COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA ORDER

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RESEARCH COUNCIL

I, SIR NINIAN MARTIN STEPHEN, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, hereby make the following Order.

Citation

1. This Order may be cited as the National Health and Medical Research Council Order.

Interpretation

2. (1) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears: 'appointed' includes reappointed;

'Chairperson' means the chairperson of the Council;

'Council' means the National Health and Medical Research Council continued in existence by this Order;

'Committee of Chairperson' means a committee consisting of:

(a) the Chairperson; and

(b) the chairpersons of each of the principal committees;

'Department' means the Department of State of the Commonwealth that is administered by the Minister;

'Education and Publicity Committee' means the Education and Publicity Committee of the Council, established by the Council pursuant to clause 6;

'Health Care Committee' means the Health Care Committee established by clause 6;

'Medical Research Committee' means the Medical Research Committee established by clause 6;

'Medical Research Endowment Fund' means the Medical Research Endowment Fund established under subsection 3 (1) of the *Medical Research Endowment Act 1937*;

'Medical Research Ethics Committee' means the Medical Research Ethics Committee of the Council, established by the Council pursuant to clause 6;

'Minister' means the Minister of State for Community Services and Health;

'Public Health Committee' means the Public Health Committee established by clause 6;

'Public Health Research and Development Committee' means the Public Health Research and Development Committee established by clause 6;

'revoked Order' means the Order revoked by clause 22.

(2) This Order shall be construed in accordance with the Acts Interpretation Act 1901 as if it were an Act.

The National Health and Medical Research Council

3. The National Health and Medical Research Council that was, immediately before the date of this Order, in existence by virtue of the revoked Order is, by force of, and subject to, this Order, continued in existence.

Functions of Council

4. (1) The functions of the Council are:

(a) to inquire into, and to advise and make recommendations to the Commonwealth, the States and Territories and the Australian community on, matters relating to:

(i) the improvement of health (including legislation, administration and practice in that field);

(ii) the prevention of disease (including the merits of methods of disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment);

(iii) health care, medical care, dental care, health research and medical research; and

(iv) ethical issues in relation to health;

(b) to advise and make recommendations to the Commonwealth on expenditure of money on health research and medical research and in connection with projects of health research and medical research generally; and

(c) to advise the Minister on the application, and on matters connected with the application, of the Medical Research Endowment Fund for the purposes of the *Medical Research Endowment Act 1937*.

(2) In the performance of its functions, the Council shall, in particular:

(a) sponsor and support investigations and recommend priorities (including priorities in the matter of funding) in the fields of health care, health services, health research and medical research;

(b) coordinate the work, and assess the recommendations, of committees (including the principal committees) established under clause 6; and

(c) review, at intervals of not more than three years, the effectiveness of the Council's activities in the performance of its functions.

Membership of the Council

5. (1) The Council shall consist of:

(a) the Chairperson;

(b) the Secretary to the Council;

(c) the chairperson of each principal committee;

(d) the chairperson of the Medical Research Ethics Committee; and

(e) each of the persons appointed by the Minister in accordance with subclause (2) or (3).

(2) The following persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Council:

(a) an officer of each of the following bodies, being in each case an officer nominated by that body:

(i) the Department of Health of the State of New South Wales;

(ii) the Health Department of Victoria;

(iii) the Department of Health of the State of Queensland;

(iv) the South Australian Health Commission;

(v) the Department of Health of the State of Western Australia;

(vi) the Department of Health of the State of Tasmania;

(vii) the Department of Health of the Northern Territory;

(viii) the Australian Capital Territory Health Authority;

(b) an officer of the Department, being an officer nominated by the Department other than the officer of that Department holding, or performing the duties of, the office of the Secretary to the Council;

(c) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee;

(d) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Academy of Science;

(e) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Council of Trade Unions;

(f) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Confederation of Australian Industry;

(g) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Federation of Consumer Organisations Incorporated;

(h) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Council of Social Service.

(3) The Minister shall, on the advice of the Committee of Chairpersons, appoint two members (other than the chairperson) of each of the principal committees to be members of the Council.

(4) The Chairperson shall be appointed by the Minister after consultation by the Minister with the other members of the Australian Health Ministers' Conference.

(5) The Secretary to the Council shall be the person for the time being holding, or performing the duties of, the office of Assistant Secretary, Research and Secretariat Branch, in the Health Research and Services Division of the Department.

