OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE

Special issues include notices which require urgent publication. All costs associated with producing Specials will be borne by the responsible department or authority. General distribution of these notices will be by their inclusion in the next published issue of the *Government Notices Gazette* or *Business Gazette* as well as in the next published issue of the series of the *Gazette* in which the notice would normally have been published.

Tariff concessions issues contain notices of tariff concessions proposed, granted or revoked in accordance with the provisions of Part XVA of the *Customs Act 1901*. GUIDELINES FOR FULL FEE OVERSEAS STUDENTS IN COURSES PROVIDED BY COMMONWEALTH FUNDED HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS

I, SENATOR THE HONOURABLE SUSAN MAREE RYAN, Commonwealth Minister for Education, pursuant to the provision made in paragraph (ca) of the definition of 'fees' in sub-section 3 (1) of the *States Grants (Tertiary Education Assistance) Act 1984*, determine the following guidelines in respect of full fee overseas students in courses provided by Commonwealth funded higher education institutions:

As part of the Government's program to improve export performance and its contribution to economic growth, attention is being given to developing Australia's services skills not only for domestic purposes, but also to earn an income from overseas sources. The Government recognises that there is demand from overseas students for courses offered by Australian higher education institutions, and considers that certain institutions have the ability to market these courses both in Australia and overseas.

Provision to do this is to be developed separately from, and in addition to, overseas students who study under current arrangements at Australian institutions and who pay (or have paid on their behalf) the Overseas Student Charge as a contribution towards the cost to Australia of their education.

The Government has therefore decided that institutions may offer courses to additional overseas students willing to pay the full cost of a place in either a mainstream or a special course. At the same time the Government is most concerned to ensure that such arrangements do not displace or in any way disadvantage Australian or subsidised overseas students and to ensure that resources currently available to institutions are not diverted away from the education of Australian students.

The general benefits for Australia's foreign relations which flow from the current overseas student program will extend also to these new arrangements.

Such arrangements will also encourage an entrepreneurial spirit amongst institutions, with the possibility of generating earnings from exporting educational services in this way.

The guidelines will operate in such a way as to ensure that institutions enrolling full fee overseas students will not be prevented from completing course offerings to students

accepted under these arrangements by virtue of any subsequent Government decisions on enrolments of Australian and subsidised overseas students at the institution.

The Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission (CTEC) will play a co-ordinating role and will advise the Commonwealth Minister for Education on the implementation and administration of these guidelines. Institutions are to confirm with CTEC that the proposed fees are consistent with these guidelines before courses are offered to students. Institutions are encouraged to consult with CTEC on any other particular aspects of the guidelines which may require clarification or resolution. The guidelines will be reviewed in the light of experience.

Once the proposed fees have been approved by CTEC, the course will be registered by the Overseas Student Office (OSO). Registration by the OSO is the basis on which visa action may be commenced.

The guidelines apply in the following three areas:

- A. Mainstream Courses Delivered in Australia in Commonwealth Funded Institutions;
- B. Courses Conducted Off-shore by Commonwealth Funded Institutions;
- C. Non-mainstream Courses Delivered in Australia in Commonwealth Funded Institutions.

A. MAINSTREAM COURSES DELIVERED IN AUSTRALIA IN COMMONWEALTH FUNDED INSTITUTIONS

Mainstream courses are those award courses which are provided for Australian students and include award courses offered by external mode, all the servicing of which is provided from Australia.

- 1. *Safeguards for Australian students and subsidised overseas students:* No course/place offering shall directly or indirectly prevent or displace an Australian or subsidised overseas student who would otherwise be eligible to study in such courses at the institutions. To this end, institutions:

- (i) may enrol full fee overseas students in existing courses where places could not be filled by qualified Australian applicants or the quota of subsidised overseas students;
- (ii) may conduct extra courses or increase enrolments in existing courses for full fee overseas students where capacity exists or could be developed. (If facilities which have been provided through normal higher education funding arrangements are subsequently required to accommodate growth in Australian students, institutions may need to make

