Except where a standard form is used, all notices for publication must have a covering instruction setting out requirements. A typewritten original or good copies are to be provided, wherever possible double-spaced, with a margin surrounding the typewritten matter. Copy is to be confined to one side of the paper, sheets are to be of uniform size (preferably A4), numbered consecutively and fastened securely together. Dates, proper names and signatures particularly are to be shown clearly.

Copy will be returned unpublished if not submitted in accordance with these requirements.

CLOSING TIMES. Notices for publication should be lodged at AGPS, Government Printing Office Building, unless otherwise specified, by the following times (except at holiday periods for which special advice of earlier closing times will be given).

PRIVATE NOTICES

OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE

Public Service issues contain notices concerning administrative matters, including examinations, vacancies, transfers and promotions within the Australian Public Service and the Services of the Australian Postal Commission, Australian Telecommunications Commission, Commonwealth Teaching Service and Defence Force appointments etc. These issues are published weekly at 10.30 a.m. on Thursday, and sold at \$7.95 each plus postage or on subscription of \$350.00 (50 issues), \$175.00 (25 issues) or \$84.00 (12 issues).

Business issues, published each Tuesday, containing Notices under the Co-operative Companies and Securities Scheme, Bankruptcy Act and Private Notices and sold at \$3.95 each or on subscription of \$180.00 (50 issues), \$90.00 (25 issues) or \$44.00 (12 issues).

Special issues include notices which require urgent publication. All costs associated with producing Specials will be borne by the responsible department or authority. A limited number of *Special Gazettes* will be made available for sale from the Commonwealth Government Bookshop, Canberra, on the day of publication. General distribution of these notices will be by their inclusion in the next published issue of the *Government Notices Gazette* or *Business Gazette* as well as in the next published issue of the series of the *Gazette* in which the notice would normally have been published.

Tariff concessions issues contain notices of tariff concessions proposed, granted or revoked in accordance with the provisions of Part XVA of the *Customs Act 1901*. These

issues are published each Wednesday and are sold at \$1.95 plus postage or on subscription only at \$80.00 for 50 issues including surface postage.

Periodic issues contain lengthy notices of a non-urgent nature, including the following: certificates of Australian citizenship; registered tax agents; authorised celebrants; unclaimed deposits and moneys; Australian Public Service conditions of entry and advancement; appointments to the Australian Public Service; holders of import licences and tariff quotas. Issues are made at irregular intervals as required, at individual prices according to size. Advice of availability is given in the Government Notices, Business and Public Service issues immediately following the day of publication. Periodic issues are not available on subscription, but standing orders are accepted for all selected issues.

Purchasing and Disposals issues of the *Gazette* provide information on Commonwealth purchases and disposals and other matters of general interest to persons buying from or selling to the Commonwealth. These issues are published each Wednesday and sold at \$2.95 plus postage or on subscription of \$140.00 including postage for 50 issues.

Index issues contain references to entries in the Government Notices issues and entries in the Orders in Council, Notices under the Superannuation Act, Notices under the Public Service Act, and Determinations under the Public Service Act sections of the Public Service issues. PROHIBITION OF TAKING PRAWNS OFF NORTH-WESTERN AUSTRALIA

I, PETER FREDERICK MORRIS, the Minister of State for Resources—

- (a) pursuant to paragraph 8 (1) (c) of the *Fisheries Act 1952*, hereby prohibit the taking of decapod crustacea of the order Penaeidae (commonly known as prawns) by otter trawling or beam trawling in the area of proclaimed waters contained within the area bounded by a line:
- (i) commencing at the point of Latitude 17°44'13" South, Longitude 120° East;
 - (ii) running thence north-easterly to the point of Latitude 17°30' South, Longitude 120°30' East;
 - (iv) thence north-easterly to the point of Latitude 15° South, Longitude 122° East;
 - (v) thence north-easterly to the point of Latitude 13°50'06.4" South, Longitude 123°45' East;
 - (vi) thence south along the meridian of Longitude 123°45' East, to its intersection with the north-western shore of Australia;

(vii) thence southerly along that shore to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 120° East;

(viii) thence north along that meridian to the point of commencement;

- (b) pursuant to sub-section 8 (4D) of the *Fisheries Act 1952*, declare that the activities prohibited by paragraph (a) are activities prohibited by paragraph (a) are activities in respect of which an endorsement may be made under subsection 9 (4).

SCHEDULE

Interpretation

1. In this Schedule:

'Inspector' means an Inspector appointed under sub-section 125 (2) of the Act.

'The Act' means *Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1904*.

'The Department' means the Department of Industrial Relations.

