## THE NORTHERN TERRITORY OF AUSTRALIA

**PROCLAMATION** 

Commonwealth of Australia to wit. W. J. SLIM Governor-General.

By His Excellency the Governor-General, in and over the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by virtue of section one hundred and three of the W Crown Lands Ordinance 1931-1957, it is provided amongst other things that the Governor-General may, at any time, by Proclamation, reserve for such purposes in relation to the Northern Territory as he thinks fit any unclined of Crown lands not subject to tory as he thinks fit, any unalienated Crown lands not subject to any right of, or contract for, purchase:

And whereas it is desirable to reserve for the purposes of the recreation and amusement of the public the lands described in the Schedule hereto being Crown lands which are unalienated and not subject to any right of, or contract for, purchase:

Now therefore I, Sir William Joseph Slim, the Governor-General aforesaid, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council hereby reserve for the purposes of the recreation and amusement of the public the Crown lands described in the Schedule hereto and declare that the lands so reserved shall be known as the South Alice Springs Recreation Reserve and Reserve Number 1025.

#### THE SCHEDULE.

#### Description of the land referred to.

All that piece or parcel of land in the Town of Alice Springs, Northern Territory of Australia, containing an area of 24 acres 3 roods 29 perches more or less, being lots 246 to 259 inclusive, lots 267 to 273 inclusive and all that part of a one chain road north westerly of and adjoining lots 246 to 252 inclusive which was closed by notification in Northern Territory Government Gazette No. 6 dated 15th February, 1956, and being more particularly delineated on Original Plan 1133 lodged in the Lands and Survey Office, Darwin.

#### **AUTHORITY UNDER SECTION 69**

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section sixty-nine of the Defence Act 1903-1953 it is enacted that the Governor-General may give a general or particular authority to the Defence Force, or any part thereof, to enter upon and survey any lands or use them for training, manoeuvres, or other naval, military or air-force exercises or purposes and that compensation shall be made, in the manner prescribed, for any damage or loss sustained by the owner or occupier of the lands, by reason of such entry survey or use:

And whereas regulation 816 of the Australian Military Regulation prescribed the manner in which compensation shall be made for any damage or loss sustained by the owner or occupier of lands by reason of any entry survey or use of the lands under an authority and provides, by sub-regulation (1) of that regulation, that all claims for compensation shall be submitted to the officer indicated for that purpose in the authority within seventy-two hours of the occurrence of the damage or loss:

Now therefore I, Sir William Joseph Slim, the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with advice of in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with advice of the Faderal Executive Council, hereby authorize such members of the Military Forces as are directed in writing by the officer of the time being holding the office or performing the duties of the Commander of the Command in which are situated the lands described in the Schedule to this Authority, to enter upon the said lands and use them for training, manoeuvres or other military exercises or purposes for the period specified in the said Schedule, and hereby designate the Commander of the Command concerned as the officer to whom all claims for compensation for any damage or loss by reason of that entry and use shall be submitted or loss by reason of that entry and use shall be submitted.



# COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE.

#### PROMOTIONS—SECTION 50 AND REGULATION 109.

PHE following promotions are provisional and subject to appeal by officers to the Public Service Board, and, where consequent upon another provisional promotion, shall be dependent upon the latter being confirmed. Appeals should be lodged, either by letter or telegram, within twenty-one days of the date of this notification, as follows:-

- (a) if the promotion is to be made in a State, with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector in the capital city of that State;
- (b) if the promotion is to be made in the Australian Capital Territory, with the Public Service Inspector in Canberra, unless the promotion is to be made to a vacancy in the Postmaster-General's Department, in which case the officer shall lodge his appeal with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Sydney;
- (c) if the promotion is to be made in the Northern Territory-
  - (i) with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Brisbane, in the case of a promotion to a vacancy in the Department of Customs and Excise;
  - (ii) with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Adelaide, in the case of a promotion to a vacancy in the Department of Civil Aviation or the Postmaster-General's Department;
  - (iii) with the Public Service Inspector, Canberra, in other cases;
- (d) if the promotion is to be made in Norfolk Island, with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Sydney;
- (e) if the promotion is to be made in the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, with the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector, Brisbane;

Appeals not lodged with the appropriate Commonwealth Public Service Inspector within the prescribed period will not be accepted.