- alternative arrangements to continue to provide places for full fee overseas students);
- (iii) may contract out courses for delivery outside the institution.
2. *Academic Standards:* Institutions are to ensure that comparable academic standards apply to courses conducted for full fee paying overseas students as currently apply to like or similar courses conducted at that institution.
3. *Student Services:* Institutions and/or sponsors will be responsible for aspects of students' services including welfare, counselling and emergency finance where necessary.
4. *Conditions of Entry and Stay:* The same conditions as apply to entry and stay of subsidised overseas students will also apply to full fee overseas students with the exception that:
- students will apply to institutions, who will issue them with an Acceptance Advice form. On presentation of the Acceptance Advice form to the overseas post by the student, and provided all entry requirements are met, the student will be issued a visa;
 - institutions will be required to advise OSO if students discontinue study. OSO will in turn inform DIEA.
5. *Charging of Fees:* The principles against which fees should be determined are as follows:
- Institutions should charge, as a minimum, fees designed to recover full economic costs having regard to both recurrent services and equipment and capital facilities applicable to the course on offer.
 - Full average costs rather than marginal costs should be the basis for determining fees even if extra places can be provided at the margin at little or no extra cost. The fee should, therefore, be assessed on the full costs of the course in question divided by the number of places (including the extra places).
 - In assessing full recurrent costs account should be taken not only of directly associated staff costs and the like but also all overheads (e.g. utilities, rent, marketing costs) and common services costs (e.g. libraries, student counsellors).
 - In assessing capital costs for fee calculation purposes, the current average cost per place of providing capital facilities for the course in question should be determined by the institution in consultation with CTEC. An appropriate amortisation rate having regard to both capital and interest should then be computed for inclusion in the fee together with assessed full recurrent costs. (As a guide, capital facilities might be amortised over forty years at an assumed interest rate of 10 per cent per annum).
 - Capital would not be taken into account where the necessary capital facilities are provided by sponsors.
 - For particular courses, institutions may choose to charge fees set at less than full average costs provided the difference between the fees collected and full average costs for these courses is recouped by surpluses on other courses for which fees in excess of full average costs are charged.
6. *Finance and Accounting Arrangements:*
- CTEC Funds and other institution funds that are available for general recurrent purposes may not be used either directly or indirectly for the purpose of establishing, maintaining or subsidising the operation of courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students or for underwriting losses incurred in the operation of such courses.
 - Subject to 6 (iii) below, revenue from fees will be retained by institutions on the basis that after direct costs are met any surplus is applied to the educational activities of the institution. Any such surplus could also be applied to major capital developments at the institution with the approval of CTEC.
- (iii) Where capital facilities that have been wholly or partly funded under Government major works programs are used for the delivery of courses, institutions will remit the following proportions of the capital element of the fee, as calculated in accordance with 5 (iv): 1986 to 1988 NIL, 1989 25 per cent and 1990 50 per cent.
- The amounts received by CTEC will be applied to priority higher education capital projects.
- (iv) Institutions will be responsible for any cash deficit/losses on the operation of courses. The Commonwealth will accept no responsibility in this regard.
7. *Accounting Requirements:*
- Institutions are required to certify to CTEC that condition 6 (i) will be met before students will be admitted to courses.
 - Institutions are required to maintain separate financial accounts for all transactions associated with courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students.
 - Institutions are to make available such details relating to the financial and accounting records of full fee overseas student course operations as CTEC may request.
8. *General:* The Overseas Student Office will establish a register of all course offerings under these arrangements.
- B. Courses conducted off-shore by Commonwealth funded institutions.
1. *Safeguard for Australian Students and Subsidised Overseas Students:* No activity in this area shall directly or indirectly prevent or displace an Australian or subsidised overseas student who would otherwise be eligible to study at the institution.
2. *Charging of Fees:* The principles against which fees should be determined are as follows:
- Institutions should charge, as a minimum, fees designed to recover full economic costs having regard to both recurrent services and equipment and capital facilities applicable to the course on offer.
 - Full average costs rather than marginal costs should be the basis for determining fees even if extra places can be provided at the margin at little or no extra cost. The fee should, therefore, be assessed on the full costs of the course in question divided by the number of places (including the extra places).
 - In assessing full recurrent costs account should be taken not only of indirectly associated staff costs and the like but also all overheads (e.g. course development costs, utilities, rent, marketing costs).
 - In assessing capital costs for fee calculation purposes, the current average cost per place of providing capital facilities for the course in question should be determined by the institution in consultation with CTEC. An appropriate amortisation rate having regard to both capital and interest should then be computed for inclusion in the fee together with assessed full recurrent costs. (As a guide, capital facilities might be amortised over forty years at an assumed interest rate of 10 per cent per annum).
 - Capital costs would not be taken into account where the necessary capital facilities are provided by sponsors.
 - For particular courses, institutions may choose to charge fees set at less than full average costs provided the difference between the fees collected and full average costs for these courses is recouped by surpluses on other courses for which fees in excess of full average costs are charged.
3. *Finance and Accounting Arrangements:*
- CTEC funds and other institution funds that are available for general recurrent purposes may not be

used either directly or indirectly for the purpose of establishing, maintaining or subsidising the operation of courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students or for underwriting losses incurred in the operation of such courses.