Committees

6. (1) There are constituted by this Order, for the purpose of assisting the Council in the performance of its functions, the following principal committees:

- (a) the Health Care Committee;
- (b) the Medical Research Committee;
- (c) the Public Health Committee;
- (d) the Public Health Research and Development Committee.

(2) A principal committee has the functions conferred by this Order.

(3) The members of a principal committee shall be appointed by the Minister in accordance with this Order.

(4) The Council shall, for the purpose of assisting it in the performance of its functions, constitute committees, not being principal committees, to be known as the Education and Publicity Committee and the Medical Research Ethics Committee respectively.

(5) The chairperson of the Medical Research Ethics Committee shall be appointed by the Minister on the advice of the Council.

(6) The Council may constitute such other committees as it thinks necessary for the purposes of this Order.

(7) Subject to subclause (5), a committee referred to in subclause (4) or (6) shall be constituted, and shall have such functions, as the Council determines.

(8) The chairperson or a member of a committee referred to in this clause shall hold office on a part-time basis.

(9) In relation to a committee constituted under this clause, the Council:

- (a) may determine the manner in which the committee is to perform its functions; and
- (b) may determine the manner in which questions arising at a meeting of the committee are to be decided.

Appointments and vacancies

7. (1) Subject to this Order, a person:

- (a) appointed to be a member of the Council, other than a person appointed under paragraph 5 (1) (b); or
- (b) appointed to be a member of a principal committee; shall be appointed for a period not exceeding three years.

(2) The appointment of a member of the Council or a principal committee is not invalidated, and shall not be called in question, by reason of a defect or irregularity in or in connection with that appointment.

(3) If a body on the nomination of which a member of the Council or a principal committee was appointed requests the Minister to terminate the appointment of the member, the Minister shall terminate the appointment accordingly.

(4) Where a member of the Council referred to in subclause (1), or of a principal committee, ceases to hold office before the expiration of the period for which that member was appointed, another person may, in accordance with this Order, be appointed in his or her place for the remainder of the period.

(5) The performance of a function by the Council or a principal committee is not invalidated by reason of there being a vacancy or vacancies in the membership of the Council or that principal committee, as the case requires.

(6) A person appointed as referred to in subclause (1) or (4) is eligible for reappointment.

Alternate members, etc.

8. (1) Where the Chairperson, or the chairperson of a principal committee, is unable to attend a meeting, the Chairperson or that chairperson, as the case requires, may appoint a person to act as his or her alternate.

(2) Where the Secretary to the Council is unable to attend a meeting, the Chairperson, or the chairperson in respect of that meeting, as the case requires, may appoint a person to act as the alternate of the Secretary.

(3) Subject to subclause (4), the Minister may appoint:

- (a) a person other than a member of the Council to be the alternate of a specified member of the Council (not being the Chairperson or Secretary to the Council); or
- (b) a person other than a member of a principal committee to be the alternate of a specified member of that principal committee (not being the chairperson).

(4) A person appointed under subclause (3) to be the alternate of a member of the Council, or of a principal committee, shall be:

- (a) a person who is nominated for the purpose by the nominating authority in relation to the member; or
- (b) where the Committee of Chairpersons has advised the Minister in respect of the appointment of the member—a person in respect of whom that Committee has likewise advised the Minister.

(5) The alternate of a member of the Council or a principal committee is entitled, in the event of the absence of the member from a meeting at which that member is entitled to be present as a member, to attend that meeting and, when so attending, shall be deemed to be a member of the Council or principal committee, as the case may be.

(6) In this clause, 'meeting' means a meeting of the Council or a principal committee, as the case requires.

Meetings

9. (1) Subject to subclause (2), a meeting of the Council or of a principal committee shall be held at such time and place as the Council or committee determines.

(2) The interval between and two meetings of the Council, or of a principal committee, shall be not greater than 12 months.

(3) The Chairperson shall preside at a meeting of the Council at which he or she is present.

(4) The Chairperson of a principal committee shall preside at a meeting of that committee at which he or she is present.

(5) Where the Chairperson is absent from a meeting of the Council, or the chairperson from a meeting of a principal committee, the alternate of the Chairperson, or that chairperson, as the case requires, shall preside at the meeting.

(6) If the chairperson vacates the chair at a meeting of the Council, the Chairperson shall appoint a member of the Council present at the meeting to act as Chairperson in his or her stead.

(7) If the chairperson of a principal committee vacates the chair at a meeting of that committee, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the committee present at the meeting to act as chairperson in his or her stead.