Under Section 50 (7A) of the Public Service Act, the Board may regard an appeal as having been made against a provisional promotion notified hereunder by an officer who, at any time within the time prescribed for lodging an appeal, is absent on leave for war service, or is absent from Australia on official duty.

Where an officer desires to appeal against two or more provisional promotions a separate appeal should be lodged in respect of each.

The grounds of appeal must be as prescribed in Section 50 of the Public Service Act, viz.:-

CONDITIONS OF EXAMINATIONS TO ENABLE MAIL OFFICERS TO QUALIFY FOR ADVANCEMENT BEYOND SALARIES OF £758 (S.) AND £798 (S.) PER ANNUM, AND OTHER OFFICERS AS SPECIFIED TO QUALIFY FOR PROMOTION OR TRANSFER AS MAIL OFFICER WITH SALARY EXCEEDING £758 (S.) or £798 (S.) PER ANNUM.

THE above conditions, which appeared in Gazette, No 57 of 4th October, 1956, are hereby amended as follows:-

Delete 4. Advancement, and insert in its stead-

4. Advancement.—Advancement of successful candidates will not take effect earlier than the first day of the month fixed for the holding of the Examination, i.e. 1st February, 1st May, 1st August or 1st November of each year whichever is applicable. Upon passing the first Barrier Test salary increases as under will be payable

Mail Officer under 21 years of age.—Allowance at the rate of £40 per annum with advancement, on attaining 21 years of age, to an amount equal to two increments above the minimum rate payable to an officer who has attained that age and who has not passed this test.

# Adult Mail Officer-

(i) If in receipt of salary of £668, £692 or £718 per annum, accelerated advancement to the extent of two increments above his present salary as from 1st day of the month in which the test was successfully completed with eligibility to advance to next increment twelve months after the date of receipt of existing salary, subject to the prescribed conditions governing

The accelerated advancement of Postal Assistants (Mail) and Postal Officers will not take effect until transfer to the position

of Mail Officer is effected.

A Postal Officer employed in the City Section at the chief offices in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth, who passes the test for the City Section, and who, in conjunction with his delivery duties as Postal Officer, is employed in sorting for private box divisions and Postal Officer (Delivery) groups will, however, be eligible for payment of allowance to raise his remuneration to such amount as he would receive if transferred to a position of Mail Officer.

(Example-Postal Assistant (Mail) in receipt of salary of £692 per annum from 1st September, 1958, passes the first test in November, 1958. He would be entitled to £738 per annum as from 1st November, 1958, and eligible for advancement to £758 from

1st September, 1959).

(ii) If in receipt of salary of £738 or £758 per annum, accelerated advancement to £778 per annum from the first day of the month in which the test is successfully completed, with eligibility to advance to £798 per annum twelve months thereafter, subject to the prescribed conditions.

(Example-Postal Assistant (Mail) in receipt of either £738 or £758 per annum from 1st September, 1958, passes the first test in November, 1958. He would be entitled to £778 per annum as from 1st November, 1958, with eligibility to advance to £798 per annum twelve months thereafter, subject to the

prescribed conditions).

(b) An officer who is not designated Postal Assistant (Mail) and who passes the test prescribed in this Part will be eligible for salary advancement in accordance with sub-paragraph (a) on transfer or promotion as Postal Assistant (Mail).

Pass Conditions.—Candidates may qualify for transfer or promotion as Clerk or for promotion as Cadet by fulfilling the requirements prescribed under Pass Conditions A or B.