- (ii) Subject to 3 (iii) below, revenue from fees will be retained by institutions on the basis that after direct costs are met any surplus is applied to the education activities of the institution. Any such surplus could also be applied to major capital developments at the institution with the approval of CTEC.
- (iii) Where capital facilities that have been wholly or partly funded under Government major works programs are used for the delivery of courses, institutions will remit the following proportions of the capital element of the fee, as calculated in accordance with 2 (iv): 1986 to 1988 NIL, 1989 25 per cent and 1990 50 per cent.

The amount received by CTEC will be applied to priority higher education capital projects.

- (iv) Institutions will be responsible for any cash deficit/losses on the operation of courses. The Commonwealth will accept no responsibilities in this regard.

4. Accounting Requirements:

- (i) Institutions are required to certify to CTEC that condition 3 (i) will be met before students will be admitted to courses.
- (ii) Institutions are required to maintain separate financial accounts for all transactions associated with courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students.
- (iii) Institutions are to make available such details relating to the financial and accounting records of full fee overseas student course operations as CTEC may request.

5. *General:* The Overseas Student Office will establish a register of all course offerings under these arrangements.

C. NON-MAINSTREAM COURSES DELIVERED IN AUSTRALIA IN COMMONWEALTH FUNDED INSTITUTIONS

Non-mainstream courses include those courses with a curriculum especially designed for overseas students whether or not they lead to an award of an institution.

1. *Safeguard for Australian Students and Subsidised Overseas Students:* No activity in this area shall directly or indirectly prevent or displace an Australian or subsidised overseas student who would otherwise be eligible to study at the institution.

2. *Student Services:* Institutions and/or sponsors will be responsible for aspects of students' services including welfare, counselling and emergency finance where necessary.

3. *Conditions of Entry and Stay:* The same conditions as apply to entry and stay of subsidised overseas students will also apply to full fee overseas students with the exception that:

- (i) students will apply to institutions, who will issue them with an Acceptance Advice form. On presentation of the Acceptance Advice form to the overseas post by the student, and provide all entry requirements are met, the student will be issued a visa;
- (ii) institutions will be required to advise OSO if students discontinue study. OSO will in turn inform DIEA.

4. *Charging of Fees:* The principles against which fees should be determined are as follows:

- (i) Institutions should charge, as a minimum, fees designed to recover full economic costs having regard to both recurrent services and equipment and capital facilities applicable to the course on offer.

- (ii) Full average costs rather than marginal costs should be the basis for determining fees even if extra places can be provided at the margin at little or no extra cost. The fee should, therefore, be assessed on the full costs of the course in question divided by the number of places (including the extra places).

- (iii) In assessing full recurrent costs account should be taken not only of directly associated staff costs and the like but also all overheads (e.g. utilities, rent, marketing costs) and common services costs (e.g. libraries, student counsellors).

- (iv) In assessing capital costs for fee calculation purposes, the current average cost per place of providing capital facilities for the course in question should be determined by the institution in consultation with CTEC. An appropriate amortisation rate having regard to both capital and interest should then be computed for inclusion in the fee together with assessed full recurrent costs. (As a guide, capital facilities might be amortised over forty years at an assumed interest rate of 10 per cent per annum).

- (v) Capital would not be taken into account where the necessary capital facilities are provided by sponsors.

- (vi) For particular courses, institutions may choose to charge fees set at less than full average costs provided the difference between the fees collected and full average costs for these courses is recouped by surpluses on other courses for which fees in excess of full average costs are charged.

5. Finance and Accounting Arrangements:

- (i) CTEC funds and other institution funds that are available for general recurrent purposes may not be used either directly or indirectly for the purpose of establishing, maintaining or subsidising the operation of courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students or for underwriting losses incurred in the operation of such courses.

- (ii) Subject to 5 (iii) below, revenue from fees will be retained by institutions on the basis that after direct costs are met any surplus is applied to the education activities of the institution. Any such surplus could also be applied to major capital developments at the institution with the approval of CTEC.

- (iii) Where capital facilities that have been wholly or partly funded under Government major works programs are used for the delivery of courses, institutions will remit the following proportions of the capital element of the fee, as calculated in accordance with 4 (iv): 1986 to 1988 NIL, 1989 25 per cent and 1990 50 per cent.

