

NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 1950.

*Spiritous Liquors and Aerated Waters—Northampton Areas
Western Australia.*

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Acting Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 1950.

Definitions and interpretation.

2.—(1.) In this Order and the Schedule thereto, unless the contrary intention appears—

“aerated waters” includes cordials;

“Northampton areas” means all those areas of Western Australia comprised within a radius of three miles from the principal post office of each of the following towns—Northampton, Nabawa and Yuna;

“spiritous liquors” means any spirituous or fermented liquors;

“oz.” means a fluid ounce or ounces as the case may be;

“small 5-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing less than 5 oz.;

“5-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing 5 oz. or more but less than 6 oz.;

“6-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing 6 oz. or more but less than 7 oz.;

“7-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing 7 oz. or more but less than 8 oz.;

“8-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing 8 oz. or more but less than 9 oz.;

“9-oz. glass” means any glass or similar container containing 9 oz. or more but less than 10 oz.;

“10-oz. glass or pot” means any glass or similar container containing 10 oz. or more but less than 12 oz.;

“12-oz. pot” means any glass or similar container containing not less than 12 oz.;

“small nobbler” means any glass or similar container containing less than 13/16th oz.;

“nobbler” means any glass or similar container containing not less than 13/16th oz.;

“reputed quart” means 26 oz.;

“imperial quart” means 40 oz.;

“reputed pint” means 13 oz.;

“bottle” unless otherwise stated means a reputed quart (26 fluid oz.);

“half bottle” unless otherwise stated means a reputed pint (13 fluid oz.);

“quarter bottle” unless otherwise stated means a reputed half pint (6½ fluid oz.).

(2.) For the purpose of this Order, where any bottled spirituous or fermented liquor is sold without a label bearing the brand and description of that liquor, that liquor shall be deemed not to be of any of the brands or descriptions set out in the Schedule to this Order.

Maximum prices—Liquors specified in schedule.

3. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which any variety or quantity of spirituous liquors or aerated waters specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail in the Northampton areas to be the prices specified therein.

Quantities not specified.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any spirituous liquors specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold in quantities other than those specified in that Schedule, to be the maximum price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the next smaller quantity of such spirituous liquors specified in that Schedule or if there is no smaller quantity specified then such price (calculated to the nearest downward halfpenny) as bears the same ratio to the maximum price fixed for the next higher measure or quantity as the quantity actually sold bears to the next higher quantity.

Sales in dining room, lounge or saloon bar.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum prices at which any spirituous liquors or aerated waters specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by any person in any hotel dining room, lounge or saloon bar in the Northampton areas to be the prices specified in the said Schedule plus an amount equal to the difference between the hotel dining room, lounge or saloon bar prices respectively charged by that person on 15th April, 1942, for any such spirituous liquors or aerated waters and the public bar prices charged by that person for such spirituous liquors or aerated waters on such date: Provided that if in the case of any sale, by reason of the absence of records such difference between the hotel dining room, lounge

or saloon bar prices and the public bar prices at the 15th April, 1942, cannot be ascertained the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply and such sale shall be deemed to have been made in the public bar.

Non-Listed liquors.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any kind of spirituous or fermented liquors or any mixture thereof, or any mixture of liquids containing any spirituous or fermented liquors, for the sale of which a maximum price is not fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order, may be sold by any person to be:—

(i) in respect of sales of beer, ale, stout or lager (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of one halfpenny for each fluid ounce of such beer, ale, stout or lager;

(ii) in respect of sales of whisky (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of threepence for each fluid ounce of such whisky;

(iii) in respect of sales of brandy (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of three pence for each fluid ounce of such brandy;

(iv) in respect of sales of gin (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of threepence for each fluid ounce of such gin;

(v) in respect of sales of schnapps (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of threepence for each fluid ounce of such schnapps;

(vi) in respect of sales of rum (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of threepence for each fluid ounce of rum;

(vii) in respect of sales of any spirituous or fermented liquors other than those specified in sub-paragraphs (i) to (vi) hereof or any mixture of spirituous or fermented liquors or any mixture of liquids containing spirituous or fermented liquor (together with any container supplied therewith)—an amount computed at the rate of one halfpenny for each fluid ounce of such spirituous or fermented liquor or mixture:

Provided that if any price calculated under the provisions of this paragraph is not an exact number of pence or halfpence that maximum price shall be computed to the nearest upward halfpenny.

Exhibition of Price-list.

7. Every person who sells or holds for sale by retail any spirituous or fermented liquors or any mixture thereof, a maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by the provisions of this Order shall exhibit in a prominent position in his place of business, or, if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business and in each of the bars, dining rooms and lounges at such place or places of business, a notice or notices setting forth the maximum prices fixed by this Order for the sale by him of any kind and quantity of such spirituous or fermented liquors. I hereby declare that any form of notice shall be deemed to be an approved form if it is otherwise in compliance with regulation 45 of the National Security (Prices) Regulations.

Fixation of maximum prices by notice.

8. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum prices at which any spirituous or fermented liquors specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 1951.

Seed Potatoes—Tasmania.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Acting Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 1951.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 1103 as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 1509 is hereby further amended—

(a) by adding at the end of paragraph 4 the following proviso:—

"Provided further that where the price paid to growers by the Australian Potato Committee for deliveries of No. 1 grade potatoes in Tasmania during any specified period exceeds £12 10s. per ton, the maximum price per ton fixed by the provisions of this Order for seed potatoes delivered during the same period shall be increased by an amount equal to the amount by which such price so exceeds £12 10s. per ton."

(b) by omitting the Schedule and inserting in its stead the Schedule to this Order.

I fix and declare the maximum price at which oysters may be sold by wholesale outside the prescribed areas to be the maximum price fixed for the sale of those oysters in the prescribed area which includes or is nearest to the place where those oysters were gathered, less the usual cost of transport to such prescribed area from the place where such oysters were gathered.

Sales by retail—Prescribed areas.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which oysters may be sold by retail outside the prescribed areas to be the price fixed for the sale of those oysters in the nearest prescribed area plus the cost of transport (if any) actually incurred by the retail seller and properly attributable to the transport of such oysters to his premises and noted on an invoice delivered to him in relation to those oysters.

Variation of maximum prices by notice.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which oysters specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

PROCLAMATION

Commonwealth of Australia to wit.
HENRY
Governor-General.

By His Royal Highness the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the third day of September, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine, the Governor-General has proclaimed the existence of war: And whereas by section 112 of the Customs Act 1901-1936 it is enacted that in time of war the Governor-General may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of any goods: And whereas the power of the Governor-General to prohibit, as aforesaid, the exportation of any goods extends to authorize the prohibition of the exportation of goods generally, or to any specified place, and either absolutely or so as to allow of the exportation of the goods subject to any condition or restriction: Now therefore I, Henry William Frederick Albert, Duke of Gloucester, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby prohibit the exportation from Australia of the goods specified in the Schedule hereto unless the consent in writing of the Minister to the exportation of the goods has first been obtained.
