OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE

Special issues include notices which require urgent publication. All costs associated with producing Specials will be borne by the responsible department or authority. A limited number of *Special Gazettes* will be made available for sale from the Commonwealth Government Bookshop, Canberra, on the day of publication. General distribution of these notices will be by their inclusion in the next published issue of the *Government Notices Gazette* or *Business Gazette* as well as in the next published issue of the series of the *Gazette* in which the notice would normally have been published.

Tariff concessions issues contain notices of tariff concessions proposed, granted or revoked in accordance with the provisions of Part XVA of the *Customs Act 1901*. These issues are published each Wednesday and are sold at \$1.95 plus postage or on subscription only at \$80.00 for 50 issues including surface postage.

I, CHRISTOPHER JOHN HURFORD, the Minister of State for Community Services, pursuant to sub-section 13 (1A) of the *Nursing Homes Assistance Act 1974*, hereby revoke, with effect on 25 June 1987, the notice for the purposes of sub-section 13 (1A) dated 23 April 1987 and published in *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* No. S 70 of 30 April 1987 and hereby determine that, on and from 25 June 1987:

- (a) for the purposes of this determination:

"extensive care patient", in relation to a nursing home, means a qualified nursing home patient who requires, and receives in that nursing home, nursing home care of a kind required by a person:

- (i) who, by reason of infirmity, or any illness, disease, incapacity or disability, is bedridden or virtually bedridden, and is wholly or substantially dependent on nursing care; or
- (ii) who is undergoing treatment for any illness, disease, incapacity or disability and, for the purposes of that treatment, is wholly or substantially dependent on nursing care; and

"ordinary care patient", in relation to a nursing home, means a qualified nursing home patient in that nursing home, not being a person who is an extensive care patient in relation to that nursing home;

- (b) the rate for the purposes of paragraph 13 (1) (a) of the Act is \$110.95 per week; and
- (c) for the purposes of paragraph 13 (1) (d) of the Act, the rate applicable to a qualified nursing home patient in a nursing home situated in a State or Territory specified in column 1 of the following table is:
 - (i) in the case of an ordinary care patient—the amount per week specified in column 2; and
 - (ii) in the case of an extensive care patient—the amount per week specified in column 3,



**CUSTOMS (PROHIBITED IMPORTS)
REGULATIONS**

The Australian Customs Service wishes to remind the public that the goods specified in the following Schedule are prohibited imports pursuant to Regulation 4 and Item 18 in the Second Schedule to the Customs (Prohibited Imports) Regulations.

THE SCHEDULE

1. Animal training collars of a kind which incorporate protrusions which are capable of puncturing or bruising an animal's neck when tightened or pulled.
2. Apparel made up from man made fibre textile fabrics which contain tris (2, 3 dibromopropyl) phosphate and yarns and textile fabrics of man made fibres containing tris (2, 3 dibromopropyl) phosphate of a kind used in the manufacture of apparel.
3. 'Ashtray Phantom' (a substance resembling cotton wool, highly inflammable when ignited) and similar articles.
4. Baby soothers, being 'dummies' or 'pacifiers' without a safety shield, consisting of a bulbous teat, of 30 mm in maximum diameter, attached to a whistle which sounds as the baby sucks on the teat.
5. Balloon-blowing kits, capable of being used to make balloon-like shapes, which contain polyvinyl acetate, ethyl acetate, acetone or benzene.
6. 'Bengal' type matches described as magic matches and magic fireworks.
7. Blow pipe darts tipped with poison.
8. Bludgeons.
9. 'BMF Activator' and any similar device able to convert a semi-automatic rifle to rapid fire capability.
10. 'Bowen Knife Belt' and any similar belt incorporating a concealed blade.
11. Brumberger Project-A-Scopes/Epidascopes, Kees Postascope Projectors of Dux Episcopes not meeting the safety requirements of a State Electricity Supply Authority.
12. Candlesticks and other candle holders which will not withstand the application of a candle flame or the heat from a candle without igniting or melting and articles incorporating such holders.
13. 'Chicco' teething ring, identified in the manufacturer's catalogue by the number 51.
14. Children's night garments being any nightdress, dressing gown, pyjama, pyjama style overgarment, infant sleep bag or other article of nightwear (but not including any article of headwear, footwear or handwear) of any of the sizes 0 to 14 as specified in Australian Standard 1182-1972, 'Size Coding Scheme for Infant's and Children's Clothing', approved by the Standards Association of Australia on 14 July 1972, which do not conform to the requirements of either clause 1.5 or clause 2.5 of Australian Standard 1249, parts 1 and 2—1976, 'Children's Night Clothings Having Reduced Fire Hazard', published by the Standards Association of Australia on 1 January 1977 or clause 3.5 of Australian Standard 1249, Part 3—1977, published by the Standards Association of Australia on 1 May 1977.

