Brief particulars of terms and reasons: Determination of the following formula for setting economy air fares over routes operated by Air N.S.W., effective from 3 July 1987:

Fare (\$) = A + BX where:

A is the flag-fall (value 41.90)

B is the distance coefficient (value 0.1600)

X is the journey distance in kilometres.

The determination represents an average increase of 9% in Air N.S.W.'s economy fares, and reflects the implementation in full of the revised allocation of costs between flag-fall and distance components as determined for Air N.S.W. in the Committee's Cost Allocation Reviews Report of March 1987 (refer *Gazette* No. G 15 dated 21.4.87).

The Committee reviewed the detailed cost and revenue estimates for the 1987/88 financial year submitted by Air N.S.W. The Committee found that the airline will incur higher costs, resulting mainly from a substantial increase in capital costs through the acquisition of F50 aircraft and other costs generally. The Committee made downward adjustments to several cost items (e.g. fuel and wages) where it was not satisfied as to the estimates.

The Committee concluded in the circumstances that a 9% fare increase was justified, which was below the level requested. The previous fare increase for Air N.S.W. was in September 1986.

The Committee's decision was made on the basis of a comprehensive review of Air N.S.W.'s estimated costs and revenues for 1987-88. Subject only to unforeseen substantial variations to the estimates provided by the airline, the Committee would not expect another rise in economy fares for Air N.S.W. this financial year.

DETERMINATION UNDER SECTIONS 85, 85A AND 88

I, ALEXANDER PROUDFOOT, Acting First Assistant Secretary, Therapeutics Division, Department of Health and Delegate of the Minister of State for Health, pursuant to sections 85, 85A and 88 of the *National Health Act 1953*, hereby make the following Determination:

1. This Determination shall come into operation on the first day of August 1987.

'M.' means million of organisms;

'mg' means milligram;

'mL' means millilitre;

'mm' means millimetre;

'mmol' means millimole;

'S.C.' means subcutaneous;

'Sch. 2' means the Second Schedule to this Determination;

'Sch. 3' means the Third Schedule to this Determination.

4. Where the strength, type of unit, size of unit or other particulars of form are specified in the column headed 'Form' in the First Schedule to this Determination in relation to a drug or medicinal preparation referred to in sub-section 85 (2) of the *National Health Act 1953* the name of which is specified in that Schedule, those particulars refer to the form or forms of the drug or medicinal preparation that is or are allowable for the purposes of Part VII of that Act to the effect that the drug or medicinal preparation in that form or in each of those forms is a pharmaceutical benefit when prescribed by a medical practitioner.

5. Where the strength, type of unit, size of unit or other particulars of form are specified in the column headed

'Form' in the Third Schedule to this Determination in relation to a drug or medicinal preparation referred to in sub-section 85 (2) of the *National Health Act 1953* the name of which is specified in that Schedule, those particulars refer to the form or forms of the drug or medicinal preparation that is or are allowable for the purposes of Part VII of that Act to the effect that the drug or medicinal preparation in that form or in each of those forms is a pharmaceutical benefit referred to in sub-section 88 (1A) of that Act for the supply of which a participating dental practitioner is authorized to write a prescription.

6. The purposes set out in the column headed 'Purposes' in Part 2 of the First Schedule to this Determination are the only purposes for which a medical practitioner may prescribe the maximum quantities and number of repeats specified in that Part in relation to those pharmaceutical benefits specified in that same Part.

7. The manner, if any, in which a pharmaceutical benefit specified in the First and Third Schedules to this Determination is to be administered in relation to the pharmaceutical benefit is set out in those Schedules in the column headed 'Manner of administration'.

8. The maximum quantity or number of units of a pharmaceutical benefit that may, in one prescription, be directed to be supplied on any one occasion is:

(a) where the name of the pharmaceutical benefit is specified—

(i) in Part 1 of the First Schedule to this Determination—the quantity or number, if any, specified in that Part of the Schedule in the column headed 'Maximum quantity' in relation to the pharmaceutical benefit; or

(ii) in Part 2 of the First Schedule to this Determination and the pharmaceutical benefit is prescribed in accordance with the provisions of the column headed 'Purposes'—the quantity or number, if any, in that Part of the Schedule in the column headed 'Maximum quantity' in relation to the pharmaceutical benefit; or

(iii) if reference is made to the Second Schedule in the column headed 'Maximum quantity' in the First Schedule the quantity or number, if any, specified in the column headed 'Maximum quantity' in the Second Schedule to this Determination in relation to the form of the pharmaceutical benefit; or

(ii) in Part 2 of the First Schedule to this Determination and the pharmaceutical benefit is prescribed in accordance with the provisions of the column headed 'Purposes'—the quantity or number, if any, in that Part of the Schedule in the column headed 'Number of repeats' in relation to the pharmaceutical benefit; or

- (iii) if reference is made to the Second Schedule in the column headed 'Number of repeats' in the First Schedule, the quantity or number, if any, specified in the column headed 'Number of repeats' in the Second Schedule to this Determination in relation to the form of the pharmaceutical benefit; or
- (b) in any other case—the number, if any, specified in the column headed 'Number of repeats' in that Second Schedule in relation to the form of the pharmaceutical benefit.

DECLARATION UNDER SECTION 85

No. PB 2 of 1987

I, ALEXANDER PROUDFOOT, Acting First Assistant Secretary, Therapeutics Division, Department of Health and Delegate of the Minister of State for Health, pursuant to sub-section 85 (2) of the *National Health Act 1953*, hereby make the following Declaration:

1. This Declaration shall come into effect on 1 August 1987.
2. The Declaration under section 85 of the Act made on 18 March 1987 with effect from 1 April 1987 is hereby revoked.
3. In this Declaration:
 "the Act" means the *National Health Act 1953*;
 "ready-prepared pharmaceutical benefit" means a drug or medicinal preparation in respect of which there is in force a determination under sub-section 85 (6) of the Act;
 "extemporaneously-prepared pharmaceutical benefit" means a pharmaceutical benefit other than a ready-prepared pharmaceutical benefit.
4. Part VII of the Act applies in relation to each of the drugs and medicinal preparations as are specified in Schedule 1.
5. A medicinal preparation composed of a compound that includes a pharmaceutical benefit specified in column 1 of Schedule 2, other than a compound specified in column 2 of that Schedule opposite to that pharmaceutical benefit, is not a medicinal preparation to which Part VII of the Act applies, unless that pharmaceutical benefit is also specified in Schedule 3, in which case the provisions of paragraphs 7 and 8 apply.
6. Part VII of the Act does not apply in relation to a medicinal preparation composed of a compound that includes a ready-prepared pharmaceutical benefit, other than Water for Injections or a pharmaceutical benefit specified in column 1 of Schedule 2.
7. Part VII of the Act applies in relation to medicinal preparations composed of one or more of the drugs or medicinal preparations specified in Schedule 3.
8. Part VII of the Act applies in relation to medicinal preparations composed of one or more of the drugs or medicinal preparations specified in Schedule 3 with the addition of one or more of the substances specified in Schedule 4.
9. The substances specified in Schedule 4 are additives for the purposes of paragraph 85 (2) (b) of the Act.
10. Part VII of the Act applies in relation to each of the drugs and medicinal preparations as are specified in Schedule 5.
11. The drugs and medicinal preparations specified in Schedule 5 are additional pharmaceutical benefits made available under arrangements provided for by section 100 of the Act.
12. Where circumstances are specified in column 2 of Schedule 1 or Schedule 3 opposite the name of a pharmaceutical benefit specified in column 1 of either of those Schedules, that pharmaceutical benefit is a relevant pharmaceutical benefit for the purposes of section 88A of the Act.
13. Where circumstances are specified in column 2 of Schedule 3 opposite the name of a pharmaceutical benefit specified in column 1 of that Schedule, those circumstances are also specified in relation to any medicinal preparation containing that pharmaceutical benefit.
14. The following circumstances are specified in relation to each relevant pharmaceutical benefit for the purposes of section 88A of the Act:
 - (a) Where a class of persons is specified in column 2 of Schedule 1 or Schedule 3—that the pharmaceutical benefit is to be supplied for the treatment of a person included in that class of persons;
 - (b) Where a disease or condition is specified in column 2 of Schedule 1 or Schedule 3—
 - (i) if sub-paragraph (ii) does not apply—that the pharmaceutical benefit is to be supplied for the treatment of that disease or condition in relation to any person; or
 - (ii) if the disease or condition is specified in relation to a specified class of persons—that the pharmaceutical benefit is to be supplied for the treatment of that disease or condition in a person included in that class of persons;
 - (c) Where a purpose is specified in column 2 of Schedule 1 or Schedule 3—that the pharmaceutical benefit is to be supplied for that purpose;
 - (d) Where it is specified in column 2 of Schedule 1 or Schedule 3 that the written authority of the Secretary is required—that an application for the written authority of the Secretary in relation to the supply of the pharmaceutical benefit has been made by a medical practitioner and the Secretary has approved the application.
15. Where a medical practitioner makes an application under sub-paragraph 14 (d) and the Secretary approves the application, the Secretary shall record the approval on a numbered authority and—
 - (a) where, in the approval, the Secretary requires the medical practitioner to vary the prescription for the supply of the pharmaceutical benefit—return the approval to the medical practitioner; or
 - (b) in any other case—return the approval to the medical practitioner or, if the medical practitioner so requests, forward the approval to the person to whom the pharmaceutical benefit is to be supplied.