The amounts received by CTEC will be applied to priority higher education capital projects.

- (iv) Institutions will be responsible for any cash deficit/losses on the operation of courses. The Commonwealth will accept no responsibility in this regard.

6. Accounting Requirements:

- (i) Institutions are required to certify to CTEC that condition 5 (i) will be met before students will be admitted to courses.

- (ii) Institutions are required to maintain separate financial accounts for all transactions associated with courses/enrolments for full fee overseas students.

- (iii) Institutions are to make available such details relating to the financial and accounting records of full fee overseas student course operations as CTEC may request.

7. *General:* The Overseas Student Office will establish a register of all course offerings under these arrangements.

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA ORDER RELATING TO THE AUSTRALIAN RADIATION LABORATORY

I, SIR NINIAN MARTIN STEPHEN, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council and pursuant to sub-section 9 (1) of the *National Health Act 1953*, hereby make the following Order.

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the Australian Radiation Laboratory Order.

Interpretation

2. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—"radiation" means—

- (a) electromagnetic radiation;
- (b) ionizing particles;
- (c) electric fields; or
- (d) magnetic fields.

"radiopharmaceutical substance" means—

- (a) a preparation that is used for medical diagnosis or therapy and that contains a radionuclide; or
- (b) a non-radioactive reagent, biological product or radionuclide generator suitable for use in the production of such a preparation.

Functions

3. The Department of Health may, through the Australian Radiation Laboratory, provide the following services;

- (a) research services in relation to radiation so far as such services are for or relate to the improvement of health or the prevention of disease, or relate to maternal and child health, including—
 - (i) research into the use of radiation for medical purposes;
 - (ii) research into the measurement of radiation and radioactivity;
 - (iii) research into methods of protection from radiation; and
 - (iv) research into the consequences to human health of exposure to radiation;
- (b) advisory services to the Australian community in relation to radiation so far as such services are for or relate to the improvement of health or the prevention of disease, or relate to maternal and child health, including—
 - (i) advice on methods of minimizing exposure to radiation; and
 - (ii) advice on substances and devices used in medical treatment and research, being substances and devices that emit radiation;
- (c) advisory services to the Commonwealth on the development of policy on matters relating to radiation so far as such services are for or relate to the improvement of health or the prevention of disease, or relate to maternal and child health;
- (d) services consisting of the development and maintenance of national standards and codes of practice relating to—
 - (i) protection from radiation;
 - (ii) the performance of radiation equipment;
 - (iii) the measurement of radiation and radioactivity; and
 - (iv) medical use of radiation;being standards and codes of practice for use by organisations (including Commonwealth and State departments and authorities) that have responsibilities in Australia in relation to the protection of the community, or particular sections of the community, from radiation hazards;
- (e) research and advisory services in relation to the quality and use of radiopharmaceutical substances;
- (f) research and advisory services relating to technical aspects of radiation so far as such services are for or relate to the improvement of health or the prevention of disease, or relate to maternal and child health, including personal radiation monitoring, instrument calibration and assessment of devices emitting or measuring radiation.

Charges

4. Charges may be levied for any of the services authorised by this Order at such rates as are determined from time to time by the Minister of State for Health.

Conditions

5. A service authorised by this Order may be provided subject to such conditions as are determined by the Secretary of the Department of Health.

Repeal

6. The Order dated 27 July 1972 providing for the functions of the Commonwealth Radiation Laboratory is revoked.

CUSTOMS TARIFF ACT 1982

BY-LAWS NOS. 8740017, 8740018, 8740019, 8740020 AND 8740021

I, KEVIN JOSEPH CHARLTON, delegate of the Comptroller-General of Customs for the purposes of section 271 of the Customs Act 1901, hereby make the by-laws set out in the Schedule hereto.

In a by-law set out in the Schedule hereto -

'security' means that security shall be given to and to the satisfaction of the Collector and that the giving of such security is a condition subject to which that by-law item applies to the goods or the class or kind of goods so conditioned.

Unless the context otherwise requires, where a description of goods is specified in a by-law set out in the Schedule hereto, the goods that fall within that by-law by virtue of that description are such goods as would fall within that description if it were specified in the tariff classification in Schedule 3 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 that applies to those goods.

Unless the context otherwise requires, any word or phrase used in a reference in a by-law set out in the Schedule hereto has the same meaning as if it were used in the tariff classification in Schedule 3 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 that applies to those goods to which that reference in that by-law applies.