- (1) that this approval will remain valid only while the Applicant continues to be a bona fide resident of the land;

- (5) that no person other than the Applicant will conduct or in any way carry on the business on the land without the prior approval of the Minister;
- (6) that the Applicant will ensure that all residence and business related vehicles are parked within the confines of the land;
- (7) that the Applicant will not employ more than one assistant for the purpose of conducting or carrying on the business on the land without the prior approval of the Minister and that assistant shall be the Applicant's husband;
- (8) that this approval relates to the storage of food stuffs in sealed packets or tinned containers;
- (9) that no food preparation whatsoever for commercial purposes shall be carried out on the site including pre-cooking of foods;
- (10) that the Applicant will allow the health surveyors to enter and inspect the premises at any reasonable hour during the day or night;
- (11) that there be no more than one commercial vehicle calling at the premises per week and that the Applicant ensures that any commercial vehicle is parked off the street;
- (12) that this approval will terminate on the thirty-first day of May 1988 or on such earlier date as the Minister determines in accordance with condition 13;
- (13) upon any failure to comply with any or all of the foregoing conditions the Minister or his Delegate under the said Ordinance may give written notice requiring the Applicant to show cause within a period of fourteen days why this approval should not be revoked. At the expiration of this period the Minister or his Delegate may revoke the approval.

Disability Services Act 1986

PRINCIPLES AND OBJECTIVES FOR THE PURPOSES OF SECTION 5

I, CHRISTOPHER JOHN HURFORD, the Minister of State for Community Services, pursuant to section 5 of the *Disability Services Act 1986* and section 4 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*, hereby formulate the principles and objectives set out in the Schedule to be principles and objectives to be furthered in the administration of the *Disability Services Act 1986*.

SCHEDULE

PRINCIPLES AND OBJECTIVES

Preliminary

1. In this Schedule, unless the contrary intention appears—
“advocate” means a person who assists—
 - (a) people with disabilities; or
 - (b) the families of people with disabilities, to represent their interests;“programs” means programs for people with disabilities administered by the Commonwealth pursuant to the *Disability Services Act 1986* (the Act); and
“services” means services provided to people with disabilities and includes rehabilitation programs provided under Part III of the Act.

Principles

2. (1) People with disabilities are individuals who have the inherent right to respect for their human worth and dignity.
(2) People with disabilities, whatever the origin, nature, type and degree of disability, have the same basic human rights as other members of Australian society.
(3) People with disabilities have the same rights as other members of Australian society to realise their individual capacities for physical, social, emotional and intellectual development.
(4) People with disabilities have the same right as other members of Australian society to services which will support their attaining a reasonable quality of life.
(5) People with disabilities have the same right as other members of Australian society to participate in the decisions which affect their lives.
(6) People with disabilities receiving services have the same right as other members of Australian society to receive those services in a manner which results in the least restriction of their rights and opportunities.
(7) People with disabilities have the same right of pursuit of any grievance in relation to services as have other members of Australian society.

Objectives

3. (1) Services should have as their focus the achievement of positive outcomes for people with disabilities, such as increased independence, employment opportunities and integration into the community.
(2) Services should contribute to ensuring that the conditions of the every-day life of people with disabilities are the same as, or as close as possible to, norms and patterns which are valued in the general community.
(3) Services should be provided as part of local co-ordinated service systems and be integrated with services generally available to members of the community, wherever possible.
(4) Services should be tailored to meet the individual needs and goals of the people with disabilities receiving those services.
(5) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to meet the needs of people with disabilities who experience a double disadvantage as a result of their sex, ethnic origin, or Aboriginality.
(6) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to promote recognition of the competence of, and enhance the image of, people with disabilities.
(7) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to promote the participation of people with disabilities in the life of the local community through maximum physical and social integration in that community.
(8) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to ensure that no single organisation providing services shall exercise control over all or most aspects of the life of a person with disabilities.
(9) Organisations providing services, whether those services are provided specifically to people with disabilities or generally to members of the community, should be accountable to those people with disabilities who use their services, the advocates of such people, the Commonwealth and the community generally for the provision of information from which the quality of their services can be judged.
(10) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to provide opportunities for people with disabilities to reach goals and enjoy lifestyles which are valued by the community generally and are appropriate to their chronological age.
(11) Services should be designed and administered so as to ensure that people with disabilities have access to advocacy support where necessary to ensure adequate participation in decision-making about the services they receive.
(12) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to ensure that appropriate avenues exist for people with disabilities to raise and have resolved any grievances about services.

