1. It is hereby notified That His Excellency the Governor-General of Australia acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council has, pursuant to the provisions of the *Lands Acquisition Act 1955* and the *Pipeline Authority Act 1973* (hereinafter called 'the Act'), authorised the acquisition by compulsory process of an easement in the terms set out in Schedule 1 of the Appendix hereto together with the rights set out in Schedule 2 of the said Appendix.
2. I hereby declare that the said land is acquired for the following public purpose approved by the Governor-General, namely: for the purposes of the Authority, such purposes being the construction, maintenance and operation of pipelines or parts thereof under and in accordance with the Act.

APPENDIX

In this Appendix 'Authority' and 'pipeline' have respectively the same meaning as those expressions have in the *Pipeline Authority Act 1973* (hereinafter called 'the Act').

SCHEDULE 1

An easement in favour of the Authority and the owners and occupiers for the time being of the land contained in Lot 1 in Deposited Plan No. 748431 over the land described in Schedule 3 at all times and from time to time to lay down, construct and place on, through, over, across and at any depth below the surface of the land and to use, operate, examine, monitor, re-lay, alter, renew, cleanse, repair and remove anodes, wires, conductors, cables, batteries any associated apparatus, equipment and structures hereafter called "the apparatus" for the production and transmission of electric current through the apparatus to or from the natural gas pipeline of the Authority for the purpose of preventing corrosion to the pipeline or any part thereof and for any purpose incidental thereto.

SCHEDULE 2

The full and free right for the Authority by itself its servants and agents and any person authorised by it at all times and from time to time:

- (a) to enter, go, return, pass, repass and remain with or without tools, implements, machinery, animals and vehicles;
- (b) to clear and remove any obstruction, timber, trees, undergrowth, crops and fences;
- (c) to dig, break up and restore the surface;
- (d) to make surveys, take levels, sink bores, dig pits and examine the soil;
- (e) to construct, build and place any plant, machinery, equipment and goods;
- (f) to take sand, clay, stone, earth, gravel, timber, wood and other materials and things;
- (g) to make cuttings and excavations;
- (h) to deposit sand, clay, stone, earth, gravel, timber, wood and other materials and things;

- (i) to erect workshops, sheds and other buildings;
- (j) to make roads;
- (k) to manufacture and work materials of any kind;
- (l) to demolish, destroy and remove any plant, machinery, equipment, goods, workshop, shed, buildings and road;
- (m) to inspect, patrol, (including aerial patrol), alter, renew, reconstruct, replace, repair, cleanse, maintain, and change the size of the apparatus or part thereof;
- (n) to remove the apparatus or part thereof;
- (o) to have the right of support of the apparatus or part thereof;
- (p) to do all things necessary or convenient to be done in connection with or incidental to the exercise of the aforesaid rights.

NOTICE OF GRANT OF EXEMPTION

Notice is hereby given of a decision of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission made on 26 May 1988 pursuant to sub-section 44 (1) of the *Sex Discrimination Act 1984* in the following terms:

'The Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission grants to The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited an unconditional exemption from the provisions of sections 14, 16 and 86 of the *Sex Discrimination Act 1984* for a period of 9 months to expire on 23 February 1989 in respect of the employment of women processors, contract workers and apprentices in or about any process involving exposure to dust, mist, fumes or gases containing a lead material or compound in the Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited Plant at Port Pirie.

The exemption does not apply to any classifications in which The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited currently employs women or any contracts by which Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited currently engages women.

The exemption will be reviewed at the expiration of the exemption period at which time the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission will consider granting a further exemption to The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited for 9 months on request and on receipt of a report which details what action The Broken Hill

Associated Smelters Pty Limited has taken and what progress has been achieved in relation to:

(a) exploring appropriate avenues for the further employment of women at The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited Plant.

(b) investigating and evaluating various risk factors involved in the employment of a mixed sex workforce at The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited Plant.