'The Minister' means the Minister of State for Industrial Relations.

'The regulations' means the Conciliation and Arbitration Regulations.

POWERS AND DUTIES

2. The powers of Inspectors shall be as specified under the Act.

3. The duties of Inspectors shall be as set out in sub-paragraphs (i) to (v) hereunder:

- (i) to make inspections, examinations, investigations and inquiries and to interview persons:
- (a) to determine whether the Act, the regulations and any award or order made under the Act are being observed and if not in what respect they are not being observed; and
- (b) where an offence against the Act is suspected;
- (ii) to advise employers and employees as to their rights and obligations under the Act, the regulations, awards and orders, and as to the manner in which the Act, the regulations, awards and orders should be observed;
- (iii) to give a person who is required, and who has failed, to observe the Act or the regulations, or an award or order made under the Act, a notice requiring them to make good the default specified in the notice within such time as is fixed by the notice and to notify the Inspector who has given the notice within such time as is fixed by the notice of the action taken to comply with the notice;
- (iv) to furnish to the Secretary of the Department, or to any officer of the Department designated for that purpose by the Secretary, reports on the results of such inspections, examinations, investigations, inquiries, advice and notices; and
- (v) to institute, conduct, assist in the conduct of, and give evidence in relation to, any proceedings or prosecutions for breach or non-observance of the Act or the regulations or an award or order made under

the Act, which may be authorised by the Minister or by any officer of the Department designated for that purpose by the Secretary.

4. In the exercise and performance of their powers and duties, Inspectors are subject to direction by the Secretary and such other officers of the Department as may be designated by the Secretary.

EXERCISE AND PERFORMANCE OF POWERS AND DUTIES

Introduction

5. The Arbitration Inspectorate is established within the Department to secure the observance of relevant legal requirements and to assist employers and employees to understand and to give effect to their rights, duties or obligations in this respect. The principal function of the Arbitration Inspectorate is to ensure that federal awards are being observed.

6. In pursuing these functions, Inspectors and other officers of the Department will seek to secure observance of relevant legal requirements by voluntary means. This should be possible in the majority of circumstances. However, occasions will arise where because offences or breaches are of such a serious nature or because of failure to comply voluntarily following the detection of offences or breaches, prosecution action is warranted.

7. The manner in which Inspectors and other nominated officers of the Department are to exercise and perform their functions in these different circumstances is set out hereunder.

Award Breaches by Employers

8. The Inspector is to normally require a breach to be rectified within 21 days of its notification by the Inspector to the employer. As appropriate, a longer period may be allowed for rectifying breaches requiring installation of equipment or physical alteration in a place of employment or for breaches involving complex or lengthy calculations of monetary amounts. Other cases which may require an extension of this period are to be referred to the Chief Inspector for approval.

9. Where an employer fails to rectify a breach of an award adequately within the stipulated time without reasonable cause or explanation, the Inspector should recommend that proceedings under section 119 of the Act be instituted. This recommendation will not be made where the employer concerned is either bankrupt or in a state of liquidation. If an employer is in either of these situations and the award breaches which exist concern monetary entitlements of an employee or former employee, the employee or former employee is to be advised to lodge a proof of debt with the Official Trustee in Bankruptcy or the Liquidator as the case may be.

10. Where a notification of award breach under Paragraph 8 has been made and where an employer refers this to an agent (eg. solicitor or industry association) to deal with the matter on the employer's behalf, the Inspector should immediately inform the agent in writing that the breach is to be remedied within 21 days from the date on which the matter was referred to the agent. Where, without reasonable cause or explanation, the employer subsequently fails to remedy the breach within the stipulated period, the Inspector should recommend that proceedings under section 119 of the Act be instituted.

11. Subject to Paragraph 12, where a breach has been voluntarily remedied, it is to be accepted without proceedings under section 119 of the Act being recommended. However, a further inspection should be conducted within twelve months, or as soon as practicable thereafter, to ensure that no further breaches have been committed.

12. Notwithstanding the fact that an employer has voluntarily remedied a breach, an Inspector may recommend that proceedings under section 119 of the Act be instituted where:

- (a) the breach is serious or deliberate; or
- (b) the employer has previously been in breach of a federal award.

13. For the purposes of Paragraph 12:

- (a) in determining whether a breach is 'serious', regard is to be had to the circumstances of the particular case. Important considerations which should be taken into account in assessing the seriousness of a breach include the amount of any underpayment to each employee concerned, and any danger to health or safety arising from the breach;
- (b) in determining whether a breach is 'deliberate', regard is to be had to whether the breach arose from conduct or events within the control of the employer;
- (c) where an employer has previously been in breach of a federal award, regard is to be had in determining whether to recommend proceedings under section 119 of the Act to:
 - (i) the circumstances and frequency of previous breaches by that employer; and
 - (ii) the likelihood of future award breaches if proceedings are not taken.