For the purposes of these by-laws, 'the Customs Tariff Act 1982' shall mean the Customs Tariff Act 1982, as amended from time to time.

THE SCHEDULE

BY-LAW NO. 8740017

**Item 15
Part I of Schedule 4**

1. This by-law may be cited as Customs By-law No. 8740017.
2. This by-law shall take effect on and from 1 July 1987.
3. This by-law shall cease to have effect as of 1 January 1988.
4. Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 applies, subject to the next succeeding paragraphs, to goods that are specified in Column 1 of a Part of the Table hereunder and subject to such provisos (being conditions, qualifications, exceptions or exclusions), if any, as are set out in Column 2 of that Part and opposite those goods.
5. Goods to which this by-law applies shall be imported by an arriving person, that is to say a person who is -
 - (a) a passenger from overseas; or

- (b) a member of the crew of a ship or aircraft arriving from overseas, being a person who has not availed himself or herself of any of the concessions accorded to a member of the crew of a ship or aircraft under any by-law written to Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 in the 12 month period commencing on the first day of the year in which the goods are imported,

who is ordinarily domiciled in Australia and who departed Australia for overseas on or before 13 May 1987, making his or her first return to Australia from that departure.

6. Subject to the next succeeding paragraph, the Table hereunder applies in relation to goods that -

- (a) are personal goods;
- (b) are non-commercial goods; and
- (c) except for the goods specified in clause (12) and (13), accompany the arriving person.

7. In this by-law:

- (1) the expression 'overseas' has the same meaning as 'parts beyond the seas' as defined in section 4 of the Customs Act 1901.
- (2) 'personal goods' means goods that -
- (a) are the arriving person's property; and
- (b) are suitable and are intended for the arriving person's own use.
- (3) 'non-commercial goods' means goods that -
- (a) are not intended to be used by the arriving person for any commercial purpose, including sale, lease, hire or exchange; and
- (b) are not goods that have been imported in such a quantity that, having regard to their nature or durability, that quantity represents a commercial quantity.

4. Goods to which this by-law applies shall be imported by an arriving person, that is to say a person who is -
 - (a) a passenger from overseas; or
 - (b) a member of the crew of a ship or aircraft arriving from overseas, being a person who -
 - (i) is ordinarily domiciled in Australia; and
 - (ii) has not availed himself or herself of any of the concessions accorded to a member of the crew of a ship or aircraft under any by-law written to Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 in the 12 month period commencing on the first day of the year in which the goods are imported.
5. Subject to the next succeeding paragraph, the Table hereunder applies in relation to goods that -
 - (a) except in respect of goods specified in Part II of the Table hereunder, are personal goods;
 - (b) are non-commercial goods; and
 - (c) except for the goods specified in paragraph 6(4), accompany the arriving person.
6. In this by-law:
 - (1) the expression 'overseas' has the same meaning as 'parts beyond the seas' as defined in section 4 of the Customs Act 1901.
 - (2) 'personal goods' means goods that -
 - (a) are the arriving person's property; and
 - (b) are suitable and are intended for the arriving person's own use.
 - (3) 'non-commercial goods' means goods that -
 - (a) are not intended to be used by the arriving person for any commercial purpose, including sale, lease, hire or exchange; and
 - (b) are not goods that have been imported in such a quantity that, having regard to their nature or durability, that quantity represents a commercial quantity.

 - (i) arrives in Australia under a migration program or under the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time) administered by the Minister of State for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs or the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs;
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up permanent residence in Australia; and
 - (iii) has, unless exempted from the requirements of obtaining an entry permit under the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time), been granted an entry permit, not being a temporary entry permit, pursuant to section 6 of the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time); or
 - (b) a person who -
 - (i) is a permanent resident of Christmas Island; and
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up permanent residence in Australia; or
 - (c) a person who -
 - (i) holds an Australian passport issued under the Passports Act 1938 (as amended from time to time) who has never been a resident of Australia; and
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up permanent residence in Australia

 - (a) the goods will, for a continuous period of 2 years, be put to use in Australia by the arriving person for the purpose for which they are intended; and
 - (b) the goods will not be sold, leased, hired, mortgaged or otherwise disposed of, by or on behalf of the arriving person, before the expiration of the 2 year period referred to in sub-paragraph (a) of this proviso.
- (7) Fur apparel, personal effects, furniture and household goods, not being goods of a kind specified in a preceding clause.
 - (1) The Collector shall be satisfied that the goods have been, for the whole of the period of 12 months preceding the arriving person's departure for Australia, personally owned and used overseas by the arriving person.
 - (2) Excludes alcoholic liquors and tobacco products.