(8) At a meeting of the Council, other than a meeting of the kind referred to in subclause (10), twelve members constitute a quorum.

(9) At a meeting of a principal committee, a quorum is constituted by:

- (a) in the case of the Health Care Committee—nine members;
- (b) in the case of the Medical Research Committee—seven members;
- (c) in the case of the Public Health Committee—seven members; and
- (d) in the case of the Public Health Research and Development Committee—five members.

(10) At a meeting of the Council convened to advise the Minister, for the purposes of the *Medical Research Endowment Act 1937*, on the application, and on matters connected with the application, of the Medical Research Endowment Fund a quorum is constituted by four members of the Council, who shall include the chairperson of the Medical Research Committee and at least one other member of the Council who is a member of that Committee.

(11) A question arising at a meeting of the Council shall be decided by a majority of votes of the members present and voting.

(12) At a meeting of the Council, the Chairperson or member presiding at the meeting has a deliberative vote only.

(13) In the event of an equality of votes on a question arising at a meeting of the Council, the question shall be taken not to be resolved and the Chairperson may direct that the question be reconsidered at a time and place to be fixed by the Chairperson.

(14) The Council with the approval of the Chairperson, or a principal committee with the approval of the chairperson of that principal committee, may request a person to attend a meeting of the Council or principal committee, as the case requires, for the purpose of providing advice or information.

Functions of Health Care Committee

10. (1) The functions of the Health Care Committee are:

- (a) to inquire into and advise the Council on matters relating to health care and the provision of health services;
- (b) to inquire into and advise the Council on the merits of methods of disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment;
- (c) to receive, and make recommendations to the Council in relation to:
 - (i) reports of expert groups and specialist working parties; and
 - (ii) representations from community groups;
- (d) to prepare reports, submissions and any other documents relating to the functions of the committee for distribution by the Council; and
- (e) to advise the Council on means of providing information to the Australian community on matters relating to the functions of the Committee.

Health Care Committee

11. (1) The Chairperson of the Health Care Committee shall be appointed by the Minister on the advice of the Council.

(2) The following persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Health Care Committee:

- (a) a person nominated by the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council, being a member of the Council by virtue of nomination pursuant to paragraph 5 (2) (a) or (b);
- (b) six persons from a list of persons, being a list comprising three persons nominated by the following specialist medical colleges:
 - Australian College of Paediatrics;
 - Australian College of Rehabilitation Medicine;

Royal Australasian College of Surgeons;
 Royal Australian College of General Practitioners;
 The Australasian College of Dermatologists;
 The Royal Australasian College of Physicians;
 The Royal Australasian College of Radiologists;
 The Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists;
 The Royal Australian College of Medical Administrators;
 The Royal Australian College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists;
 The Royal Australian College of Ophthalmologists;
 The Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia, together with such other specialist medical colleges as the Minister may from time to time approve for the purposes of this provision by notice published in the *Gazette*;

- (c) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Medical Association;
- (d) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Dental Association;
- (e) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the College of Nursing, Australia;
- (f) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Federation of Consumer Organizations Incorporated;
- (g) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Hospital Association;
- (h) one person from a list of five persons, being a list comprising one person nominated by each of the following bodies:

Australian Association of Occupational Therapists;
 Australian Association of Social Workers;
 Australian Association of Speech and Hearing;
 Australian Physiotherapy Association;
 Pharmaceutical Society of Australia.

(3) Four persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Health Care Committee on the advice of the chairperson of that Committee, being persons with expertise respectively in health economics, epidemiology, community health and ethical issues relating to health care.

Functions of the Medical Research Committee

12. The functions of the Medical Research Committee are:

- (a) to advise and make recommendations to the Council on the application of the Medical Research Endowment Fund;
- (b) to monitor for the Council the utilisation of assistance provided by that fund;
- (c) to assess on behalf of the Council the quality and scope of medical and dental research in Australia and to develop plans to advance such research;
- (d) to advise the Council and the Commonwealth with regard to research undertaken, or to be undertaken, in relation to the improvement of health or the prevention of disease, in institutes and laboratories administered by the Department; and
- (e) to provide to the Council advice on research matters relevant to the functions of the other principal committees.

Medical Research Committee

13. (1) The chairperson of the Medical Research Committee shall be appointed by the Minister on the advice of the Council.

