HE following promotions are provisional and subject to appeal by officers to the Public Service Board, and, where consequent upon another provisional promotion, shall be dependent upon the latter being confirmed. Appeals should be lodged, either by letter or telegram, within twenty-one days of the date of this notification, as follows:—

(a) if the promotion is to be made in a State, with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector in the capital city of that State;