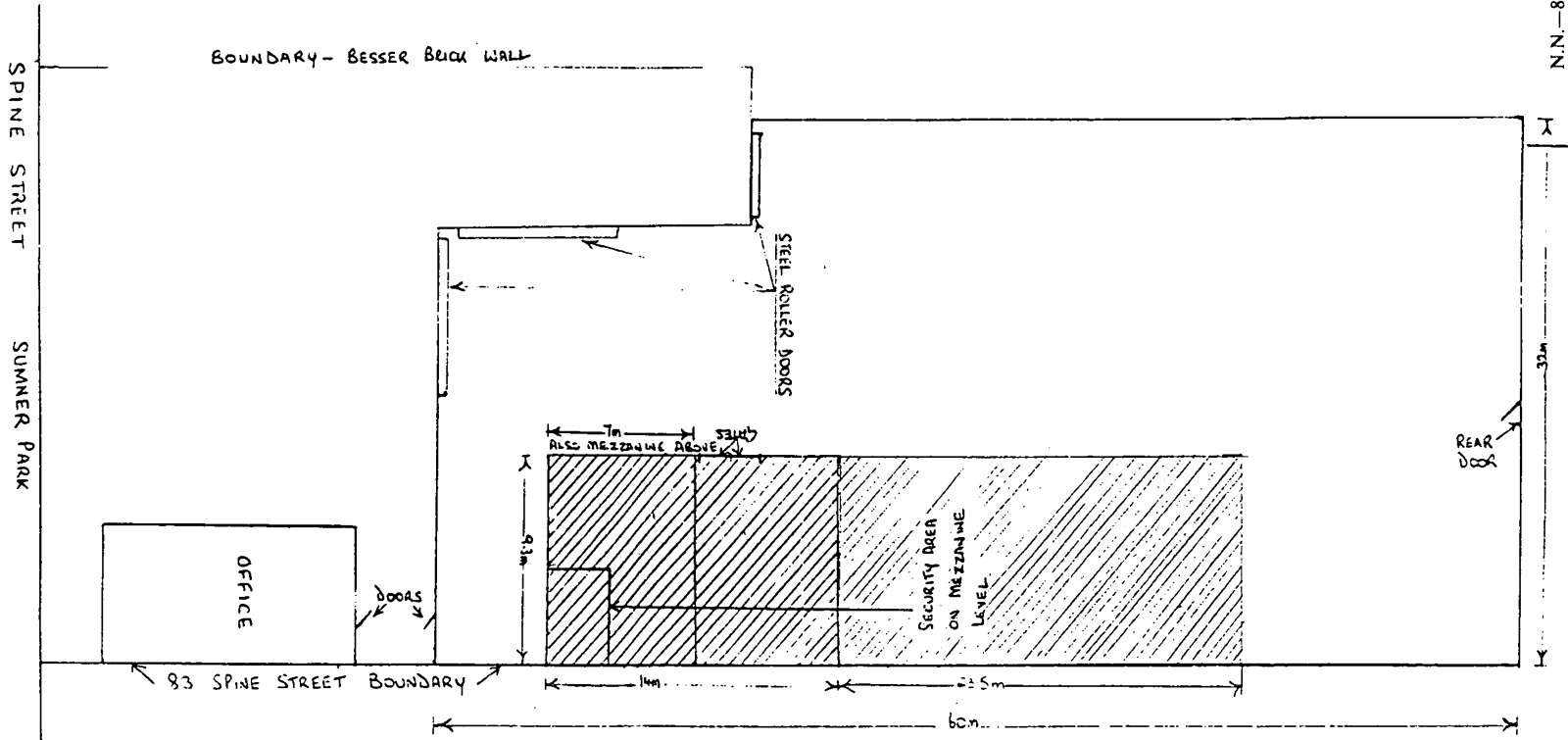

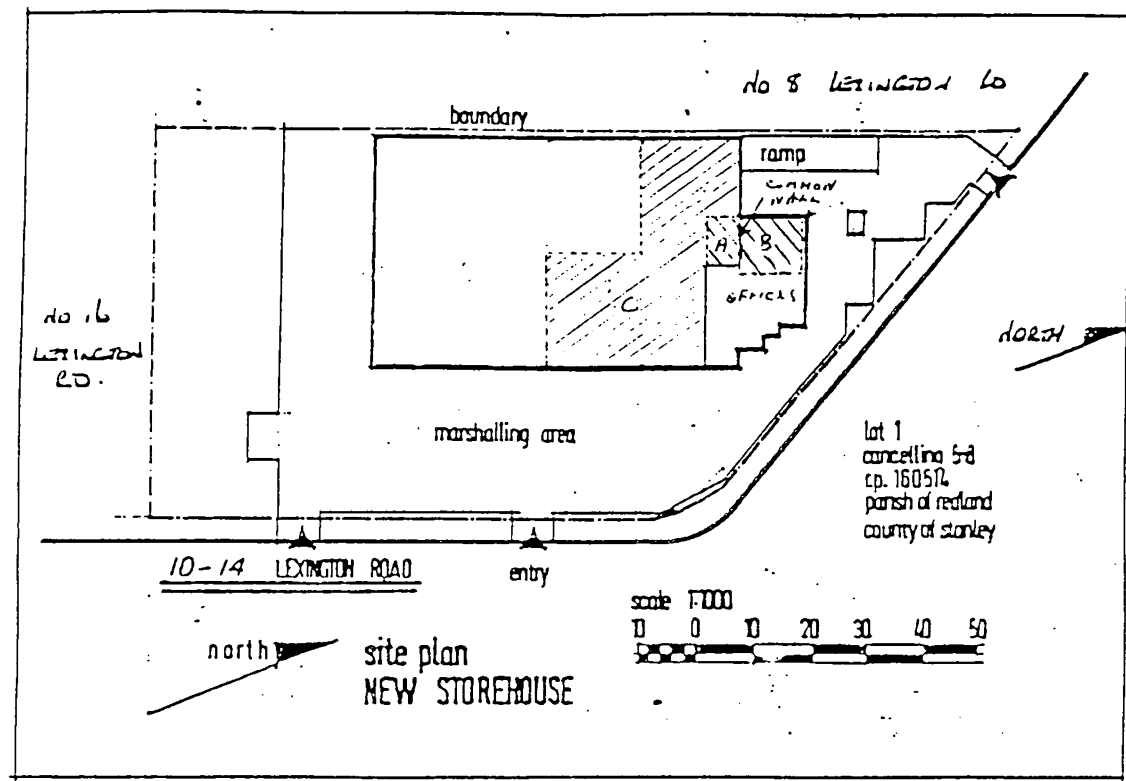

- (c) direct that a provision in an Act specified in Column 2 of an item in Schedule 3 shall have effect as if there were substituted for any reference in that provision to the Minister of State for Housing and Construction a reference to the Minister of State for Community Services and Health;
- (d) direct that the definition of "Energy Minister" in subsection 3 (1) of the *Liquid Fuel Emergency Act 1984* shall have effect as if there were substituted for the reference to the Minister of State for Science in that definition a reference to the Minister of State for the Arts, Sport, the Environment, Tourism and Territories;
- (e) direct that section 23AF of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1936* shall have effect as if there were substituted for the reference to the Minister of State for Trade in that provision a reference to the Minister of State for Foreign Affairs and Trade;
- (f) direct that section 13 of the *National Capital Development Commission Act 1957* shall have effect as if there were substituted for the reference to the Minister of State for Housing and Construction in that provision a reference to the Minister of State for Administrative Services;
- (g) direct that item 7 in Schedule 1 to the *Supply Act (No. 2) 1987-88* shall have effect as if there were substituted for the references to the Minister of State for Employment and Industrial Relations in that item references to the Minister of State for Employment, Education and Training; and
- (h) direct that a provision of an Act or of an instrument (including rules, regulations and by-laws) made, granted or issued under an Act (other than a provision to which paragraph (a) applies or a provision specified in paragraph (b), (c), (d), (e), (f) or (g)) shall have effect as if there were substituted for any reference in that provision to the Minister specified in Column 2 of an item in Schedule 4 a reference to the Minister specified in Column 3 of that item.





- (b) officers who are unable to perform their duties, or other duties appropriate to their classification, because of physical or mental capacity.

SCHEDULE**INEFFICIENCY INSTRUCTIONS****PART 1: PRELIMINARY****Definitions and Interpretations****1.1 In these instructions,**

'the Act' means the Public Service Act 1922, and the Regulations made under that Act;

'department' means a department of the Service and includes a branch or part of the Service in relation to which a person has, under the Act or another Act, the powers of, or exercisable by, a Secretary as if that Branch or part of the Service were a separate department;

'officer' means an officer employed under the Act other than a Secretary, unattached Secretary or Senior Executive Service officer, and includes a continuing employee as defined in Division 10 of Part III of the Act who has been an employee for more than one year, but does not include an officer whose appointment to the Service on probation has not been confirmed;

'the Board' means the Public Service Board and a reference to the Board shall be read as including a reference to an officer or employee as defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Board;

a reference to a 'Secretary' shall be read as including a reference to an officer or employee as defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Secretary.

1.2 As provided in section 76S of the Act, an officer is inefficient if and only if the officer fails, in the performance of the duties that he or she is required to perform, to attain or sustain a standard of efficiency that a person may reasonably be expected to attain or sustain in the performance of those duties.

Overcoming problems in work performance

1.3 All officers should know the standard of work expected of them. Arrangements should be made to ensure they have access to adequate information regarding the duties they are required to perform. Such information would include any rules or guidelines relevant to the performance of the duties, and any relevant departmental work standards.

1.4 As part of the normal interaction between officers and their supervisors, officers should be given regular feedback

on their work performance, and should be told when performance is unsatisfactory. By these means performance problems of a minor kind will often be overcome quickly and informally.

1.5 When a significant performance problem is drawn to an officer's attention, a brief written record should be kept of any discussion with the officer. The officer must be given a copy of the record; before this happens he or she must also be given the opportunity to attach any comments to, and sign, the record.

1.6 To resolve work performance problems effectively and fairly it is necessary to identify the factors contributing to the problem. These could include, for example, a lack of relevant training, a medical condition, personal problems or poor supervision. Therefore, consideration should be given to the following measures before action is taken under Part 2 of these instructions:

- . providing some form of training;
- . re-arranging the officer's duties;
- . changing the procedures relating to the officer's duties;
- . arranging for the officer to have specialised counselling;
- . transferring the officer to another position at the same level;
- . arranging for the officer's supervisor to be counselled; or
- . referring the officer to the Commonwealth Medical Officer for a medical examination.

PART 2 - INEFFICIENCY PROCEDURES

2.1 Action under this Part will usually (although not necessarily) be taken in response to a report from a supervisor or from a senior manager with line responsibilities for the officer to whom the report relates.

2.2 The officer must be given a copy of any report furnished to the Secretary for the purpose of initiating action under this Part, and must also be given 14 days to comment on the report.

2.3 If, after receiving a report and any comments of the kind referred to in paragraph 2.2 the Secretary decides to take no further action under this Part or defers a decision on whether to take such action, the Secretary should advise the officer in writing and inform him or her of any other action the Secretary is proposing to take.

2.4 Nothing in this Part prevents a Secretary from, at any time, exercising any powers vested in him or her under the Act in accordance with the Act, or taking any action open to him or her in the ordinary course of managing staff, in relation to an officer who is or may be inefficient. Examples of powers or actions open to the Secretary are set out in paragraph 1.6.

Warning to officer

2.5 Where a Secretary is not satisfied with an officer's work performance, the Secretary may give the officer written warning that the officer must, over the next three months, sustain (or, where appropriate, both attain and sustain) an acceptable standard of work performance and thereby satisfy the Secretary that the officer is efficient. The warning must include:

- (a) the reasons for the warning;
- (b) advice of the possible consequences of failure to satisfy the Secretary that the officer is efficient, including reduction in classification or retirement from the Service; and
- (c) advice that an assessment committee will be appointed, and an outline of the procedures to be followed by that committee.

2.6 Unless an officer is given a warning in accordance with paragraph 2.5 no further action may be taken under this Part in relation to that officer.

2.7 Except where retirement with consent is expected to be agreed forthwith (see paragraphs 2.23 to 2.26), the Secretary is required to appoint an assessment committee and advise the officer of the composition of the committee.

Assessment Committee

2.8 The function of the assessment committee is to advise the Secretary, at the completion of a three month assessment period, on whether the officer has sustained (or, where appropriate, attained and sustained) an acceptable standard of work performance and is efficient, and to recommend the action, if any, the Secretary should take. The assessment period commences on the day the officer received the warning under paragraph 2.5.

2.9 The assessment committee is to consist of at least two officers, one of whom shall not be from that part of the department in which the officer being assessed normally performs his or her duties.

2.10 The committee may inform itself and adopt such procedures as it sees fit, subject to paragraphs 2.11 and 2.12. It is not intended that the investigations and

considerations of the committee be overly formal or procedural.

2.11 The committee must advise the staff member in writing that he or she may make submissions orally and/or in writing to the committee, addressing the matter of his or her work performance. It must also inform the officer at an early stage how it proposes to go about its task.

