As part of this programme the Chemical Engineering Section of the Division of Industrial Chemistry is undertaking research into the gasification and combustion of low-rank coals, and particularly Victorian brown coal. While this work will be centred on two pilot-scale gasification plants designed to gasify finely-divided coal in fluid beds under pressure, research will also be done on a number of related problems.

Six staff vacancies exist for research in the following fields:—

- (a) A general study of the kinetics of the gasification reactions of carbon,
- (b) A study of the behaviour and significance of ash during the gasification of coal in fluid beds.
- (c) A study of the problems associated with the removal of dust from the product gas streams with the object of developing adequate dust removal equipment.
- (d) A study at high pressures of the reactions of carbon monoxide-hydrogen mixtures with coal.
- (e) A study of the application of suspension gasification procedures to the gasification of low-rank coals.
- (f) The development and application of procedures for gas and coal analysis.