(2) The following persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Medical Research Committee:

- (a) a person who is a member of the Medical Research Ethics Committee, being a person nominated by that Committee;

- (b) one person from a list of three persons, being citizens or permanent residents of Australia engaged in research, nominated by the Committee of Deans of Australian and New Zealand Dental Schools;
- (c) a person from persons signifying in writing to the Council their interest in being appointed to the Committee, being persons engaged in research in health sciences other than medicine and dentistry;
- (d) two persons from a list of:
 - (i) three persons nominated by the Australian Federation of Consumer Organisations Incorporated; and
 - (ii) three persons nominated by the Australian Council of Social Service.

(3) Eleven persons, being persons experienced in medical research, shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Medical Research Committee on the advice of the chairperson of that Committee.

(4) For the purpose of advising the Minister for the purposes of sub-clause (3), the chairperson of the Medical Research Committee shall consult with the Dean of each medical school at an Australian University and with the Australian Society for Medical Research.

Functions of the Public Health Committee

14. The functions of the Public Health Committee are:

- (a) to inquire into and advise the Council on matters of public health, preventive medicine and the improvement of health, including environmental health and the health of the Aboriginal and other ethnic groups;
- (b) to advise the Council on the legislation and administrative procedures that should be introduced by the Commonwealth, the States or the Territories to implement the matters referred to in paragraph (a);
- (c) to receive, and make recommendations to the Council on, reports of expert groups and working parties in matters relating to the Committee's functions;
- (d) to prepare reports, submissions and any other documents relating to the functions of the Committee for distribution by the Council; and
- (e) to advise the Council on means of providing information to the Australian community on matters relating to the functions of the Committee.

Public Health Committee

15. (1) The chairperson of the Public Health Committee shall be appointed by the Minister on the advice of the Council.

(2) The following persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Public Health Committee:

- (a) a person nominated by each of the following bodies, being in each case a person with expertise in public health:
 - (i) the Department;
 - (ii) the Department of Health of the State of New South Wales;
 - (iii) the Health Department of the Health Department of Victoria;
 - (iv) the Department of Health of the State of Queensland;
 - (v) the South Australian Health Commission;
 - (vi) the Department of Health of the State of Western Australia;
 - (vii) the Department of Health of the State of Tasmania;
 - (viii) the Department of Health of the Northern Territory;
 - (ix) the Australian Capital Territory Health Authority;
- (b) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the National Occupational Health and Safety Commission;

- (c) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Confederation of Australian Industry;
- (d) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Council of Trade Unions;
- (e) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Federation of Consumer Organisations Incorporated;
- (f) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the College of Nursing, Australia;
- (g) one person from a list of three persons, being epidemiologists, nominated by the Public Health Association of Australia and New Zealand;
- (h) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Federal Bureau of Consumer Affairs.

Functions of the Public Health Research and Development Committee

16. The functions of the Public Health Research and Development Committee are:

- (a) to develop guidelines for the funding of research in the field of public health;
- (b) to advise the Council on recommendations to be made by the Council to the Commonwealth under paragraph 4 (1) (b) in so far as those recommendations relate to research in the field of public health;
- (c) to advise and make recommendations to the Council on the allocation of funds for the conduct and promotion of research in the field of public health; and
- (d) to advise the Council on means of providing information to the Australian community on matters relating to the functions of the Committee.

Membership of the Public Health Research and Development Committee

17. (1) The chairperson of the Public Health Research and Development Committee shall be appointed by the Minister on the advice of the Council.

(2) The following persons shall be appointed by the Minister to be members of the Public Health Research and Development Committee:

- (a) an officer of the Department nominated by the Department, not being one of the officers who are for the time being the Chairperson or the Secretary to the Council;
- (b) a member of the Council nominated by the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council, being a member appointed pursuant to a nomination under paragraph 5 (2) (a) or (b);
- (c) a person nominated by the Australian Institute of Health;
- (d) one person from a list of 3 persons nominated by the Public Health Association of Australia and New Zealand;
- (e) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Australian Community Health Association.
- (f) one person from a list of three persons nominated by the Consumers' Health Forum of Australia Incorporated.

(3) In addition to the members appointed under sub-clause (1) and (2), the Minister shall, on the advice of the chairperson of the Committee, appoint five other persons to be members of the Public Health Research and Development Committee, being persons with expertise in one or more of the following fields:

- (a) epidemiology;
- (b) health economics and statistics;
- (c) human behaviour in relation to disease;
- (d) public health administration;
- (e) research in health services;
- (f) social analysis.