2.12 Without limiting the matters it may take into account, for the purpose of assessing and reporting on the officer's work performance the committee

(a) must have regard to:

- (i) any written selection criteria or job specifications applicable to the officer's duties;
- (ii) any duty statement describing those duties; and
- (iii) any written work standards or instructions relating to the manner of performance of those duties; and

(b) may have regard to:

- (i) appropriate personnel records on the officer, including any available records which may indicate any patterns in the officer's work performance over a reasonable period;
- (ii) with the officer's agreement - relevant medical reports on the officer; and
- (iii) documents of the kind described in sub-paragraph (a) relating to similar duties in the department.

The committee must make available to the officer those documents or parts of documents which are relevant to the officer and which the committee is taking into account. The officer will be able to address these, if he or she wishes, in the course of making submissions to the committee.

2.13 The three month assessment period may be extended if the Secretary considers that there are good reasons for doing so. The Secretary may require progress reports at any time during the initial or extended assessment period.

2.14 The assessment committee should report to the Secretary in writing within seven days of the completion of the assessment period, unless the Secretary specifies a longer period.

Action following report by an assessment committee

2.15 The Secretary must give a copy of the assessment committee's report to the officer and advise the officer of his or her right to comment within 14 days.

2.16 If the Secretary decides to take no further action under this Part or defers a decision on whether to take such action, the Secretary must advise the officer in writing and inform him or her of any other action the Secretary is proposing to take.

2.17 Where, after considering the assessment committee's report and any comments by the officer the Secretary is satisfied that an officer is inefficient, the Secretary must first consider whether it would be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to transfer the officer under section 50 of the Act to a position at the same level within the department. Having considered this the Secretary may, by notice in writing under subsection 76W(1) of the Act, reduce the officer's classification or retire the officer from the Service.

2.18 Where the officer is not transferred at the same level but the Secretary is satisfied that it would be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to reduce the officer's classification, and a suitable position is available for the officer, the Secretary should reduce the officer's classification rather than retire the officer.

2.19 Any reduction in classification must be to duties which the officer is qualified to perform, would be able to perform efficiently immediately or within a reasonable period, and could reasonably be required to perform. In relation to permanent staff, reduction in classification by a Secretary must be to a vacant position. For continuing employees, the Act provides that reduction in classification means employment in a lower capacity.

2.20 The Act does not require Secretaries or the Board to attempt to redeploy an inefficient officer to another department. If however an officer is assessed as capable of working efficiently at a reasonable level but internal redeployment is precluded, for example because of the small size or specialised nature of the department's operations in the location where the officer is employed, the department should raise the case with the Board's Regional Office before the officer is given any notice of retirement.

2.21 Before giving notice of reduction or retirement it is open to the Secretary to establish whether the officer consents to the action proposed. Where the Secretary does this the Secretary must explain the possible implications for the officer under section 76Z of the Act, viz. that if the officer, before receiving the notice, consents in writing to the giving of the notice, he or she will not then be able to appeal. If the officer is prepared to consent to the action proposed, the Secretary should also seek the officer's agreement to a date, set in accordance with

paragraph 2.27, for the reduction or retirement to take effect.

2.22 Where the Secretary gives notice of reduction in classification or notice of retirement the notice must include or be accompanied by the reasons for the decision and, unless the officer has given prior written consent to the action being taken, advice of the officer's right of appeal. Notices take effect in accordance with paragraphs 2.27 to 2.30.

Retirement with consent during assessment period

2.23 Where an officer has received a warning under paragraph 2.5, and the Secretary is satisfied that

- (a) the officer is inefficient, and
- (b) it would not be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to transfer the officer under section 50 of the Act or to reduce the officer's classification,

the Secretary may, at any time during the three month assessment period, with the prior written consent of the officer and the agreement of the Board, give the officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act.

2.24 For the purpose of seeking the Board's agreement the Secretary should send to the Board's Regional Director a brief memorandum setting out the background to the case and noting that the Secretary is satisfied on the points mentioned in paragraph 2.23.

2.25 Where the Secretary proposes to proceed with retirement action in accordance with paragraph 2.23 the Secretary must

- (a) give the officer sufficient information, including the proposed retirement date (see subparagraph 2.27 (b)) and relevant information on entitlements, to enable him or her to make an informed decision in the matter, and
- (b) allow the officer 14 days in which to advise the Secretary, in writing, of his or her consent to being retired and to the retirement taking effect on the date proposed by the Secretary.

2.26 The officer should be encouraged to take the full 14-day period before advising his or her decision. The Secretary must not give the officer notice of retirement before the end of that period.

Reduction or retirement with consent - date of effect

2.27 Under Regulation 120C, where the officer has given prior written consent to the giving of notice of reduction or retirement, the notice takes effect on any day specified

in the notice and agreed between the Secretary and the officer. This should be:

- (a) one month after the day the notice is given to the officer; or
- (b) in the case of an officer retired with consent in accordance with paragraph 2.23 - 14 days after the notice is given to the officer.

2.28 If the appropriate date cannot be agreed in advance the case should be treated as a non-consent one. In cases where the assessment process had been completed the notice will then take effect in accordance with the next paragraph. If however the officer was to have been retired with consent before completion of the assessment process, it will now be necessary to complete the assessment process, in accordance with this Part, before the officer is given any notice under subsection 76W(1).

Reduction or retirement without consent - date of effect

2.29 Where the officer has not given prior written consent to the giving of notice of reduction or retirement, the notice takes effect:

- (a) one month after the day the notice is given to the officer;
- (b) if the Secretary specifies a day that is later than (a) - on that day; or
- (c) if the officer appeals - the day the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn;

whichever occurs last.

2.30 For the purposes of paragraphs 2.27 and 2.29 "one month" means a period commencing at the beginning of a day and ending immediately before the beginning of the corresponding day of the next month or, if there is no corresponding day, ending at the expiration of the next month. For example, if a notice is given on 20 August the one month will end at the expiration of 19 September.

PART 3 - APPEAL RIGHT

3.1 An officer who is given notice under subsection 76W(1) of the Act and who has not given prior written consent to the giving of the notice may appeal to a Redeployment and Retirement Appeal Committee constituted under subdivision D of Division 2 of Part II of the Merit Protection (Australian Government Employees) Act 1984.

3.2 The ground of appeal is that the reduction or retirement (as appropriate) would be unreasonable.

3.3 An appeal must be in writing and must reach the Director, Merit Protection and Review Agency within 14 days of the day the officer received the notice. The address of the Agency is: PO Box E440, Canberra, ACT, 2600.

3.4 Officers should be advised to contact the local office of the Merit Protection and Review Agency if they have any questions about the appeal process.

Miscellaneous provisions

Superannuation and other entitlements

3.5 Contributors to the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme with at least one year's contributory service are entitled to involuntary retirement benefits under the Superannuation Act 1976 if retired on inefficiency grounds. These are the same superannuation benefits as are payable on retrenchment.

3.6 Officers retired on inefficiency grounds are entitled to payment in lieu of long service leave and recreation leave credits on the same basis as if they resigned or, after reaching the minimum retiring age, retired voluntary.

Maintenance of records in inefficiency cases

3.7 Arrangements for retaining records of action taken under these instructions are the same as for records of disciplinary action for misconduct (see Volume 3 of the Personnel Management Manual).

Advice to Board

3.8 Until further notice departments are asked to inform the Board's central office of each case where an officer is reduced in classification or retired on inefficiency grounds. This is to assist the Board to monitor the overall efficacy of these instructions and identify any particular problems with them. The form for advising the Board will be issued separately.

3.9 Departments should also complete and return a form PSB 14 (Notification of Separation) for each permanent officer who is retired on inefficiency grounds.

Gazettal of retirements

3.10 Action for gazette notification of retirements is to be taken by the department on form PSB6. The following words should be inserted in the first column of the form: "Retirement - section 76W Public Service Act."

PART 4 - TRANSITIONAL PROVISIONS

4.1 The following provisions apply in relation to officers who, at 19 July 1987, were subject to action under the Administrative Procedures for inefficiency notified by the

Public Service Board under section 8 of the Commonwealth Employees (Redeployment and Retirement) Act 1979 on 1 April 1986 ("the former procedures"):

- (a) any supervisor's report or officer comments provided under sub-clauses 3(1) and 3(2) of the former procedures shall be taken to have been provided under Part 2 of these instructions;
- (b) an assessment committee appointed under the former procedures shall, unless the Secretary otherwise directs, be taken to have been appointed under Part 2 of these instructions;
- (c) where an assessment committee appointed under the former procedures has not reported to the Secretary under clause 6 of those procedures, the committee shall complete its inquiries and make its report in accordance with Part 2 of these instructions, provided that:
 - (i) where the officer has not already been warned by the Secretary in similar terms to paragraph 2.5 of these instructions - the officer shall be warned in the terms of that paragraph, and
 - (ii) the assessment committee shall not give its final report to the Secretary until at least three months after any such warning has been given to the officer;
- (d) where:
 - (i) an assessment committee has reported to the Secretary under clause 6 of the former procedures;
 - (ii) the Secretary has advised the officer in accordance with clause 8 of the former procedures; and
 - (iii) a review period is in progress; but
 - (iv) the assessment committee has not reported to the Secretary under clause 11 of the former procedures,the committee shall, at the end of the review period set under the former procedures or at such later time as the Secretary may direct, report to the Secretary in accordance with paragraph 2.8 of these instructions. The Secretary shall first advise the officer of the changed procedures for handling the officer's case, including the possibility of reduction or retirement action being taken by the Secretary;
- (e) a report provided by an assessment committee under clause 11 of the former procedures shall be taken as having been provided under Part 2 of these instructions;

- (f) where action has commenced under the former procedures but not been completed under those procedures or these instructions, and the Secretary is satisfied that
- (a) the officer is inefficient; and
 - (b) it would not be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to transfer the officer under section 50 of the Act or to reduce the officer's classification,

the Secretary may, with the prior written consent of the officer and the agreement of the Board, whether or not the officer has been given a formal warning, give the officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act.

SCHEDULE**FITNESS FOR CONTINUED DUTY - INTERIM INSTRUCTIONS****PART I - PRELIMINARY****Definitions and Interpretations****1.1 In these instructions,**

'the Act' means the Public Service Act 1922 and the Regulations made under that Act;

'department' means a department of the Service and includes a branch or part of the Service in relation to which a person has, under the Act or another Act, the powers of, or exercisable by, a Secretary as if that branch or part of the Service were a separate department;

'officer' means an officer employed under the Act other than a Secretary, unattached Secretary or Senior Executive Service officer, and includes a continuing employee as defined in Division 10 of Part III of the Act who has been an employee for more than one year, but does not include an officer whose appointment to the Service on probation has not been confirmed;

'the Board' is the Public Service Board and a reference to the Board shall be read as including reference to an officer or employee defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Board;

a reference to a 'Secretary' shall be read as including a reference to an officer or employee as defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Secretary;

'Medical Officer' means any legally registered medical practitioner engaged to conduct medical examinations on behalf of the Commonwealth including examinations in connection with fitness for continued duty.

Management response to ill-health

1.2 A key objective of these instructions is to bring about positive and appropriate action by management as soon as there appears to be a health problem which may impair an officer's ability to do his or her duties over the long term.