#### Pass Conditions A.

Candidates must sit for and pass in at least four and not more than six prescribed subjects, including English, at this examination. (Exemption in English may be claimed in certain circumstances. See "Exemptions" below.)

#### Pass Conditions B.

Candidates must sit for and pass in at least five and not more than six prescribed subjects, including English, at two successive "Clerical" examinations.

Exemptions.—(i) Candidates who wish to satisfy the requirements of Pass Conditions B may claim exemptions at this examination in the subjects or subject which they passed at Examinations Nos. 4630 and 4631.

Note.—Marks will be allotted in the subject or subjects in which candidates claim exemption.

(ii) Under both Pass Conditions A and B, candidates may claim

(ii) Officers who are eligible for exemption in English under either Pass Conditions A or B, but not for an award of marks in this subject, may elect to sit for this subject at this examination as one of the number of subjects required for a pass under these conditions.

Transfer or Promotion of Successful Candidates.-The Public Service Board hereby determines, in pursuance of section 53 $\alpha$  of the Public Service Act 1922-1958 that the transfer or promotion of successful candidates shall be in accordance with their order of merit at this examination and that the provisions of section 50 of the Act shall not apply.

Vacancies.—It is estimated that three hundred (300) vacancies will be filled by qualified candidates at this examination during the period of eligibility.

Order of Transfer or Promotion.—Successful candidates who are officers of the Third Division, and are willing to accept transfer as Clerk at a salary not exceeding £966 per annum, and successful Fourth Division officers, will be registered in two distinct orders of merit, one for those who satisfy Pass Conditions A and one for those who satisfy Pass Conditions B. Males and females will be listed separately.

Transfers and promotions will be effected in order of merit from successful candidates under Pass Conditions A and then in order of merit from successful candidates under Pass Conditions

Candidates who qualify under Pass Conditions A will be listed in an order of merit determined from the total number of marks gained in the subjects passed.

Previous Papers.—A booklet containing the syllabus, selected papers set for the previous examination and examiners' comments Public Service Inspector, Canberra, Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide, Perth or Hobart, or the Board's representative, Port Moresby, after the 31st March, 1959.

Eligibility for Promotion or Transfer.—Officers who qualify at this examination will be eligible for promotion or transfer within a period of twelve months, commencing on the date of publication in the "Commonwealth Gazette" of the results of this examination, provided that a candidate under the age of sixteen years who qualifies will not be eligible for such promotion or transfer until he attains that age.

Successful candidates who are former members of the Forces, and who make application to the Public Service Inspector, will also be eligible for transfer to the Third Division, under Regulation 112 (1) (a).

Salary on Promotion or Transfer.—Fourth Division officers upon transfer to the Third Division will be paid salaries in accordance with the provisions of Public Service Regulations 112 (3) and 105 (2) and (3). No officer, however, will be paid at a rate in excess of that which would have been received had the whole of the service been in the Third Division. Third Division officers upon transfer as Clerk will be paid their existing salary, subject to any necessary subdivisional adjustment, provided that it is not more than £966 per annum.

Results of Examinations.—The results of this examination showing the order in which successful candidates are eligible for promotion or transfer shall be published in the "Commonwealth Gazette".

Marks.—The marks allotted by the examiners for each subject or part of a subject shall be final.

# SYLLABUSES IN DETAIL.

# ENGLISH.

#### Paper A.

Paper A will consist of three sections. Candidates will be required to study all sections; section 3 contains a choice of study topics, one only of which should be studied.

# Section 1.

Essay Writing.—Essays are a means of testing candidates' knowledge and also of assessing their capacity for self expression. Essay writing requires the development of an adequate vocabulary and also certain techniques or skills.

They are either of the personal type as in the subject of English or are the means frequently adopted for reporting facts or developing arguments as in History and Economics. It is with the personal type of essay that students are concerned in this examination. Candidates will be given a choice of subjects, so that each may write approximately 400 words on a theme within his own field of interest.

