NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 3403.

Bran and Pollard—Wholesale and Retail—Victoria.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Mortimer Eugene McCarthy, Commonwealth Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 3403.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 1785 as amended by Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 1914, 1993 and 2481 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 "by wholesale" means, in relation to any sale of bran or pollard, that the quantity sold is not less than 3 long tons of 2,240 lb. each;
 "by retail" means, in relation to any sale of bran or pollard, that such a sale is not a sale by wholesale as defined in this paragraph;
 "Melbourne and suburbs area" means all that area defined in the First Schedule to this Order;
 "mill town area" means any area in which deliveries of bran or pollard were customarily made from a local mill to the purchaser's premises by the miller prior to 27th September, 1948;
 "bushel" means, in relation to any sale of bran or pollard, 20 lb. in weight.

Maximum prices—Sales by wholesale—Melbourne and suburbs.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which bran or pollard may be sold by wholesale for delivery in the Melbourne and suburbs area to be—

- (a) where delivered free to purchaser's premises—the price specified in the second column of the First Schedule to this Order opposite to such area in the first column thereof;
- (b) where delivered *ex* mill or free to the railway station or siding most accessible to the purchaser's premises—the price specified in sub-paragraph (a) hereof less 2s. 6d. per ton; or
- (c) other deliveries—the price specified in sub-paragraph (a) hereof less the cost which would be incurred in transporting such bran or pollard to the purchaser's premises.

Maximum prices—Sales by wholesale—Outside Melbourne—Other than mill town areas.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which bran or pollard may be sold by wholesale for delivery outside the Melbourne and suburbs area, except where the purchaser's premises are within a mill town area, to be—

- (a) where delivered to the railway station or siding most accessible to the purchaser's premises—the price specified in the second column of the Second Schedule to this Order according to the railway station or siding to which such bran or pollard is so delivered; or

- (b) where delivered on rail, but not free on rail to railway station or siding most accessible to the purchaser's premises—the price specified in sub-paragraph (a) hereof less the freight which would be incurred in transporting such bran or pollard to such most accessible railway station or siding:

Provided that—

- (i) where such most accessible railway station or siding is on the Tatong line beyond Benalla or on the Whitfield line beyond Wangaratta, then in such case Benalla and Wangaratta respectively shall be deemed to be the most accessible railway station as aforesaid;
- (ii) in the case of Portarlington, Dromana, Sorrento and Flinders—free on board Geelong or Melbourne shall be substituted for most accessible railway station or siding and railway station or siding as aforesaid.

Maximum prices—Sales by wholesale—Outside Melbourne—Mill town areas.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which bran or pollard may be sold by wholesale for delivery outside the Melbourne and suburbs area in all cases where the purchaser's premises are within a mill town area to be—

- (a) where delivered free to the purchaser's premises—the price specified in the second column of the Second Schedule to this Order according to the railway station or siding to which those premises are most accessible;
- (b) where delivered *ex* mill or free to the railway station or siding most accessible to the purchaser's premises—the price specified in sub-paragraph (a) hereof less 2s. 6d. per ton; or
- (c) for other deliveries—the price specified in sub-paragraph (a) hereof less the cost which would be incurred in transporting such bran or pollard to the purchaser's premises.

Maximum prices—Deliveries under 3 tons.

7.—(1.) The maximum prices fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order are for deliveries of 3 long tons (6,720 lb.) or more.

(2.) Where deliveries are made of less than 3 long tons (6,720 lb.) and the seller has incurred freight costs which have not been charged to the purchaser, then the maximum prices fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order shall in each case be increased by an amount by which the freight incurred is greater than the proportional amount of freight on a 3 long ton truck lot basis.

Maximum prices—Sales by retail.

8. I fix and declare the maximum price at which bran or pollard may be sold by retail to be—

- (a) in respect of sales by millers—
- (i) for deliveries in lots of 1 bushel or more—1s. 6½d. per bushel; or
- (ii) for deliveries in lots of less than 1 bushel—1s. 7½d. per bushel; and
- (b) in respect of sales other than by millers—
- (i) for deliveries to the purchaser's premises—
- (aa) in bushel lots—2s. 0½d. per bushel;
- (bb) in bag lots—1s. 10½d. per bushel; or
- (ii) for deliveries *ex* store—
- (aa) in bushel lots 1s. 10½d. per bushel;
- (bb) in bag lots—1s. 9½d. per bushel.

Fixation of maximum prices by notice.

9. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which bran or pollard specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

Provided that where delivery is made to any point distant beyond 25 miles from the seller's place of business, such maximum price may be increased by ½d. per set for each 5 miles, or part thereof (as the case may be) by which the distance on a horizontal plane between the point of delivery and the seller's place of business exceeds 25 miles.

Maximum prices—Seasoned.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which fruit case shoos specified in the Second Schedule to this Order may be sold in Tasmania to be the price therein specified:

Provided that where delivery is made to any point distant beyond 5 miles from the seller's place of business, such maximum price may be increased by ½d. per set for each five miles, or part thereof (as the case may be) by which the distance on a horizontal plane between the point of delivery and the seller's place of business exceeds 5 miles:

Provided, however, that no amount may be added for such delivery in excess of 2d. per set.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Horace Eddy Bishop, Assistant Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 3400.

Definitions.

2. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears—
“by wholesale” means a sale to a case or crate manufacturer or industrial user;

“case quality” means—

(a) in relation to any sawn softwood timber for the manufacture of crates or cases, that such timber is the cut of the log, consisting of timber well sawn to an even width and thickness, with ends docked square and cut full to size green off saw to the following specifications in any one parcel or lot, namely: not less than 55 per centum of such parcel or lot being 3 inches in thickness and from 3 inches to 12 inches in width, and the remainder of such parcel or lot being from 1 inch to 1½ inches in thickness and from 3 inches to 9 inches in width, but consisting, where possible, of widths of 4 inches and upwards; lengths being not less than 5 feet and the average length of any such parcel or lot being not less than 9 feet; all 1 inch and 1½ inch stock being cut clear of heart; clean sound heart being included in 3 inch stock, if well boxed; and in any one parcel or lot the content of the average piece of timber being not less than 9 super. feet;

(b) in relation to any sawn hardwood timber for the manufacture of crates or cases, that such timber is the cut of the log, consisting of timber well sawn to an even width and thickness, with ends docked square and cut full to size green off saw to the following specifications in any one parcel or lot, namely: not less than 55 per centum of such parcel or lot being 3 inches in thickness and from 3 inches to 12 inches in width, and the remainder of such parcel or lot being from 1 inch to 1½ inches in thickness and from 3 inches to 9 inches in width, but consisting, where possible, of widths of 4 inches and upwards; lengths being not less than 5 feet and the average length of any such parcel or lot being not less than 9 feet; clean sound heart being included in 3 inch stock of flooded gum timber if well boxed, but all sizes of other hardwood timber being sawn well clear of heart; and in any one parcel or lot the content of the average piece of timber being not less than 9 super. feet;

“heart” means, in relation to any sawn softwood or hardwood case quality timber, that portion of the log contained within a radius of 4 inches from the centre of the core;

“Sydney metropolitan area” means all that area of New South Wales comprised within a radius of 30 miles from the General Post Office, Sydney, other than all that part of such area north of the Hawkesbury and Colo Rivers.

Maximum prices—Sales by wholesale.

3. Notwithstanding the provisions of any Prices Regulation Order issued prior to this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which any kind and size of sawn softwood or sawn hardwood case quality timber of any kind specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by any person by wholesale in New South Wales to be—

(i) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks at any of the following points on the New South Wales Government railway lines within the Sydney metropolitan area, viz.—Darling Harbour, Rozelle, Alexandria, Hornsby to St. Leonards inclusive, Hornsby to Newtown inclusive, Homebush, Lidcombe, Auburn, Clyde, Granville, Enfield North, Dulwich Hill to Bankstown inclusive, Regents Park, Sydenham to Hurstville inclusive, Wentworthville, Merrylands, Sutherland, Commonwealth Sidings, Leightonfield, and all stations on the Botany and Carlingford lines—the price specified in the said Schedule to this Order;

- (ii) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks at any point on the New South Wales Government railway lines within the Sydney metropolitan area and not specified in sub-paragraph (i) above—the price specified in the said Schedule plus the actual railway freight paid or payable from Darling Harbour to destination station;
- (iii) where that timber is delivered at any point in the Sydney metropolitan area not specified in sub-paragraphs (i) and (ii) above—the price specified in the said Schedule;
- (iv) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks or free on wharf nearest wharf in the zone served by the New South Wales Government railway lines North of Gloucester to South of Rappville, including branch line to Dorrig— the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 10s. 3d. per 100 super. feet;
- (v) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks or free on wharf nearest wharf in the zone served by the New South Wales Government railway lines Rappville to the Queensland border (both inclusive)—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 11s. per 100 super. feet;
- (vi) where that timber is delivered in trucks in the zone served by the New South Wales Government railway lines south of Kiama to and including Bomaderry—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 8s. 6d. per 100 super. feet;

- (xi) where that timber is delivered free on wharf any port south of Bateman's Bay—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 11s. 9d. per 100 super. feet;
- (xii) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks on the New South Wales Government railway line in the zone Bulli to Kiama (both inclusive)—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 4s. 9d. per 100 super. feet;
- (xiii) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks on the New South Wales Government railway line at Bathurst—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 10s. 9d. per 100 super. feet;
- (xiv) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks or free on wharf in the City of Greater Newcastle or Maitland—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 5s. per 100 super. feet;
- (xv) where that timber is delivered in railway trucks on the New South Wales Government railway line at Dungog—the price specified in the said Schedule less the sum of 8s. 9d. per 100 super. feet;

- (a) the name and address of the seller;
- (b) the name and address of the purchaser;
- (c) the address at which that timber is delivered;
- (d) the date of the sale of that timber;
- (e) the quantity of each species, quality or grade and size and length of each piece;
- (f) the price at which each specie, quality or grade and size and length is sold;
- (g) particulars of any discounts allowed.

Application for maximum prices.

5. No person shall sell in New South Wales any sawn softwood or sawn hardwood case quality timber for the sale of which a maximum price is not fixed by or under the provisions of this Order, unless and until he has made a written request to the Commission to fix the maximum price at which such timber may be sold, and the Commissioner has fixed the maximum price accordingly.

Fixation of maximum prices by notice.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I, declare the maximum price at which any sawn softwood or sawn hardwood case quality timber may be sold by any person specified in a notice given in pursuance of this paragraph to be such price or rate as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