- (13) Services should be designed and administered so as to provide people with disabilities with, and encourage them to make use of, avenues for participating in the planning and operation of services which they receive and the Commonwealth and organisations should provide opportunities for consultation in relation to the development of major policy and program changes.
- (14) Programs and services should be designed and administered so as to respect the rights of people with disabilities to privacy and confidentiality.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO PROPOSE EXCISE TARIFF ALTERATION

Notice No. 6 (1987)

IN pursuance of section 160B of the *Excise Act 1901*, I, HAROLD JOSEPH McMAHON, delegate of the Comptroller-General of Customs, hereby give notice that it is intended within seven sitting days of the House of Representatives after the date of publication of this notice in the *Gazette*, to propose in the Parliament an Excise Tariff alteration in accordance with the particulars specified in the Schedule to this notice and operating on and from 1 July 1987.

THE SCHEDULE

Alteration to the *Excise Tariff Act 1921*

1. Interpretation

Section 3 of the *Excise Tariff Act 1921* is amended by inserting in sub-section (1) the following definitions in their respective appropriate alphabetical positions determined on a letter-by-letter basis:

“‘exempt area’ means a production area, within the meaning of section 5B, that is:

(a) in a State or Territory; or

(b) inside the outer limits of the territorial sea of Australia;

other than such a production area that is, or has been, a prescribed source;

‘exempt field’ means an area prescribed by Departmental By-laws, being an exempt area or 2 or more associated exempt areas;

‘exempt offshore oil’ means the first 4767.3 megalitres of stabilized crude petroleum oil obtained in a particular project to produce petroleum oil from an accumulation or accumulations from which petroleum oil was not produced before 1 July 1987 (whether or not the project is also for other purposes), being stabilized crude petroleum oil obtained from petroleum oil produced from the accumulation or accumulations;

‘exempt onshore oil’ means stabilized crude petroleum oil produced after 30 June 1987 that is included in the first 4767.3 megalitres of stabilized crude petroleum oil produced from a particular exempt field.”

2. Duties of Excise on certain crude petroleum oil

Section 6B of the *Excise Tariff Act 1921* is amended—

(a) by inserting in sub-section (1) the following definitions in their respective appropriate alphabetical positions determined on a letter-by-letter basis:

“‘added duty’, in relation to a prescribed production area in relation to a prescribed division of a financial year, means an amount that is added duty for that area for that division under sub-section (5A);

‘added percentage’, in relation to a prescribed division of a financial year, being a division to which sub-section (5A) relates, means 1% or, if lower, the percentage ascertained in accordance with the formula:

$$\frac{15 \times (\text{IPP} - 224.54)}{\text{IPP}} \%$$

where:

IPP is the number of dollars in the Import Parity Price at the commencement of the division;

‘threshold quantity’, in relation to a prescribed production area and a period, means the number of kilolitres that is A x 10B in sub-section (4) in the application of that sub-section in relation to that area and period.”

(b) by omitting from sub-section (3) “or commencing on or after 1 July 1987”;

(c) by inserting after sub-section (3A) the following sub-section:

“(3B) The amount of duty in respect of relevant oil produced from a particular prescribed production area and entered for home consumption during a particular prescribed division of a financial year (being a division commencing on or after 1 July 1987) is the amount ascertained in accordance with the formula $ND + AD - DP$ where:

- (f) by omitting paragraphs (7) (f) and (g) and substituting the following word and paragraph:

“and (f) in the case of a quantity to which paragraph (4) (f) applies—79%.”;

- (g) by inserting in sub-section (8) “, (5A)” after “(5)”; and

- (h) by inserting in sub-section (9) “, or, in accordance with sub-section (5A), the added duty,” after “notional duty”.

- (c) by inserting in sub-item 17 (C) “or from an exempt area” after “excepted area” (wherever occurring).

I, SIR NINIAN MARTIN STEPHEN, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, hereby:

- (a) under sub-section 8A(2) of the *National Parks and Wildlife Conservation Act 1975* declare the area specified in the Schedule to be a conservation zone; and
- (b) under sub-section 8A(4) of that Act specify the depth of 1000 metres below the surface of any land within the area so declared to be a conservation zone as the depth below that surface to which sub-soil beneath that land shall be taken to be within that conservation zone.