1.3 In a number of cases non-medical factors may have substantially contributed to an officer's apparent unfitness for his or her duties. These may include disaffection with or inability to cope with a particular job, conflict with a supervisor or personal problems. Depending on the factors involved, it may be appropriate to take measures of the following kind rather than refer the case to the Medical Officer:

- . providing some form of training;
- . modifying the officer's duties;
- . arranging for the officer to have specialised counselling;
- . temporarily transferring the officer to different duties;
- . transferring the officer under section 50 of the Act to another position at the same level; or
- . arranging for the officer's supervisor to be counselled.

1.4 It is important that management intervene as early as possible so as to assist staff whose health may be impaired to remain at work on medically suitable duties or, where they are on sick leave, to improve the prospects of their successful return to work. Early intervention will also help to avert the situation of officers being forced onto sick leave without pay before their case is finalised.

1.5 Although as a general rule the report of a Medical Officer will form the basis of action by Secretaries in relation to medically unfit officers, such a report may not be necessary in all cases. It is open to Secretaries to take action such as modifying an officer's duties or transferring the officer - temporarily or permanently - to other duties at the officer's level on the advice of the officer's treating doctor. This should only be done where the Secretary is satisfied with the medical certificates or other material provided by the treating doctor, and satisfied that the duties in question would, in the light of the medical advice, be suitable. Departments with established rehabilitation schemes may also be able to handle some cases without the need for the case to be referred to the Medical Officer.

1.6 Otherwise, Secretaries should refer cases to the Medical Officer in accordance with the ensuing procedures.

PART 2 - REFERRAL TO MEDICAL OFFICER

2.1 Nothing in these procedures prevents the Secretary from consulting the Medical Officer or arranging a medical examination as soon as it comes to notice that an officer's health could be substantially impairing, other than temporarily, the officer's ability to perform his or her duties.

Officer absent for four weeks

2.2 Where an officer has been absent from duty on account of illness for a continuous period of four weeks and the Secretary has reason to believe that the officer could be substantially impaired, other than temporarily, in the officer's ability to perform his or her duties, the Secretary must:

- (a) consult the Medical Officer on the advisability of arranging a medical examination for the officer; and
- (b) where the Secretary considers that a medical examination is advisable, arrange for the officer to be examined by the Medical Officer as soon as practicable.

2.3 The consultation requirement in the preceding paragraph is designed to guard against unnecessary referrals to the Medical Officer, eg in some short-term injury cases. Consultation should be with a Senior Medical Officer and be by telephone in the first instance.

2.4 Departments should ensure that they have adequate sick leave reporting arrangements so that the provisions of paragraph 2.2 are complied with.

Other circumstances

2.5 Except as provided in paragraph 2.6, the Secretary is required to arrange for an officer to be examined by a Medical Officer where:

- (a) the officer has been absent on account of illness for 13 weeks continuously;
- (b) the officer has been absent on account of illness for a total of 13 weeks in any 26 week period; or
- (c) the officer presents a report from a registered medical practitioner indicating that the officer is unfit for his or her duties and that the prognosis is unfavourable;

and the Secretary has reason to believe that the officer could be substantially impaired, other than temporarily, in the officer's ability to perform his or her duties.

2.6 The exception to the requirement in the preceding paragraph is where the officer has been referred after a four weeks' absence in accordance with paragraph 2.2 and the Medical Officer has set a date for further medical examination, in which case the officer should be referred for examination on that date.

Advice to officer before medical examination

2.7 At a reasonable time before an officer is examined by the Medical Officer, the Secretary must advise the officer in writing of:

- (a) the time and place of the examination;
- (b) the purpose of the examination, and the reason for arranging it;
- (c) the officer's right, subject to paragraph 6.1, to be provided on request with the information to be furnished to the Medical Officer;
- (d) the officer's right to submit supporting material for consideration by the Medical Officer; and
- (e) if the officer has been a superannuation contributor for less than 20 years - the need to bring to the medical examination any Benefit Classification Certificate issued to the officer.

Information to be provided to Medical Officer

2.8 In connection with a medical examination arranged under these instructions the Secretary should provide the Medical Officer with:

- (a) a medical report form (PSB 14B/S19);
- (b) details of the officer's duties and factors associated with the duties or physical working environment which the Secretary considers relevant;
- (c) details of the officer's work performance;
- (d) the officer's sick leave record for the previous two years, or longer where this is considered relevant;
- (e) relevant medical reports and certificates;
- (f) supporting material which the officer wishes to be provided to the Medical Officer;
- (g) with the authorisation of the officer or the Commissioner for Employees' Compensation - compensation medical reports; and
- (h) advice as to which of the above material has been given to the officer.

Conduct of medical examination and report

2.9 The Medical Officer will report to the Secretary on the medical condition of the officer and on whether the officer:

- (a) is fit to perform his or her duties;
- (b) is unfit to continue to perform those duties but is fit to perform other duties;

- (c) is unfit to undertake any duties; or
- (d) should be granted sick leave or further sick leave if available.

2.10 The Medical Officer will have regard to all relevant factors including:

- (a) his or her assessment of the officer's medical condition;
- (b) the material submitted to him or her; and
- (c) such other medical advice as he or she obtains in relation to the officer.

2.11 Where the Medical Officer considers that an officer is unfit to perform his or her duties or is unfit to undertake any duties, the Medical Officer will indicate the prognosis for the health of the officer and will state his or her reasons for this prognosis.

2.12 Where the Medical Officer considers that an officer is unfit to perform his or her present duties but is capable of performing other duties, the Medical Officer will indicate any types of work or working situations from which the officer is precluded because of his or her medical condition.

2.13 Where the Medical Officer considers the officer should be granted further sick leave, the Medical Officer will recommend the period after which the health of the officer should be reviewed.

2.14 At the end of the review period, or at an earlier time if the Secretary considers it appropriate, the Secretary should:

- (a) arrange for a further medical examination by the Medical Officer;
- (b) advise the officer in accordance with paragraph 2.7; and
- (c) update the information provided to the Medical Officer in accordance with paragraph 2.8, including any further supporting material submitted by the officer.

Action to be taken by Secretary on medical report

2.15 On receipt of a Medical Officer's report, the Secretary, subject to paragraphs 6.1 and 6.2, must inform the officer in writing of:

- (a) the findings, under paragraph 2.9, of the medical examination;
- (b) any recommendation in the report;
- (c) where membership of the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme is less than 20 years - advice that if the officer is reduced in classification or is retired and the Commissioner for Superannuation finds that the reduction or retirement condition is connected with a medical disability existing on entry to the Scheme, the benefit payable under the scheme may be adjusted; and
- (d) any action the Secretary proposes to take arising from the report;

and the officer must be given the opportunity:

- (e) to discuss with the Secretary or the Secretary's representative the recommendation and any action proposed to be taken; and
- (f) within 14 days of the Secretary informing the officer in accordance with this paragraph - to submit written comments to the Secretary on these matters.

PART 3 - REDEPLOYMENT

Transfer and reduction

3.1 Where the Medical Officer has found that the officer is unfit for his or her usual duties but is fit for other duties and the Secretary considers it is necessary to transfer the officer to a different position, the Secretary should first attempt to transfer the officer to a position at the officer's substantive level. Trial placements and training opportunities should be arranged where necessary.

3.2 Where however the officer's health precludes transfer at his or her substantive level or the Secretary considers that it would not be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to transfer the officer at that level, the Secretary may, by notice in writing under subsection 76W(1) of the Act, reduce the officer's classification.

3.3 A contributor to the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme who is reduced in classification will, where the Commissioner for Superannuation is satisfied that the reduction was on medical grounds, be paid a partial invalidity pension to offset part of the reduction in salary. Departments should refer a copy of the medical reports to the Australian Government Retirement Benefits Office (AGRBO) and seek advice as to the officer's eligibility for a partial invalidity pension before the officer is given notice of reduction.

3.4 If an officer who has been reduced in classification qualifies for a partial invalidity pension, he or she may continue to pay contributions to the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme on the "frozen" level of salary before reduction (ie. not adjusted for future salary movements) until this salary is overtaken by increases in the reduced level of salary, or he or she may elect to pay contributions on the reduced level of salary. However such an officer automatically retains benefit coverage under the Scheme on the basis of the former (higher) salary before reduction, as adjusted from time to time, regardless of whether he or she elects to pay a reduced level of contributions.

3.5 Any reduction in classification must be to duties which the officer is qualified to perform, able to perform efficiently either immediately or within a reasonable period, and could reasonably be required to perform. In relation to permanent staff, reduction in classification by a Secretary must be to a vacant position. (For continuing employees, the Act provides that reduction in classification means employment in a lower capacity).

Notice of reduction

3.6 Where the Secretary proposes to give an officer notice of reduction in classification, it is open to the Secretary to establish whether the officer consents to the action proposed. Where the Secretary does this the Secretary must explain the possible implications for the officer under section 76Z of the Act, viz. that if the officer, before receiving the notice, consents in writing to the giving of the notice, he or she will not then be able to appeal. The officer should also be advised of the matters outlined in paragraphs 3.3 and 3.4 and of the effect on recreation leave and long service leave entitlements (see Orders 5/G/8 and 5/B/12 in Volume 8 of the Personnel Management Manual).

3.7 Where the Secretary gives an officer notice of reduction in classification under subsection 76W(1) of the Act, the notice must include or be accompanied by the reasons for the notice and, unless the officer has given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, advice of the officer's right of appeal.

3.8 In accordance with regulation 120C, where the officer has given prior written consent to the giving of notice of reduction the notice will take effect on any day specified in the notice and agreed between the Secretary and the officer. This date should be one month after the notice is given to the officer unless there are exceptional circumstances. If the officer and the Secretary do not agree in advance on the date of effect the case should be treated as a non-consent one, in accordance with the next paragraph.

3.9 Where the officer has not given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, the notice will take effect:

- (a) one month after the day the notice is given to the officer;
- (b) if the Secretary specifies a day that is later than (a) - on that day; or
- (c) if the officer appeals (see Part 5) - the day on which the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn;

whichever occurs last.

3.10 For the purposes of paragraphs 3.8 and 3.9, "one month" means a period commencing at the beginning of a day and ending immediately before the beginning of the corresponding day of the next month or, if there is no corresponding day, ending at the expiration of the next month. For example, if a notice was given on 20 August the one month would end at the expiration of 19 September.

Redeployment to other departments

3.11 If an officer has been found fit by the Medical Officer for other duties but redeployment within the officer's own department is precluded, for example because of the small size or specialised nature of the department's operations in the location where the officer is employed, the department should raise the case with the Board's Regional Office with a view to redeployment being explored with other departments.

Retirement where officer not redeployed

3.12 Where the Secretary does not transfer the officer under section 50 of the Act and is unable to reduce the officer's classification in accordance with this Part, the Secretary may, with the prior agreement of the Board and in accordance with Part 4 of these instructions, retire the officer from the Service. Such retirement is invalidity retirement for the purposes of the Superannuation Act 1976.

PART 4 - PROCEDURES FOR INVALIDITY RETIREMENT

Need for Board approval

4.1 The Secretary may give an officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act on invalidity grounds only with the prior agreement of the Board.

4.2 Secretaries should give the Board's Regional Office all relevant information when seeking its agreement to invalidity retirement.