 - (ii) is in the process of acquiring title in that vehicle under a bona fide hire purchase agreement or a leasing arrangement and that at the date of export no other person has lien in the vehicle.
- (8) the period of ownership referred to in proviso (1) of the Table hereunder shall be calculated from the date the vehicle imported into Australia by the migrant is registered overseas by that migrant or delivered for that migrant's use overseas, whichever is the later date, and shall cease on the date that migrant leaves for Australia or when that vehicle is delivered to the freight forwarder for shipment to Australia, whichever is the earlier date.
- (9) 'migrant', shall mean:
- (a) a person who -
 - (i) arrives in Australia under a migration program or under the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time) administered by the Minister of State for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs or the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs;
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up permanent residence in Australia; and

- (iii) has, unless exempted from the requirements of obtaining an entry permit under the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time), been granted an entry permit, not being a temporary entry permit, pursuant to section 6 of the Migration Act 1958 (as amended from time to time); or
- (b) a person who -
 - (i) is a permanent resident of Christmas Island; and
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up residence in Australia; or
- (c) a person who -
 - (i) holds an Australian passport issued under the Passports Act 1938 (as amended from time to time) who has never been a resident of Australia; and
 - (ii) intends forthwith to take up permanent residence in Australia.

Vehicles of the following kinds:

- (a) motor cars, vans, trucks or motorised caravans;
- (b) motor-cycles with or without sidecar.

Restricted to vehicles imported by:-

- (1) a migrant who is over the age of 18 years; and
- (a) satisfies the Collector that the vehicle he or she has imported or is importing into Australia was for the whole of a continuous period of 6 calendar months preceding that migrant's departure for Australia or, where use of that vehicle was not continuous, for periods totalling not less than 184 days preceding that migrant's departure for Australia, owned and used by him or her;
- (b) further satisfies the Collector that the vehicle was owned and used overseas by the arriving person on or before 13 May 1987 or, alternatively, that the arriving person had, on or before 13 May 1987, entered into a binding arrangement to purchase the vehicle;
- (c) further satisfies the Collector that he or she has not previously entered a vehicle for home consumption free of Customs duty under any by-law to Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 at any time since 1 January 1985; and

- (d) has provided security with surety, to and to the satisfaction of the Collector, pursuant to his or her undertaking that the vehicle imported into Australia by him or her will be used by him or her and not be sold or otherwise disposed of in Australia by him or her or on his or her behalf, within 12 months after the date of that vehicle's entry for home consumption; or
- (2) a person who satisfies the Collector that he or she has returned to Australia with the intention of forthwith resuming permanent residence provided that the Collector is further satisfied that -
 - (i) the vehicle was personally owned and used overseas by the arriving person on or before 1 December 1978 or, alternatively, that the arriving person had, on or before 1 December 1978, entered into a binding arrangement to purchase the vehicle;
 - (ii) the vehicle was, for the whole of the period of 15 months preceding the arriving person's departure for Australia, personally owned and used overseas by him or her; and
 - (iii) neither the arriving person nor any member of his or her family had within a period of 3 years immediately preceding his or her arrival in Australia, entered for home consumption a motor car, van, truck, motorised caravan or motor-cycle free of Customs duty and sales tax.

**Item 15
Part I of Schedule 4**

1. This by-law may be cited as Customs By-law No. 8740020.
2. This by-law shall take effect on and from 1 July 1987.
3. Paragraph (b) of Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982 applies only to:

- (1) alcoholic liquors and tobacco products which, when taken together with alcoholic liquors and tobacco products approved for delivery for home consumption under any other by-law written to Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982, do not exceed:
 - (i) in respect of alcoholic liquors - one litre;
 - (ii) in respect of tobacco products - 250 grams.
- (2) perfume which, when taken together with goods other than alcoholic liquors and tobacco products approved for delivery for home consumption under any other by-law to Item 15 in Part I of Schedule 4 to the Customs Tariff Act 1982, does not exceed a total purchase price of:
 - (i) in the case of a person aged 18 years or older - \$400 per person;
 - (ii) in any other case - \$200 per person.
4. The importation of goods under paragraph 3(1) is restricted to goods imported by persons aged 18 years or over.
5. Customs By-law No. 8740015 published in Gazette No. S82 dated 14 May 1987 is hereby revoked.

1. This by-law may be cited as Customs By-law No. 8740021.
2. This by-law shall take effect on and from 1 July 1987.