Representation on principal committees

18. (1) The Secretary to the Council shall be a member of each of the principal committees.

(2) Each principal committee shall, in respect of each of the other principal committees, nominate a person for appointment by the Minister as a member of that committee.

(3) Nothing in subclause (2) is to be interpreted as precluding a principal committee from nominating the same person for appointment as a member of more than one of the other principal committees.

Allowances

19. (1) Where a person who is a member of the Council or of a committee established in accordance with clause 6 attends a meeting of the Council or committee, as the case may be, the member is entitled to be paid such remuneration in respect of that attendance as is determined by the Remuneration Tribunal, or, if no determination is in operation, as the Minister determines.

(2) Where a person attends a meeting of the Council or a principal committee as the result of a request made under subclause 9 (14), the person is entitled to be paid such fees and allowances in respect of that attendance as are determined by the Minister.

(3) This clause does not apply to a person who is an officer or employee of the Public Service of the Commonwealth or of a State or of the Northern Territory.

Estimates of Council

20. The Council shall, before the end of each calendar year, prepare and submit to the Minister:

- (a) estimates of the receipts and expenditure of the Council in respect of the following year; and
- (b) such long-term estimates of the receipts and expenditure of the Council as the Council considers appropriate or the Minister requests.

Reports

21. (1) As soon as practicable after each of its meetings, the Council shall prepare and furnish to the Minister a report on the matters dealt with at the meeting.

(2) The Council may, from time to time, prepare and publish such special reports on matters relating to the functions of the Council as the Council thinks fit.

(3) As soon as practicable after the publication of a report referred to in subclause (2), the Council shall provide copies of the report to the Minister.

(4) The Minister shall cause a copy of each report furnished to the Minister in accordance with subclause (1) to be laid before each House of the Parliament within fifteen sitting days of that House after the receipt of the report by the Minister.

Repeal

22. The Order dated 14 November 1986 reconstituting the National Health and Medical Research Council is revoked.

STATEMENT UNDER SECTION 106AA

On the 26th day of May 1987, I, NEAL BLEWETT, Minister of State for Community Services and Health, made a determination under section 106 of the *Health Insurance Act 1973*, in respect of Dr Subramanian Sinnathamby of 5 MacDonald Crescent, Strathfield, New South Wales.

On 24 September 1987 Dr Sinnathamby wrote to inform me that he would not seek a review of my determination.

Particulars of Determination

A copy of the Determination is at Attachment A.

Reasons for Determination

The determination was made in accordance with a report made under sections 104 and 105 of the *Health Insurance Act 1973* by the Medical Services Committee of Inquiry for the State of New South Wales, after its inquiry into the practice of Dr Sinnathamby.

The Committee was of the opinion that, in respect of the patients under reference, certain of the services were excessive, as they were not reasonably necessary for the medical care of the patients concerned.

Accordingly, the Committee recommended that Dr Sinnathamby be reprimanded, counselled and required to repay the amount of \$11 817.05 to the Commonwealth of Australia, \$47.15 to Medibank Private and \$9.20 to the Hospitals Contribution Fund. I accepted the findings and recommendations set out in the Committee's report.

Comments

The Government is seriously concerned by the practice of doctors like Dr Sinnathamby who provide services which are not reasonably necessary for the adequate medical care of the patients concerned. Excessive services are a drain on public funds and every effort is being made to reduce the magnitude of the problem.

- (b) the said Committee, after having conducted a hearing into the abovementioned matter pursuant to section 94 of the Act, has reported to the Minister, under section 104 of the Act, and has expressed the opinion that the services identified in its report and which were rendered by the said Subramanian Sinnathamby were excessive services within the meaning of paragraph 79 (1B) (a) of the Act;
- (c) medical benefits within the meaning of paragraph 79 (1B) (d) of the Act in respect of the abovementioned services have been paid to the said Subramanian Sinnathamby or have been paid or are payable to another person or persons;
- (d) section 134 (1) of the *Health Legislation Amendment Act 1983* continued the operation of paragraph 79 (1B) (d) in relation to any matter arising out of, or

- relevant to, the rendering of a professional service or a medical service before 1 February 1984 notwithstanding the omission of that paragraph by section 51 of that Act.
- (e) Medicare benefits within the meaning of sub-section 3 (1) of the Act in respect of the abovementioned services have been paid to the said Subramanian Sinnathamby or have been paid or are payable to another person or persons;
 - (f) the services in respect of the 30 patients included in the reference to the Committee were rendered between 1 December 1983 and 30 November 1984;
 - (g) the said Committee has made recommendations pursuant to paragraphs 105 (2) (c), 105 (2) (ca) and 105 (2) (f) of the Act; and
 - (h) sub-section 106 (1) of the Act provides that the Minister may make a determination in writing in accordance with the said Committee's recommendations.