4.3 For the purposes of making its decision the Board may arrange for further information to be obtained from the Medical Officer or from such other sources as it considers appropriate.

Sick leave pending invalidity retirement

4.4 Secretaries may permit half-pay credits to be converted to full-pay in certain circumstances (see Order 5/C/16A in Volume 8 of the Personnel Management Manual) for officers who have not been given notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act. Where it is proposed to give notice of retirement, conversion should only be granted for short periods, say two weeks in advance. No further grant of conversion can be made after the Secretary has given notice of retirement.

Information to officer about proposed retirement

4.5 Where the Secretary proposes to retire an officer on invalidity grounds and has obtained the Board's agreement to the giving of notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act to the officer, the Secretary should advise the officer in writing of the proposal and include in that advice:

- (a) a statement setting out the restrictions on further leave (see paragraph 4.4);
- (b) the dates on which the officer's maximum periods of sick leave on full pay and half pay expire;
- (c) any information in the medical reports which could have implications for the level of superannuation benefits payable;
- (d) the suggestion that the officer obtain written advice from AGRBO about superannuation entitlements if this has not already been done;
- (e) advice of the appeal right available to the officer if the Secretary gives the officer notice of retirement without the officer's consent;
- (f) a request that, if the officer consents to being retired, the officer provide that consent in writing together with an acknowledgement that the officer understands that, in consequence of giving his or her consent, the officer will forego the right of appeal against the giving of the notice;
- (g) the earliest and latest dates on which the Secretary can, consistent with paragraphs 4.8, 4.9 and 4.11, retire the officer; and
- (h) if the officer consents to being retired - a request that the officer advise the Secretary of his or her preferred retirement date.

4.6 The officer should be allowed 14 days to respond, although this may be extended by the Secretary if for example it is necessary to obtain further information from AGRBO. The Secretary may then give the officer notice of retirement as outlined below.

Notice of retirement

4.7 Where the Secretary gives an officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act the notice must include or be accompanied by a statement of the reasons for the notice and, unless the officer has given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, advice of the officer's right of appeal.

Date of effect where officer consents to giving of notice

4.8 Under regulation 120C, where an officer has given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, the notice takes effect on any day specified in the notice and agreed between the officer and the Secretary. This date may be before or after the day on which the notice is given to the officer.

4.9 In setting the retirement date the Secretary and the officer should consider the following:

- (a) The Common Rule re Sick Leave provides that officers cannot be retired before expiration of their full pay sick leave credits without their agreement. The retirement date can also be set to allow use of half pay sick leave credits (without conversion), "compensation leave" and war service sick leave if the officer requests it. This is subject to the limits on continuous absence on account of illness set out in Order 5/C/9 of Volume 8 of the Personnel Management Manual.
- (b) Where an officer has been on sick leave without pay for a continuous period immediately preceding the giving of the notice of retirement, the Secretary may, with the agreement of the officer, backdate the retirement. This should be to a date no earlier than the day the

Medical officer found the officer to be permanently unfit for his or her duties, unless the Board approves otherwise.

4.10 If the Secretary and the officer are unable to agree on the date of effect the case should be treated as a non-consent one in accordance with the next paragraph.

Date of effect where officer does not consent to the giving of notice

4.11 Where the officer has not given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, the notice takes effect:

- (a) one month after the notice is given to the officer; or
- (b) on a day calculated in accordance with sub-paragraph 4.9 (a); or
- (c) where the officer appeals against the giving of the notice - the day on which the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn;

whichever occurs last. Retirement can occur no earlier than one month after the notice is given; backdating is thus not possible.

4.12 For the purpose of paragraph 4.11, "one month" has the same meaning as given in paragraph 3.10.

PART 5 - APPEAL RIGHT

5.1 An officer who is given notice under subsection 76W(1) of the Act of reduction in classification or retirement, and who has not given prior written consent to the giving of the notice, may appeal to a Redeployment and Retirement Appeal Committee constituted under subdivision D of Part II of the Merit Protection (Australian Government Employees Act) 1984.

5.2 The ground of appeal is that the reduction in classification or retirement (as appropriate) would be unreasonable.

5.3 An appeal must be in writing and must reach the Director, Merit Protection and Review Agency, within 14 days of the day the officer received the notice. The address for lodgement of appeals with the Agency is: PO Box E440, Canberra, ACT, 2600.

5.4 Officers should be advised to contact the local office of the Merit Protection and Review Agency if they have any questions about the appeal process.

PART 6 - MISCELLANEOUS AND TRANSITIONAL

Handling of medical information etc

6.1 Where under these instructions the Secretary is required to provide or make available medical or other information to an officer, but the Secretary considers that disclosing the information direct to the officer might be prejudicial to the officer's health or well-being, the Secretary may instead provide or make available the information to a medical practitioner nominated by the officer. Where this happens the officer should be informed accordingly.

6.2 Departments should provide the Medical Officer's findings and recommendation direct to the officer unless the Medical Officer advises that they be withheld.

6.3 It is essential that departments make arrangements to ensure the confidentiality of medical reports relating to officers, especially psychiatric reports. There have been occasions in the past where officers have been caused distress, and specialists have withdrawn their services, because of departments' failure to maintain confidentiality of medical information. Departments should ensure that medical reports are housed securely and separately from ordinary personal files, and that access to them is on a strict need-to-know basis.

Unattachment

6.4 Where the Medical Officer has recommended that an officer be redeployed on medical grounds and the Secretary decides that it will be necessary to transfer the officer to a different position, the Secretary may, in accordance with section 76Y of the Act, unattach the officer. The Secretary may also unattach an officer whom the Medical Officer has recommended for invalidity retirement.

Notification of separation

6.5 Departments should complete and return a form PSB14 (Notification of Separation) for each permanent officer who is retired on invalidity grounds.

Gazettal of retirements

6.6 Action for gazette notification of retirements is to be taken by the department on form PSB6. The following words should be inserted in the first column of the form:
"Retirement - section 76W of the Public Service Act - invalidity".

Transitional provisions

6.7 Where as at 19 July 1987 an officer had not been retired under section 19 of the Commonwealth Employees (Redeployment and Retirement) Act 1979 (the CE(RR) Act), any action taken in relation to that officer under the Administrative Procedures notified by the Board under section 8 of the CE(RR) Act on 2 October 1982, or the Administrative Procedures similarly notified on 8 March 1985, shall be regarded as having been taken under these instructions for the purposes of these instructions.

6.8 Where the officer had, at 19 July 1987, been declared under section 9 of the CE(RR) Act as eligible for redeployment but the Board had not issued a certificate under paragraph 11(6)(b) or section 14 of that Act, the Board may, after taking into account any comments by the officer:

- (a) transfer the officer under section 51 of the Act;
- (b) reduce the officer's classification in accordance with subsections 76W(3) and 76T(2) of the Act (if this is done without the officer's consent, he or she may appeal);
- (c) notify the Secretary that the officer's retirement on invalidity grounds is agreed; or
- (d) refer the case to the Secretary with advice on other action the Secretary should take.

Where the Board notifies the Secretary that invalidity retirement is agreed, the Secretary should process the retirement in accordance with Part 4 of these instructions.

6.9 Where as at 19 July 1987 the Board had issued a certificate under paragraph 11(6)(b) or section 14 of the CE(RR) Act, but the Secretary had not signed an instrument of retirement under section 19 of that Act, the retirement must be processed in accordance with paragraphs 4.5 to 4.13 of these instructions. Where however the officer had already been notified and given the opportunity to comment along the lines of paragraphs 4.5 and 4.6 respectively, those parts of the process need not be repeated.

6.10 Officers who, at 19 July 1987, were subject to a redeployment declaration under the CE(RR) Act but had not been retired, should be advised by the Secretary of the provisions which will now apply.

Note: The administrative instructions set out in the Schedule are also being published as part of the Public Service Board's Streamlining circulars. The circulars will contain a series of attachments including suggested forms of notice to officers.

PART 1: PRELIMINARY**Definitions and interpretations****1.1 In these instructions:**

- (a) "the Act" means the Public Service Act 1922;
- (b) "the Award" means the Australian Public Service Redeployment and Retirement (Redundancy) Award 1987;
- (c) "department" means a department of the Service and includes a branch or part of the Service in relation to which a person has, under the Act or another Act, the powers of, or exercisable by, a Secretary as if that branch or part of the Service were a separate department;
- (d) "officer" means an officer employed under the Act other than a Secretary, unattached Secretary or Senior Executive Service officer, and includes a continuing employee as defined in Division 10 of Part III of the Act who has been an employee for more than one year, but does not include an officer whose appointment to the Service on probation has not been confirmed;
- (e) "excess officer" has the same meaning as under section 7 of the Act and clause 5 of the Award;
- (f) "the Board" means the Public Service Board, and a reference to the Board shall be read as including reference to an officer or employee as defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Board;
- (g) a reference to a "Secretary" shall be read as including a reference to an officer or employee as defined in the Act authorised for the purpose by the Secretary;
- (h) "reduce in classification" has the same meaning as in section 76T of the Act and includes, in relation to an employee, the employment of that employee in a lower capacity;
- (i) "staffing structure" means the number and classification of officers and the extent of temporary assistance which a Secretary considers necessary for the efficient and economical operation of a work area.
- (j) "work area" means a Division, Branch or other approved comparable organisational unit within a department;

Circumstances and timing of advice to unions of potential redundancies

1.2 Circumstances which may give rise to potential redundancies can include:

- (a) the abolition or alteration of functions or activities of a particular work area;
- (b) a decision to reduce staff numbers;
- (c) reclassification of positions;
- (d) transfer of functions outside the Service (eg where the staff engaged on the function do not transfer with it and will be unable to be redeployed within their home department);
- (e) the return to duty of an unattached officer;
- (f) changes to technology or work practices;
- (g) unwillingness by officers to transfer with their jobs from one locality to another (however the application of redundancy provisions in situations of this kind requires the Board's approval in each instance).

1.3 The Award requires that the relevant union be notified of potential redundancies and be given all relevant details "at the earliest practicable time" i.e. as soon as it appears to the Secretary that an officer "is likely to be excess to the department's requirements" (clause. 6(a)).

1.4 Officers are "likely to be excess to the department's requirements" when it appears to the Secretary that he or she is unlikely to be able, within a reasonable period of time and consistent with the interests of the efficient administration of the department, to transfer them all to positions of equal classification elsewhere in the department. If the Secretary believes that such transfers are likely within a reasonable period there is no potential redundancy and no further action has to be taken under these instructions.

1.5 The Secretary's judgment as to his or her capacity to transfer potentially excess officers at level will be necessarily broad in cases where it is not known precisely which officers would require transfer.

1.6 Where the potential redundancies flow from a Government decision, unions should be notified as soon as possible after that decision is announced.

1.7 Where the circumstances giving rise to potential redundancies involve changes to the number or classification of officers in a work area, departments should not finalise the new staffing structure until the relevant unions have

had the opportunity to put their views on the proposed new structure.

1.8 Board memorandum 87/004 of 29 April 1987 sets out guidelines for consultation with unions on the introduction of new technology. Consultations specifically on the redundancy aspects are required under the Award if officers are likely to become excess as a result of technological change. Note that officers who are unable to adapt to new technology and cannot be placed at the same level within their department are to be handled under redundancy rather than inefficiency provisions (subsection 7(3)(b) of the Act).