The essay requires the student after selecting his subject-

- (a) to collect his thoughts and opinions on the subject, expressing his ideas correctly (grammar and syntax), and suitably (vocabulary);
  (b) to arrange his thoughts, grouping sentences together
- which deal with one phase of the subject (paragraphs); and
- (c) to develop his treatment of the subject in a logical sequence so as to arrive at a conclusion.

#### Preparation will require study and exercises in-

- (a) Vocabulary building, including the recognition of prefixes and affixes; simple Latin roots; grouping of words according to endings (affixes), e.g., -able, -ible, -ary, -ous, -eous, &c.; singulars and plurals, especially borrowings from other languages now in common use; collective nouns as names of groups, e.g., shoal, bevy, committee; synonyms, antonyms and homonyms.
- (b) Rules of syntax.
- (c) Punctuation, keeping in mind after learning the use of the stops, that over-punctuation should be avoided and that the function of punctuation is to show up the meaning and not to patch up faulty composition.
- (d) Grammar.—Parts of speech as follows should be understood and readily recognized:—

  Nouns: proper, common, abstract and collective.

Pronouns: personal, relative, demonstrative, interrogative, and possessive.

Adjectives: descriptive, numeral, demonstrative, inter-

rogative, and indefinite.

Adverbs: of time, place, manner, and degree. Verbs: finite, infinite, transitive, intransitive, active

and passive. Conjunctions: co-ordinate and sub-ordinate.

The examination will also require candidates to develop their powers of expression-

- (a) Expression depends upon the word, the sentence, and the paragraph. When writing an essay students should:— aim to use the right word in the right place; choose apt adjectives and strong verbs; where necessary use explanatory phrases to enhance meaning and description. To avoid the use of the wrong word, students should study words likely to be confused, e.g., allusion, illusion; eligible, illegible; credible, creditable, &c.
- (b) Variety in sentence construction is also important, short sentences and long sentences being suitably blended, due regard being paid to balance, emphasis, and unity.
- (c) Paragraphs should be real, sentences dealing with one phase or aspect of the subject being grouped together; students should also use variety in the beginning of paragraphs.
- (d) Finally, in their essays candidates should always aim at clearness of expression and simplicity of style; they should plan before writing and know clearly what they have to say.

## Section 2.

# Précis Writing-

- (a) Candidates should understand the meaning of précis writing, its use, and what is necessary to prepare a précis, including the value of an extensive vocabulary.
- (b) Dictionary work is essential; so too are exercises in the substitution of words for phrases, &c. Candidates should use their knowledge of grammar to aid them in discrimination; they should use principal clauses to give the main points and subordinate clauses to add the detail.
- (c) Rough notes are important as a guide in preparing a précis.
- (d) A précis should contain about one-third of the number of words of the original passage and should be written in the candidate's own words, in the third person and past tense.
- (e) Précis of correspondence: use of an index should take the place of rough notes; précis should be written from an index.
- (f) Précis of minutes of meeting: use an index on similar lines to précis of correspondence.

#### Section 3.

#### Either.

- (A) Appreciation of Verse.—In this section, emphasis should be given to the content of the poem and its meaning. The structure of the poem, metrical devices employed by the poet and figures of speech should be studied at the same time.
- (N.B.—The mechanics of construction should not be over emphasized.)
  - (i) Candidates should know something of the types of poems; lyric, ballad, epic, ode, elegy, sonnet and the narrative poem.

- (ii) They should also understand the meaning of appreciation and how to appreciate in literature. Class discussions on the merits and demerits of selected examples will prove helpful; rhythm balance, choice of words should be discussed, also descriptive qualities, vividness and music.
- (iii) Recognition of both the figures of speech and metrical devices used is important.

(B) Clear Thinking and Writing.—Candidates will be tested on their ability to think accurately and to express themselves clearly after study of one of the following text books—

Jepson: Clear Thinking (Longmans, Green & Co., Melbourne).