Now therefore, I, NEAL BLEWETT, Minister of State for Health, hereby determine that, in accordance with the said Committee's recommendations:

- (i) under paragraph 105 (2) (c) of the Act, the said Subramanian Sinnathamby be reprimanded and I do so reprimand him;

- (ii) under paragraph 105 (2) (ca) of the Act, the said Subramanian Sinnathamby be counselled;
- (iii) under paragraph 105 (2) (f) of the Act, the amount of medical or Medicare benefits referred to in paragraph (c) herein be payable by the said Subramanian Sinnathamby in the case of an amount of medical or Medicare benefits paid or payable by the Commonwealth of Australia, to the Commonwealth of Australia, or in the case of an amount of medical benefits paid or payable by the registered organisation, to the organisation, the total amounts of medical and Medicare benefits so payable by the said Subramanian Sinnathamby being as specified at (iv) hereunder:

- (iv) Amount Payable to
 - \$11 817.05 Commonwealth of Australia
 - 47.15 Medibank Private
 - 9.20 Hospitals Contribution Fund of Australia

PART 1-PRELIMINARY

Citation

1. This Frequency Band Plan may be cited as the 40 MHz Band Plan

Interpretation

- 2.(1) In this frequency band plan, unless the contrary intention appears:

"duplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in both directions simultaneously between two points;

"40 MHz band" means the band of radio frequencies exceeding 29.7 MHz but not exceeding 45 MHz;

"ISM" means the operation of equipment or appliances designed to generate and use locally radio frequency energy for industrial, scientific, medical, domestic or similar purposes;

"kHz" means kilohertz;

"land mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"low band VHF" means VHF frequencies not exceeding 45 MHz;

"MHz" means Megahertz;

"mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"mobile station" means a station in the mobile service intended to be used while in motion or during halts;

"radio astronomy" means astronomy based on the reception of radio transmissions of cosmic origin;

"simplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in either direction, but not simultaneously, between two points;

"spectrum plan" has the same meaning as in section 17 of the Radiocommunications Act 1983;

2.

"two-frequency low-band VHF land mobile service" means a land mobile service operating the 40 MHz band, in which information can be transmitted between two points either in a simplex or duplex manner and to which two frequencies are assigned; and

"VHF" means a frequency exceeding 30 MHz but not exceeding 300 MHz.

- (2) Unless the contrary intention appears, where any expression used in this frequency band plan is defined in the Radiocommunications Act 1983, the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations, or the spectrum plan, that expression has the same meaning in this frequency band plan as in that Act, those Regulations, or the spectrum plan, as the case may be.

PART II - BAND SUB-DIVISIONS

Band Sub-divisions

- 3.(1) Frequencies in a segment specified in Column 2 of an item in the Table may be used for the purpose or purposes specified in Column 3 of that item.
- (2) A mobile station in a two frequency land mobile service shall be assigned a nominal transmitter carrier frequency 2 MHz higher than the nominal transmitter carrier frequency assigned to the corresponding base station.
- (3) In the Table "Defence" means used primarily for the general purposes of defence by the Defence Force or the Department of Defence.

PART III - CHANNELLING

Segments not allocated to Defence.

- 4.(1) For the purposes of all devices other than cordless telephones, the segments of the 40 MHz band not allocated to Defence are divided into frequency channels, the centre of each one being separated from the centre of the next by 20 KHz, with the centre of the first channel in each segment being at a frequency 10 KHz, greater than the lower boundary frequency of that segment.
- (2) Cordless telephones are assigned channels centred on 30.075, 30.125, 30.175, 30.225, 30.275, 39.775, 39.825, 39.875, 39.925, 39.975, 40.025, 40.075, 40.125, 40.175 and 40.225 MHz.
- (3) Nothing in subsection (1) prevents the allocation of a centre frequency for a frequency channel other than a centre frequency of a frequency channel defined in subsection (1).