1.9 Procedures relating to geographic relocation of functions and staff are set out in Attachment B. In situations approved by the Board as attracting redundancy conditions, Secretaries should notify unions under the Award of any potential redundancies as soon as possible after the date that is set for officers under notice of relocation to advise the department of their decision on relocation. Any proposal to commence redundancy processes prior to that time must be cleared with the Board's Office in Canberra.

1.10 Departments should communicate the details to unions under sub-clause 6(a) of the Award by facsimile machine where possible; by telex or registered mail otherwise. This is to avoid any subsequent doubt over the date unions receive the details.

Content of advice to Unions

1.11 Sub-clause 6(b) of the Award sets out the nature of the details to be given to unions about potential redundancies. These include the reason for the Secretary's belief that officers are likely to be excess, personal details of the officers likely to be affected, and, where appropriate, the current and proposed staffing structure for the affected area. Personal details for the purposes of sub-clause 6(b) are the officer's name, sex, classification, age, length of service, and employment status (including whether full-time or part-time).

1.12 The advice to unions should also describe any higher duties arrangements applying to the officers affected, including the duration of those arrangements.

Consultation with Board

1.13 The Board's central office should be advised of any potential redundancies as early as possible. This is to enable it, in conjunction with the Secretary, to assess the redeployment prospects for the officers affected. As provided under the Award, voluntary retrenchment can be offered only with the Board's approval after the redeployment prospects have been assessed and discussed with the union.

Advice to officers

1.14 The Secretary should ensure that officers who are affected by potential redundancy are advised of the situation as soon as possible after the union has been notified under sub-clause 6(a) of the Award, and that they are kept informed of developments thereafter.

1.15 While it is important that the officers be kept so informed, Secretaries are generally prevented from actually inviting officers to elect for retrenchment, or from formally advising any individual officer that he or she is excess to the department's requirements, until after the situation has been discussed with the union. This aspect is addressed further in paragraph 2.1.

Discussions with unions

1.16 The Award requires the Secretary to arrange discussions with the relevant union or unions on the potential redundancies. The Board will often need to participate also. To avoid delay in the procedural steps towards the redeployment or retrenchment of staff, it is important that the discussions be scheduled for an early date and not have to be rescheduled because of avoidable mistakes such as the provision of inadequate information to the union.

1.17 The discussions should concentrate on the handling of the redundancies. The purpose is not to debate the merits of Government decisions, or to go over initiatives or measures that have been the subject of consultation in another forum. However, as stated earlier, unions should be given the opportunity to put their views on any proposed changes to the staffing structure of an affected work area before the structure is finalised.

1.18 The Award provides that the discussions with unions shall include discussion of:

- (a) measures that could reduce or remove the incidence of officers becoming excess;
- (b) redeployment prospects for the officers concerned;
- (c) the appropriateness of using voluntary retrenchments; and
- (d) the method of identifying officers as excess, having regard to the efficient and economical working of the department and the relative efficiency of officers (see paragraph 3.4).

1.19 The aim should be where possible to resolve potential redundancy situations without the need for retrenchment and officers affected by potential redundancy should where appropriate be reassured of this intention. However, it is important that officers and unions be given

realistic and honest advice about the redeployment prospects for the affected officers. If there are doubts about these prospects, open ended commitments to "no retrenchments" or "no enforced retrenchments" would clearly be inappropriate. Similarly, officers should not be given a commitment that there will be "no compulsory redeployment" if that is likely to be required to achieve their placement.

Filling of vacancies

1.20 From the time it becomes apparent that there are likely to be excess officers, the Secretary should take steps to ensure that, as vacancies arise in non-affected work areas, they are filled by the transfer of suitable potentially excess officers from affected areas. The vacancies in question will be at the level of the officers concerned (although some officers may wish to accept a position at a lower level). Officers should be transferred in these circumstances where they would be able to perform the duties of the vacant position efficiently, either immediately or within a reasonable period.

1.21 Where, having obtained the Board's approval, the Secretary proposes to invite officers to take voluntary retrenchment, and there is a limited number of vacancies within the department at the officers' level, the Secretary should first attempt to fill these on a voluntary basis from amongst the group of officers in question. If time permits, volunteers for transfer should be called for before volunteers for retrenchment are sought; otherwise, they should be called for simultaneously.

1.22 The officers transferred to the vacancies will preferably be those who do not want voluntary retrenchment. If however an insufficient number of suitable officers volunteers for transfer, some officers who might have preferred retrenchment may be transferred to the unfilled vacancies. The Secretary should always reserve the right to do this.

PART 2: VOLUNTARY RETRENCHMENT

2.1 After the discussions with the unions, and where the Board has given its approval, the Secretary may invite officers to submit an election to be retrenched. Under the Award, this invitation can be issued:

- (a) no earlier than a month after the union received advice of the situation, unless a shorter period is agreed with the union; and
- (b) not before the discussions with the union have been completed, unless the Board approves otherwise (cl. 6(e)).

Offer of voluntary retrenchment

2.2 The invitation to submit elections to be retrenched will be given to such individual officers or groups of officers as are approved by the Board. Within a department, elections will usually be invited from affected work areas only, in the first instance. The question of whether some or all of the officers in an affected work area (or officers outside that area) are invited to submit elections will depend on factors such as the size of the redundancy problem and on whether, for operational reasons, the Secretary decides in advance that particular officers will not be invited to submit elections for retrenchment.

2.3 Where it is intended that the offer of voluntary retrenchment be given widely, e.g. to all officers in a particular establishment, the Board's approval to the giving of the offer may be provisional, with a final decision on individual cases being deferred until after elections have been made.

Election period

2.4 The Award provides that officers who have been invited to submit an election to be retrenched shall have one month to advise the Secretary of their election. They should be encouraged to indicate their intentions (without commitment) midway through this period.

2.5 Although the actual election may be submitted before the end of the month, no election should be approved until the month is up. This is to ensure that approvals are seen to be given fairly and with regard to operational requirements - not on the basis of "first come, first served" - and to guard against officers making hasty, uninformed decisions on their future.

Information to officers

2.6 To allow officers to make informed decisions on whether to submit elections to be retrenched, they must have access to advice on:

- (a) the sums of money they would receive by way of severance pay, pay in lieu of notice, and paid up leave credits;
- (b) the amount of their accumulated superannuation contributions;
- (c) the options open to them concerning superannuation benefits; and
- (d) the taxation rules applicable to the various payments.

It will be necessary for departments to make the earliest possible contact with the Australian Government Retirement Benefits Office on the superannuation matters. Departments are asked to do this on a co-ordinated basis through the Board's office. Pending circulation of an advice on taxation of the various benefits, assistance should be sought from the nearest branch of the Australian Taxation Office as necessary.

2.7 In addition:

- (a) general financial counselling for groups of officers should be arranged through a bank or other institution with appropriate counselling expertise;
- (b) officers should have access to advice on the employment outlook outside the Service for people in their occupation; and
- (c) arrangements should be made for the Commonwealth Employment Service to conduct placement interviews as soon as possible after elections for retrenchment are approved.

2.8 It is important that the notice or letter inviting officers to submit an election to be retrenched indicate the processes that will be followed should an insufficient number of officers volunteer (or, as the case may be, the recipients themselves not volunteer), and point out that the Secretary has the right to refuse any election to be retrenched. The notice or letter should, where appropriate, also canvass the officers for volunteers for transfer (see paragraphs 1.21 and 1.22).

Consideration of elections to be retrenched

2.9 It is essential that decisions to approve or refuse elections to be retrenched be made as quickly as possible after the elections close.

2.10 The Secretary has the right to refuse any election by an officer to be retrenched. This would normally be for operational reasons.

2.11 In considering elections for voluntary retrenchment, the Secretary should bear in mind the provisions of clause 7(i) of the Award, which would prevent the involuntary retrenchment of officers if there are other officers engaged in the same work at the same level and in the same location who have been refused voluntary retrenchment and would still be prepared to accept it.

2.12 If more officers submit elections than the number it is necessary to retrench, selections should be made on the basis of operational requirements. In cases where selections have to be made between officers of the same classification in the same work area, the more efficient officer or officers should be selected for retention in employment.

2.13 If an insufficient number of officers from affected work areas volunteers, the Secretary should initiate formal procedures of identification etc in relation to the remaining officers in the area, in accordance with paragraph 3.4 of these instructions.

2.14 Alternatively the Secretary may, with the Board's approval, invite officers from elsewhere in the department to submit an election to be retrenched. Any such invitation will need to be targetted carefully and, subject in all cases to operational requirements, approval for retrenchment must be given only if a potentially excess officer who could efficiently perform the duties of the electing officer's position can be transferred to the position.

Notice of retirement

2.15 When an election to be retrenched is approved, for the retrenchment to take effect the Secretary must give the officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act. Before the notice is given, the officer's consent in writing to the giving of the notice must be obtained, and the date of effect for the notice should be settled.

2.16 Under the Award, the officer's retirement takes effect 28 days after the notice is given to the officer, or on such earlier date within the 28 day period as either is directed by the Secretary or is requested by the officer (cl. 7(d) and (e)). If the officer chooses a date earlier than that specified by the Secretary, the officer should be retired on the date chosen by the officer.

2.17 Where voluntary retrenchment is approved in principle, but for operational reasons it is necessary to retain the services of the officer for a short period before retrenchment occurs, the Secretary should defer giving any notice to the officer until the appropriate time. If in the meantime circumstances change and it becomes possible to keep the officer at his or her level the notice should not be given.

Pay in lieu of notice

2.18 Where the 28 day notice period is foreshortened, by either the Secretary or the officer, the officer is entitled to a lump sum payment in lieu of salary for the unexpired portion of the notice period (cl. 7(e)).

2.19 To calculate any payment in lieu of notice or part payment thereof, the salary an officer would have received had he or she been on recreation leave during the period of notice foregone, excluding leave loading, should be used (cl. 7(g)).

Severance payment

2.20 Officers who are voluntarily retrenched are entitled to a severance payment of two weeks' salary for each complete year of Commonwealth service, plus a pro rata payment for complete months of service since the last completed year of service (cl. 7(f)).

2.21 The minimum amount of severance pay is four weeks' salary and the maximum amount 48 weeks' salary. However an officer cannot receive more in a severance payment than the salary the officer would have received had he or she worked to the applicable maximum retiring age.

2.22 "Salary" for severance pay purposes can include higher duties allowances and shift penalty payments, subject to eligibility requirements as set out in sub-clause 7(h) of the award. The inclusion of other allowances in the nature of salary is at the Board's discretion.

2.23 "Commonwealth service" for this purpose includes service with any Commonwealth agency, or service with the Defence forces, which is recognised for long service leave purposes. However for the definition of continuous service to be satisfied, there must have been no break between the various periods of employment. Also, any period of service which ceased in any of the following ways is not to be counted: retrenchment; retirement on grounds of invalidity, inefficiency or loss of qualifications; forfeiture of office; dismissal as a result of disciplinary action; termination of probationary appointment for reasons of unsatisfactory service; and voluntary retirement at or above the minimum retiring age applicable to the officer.

2.24 Absences during a period of eligible service which do not count as service for long service leave purposes also do not count for severance pay purposes.