Thouless: Straight and Crooked Thinking (English Universities

Stebbing: Thinking to Some Purpose (Pelican Books).
Boyce Gibson and Phillips: Thinkers at Work (Longmans).

Or

(C) Comprehension.—A prose passage will be presented to candidates who will be required to answer questions thereon.

This section is a test of careful and analytical reading. The questions may be directed at the following elements of writing:-

(i) Content in general and in some detail

- (ii) Interpretation of language, e.g. the words underlined in this sentence—
  "The conquest of Everest was a calculated adventure".

(iii) Substance and form-

- (a) Relationships between the main points.
- (b) Precise shades of meaning of words (e.g. peeped and looked).
- (c) Bias of the writer, e.g. emotional approach, one-sided treatment.

# Paper B.

Paper B will consist of three sections, all of which are compulsory.

# Section 1.

Synthesis and Analysis.—Synthesis should be regarded as the combination of various types of clauses or phrases into a complete sentence while analysis is the dissection of sentences to show the functional relationships which exist among parts of the sentences.

These parts are of three kinds—
(a) Words.
(b) Phrases.

- (c) Clauses.

Candidates will not be asked to deal extensively with words or phrases in analysis but are advised to study the types and functions firstly of words and then of phrases in order that they may clearly understand the kinds and functions of clauses.

There is no easy road to success. Analysis calls for the exercise of reason more than the application of memorized "rules". Candidates are strongly advised, when preparing for the examination to adopt a questioning approach. They should ask, "Is this Candidates are strongly advised, when preparing for the examination to adopt a questioning approach. They should ask, "Is this a clause?" "What duty or function does this clause perform?". Only in this way will candidates develop confidence and certainty in analysis. Emphasis will be placed upon the functional approach.

- (A) Words (Parts of Speech).—The identification and description of parts of speech is called "parsing". The following coverage will be an adequate basis for understanding phrases and clauses:—
  - (i) Nouns.—A noun is the name of anything (e.g., horse, honesty, Sydney, family).

It may be-

(a) Subject of a verb.(b) Object of a verb.

(c) Complement of a verb.

(ii) Verbs.—A verb is a word which indicates "doing", "being" or "having".

A finite verb has a subject.

There must be a finite verb and one only in each clause.

Candidates must therefore be able to recognize finite and infinite verbs and should know that some finite verbs

have two or more words, e.g., Tom would have gone.

(iii) Adjectives.—An adjective adds to the meaning of a noun

(e.g., the black horse) and not to a verb or adverb.

- (iv) Adverbs.—An adverb adds meaning to a verb, an adjective or another adverb, (e.g. With a verb—I walked slowly. With an adjective—He is extremely lazy. With an adverb.—I walked quite quickly.
- (B) Phrases.—Candidates will not be directly examined on their knowledge of phrases, but are strongly advised to study the use of adjectival and adverbial phrases. This will assist in the recognition and separation of clauses in analysis.
- (C) Clauses.—A clause is a group of words which contains one
  - ncipal Clauses. (These make complete sense on their own. They are like small sentences.) There must be at least one principal clause in a sentence. (i) Principal Clauses.

(ii) Noun Clauses. (These do the work of a noun.) Required to know-

(a) Noun clause subject of a verb. That he will be

late is certain.

- (b) Noun clause object of a verb. I know that he is efficient.
- (c) Noun clause object of a participle. He stood there wishing that they would arrive.

  (d) Noun clause object of a preposition. That is different from what I was told.

  (iii) Adjectival Clauses. An adjectival clause adds meaning to a noun or to a noun clause. That is the man whom I

saw. Adjectival clauses are introduced by a relative pro-noun, frequently "who", "whom" or "which". Candidates should learn that other words can be used as relative pronouns, e.g., "where" (That is the house where I was born) and "that". In particular, students should learn to distinguish between adjectival clauses and noun clauses, both of which can be introduced by "that".