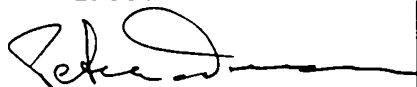

PLAN FOR THE 403 MHZ TO 520 MHZ BAND OF THE SPECTRUM

PART 1 - PRELIMINARY

Citation

1. This frequency band plan may be cited as the 400 MHz Band Frequency Band Plan.

Interpretation

- 2.(1) In this frequency band plan unless the contrary intention appears:

"amateur satellite service" means a radiocommunications service using space stations or earth satellites for the same purposes as those of the amateur service;

"amateur service" has the same meaning as in the spectrum plan;

"amateur television" means an amateur service used for the transmission of transient images of fixed or moving objects;

"Australia" includes the external Territories;

"authorised area" means the areas in which services are permitted to operate;

"outside major cities" means a location situated 200 kms or more from each of the General Post Office of Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth.

"duplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in both directions simultaneously between two points;

"fixed service" has the same meaning as in the spectrum plan;

"frequency band" means the 403 MHz to 520 MHz band of the spectrum;

"land mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"maritime mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"MHz means Megahertz;

"mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"radio astronomy" means astronomy based on the reception of radiotransmissions of cosmic origin;

2.

"simplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in either direction, but not simultaneously, between two points;

"single frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted between two points in either one or both directions, but not simultaneously and to which only one frequency is assigned;

"spectrum plan" has the same meaning as in section 17 of the Radiocommunications Act 1983;

"small capacity fixed link" means a radio relay system operating in the fixed service, capable of supporting a maximum of 24 voice channels, and using a bandwidth of less than 600 kHz;

"two frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted between two points either in a simplex or duplex manner and to which two frequencies are assigned; and

"trunked land mobile service" means a land mobile service which operates on a number of frequency channels with automatic selection of an available channel when communication is desired.

- (2) Unless the contrary intention appears, where any expression used in this frequency band plan is defined in the Radiocommunications Act 1983, the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations, or the spectrum plan, that expression has the same meaning in this frequency band plan as in that Act, those Regulations, or the spectrum plan, as the case may be.

PART II - BAND SUB-DIVISIONS

3. (1) The services listed in Table 1 are primary and the services listed in Table 2 are secondary.
- (2) Subject to sub-clauses (3) and (4) frequencies in a segment specified in Column 2 of an item in Table 1 or Table 2 is allotted to the services specified in Column 3 of that item.

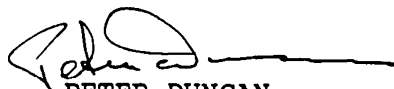

FREQUENCY BAND PLAN FOR THE 820 to 960 MHZ Band

PART 1-PRELIMINARY

Citation

1. This frequency band plan may be cited as the 900 MHz Frequency Band Plan

Interpretation

- 2.(1) In this frequency band plan, unless the contrary intention appears:

"aircraft" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"aircraft telephone service" means a mobile telephone service in which the stations are installed aboard aircraft;

"authorised area" means the areas in which services are permitted to operate;

"cellular mobile telephone service" means a mobile telephone service which uses a cellular radio system to provide that service;

"cellular radio system" is a system which contains base stations and ambulatory stations and which allows automatic hand off as an ambulatory station moves away from one base station and closer to another;

"digital cellular mobile telephone service" means a cellular mobile telephone service in which stations operate using a digital modulation technique;

"duplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in both directions simultaneously between two points;

"fixed service" has the same meaning as in the spectrum plan;

2.

"hand off" means the act of transferring a mobile station from one frequency channel to another;

"ISM" means the operation of equipment or appliances designed to generate and use locally radio frequency energy for industrial, scientific, medical, domestic or similar purposes;

"kHz" means kilohertz;

"land mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (licensing and General) Regulations;

"land mobile station" means a mobile station in the land mobile service;

"low capacity fixed service" means a fixed service which can operate in a frequency channel of greater than 25 kHz but not exceeding 200 kHz;

"Melbourne and Sydney" means the area enclosed in 200 kHz circles, radius 200 km, centred on the GPO of each of those two cities;

"MHz" means Megahertz;

"mobile service" has the same meaning as in the Radiocommunications (licensing and General) Regulations;

"mobile station" means a station in the mobile service intended to be used while in motion or during halts at unspecified points;

"mobile telephone service" means a mobile service which provides duplex connection between ambulatory stations and the national telephone network;

"narrowband area service" is a service which provides oneway radio communications to narrowband receivers at fixed points within a defined area and which can operate in a frequency channel of less than 50 kHz.