Other benefits on voluntary retrenchment

2.25 In addition to severance pay, officers who are superannuation contributors have options in accordance with Part V of the Superannuation Act 1976. Also, for all officers who are retrenched the Long Service Leave (Commonwealth Employees) Act 1976 provides payment in lieu of accrued long service leave where qualifying service for this purpose (see Order 5/G/4 in Volume 8 of the Personnel Management Manual) is more than 10 years, and payment on a pro rata basis where service is more than one year but less than 10. The standard provisions for payment in lieu of recreation leave including leave bonus on separation from Public Service employment also apply.

Integrity of the process

2.26 As voluntary retrenchment can provide substantial monetary benefits to officers, the processes employed in any voluntary retrenchment exercise must be above reproach.

Decisions on elections to be retrenched must be made having regard only to operational requirements and redeployment considerations.

2.27 To guard against abuse of voluntary retrenchment Secretaries should ensure that any authorisation to accept elections on the Secretary's behalf is given to senior officers only, and that they account to the Secretary for their decisions.

2.28 When the voluntary retrenchment process is completed, as a general rule the positions occupied by the officers at the date of retrenchment should be withdrawn or abolished and not be re-established or filled without the express approval of an appropriate senior officer. Also where the retrenchments were affected in order to reduce staff numbers to a particular level, the staff numbers should be carefully monitored for penetration of the approved staffing level.

Rehiring of retrenched officers

2.29 Staff who are retrenched are not disbarred from returning to the Service via the normal competitive recruitment processes. However, as retrenchment presupposes a poor redeployment outlook both at the time of retrenchment and in the foreseeable future, the usual expectation is that a person who has been retrenched from the Service will not be rehired.

2.30 Rehiring after voluntary retrenchment could raise serious questions about the integrity of the process used. If, therefore, a department is considering appointing, or engaging in temporary employment, a person who had been voluntarily retrenched from the same department within the previous 12 months, this should be brought to the attention of an appropriate senior officer so that, if appropriate, the circumstances of the retrenchment are inquired into. If the person had been voluntarily retrenched from a different department the matter should be referred to the Board's Regional Director.

2.31 Officers who are under consideration for voluntary retrenchment should have their attention drawn to subsection 3(3) of the Superannuation Act, in accordance with which superannuation benefits may be recovered by the Commissioner for Superannuation in the event of a return to Commonwealth employment. Further information on this aspect is provided in the section on continuity of service for superannuation purposes in Part 3 of the Instructions in the Superannuation Manual.

2.32 As there are special rates of taxation for bona fide redundancy payments, staff who are under consideration for voluntary retrenchment should also be advised to discuss with the Australian Taxation Office the possible implications of a return to employment with the Australian Public Service. (As redundancies arise, advice should be

sought from the Australian Taxation Office on this and other taxation aspects, pending circulation of detailed information on these matters).

Advice to Board

2.33 Departments are asked to provide advice in accordance with Attachment E to the Board's central office when an excess staff situation has reached the point that any voluntary retrenchments have been finalised and any staff who have declined or not been offered voluntary retrenchment have been formally advised that they are excess to departmental requirements.

PART 3: REDEPLOYMENT AND RETIREMENT OF EXCESS OFFICERS (WHERE OFFICERS NOT VOLUNTARILY RETRENCHED UNDER PART 2.)

Need to act quickly

3.1 It is essential that officers who declined an opportunity to take voluntary retrenchment, or were not offered the opportunity in the first place, and are then identified as excess to the department's requirements, be advised of their excess status as quickly as possible.

3.2 This is particularly important in the case of officers who have declined voluntary retrenchment. Where these officers are then identified as excess to the department's requirements they are guaranteed retention in employment for 7 or 13 months (depending on age and length of service) starting from the day one month after elections for voluntary retrenchment were invited. To ensure they know they must seek other work and to give them the maximum time in which to do this, there must be as little delay as possible between the day elections close and the day they receive formal advice that they are excess.

Changes to staffing structure - selection of staff for retention

3.3 Where a redundancy situation involves changes to the staffing structure of a work area the Secretary should finalise the new structure after discussions with the unions and, if voluntary retrenchments have been invited and approved, after making any appropriate adjustments in the light of those approvals.

3.4 Having finalised the new structure for the work area, the Secretary should apply the following criteria in staffing it, unless other criteria are agreed to by the Board:

- (a) where the duties of a position are to remain substantially unchanged, the position should be filled by the substantive occupant in the old structure, except where the circumstances in (b) apply;

- (b) where two or more positions with identical duties previously existed, the duties are to remain substantially the same but fewer positions now exist, and the number of substantive occupants in the old structure exceeds the number of positions now available, the positions should be filled in the order of the relative efficiency of those substantive occupants;
- (c) in any other case, where the number of officers at a particular classification exceeds the number required in the new structure, the more or most efficient officers at that classification should be retained.

3.5 Officers who will be assessed for retention in terms of their relative efficiency should be given the opportunity to put their claims in writing to the Secretary. A reasonable period should be allowed for this.

Identification as excess where transfer not available

3.6 The Secretary should take all reasonable steps, consistent with the efficient administration of the department, to transfer any officer who

- (a) after the process outlined in paragraph 3.4, is not retained in the new structure, or
- (b) as a result of any circumstances, including those outlined in paragraph 1.2, is potentially excess to requirements,

to a vacant position of equal classification elsewhere in the department. If all the officers can be so transferred there is no redundancy and no further action is required under these procedures.

3.7 If the Secretary is able to transfer some but not all of the officers and it is necessary to choose between officers for transfer, the more or most efficient officers should be selected for transfer.

3.8 An officer who is not transferred on the above basis, and whom the Secretary expects to be unable so to transfer within a reasonable period, is an excess officer.

Formal advice of excess status

3.9 When an officer becomes excess the Secretary must advise the officer in writing of that fact. Under sub-clause 7(c) of the Award, this advice can be given no earlier than one month after the day the advice of the potential redundancies was given to the relevant union, unless a lesser period is agreed between the Secretary and the union.

3.10 A copy of the advice, together with personal details of the officer including an outline of the officer's experience and qualifications, should be sent to the Board's Regional Director.

Retention period for excess officers

3.11 The Award provides that an excess officer shall not be retired without his or her consent until the following retention periods have elapsed:

- (a) in the case of an officer who has 20 or more years of service or who is over 45 years of age - 13 months;
- (b) in the case of other officers - 7 months.

"Service" means continuous service as defined in paragraph 2.23 of these instructions.

3.12 The retention period commences on:

- (a) the day an officer is advised in writing by the Secretary that he or she is an excess officer; or
- (b) in the case of an officer who was invited to submit an election to be retrenched and declined to do so - one month after the day on which elections were invited,

whichever is the earlier (cl. 8(c)).

3.13 In accordance with clause 12 of the Award, the retention period is extended by certificated sick leave. It may also be extended by maternity leave, but not by any recreation leave or long service leave that is taken, unless in the view of the Secretary there were compelling reasons for such leave to be taken and the officer's absence on leave has affected his or her efforts at redeployment.

3.14 During the retention period officers are eligible for leave and expenses to seek employment, in accordance with clause 10 of the Award. They continue to accrue credits of sick leave, recreation leave and long service leave. If redeployed to a different locality they may be entitled to the costs of moving household (cl. 11).

Foreshortening of retention period - excess continuing employees

3.15 In accordance with sub-clause 8(i) of the Award, the retention period of an excess continuing employee may be foreshortened by the Secretary after consulting the Board and the union if there is insufficient productive work for the employee during the retention period.

3.16 In that event the excess employee is, on retrenchment, eligible to receive income maintenance

payments for the balance of what would have been the retention period, calculated in accordance with clause 12 of the Award.

3.17 The procedures for retirement set out in paragraphs 3.42 to 3.46 of these instructions must be followed in relation to any retrenchment of continuing employees effected in accordance with the foreshortening provisions of the Award.

3.18 Secretaries should raise with the Board at an early stage any situation where it will be difficult to provide an excess officer or employee with gainful employment. In some cases it may be possible for the staff to be temporarily transferred to another department.

Redeployment of excess staff

3.19 During the retention period the Secretary must continue to take all reasonable steps, consistent with the interests of the efficient administration of the department, to transfer excess officers to suitable vacancies of equal classification within the department.

3.20 The Board is empowered under section 51 of the Act to transfer officers from one department to another at their level where the Board is satisfied that this is necessary in the interests of the efficient administration of the Service. This power is available to redeploy excess officers in appropriate cases.

3.21 Excess officers should apply for suitable advertised vacancies. They should let the Board's Regional Office know of any applications for transfer to vacancies at or below their level.

3.22 Departments should consider an excess officer in isolation from and not in competition with other applicants for a vacancy to which the excess officer seeks transfer. The Board may participate in the selection process.

3.23 Subject to the provisions of section 51, the Board would expect to transfer an excess officer to a position at or below the officer's level in another department where the officer is expected to be able to perform the duties of the position efficiently, either immediately or within a reasonable period, unless, in exceptional circumstances, the department is able to demonstrate to the Board that it is essential the position in question be filled by the most efficient applicant.

3.24 It is open to Secretaries to arrange for the retraining of excess officers where

- (a) retention in employment is unlikely to be possible without it;

- (b) it would be in the interests of the efficient administration of the department to retrain the officer; (departments should consult the Board's Regional Director on the appropriateness of any retraining options which could fit the officer for placement elsewhere); and
- (c) it would lead to successful placement within the retention period applying to the officer.

3.25 Retraining will usually take the form of on-the-job training but could include, in some cases, the undertaking of a short course to provide new skills or update existing ones. It should be tailored closely to the employment realities for the officer.

3.26 In some cases it may be appropriate to provide assistance to excess officers to obtain employment outside the Service. This might be explored with the Commonwealth Employment Service, Professional Employment Service or private agencies as appropriate, as cases arise.

Reduction in classification

3.27 In cases where transfer at level is unlikely to occur, for example because of the location or specialisation of the excess officer concerned, an early attempt should be made to find a position for the officer at a lower level.

3.28 Any reduction in classification must be to duties for which the officer is qualified, which he or she could perform efficiently either immediately or within a reasonable period, and which the officer could reasonably be required to perform. In relation to permanent staff, any reduction by the Secretary must be to a vacant position; reduction with unattached status is not open to the Secretary.

3.29 The Board is also able to reduce an excess officer's classification.

Reduction with consent

3.30 Reduction in classification with the consent of the officer can occur at any time during the retention period. This can occur under section 50 of the Act or through the Secretary giving notice under subsection 76W(1) of the Act. The officer's prior written consent to the reduction should be obtained. Before an officer gives consent to reduction, he or she should be advised of the effect that this will have on particular conditions of service such as payment in lieu of leave credits (in the event of retirement or resignation) and superannuation contributions/benefits.

3.31 The period of notice of reduction under subsection 76W(1) must be no less than one month. Provided that requirement is met, a notice of reduction under subsection 76W(1) will take effect on a date specified in the notice

and agreed between the Secretary and the officer. If the Secretary and the officer do not agree in advance on the date of effect, the case should be treated as a non-consent one, in accordance with paragraphs 3.32 to 3.34.