Required to know.—Adjectival Clause introduced by "who", "whom", "whose", "which", "that", "where", "as" (after "such" or "same") and other relative pronouns-

Relative pronouns-

- (a) Subject of a verb.
- (b) Object of a verb.
- (iv) Adverbial Clause.—Adverbial clauses, like adverbs, add meaning to verbs, adjectives and other adverbs.

  Required to know—

- (a) Adverbial Clause of Reason, e.g., introduced by conjunctions like "because", "since", "as". "for"
- "as". "for"

  (b) Adverbial Clause of Purpose, e.g., introduced by conjunctions like "in order that", "so that", "lest", "that".

  (c) Adverbial Clause of Time, e.g., introduced by conjunctions like "when", "while", "after", "before", "till", "until", "since", "as", "as soon as".

  (d) Adverbial Clause of Manner, e.g., introduced by "as".

  (e) Adverbial Clause of Place e.g., introduced by "as".
- (e) Adverbial Clause of Place, e.g., introduced by where

Candidates are warned against memorizing the conjunctions which usually introduce the various clauses. It will be observed that "as" can introduce adverbial clauses of reason, time and manner. Relying on rote memory instead of examining the functions of clauses will lead to incorrect answers.

At the examination the analysis will be submitted on a special The form contains columns for the following form provided. information only:-

Clause.—The clause is to be entered in full.

Kind of Clause.—e.g., Principal, noun, adjective, adverbial

(of time, purpose, &c.).

(of time, purpose, &c.).

Function.—e.g., qualifying or modifying part of sentence (to be stated). Noun clauses should be stated as "subject of ...." or "object of ....". No entry is required for a principal clause.

Verb.—Finite verbs only should be entered.

Subject.—i.e., the subject of the verb entered in the previous column.

The set passage will be a short piece of continuous prose. Parenthetic matter will not be included.

**Spelling.**—Study from a spelling book containing graded and selected lists of words should be the basis of candidates' preparation for this section.

# Section 3.

Use of Words.—Candidates' preparation in this section will require study and drill as well as exercises in the following:—

- (i) Antonyms (including the use of prefixes in the formation of antonyms), synonyms, homonyms.

  (ii) Nouns and the adjectives derived from them, e.g., choir,
- choral.
- (iii) Verbs and their corresponding nouns; e.g., propose, proposal.
- (iv) Plurals of nouns, including irregular plurals and plurals of foreign words in common use, plurals of compound nouns, plurals which are the same as the singular, words with two plurals of different meaning.
- (v) Genders of nouns.
- (vi) Rules for the possessive case.(vii) Verbs and their principal parts.
- (viii) Prepositional idioms.
  (ix) Correction of faulty sentences (with reason for corrections).
  (x) Recognition of redundant words, &c.
- (xi) Expressions, metaphorical phrases, &c., in plain speech.
   (xii) Recognition of the shades of meaning in groups of words similar but not the same in meaning, e.g., announce, intimate, inform, advise, &c. The use of such words in sentences so as to reveal the particular shade of meaning.

In the study of words, especially synonyms and antonyms, the student should use his dictionary and note well the distinctions between words of similar meaning; synonyms have the same general between words of similar meaning; synonyms have the same general meaning, not the same meaning, e.g., efficient—able, qualified, competent, satisfactory, &c. This does not mean that any one word may be substituted for any other word. Each has its peculiar use. Strive for the word rather than a word.

When a new word is learned, the student should learn its opposite, its extensions to include the different parts of speech, and the student should be appropriate the parts of speech.

e.g., change verbs, nouns, adjectives, into participles, abstract nouns,

&c.

The student should study rules of syntax in conjunction with grammar. He should make one help the other. Rules are set out in the text-books recommended. Sentences for correction should be constantly revised. When the student has learned some new fact in grammar he should apply it to his general English so as to retain it.