3.

"offshore areas" are areas within which the Radiocommunications Act 1983 applies but which are beyond the seaward horizon of the Australian coast;

"outside major cities" means a location situated 200 km or more from each of the GPO's of Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth;

"radiocommunications" has the same meaning as in section 3 of the Radiocommunications Act 1983;

"radio linked microphone" means a microphone which uses radio transmission for the transmission of information, to a public address or to recording equipment;

"simplex" means a mode of operation by which information can be transmitted in either direction, but not simultaneously, between two points;

"single frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted between two points in either one or both directions, but not simultaneously and to which only one frequency is assigned;

"spectrum plan" has the same meaning as in section 17 of the Radiocommunications Act 1983;

"studio to transmitter link" is a fixed service which carries programme material from a broadcast studio to a broadcast station;

"trunked land mobile service" means a land mobile service which operates on a number of channels with automatic selection of an available channel when communications is desired;

"two-frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted between two points either in a simplex or duplex manner and to which two frequencies are assigned; and

"wideband fixed service" means a fixed service which may operate in a frequency channel of up to 2 MHz.

- (2) Unless the contrary intention appears, where any expression used in this frequency band plan is defined in the Radiocommunications Act 1983, the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations, or the spectrum plan, that expression has the same meaning in this frequency band plan as in that Act, those Regulations, of the spectrum plan, as the case may be.

PART II BAND SUB-DIVISIONS

- 3.(1) The services listed in Table 1 are primary and the services listed in Table 2 are secondary.
- (2) Subject to sub clauses (3) and (4) frequencies in a segment specified in Column 2 of an item in Table 1 or Table 2 is allotted to the services specified in Column 3 of that item.
- (3) Where no area is mentioned in Column 4 of an item in Table 1 or Table 2, frequencies in a segment mentioned in Column 2 of that item are allotted to the service specified in Column 3 of that item throughout Australia.
- (4) Where an area is specified in Column 4 of an item in Table 1 or Table 2, frequencies in a segment mentioned in Column 2 of that item are allotted to the service specified in Column 3 of that item only within the area specified in Column 4 of that item.
- (5) The radiolocation service listed in Table 1 is limited to maritime radars operated by Department of Defence.

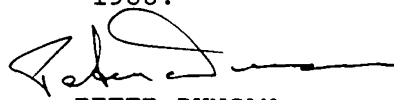

PART I - PRELIMINARY

Citation

1. This Frequency Band Plan may be cited as the TMLS Band Plan.

Interpretation

"GHz" means gigahertz;

"MHz" means Megahertz;

"spectrum plan" has the same meaning as in section 17 of the Radiocommunications Act 1983;

"TMLS" means temporary microwave link service;

"TMLS band" means the band of frequencies exceeding 1000 MHz but not exceeding 52 GHz;

NOTICE OF INQUIRY—SUBMISSIONS INVITED

The Australian Broadcasting Tribunal has commenced an inquiry into the application for the transfer of the licence for the north east region remote commercial television licence from Queensland Satellite Television to a company to be known as Q-Net Limited.

The issues which will be addressed during the Inquiry are as follows:

1. Whether the Tribunal should refuse consent, having regard to, whether:
 - (a) the giving of the consent would be contrary to a provision of the Act; and
 - (b) it appears to the Tribunal, having regard to the following matters or circumstances, that it is advisable in the public interest to refuse consent:
 - (i) it is not satisfied that Q-Net Limited:
 - (A) has the financial, technical and management capabilities necessary to provide an adequate and comprehensive service pursuant to the licence; and
 - (B) is capable of providing an adequate and comprehensive service and complying with the Tribunal's Program Standards;
 - (C) is a fit and proper person to hold the licence;
 - (ii) subject to the desirability of ensuring that, in all parts of Australia, there are available at least one service provided by a commercial radio licence and a commercial television licence, the need to avoid an undue concentration of the ownership or control, direct or indirect, of the media in the service area of the licence;
 - (iii) the likelihood that, if the Tribunal gave consent, a person would, in relation to the licence or the holder of the licence, contravene an order of the Tribunal made for the purposes of section 92V;
 - (iv) any relevant government policy statements;
2. Such other matters relevant to the Inquiry as the Tribunal sees fit.

Any person wishing to make a submission on these issues may lodge it with the Tribunal by 19 February 1988.