Reduction without consent

3.32 Any proposal to reduce an excess officer in classification without the consent of the officer must be cleared by the Board's Regional Director. The effect of subsection 76W(2) of the Act is that reduction without consent can occur only where:

- (a) the Secretary has been unable to find suitable alternative employment for the excess officer at the officer's level in the Secretary's department, and
- (b) the Board is satisfied that it would not be in the interests of the efficient administration of the Service to transfer the officer at level to another department.

3.33 When these requirements are fulfilled, the Secretary should give the officer notice of reduction under subsection 76W(1) of the Act. The notice must include or be accompanied by a statement of the reasons for the notice and of the officer's right of appeal.

3.34 Where an officer has not given prior written consent to the giving of notice of reduction in classification, the notice takes effect:

- (a) one month after the day the notice is given to the officer;
- (b) if the Secretary specifies a day that is later than (a) - on that day; or
- (c) if the officer appeals, the day on which the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn;

whichever occurs last.

Income maintenance following reduction

3.35 An officer who is reduced in classification during the retention period is entitled to receive income maintenance payments for the balance of what would have been the retention period. This applies whether the reduction is voluntary or involuntary and whether it is effected by the Secretary or the Board. Income maintenance payments are the amount of money payable from time to time to bring the officer's new salary up to the salary being received on the day before reduction took effect. Income maintenance is not updated, eg for salary increases.

3.36 Income maintenance payments should be calculated in accordance with clause 9 of the Award.

Retrenchment

3.37 Note: officers who are retrenched in accordance with the succeeding paragraphs of this Part are entitled on retrenchment to receive the same superannuation and leave payments as are payable on voluntary retrenchment. However, unless otherwise indicated, they are not eligible to receive a severance payment, pay in lieu of notice, or income maintenance payments.

Retrenchment at officer's request during retention period

3.38 If during a retention period an officer requests to be retrenched, the Secretary may, with the approval of the Board, retrench the officer. The decision on any such request will depend on the officer's redeployment prospects and the reasons for the officer's request (eg to take up work outside the Service).

3.39 The retrenchment will usually not attract a severance payment; and income maintenance will not be payable in any circumstances. If however the officer had not been invited to elect to be retrenched with the severance payment under clause 7 of the Award, or had made such an election but the Secretary had refused it, by agreement between the Board and the Secretary the officer may be retrenched with the severance payment.

3.40 To effect the retrenchment the Secretary must give the officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act, and obtain the officer's written consent beforehand. The notice takes effect in accordance with paragraph 3.48. The officer is not able to receive pay in lieu of notice.

Retrenchment at end of notice period

3.41 When the Secretary concludes that an excess officer is unlikely to be redeployed by the end of the retention period, the Secretary should, subject to this Part, give the officer notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act. The notice should be given no later than one month before the scheduled end of the retention period. If redeployment arrangements have been made before the end of the retention period but the officer will not actually be redeployed until after that period ends, notice of retirement should not, of course, be given.

3.42 However where, because of factors such as the location, specialisation, employment status or level of efficiency of an excess officer, it is appropriate to do so, the notice should be given earlier than a month before the end of the retention period. Where notice is given at an earlier stage, this should also allow time for any appeal to be determined before the retention period ends.

3.43 Before the Secretary gives notice of retirement the following points need to be taken into account:

- (a) If the officer had not been given the opportunity under clause 7 of the award to elect to be retrenched with the severance payment or had made such an election and the Secretary had refused it, the officer must now be given the opportunity to take voluntary retrenchment with the severance payment and, if desired, pay in lieu of notice. (However the Secretary must first obtain the Board's approval to the offer of voluntary retrenchment.)

Only if the officer declines that offer can the Secretary give the officer notice leading to involuntary retrenchment. If the officer does elect to be retrenched with clause 7 benefits, the retrenchment should be processed in accordance with paragraphs 2.15 to 2.25.

- (b) An officer who had been given the opportunity under clause 7 to elect to be retrenched with the relevant benefits but had declined to do so, cannot now be retrenched, voluntarily or otherwise, with those benefits. Subject to paragraph 3.45, there is no bar to the Secretary giving the officer notice leading to involuntary retrenchment.

3.44 Even where an officer consents to being retrenched the Secretary should check with the Board's Regional Director as to the redeployment prospects for the officer outside the department, before giving any notice of retirement.

3.45 Any proposal to give notice of retirement without the prior written consent of an the officer must be cleared by the Board's Regional Director. The effect of subsection 76W(2) of the Act and sub-clause 8(d) of the Award is that retirement without consent can occur only where:

- (a) the Secretary has been unable to find alternative suitable employment for the excess officer in the Secretary's department, and
- (b) the Board is satisfied that it would not be in the interests of the efficient administration of the Service to transfer the officer under section 51 of the Act to another department.

3.46 Where the Secretary gives notice of retirement without the prior written consent of the officer the notice must include or be accompanied by a statement of the reasons for the decision and of the officer's right of appeal.

Notice of retirement - date of effect

3.47 A notice of retirement under subsection 76W(1) of the Act without the prior written consent of the officer takes effect:

(a) in the case of an excess continuing employee who is retired in accordance with sub-clause 8(i) of the Award:

(i) one month after the notice is given to the employee, or

(ii) if the employee appeals - the day on which the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn

whichever is the later;

(b) in the case of other excess officers (including continuing employees who are not retired in accordance with sub-clause 8(i) of the award):

(i) one month after the day the notice is given to the officer;

(ii) at the end of the retention period applying to the officer, or

(iii) if the officer appeals - the day on which the appeal is disallowed or withdrawn;

whichever occurs last.

3.48 A notice of retirement given under subsection 76W(1) of the Act in accordance with sub-clause 8(i) of the Award with the prior written consent of the officer takes effect

(a) 28 days after the notice is given to the officer, or

(b) on such earlier date within the 28 day period as is directed by the Secretary or requested by the officer.

If the officer chooses a date earlier than that preferred by the Secretary, the officer should be retired on the date chosen by the officer.

3.49 A notice of retirement given during the retention period at the request of, and with the prior written consent of, an officer (paragraphs 3.38 to 3.40 refer) takes effect

(a) on any day specified in the notice and agreed between the Secretary and the officer (this should be no later than a month after the notice is issued); or

(b) at the end of the retention period,

whichever is the earlier.

3.50 In relation to periods of notice under this Part, "one month" means a period commencing at the beginning of a day and ending immediately before the beginning of the corresponding day of the next month or, if there is no corresponding day, ending at the expiration of the next month. For example, if a notice is given on 20 August the one month will end at the expiration of 19 September.

Preference to union members

3.51 Sub-clause 8(j) provides preference in retention in employment to union members, when notice of retirement is being given. It applies to officers who have not consented to the giving of the notice of retirement. It would operate only in the event that a suitable vacancy occurred within the department at the level and in the area or locality of those officers and it was not possible to select between them on the basis of relative efficiency.

Appeal rights

3.52 An officer who is given notice under subsection 76W of the Act of reduction in classification or retirement and who has not given prior written consent to the giving of the notice may appeal under section 76Z of the Act to a Redeployment and Retirement Appeal Committee.

3.53 An appeal must be in writing and must reach the Director, Merit Protection and Review Agency within 14 days of the day the officer received the notice. The address for lodgement of appeals is:

3.54 The ground of appeal is that the reduction or retirement (as appropriate) would be unreasonable.

3.55 Officers should be advised to contact the local office of Merit Protection and Review Agency if they have any questions about the appeal process.

3.56 Apart from the right of appeal against involuntary reduction in classification or retirement, there is also provision for appeals under clause 13 of the Award in relation to decisions on benefits under clauses 9 to 12 inclusive of the Award.

PART 4: TRANSITIONAL PROVISIONS AND MISCELLANEOUS

4.1 Where as at 19 July 1987 an officer had not been retired under section 19 of the Commonwealth Employees (Redeployment and Retirement) Act 1979 (the "CE(RR) Act"), any action taken in relation to that officer under the Administrative Procedures notified by the Board under section 8 of the CE(RR) Act on 2 October 1982, or the Administrative Procedures similarly notified on 8 March 1985, shall be regarded as having been taken under these instructions for the purposes of these instructions.

4.2 As the CE(RR) Act is repealed on 20 July 1987, declarations of eligibility for redeployment made under section 9 of that Act and in force immediately before 20 July 1987 are, as of that date, no longer in force. The officers who were subject to those declarations will now be subject to the provisions of Division 8C of the Public Service Act, Regulations 120C and 120D, and these instructions, as set out below.

4.3 Where the officer had, at 19 July 1987, been declared under section 9 of the CE(RR) Act as eligible for redeployment but the Board had not issued a certificate under paragraph 11(6)(b) of that Act, the Board may, in accordance with the Public Service Act and the Award and after taking into account any comments by the officer,

- (a) transfer the officer under section 51 of the Public Service Act;
- (b) in accordance with subsections 76W(3) and 76T(2) of the Act, reduce the officer's classification; or
- (c) refer the case to the Secretary with advice or directions as to the action the Secretary should take.

The officer can be retired only in accordance with section 76W of the Act.

4.4 Where as at 19 July 1987 the Board had issued a certificate under paragraph 11(6)(b) of the CE(RR) Act, but the Secretary had not signed an instrument of retirement under section 19 of that Act, the officer can be retired only under section 76W of the Public Service Act. If the officer does not give prior written consent to the giving of notice of retirement by the Secretary, the Secretary must, in accordance with subsection 76W(2), obtain the Board's concurrence to the giving of the notice.

4.5 Clause 16 of the Award sets out transitional provisions on matters previously covered by the CE(RR) Act Award 1985 and the Redundancy Provisions Australian

Government Employment Award 1986 (the "RPAGE" Award). The more important of the Award's transitional provisions are that

- (a) action by way of advice to and consultation with unions under the former awards is taken to have occurred under the new award and thus need not be re-commenced;
- (b) periods of notice of redundancy under the former awards translate into retention periods under the new award; however
 - (i) the retention period is taken to have commenced at the beginning of the period of notice of redundancy, and
 - (ii) excess continuing employees, who were subject to notice of redundancy of one month, do not become entitled to retention for the longer periods provided under the new award;
- (c) an officer or employee who declined an offer of voluntary retrenchment with a severance payment negotiated under the substitution clause of a former award is not entitled to the severance payment under the new award, and may be retired involuntarily without that payment at the end of the retention period.

4.6 Officers who had been declared under section 9 of the CE(RR) Act as eligible for redeployment prior to 20 July 1987 and who were covered by the CE(RR) Act Award 1985 i.e. members of ACOA and APSA, would have been subject to notice of redundancy by virtue of clause 7 of the CE(RR) Act Award. Declared officers who were not subject to the CE(RR) Act Award and who had not been given notice by the Board under clause 7 of the Redundancy Provisions Australian Government Employment Award 1986, should now be advised by the Secretary that they are excess to requirements; they are entitled to be retained for 7 or 13 months after being so advised.

Miscellaneous Provisions

4.7 Departments should complete and return a Form PSB 14 (notification of separation) for each permanent officer who is retired. The second item on the form should read: "Retirement - section 76W, Public Service Act - excess officer."

4.8. Action for Gazette notification of retirements of permanent officers is to be taken by departments on the form PSB 6. The following words should be inserted in the first column of the form : " Retirement - section 76W, Public Service Act - excess officer."