#### Part B .- Current Affairs.

Questions in this Part will aim to test the candidate's knowledge of current affairs, and matters underlying the understanding of current affairs, gained from the intelligent reading of newspapers and accessible journals and publications.

No books or other publications are set for Part B, and no specific reading is demanded. A wide choice of questions will be offered. In addition to the common sources of news, candidates will be helped by such publications as the "Current Affairs Bulletins" issued by the Sydney University and "Australia in Facts and Figures", issued by the News and Information Bureau, Department of the Interior, Canberra. News commentaries and educational and information broadcasts over the radio, particularly the A.B.C., are another source of information on current affairs.

COMPETITIVE examination as above will commence on 10th October, 1959.

It should be noted that this examination will be discontinued after 1959.

Examination Centres.—Canberra, capital cities of the States, and such other centres as the Board may determine.

Persons Eligible to Apply.—Males and unmarried females, not officers of the Commonwealth Service, who are British subjects (or whose British naturalization will be completed within the period of eligibility for appointment) and who were born not earlier than 10th February, 1909, and not later than 10th October, 1944.

Applicants must be permanently residing in Australia or eligible for entry to Australia for permanent residence.

How to Make Application.—Applications must be made on How to Make Application.—Applications must be made on printed forms obtainable from the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector in Canberra, all State Capital Cities, the Postmaster, Darwin, or from the Board's Representative, Port Moresby. Syllabus.—The syllabuses for these subjects are the same as for the corresponding subjects at Examination No. 4730, notification of which appears in this issue of the "Commonwealth Gazette."

Pass Conditions.—Candidates may qualify for appointment as Clerk by fulfilling the requirements prescribed under Pass Conditions A or B.

#### Pass Conditions A.

Candidates must sit for and pass in at least four and not more than six prescribed subjects, including English, at this examination. (Exemption in English may be claimed in certain circumstances. See "Exemptions" below.)

#### Pass Conditions B.

This examination will not be held in 1960. Candidates attempting this examination for the first time should therefore sit under Pass Conditions A.

Candidates must sit for and pass in at least five and not more than six prescribed subjects, including English over two successive "Clerical" examinations.

Exemptions.—(i) Candidates who wish to satisfy the requirements of Pass Conditions B may claim exemptions at this examination in the subjects or subject which they passed at Examination No. 4631.

[Note.—Marks will be allotted in the subject or subjects in which candidates claim exemption.]

- (ii) Under both Pass Conditions A and B, candidates will be granted exemption in English if they have passed in this subject at—
  - (a) A previous examination for appointment to the Third Division in an office of Clerk, held since 28th June, 1933, or
  - (b) a Leaving Certificate (including Class A Schools); Matriculation, Senior Public, Schools Board or New South Wales Department of Technical Education Qualifying or Qualifying (Deferred) examination, or
  - (c) any other examination, his pass at which has been recognized by an Australian University as sufficient for Matriculation provided that no exemption shall be granted for a previous pass in English where that subject was studied as a foreign language.

Except where exemption is claimed in English by candidates who wish to qualify under Pass Conditions B by virtue of a pass in this subject at Examination No. 4631, no marks will be credited for the previous pass in this subject.

Note.—(i) Candidates who claim exemption in English, except where that exemption is claimed under Pass Conditions B by virtue of a pass in this subject at Examination No. 4631, must still satisfy the pass conditions prescribed under A or B above—that is—

- (a) a pass in at least four and not more than six prescribed subjects under Pass Conditions A, or
- (b) a pass in at least five and not more than six prescribed subjects at two successive examinations under Pass Conditions B.
- (ii) Candidates who are eligible for exemption in English under either Pass Conditions A or B, but not for an award of marks in this subject, may elect to sit for this subject at this examination as one of the number of subjects required for a pass under these conditions.

Order of Appointment.—Successful candidates will be registered in two distinct orders of merit, one for those who satisfy Pass Conditions A and one for those who satisfy Pass Conditions B. Males and females will be listed separately.