14. Regional Directors are authorised to approve recommendations for proceedings under section 119 of the Act for breach of an award or to give such other decision on the recommendations as is consistent with the criteria set out above. In exercising this responsibility Regional Directors may consult with the First Assistant Secretary, Industrial Relations Operations Division. The Regional Director New South Wales is the authorised Regional Director for the Australian Capital Territory.

15. An Inspector is to submit recommendations for proceedings under section 119 of the Act, to the Senior Officer as designated by the Regional Director.

16. The designated Senior Officer will forward each recommendation on to the Regional Director with their comments. Before doing so, the designated Senior Officer is to be satisfied that:

- (a) all relevant facts are available;
- (b) the award has been properly construed;
- (c) a prima facie breach exists;
- (d) policy on the institution of proceedings has been observed; and
- (e) evidentiary requirements appear capable of being met to the satisfaction of the Australian Government Solicitor.

17. In considering these matters the designated Senior Officer may consult with the Australian Government Solicitor and ask for advice from appropriate officers of the Industrial Relations Operations Division.

18. A copy of each recommendation for prosecution, together with the decision of the Regional Director, is to be forwarded as soon as practicable to the Central Office of the Department.

19. The Regional Director or an officer nominated by that person, will arrange for the Australian Government Solicitor to institute action in approved proceedings and will report the progress and outcome of proceedings to Central Office.

Award Breaches by Employees

20. Award breaches by employees are subject to the same secumement policy as award breaches by employers. However, application of the policy must take account of the differences in the nature of any such breaches. For this reason and because of the complexities of the issues involved, the Regional Director is to refer all such cases, together with all available facts and their own comments, to the First Assistant Secretary, Industrial Relations Operations Division, for decision as to whether, if a breach exists, proceedings under section 119 of the Act will be instituted.

Courts

21. Proceedings may be taken in the Federal Court of Australia, Industrial Division, or in another Court specified in section 119 of the Act as considered appropriate by the Regional Director.

Award Interpretation

22. Where an Inspector considers an award has been breached but a strong alternative view exists as to the interpretation of the award provision, the Inspector will refer the matter to the designated Senior Officer for consideration. The designated Senior Officer may seek advice from the Central Office of the Department.

23. If an interpretation of an award under section 110 of the Act is sought by an organization or person bound by the award, any action by the Inspector to remedy the alleged breach will be suspended while the matter is before the Federal Court of Australia. Once an interpretation has been obtained from the Court, any necessary action for securing observance of the award and, if appropriate, prosecution can be taken by the Inspector if authorised to do so.

Production of Books and Documents

24. When relevant books and documents are not produced at an employer's premises or the employer's nominated agent's premises or the place of inspection at all or within a reasonable time, the Inspector may require, by notice in writing, the production of the books and documents at such places as are specified in the written notice.

25. The Inspector is not to serve a notice referred to in Paragraph 24 before obtaining the authorisation of the designated Senior Officer who is to be satisfied that all reasonable opportunity has been given for the production of books and documents at the employer's premises or the employer's nominated agent's premises or at the place of inspection. After such authorisation has been given, the Inspector may require the production of such books and documents at an appropriate Commonwealth Office.

Offences Against the Act and regulations

26. Where a complaint or matter concerning an alleged offence against the Act or the regulations comes to the notice of the Inspector, the Inspector may provide advice to the relevant person or parties as to the rights and obligations involved. Where the complaint involves a matter impinging on the rights of an individual under the Act, for example, sections 5, 132A, 144A and 188, the Inspector should advise the individual concerned to contact, as appropriate, their organization, the Regional Director, the Office of the Industrial Registrar or their own solicitor for further advice and/or assistance.

27. The Inspector is to report immediately any matter concerning an alleged offence against the Act or regulations through the supervising officer to the Regional Director. The Regional Director is to determine what subsequent action, if any, is necessary by the Inspector or the Department to secure the observance of legislation by voluntary means. The Regional Director may require the Inspector to proceed with an investigation of a matter or complaint.

28. The Regional Director may recommend that proceedings be instituted for an offence against the Act or the regulations. All such recommendations are to be forwarded

to the First Assistant Secretary, Industrial Relations Operations Division to be conveyed with the comments of that officer, to the Secretary for decision.

General

29. In the course of exercising responsibilities under Paragraphs 22 and 25 the designated Senior Officer is to keep the Regional Director informed regularly of action taken.