Appointments will be effected, subject to the Re-establishment and Employment Act 1945-1956, in order of merit from successful candidates under Pass Conditions A and then in order of merit from successful candidates under Pass Conditions B.

Candidates who qualify under Pass Conditions A will be listed in an order of merit determined from the total number of marks gained in the subjects passed at this examination.

Candidates who qualify under Pass Conditions B will be listed in order of merit determined from the total number of marks gained in subjects passed in the two examinations.

If two or more candidates obtain the same total number of marks, their relative order of merit will be determined by the number of marks gained in English. If marks are still equal, their order will be determined by lot.

Advancement of Clerks from commencing salary to £966 per annum in the case of males, £796 per annum in the case of females, is by annual increments.

A temporary employee who is appointed will continue to receive, within the salary limits specified above, at least the amount of remuneration received immediately prior to appointment.

Period of Eligibility.—Except in the cases of former members of the Forces, a candidate who qualifies will be eligible for appointment only until the expiration of twelve months commencing on the date of publication in the "Commonwealth Gazette" of the results of the examination or until he attains the age of fifty-one, whichever is the sooner. The eligibility of a former member of the Forces for appointment will terminate when he attains the age of fifty-one years.

Exclusion of Candidates from Examination.—The Board may determine that a person shall not be allowed to sit for this examination if it is satisfied, after consideration of the available evidence, that a person is not a fit and proper person for appointment to the Public Service of the Commonwealth.

Results of Examination.—The results of this examination showing the order in which successful candidates are eligible for appointment shall be published in the "Commonwealth Gazette".

Marks.—The marks allotted by the examiners for each subject or part of a subject shall be final.

Reports on Examination Papers.—A candidate may at any time within three months of the date of publication in the "Gazette" of the results of this examination obtain reports on his examination papers. The reports will show the detailed allotment of marks and will contain a statement as to the merits and defects of the papers concerned.

To obtain these reports, a candidate should pay to the Commonwealth Public Service Inspector or the Board's Representative, Port Moresby, with whom he lodged his application, the sum of ten shillings for each subject upon which a report is desired.

Note.—For report purposes, English A and English B should be regarded as two separate subjects.

Appointment Subject to Conditions.—A successful applicant from outside the service must produce evidence of date of birth, and undergo a medical examination as required by the Board. Successful candidates should not undergo the medical examination until instructed to do so. The Board will be required to be satisfied from the report of the examination as to the candidate's health and physical fitness for appointment. Upon the confirmation of appointment, an officer will also be required to become a contributor under the Superanunation Act 1922-1957.

Qualified candidates who on appointment are already temporarily employed, or who take up duty within twenty-eight days of the date of issue by the Chief Officer of notification of appointment and request to report for duty, will be regarded for seniority purposes as having entered the Commonwealth Service on the date of the Public Service Inspector's appointment certificate.

Successful candidates should note that the National Service Act 1951-1957 precludes the employment for more than seven days of persons liable to register under the Act and who have failed to register.

Successful candidates who, at the date of application, were not British subjects, must, on request, produce evidence of their British naturalization in the form of a certificate or in such other form as the Board may determine.

Candidates who nominate for appointment in the Australian Capital Territory, Northern Territory, and the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, will be eligible for appointment only in the Territory for which they nominate.

Refusal by the Board to Appoint Successful Candidates.—The Board may, upon sufficient evidence of an adverse nature respecting the conduct, character or ability of a successful candidate or upon sufficient evidence that a successful candidate has knowingly made a false statement in respect of his application to sit for this examination, direct that that successful candidate shall not receive appointment.

Refusal of Appointment.—If a successful candidate declines appointment or falls to reply within seven days to a communication from the Board, the Public Service Inspector, or a Department, respecting nomination to the Public Service, his name may be removed from the "Register of Persons Qualified for Appointment".