(c) the implementation of a programme to provide a lead free environment for employees at The Broken Hill Associated Pty Limited Plant, Port Pirie.

(d) examining the appropriateness of current and economically feasible facilities and management practices to meet the needs of a mixed sex workforce and developing appropriate strategies to assist the opening up of employment opportunities for female processors and apprentices at The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited Plant, Port Pirie.

However, the Commission may require submissions from The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited as to whether a further exemption for 9 months should be granted subject to the following condition, which the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission will consider imposing, should an additional exemption be sought:

(1) The exemption will not apply in respect of women who have signed a written statement specifying that they are not planning or wishing a pregnancy, the said statement being countersigned by a conciliator employed by the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission or by a conciliator employed by the South Australian Commission for Equal Opportunity certifying that the

consequences of the employment in the Lead Industry have been fully explained and the worker appeared to understand the ramifications thereof.

A. The Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission's findings on material questions of fact relating to the application were as follows:

(i) Until the proclamation of the Equal Opportunity Act 1984 women were excluded from employment in lead processing in South Australia by virtue of regulation 45 (1) (b) of the Industrial Safety Code Regulations, 1975-1976, made under the Industrial Safety Health and Welfare Act 1972 as amended.

(ii) On 25 August 1987 the South Australian Equal Opportunity Commission granted the Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited a conditional exemption from the provisions of sections 30, 32 and 103 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1984, for a period of three years, to expire on 16 September 1990. The Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission has taken into account all the evidence presented to the South Australian Equal Opportunity Tribunal and its decision E.O.T. No. 14 of 1987 and concurs with that decision.

(iii) The Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission recognises that the lead processing is a hazardous activity and persons engaged in this work are at risk from lead contamination. The National Health and Medical Research Council has produced guidelines stipulating maximum acceptable levels of lead absorption. The Council has found no difference in the effect of lead absorption in adult men and women. It does recognise that in the case of pregnant women lead may cross the placenta thereby creating a risk to the developing foetus. The Council recommends a lower maximum absorption rate of lead in the case of women of child bearing capacity than men and also recommends that pregnant women be removed from any risk of lead absorption.

(iv) The Australian Federal Government has established the National Occupational Health and Safety Commission which is currently examining and developing codes of practice for the Australian lead industry. The Committee's recommendations to date have not been finalised.

B. These findings were based on the following evidence:

(i) The letter of application for exemption from The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited dated 19 October 1987 and associated documents being:

— Statement of Understanding on Occupational Health and Hygiene between The BHAS Pty Limited and the BHAS Combined Unions Council;

— Statement of Specific Undertaking Concerning Occupational Health and Safety and Equal Employment Opportunity between The BHAS Pty Limited and the Combined Unions Council; and

— The BHAS Special Newsletter 'Environment and Economic Improvement Plan'.

(ii) All the evidence presented to the South Australian Equal Opportunity Tribunal at its hearing of the application for exemption by The Broken Hill Associated Smelters Pty Limited on 25 August 1987.

C. The Commission's reasons for granting the exemption are as follows:

(i) Currently the National Occupational Health and Safety Commission is examining and developing codes of practice for the Australian lead industry. The Committee's recommendations to date have not been finalised.

(ii) The Commission's charter seeks to encourage the employment of women in as many facets of every industry as possible.

Subject to the *Administrative Appeals Tribunal Act 1975*, application may be made to the Administrative Appeals

Tribunal for review of this decision by or on behalf of any person or persons whose interests are affected by it.

 3. the Mining Industry Division
 4. the Energy Industry Division
- (e) The Rules of the amalgamated organisation comprise four (4) parts, namely —
1. Part One: National Rules
 2. Part Two: Uniform Branch Rules
 3. Part Three: Supplementary Branch Rules

WHEREAS by Letters Patent dated 14 February 1975 We established a society of honour to be known as the "Order of Australia" and made provision with respect to membership and the Constitution of the Order:

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that certain amendments be made to the Constitution of the Order:

KNOW YOU that We do, by these Presents, declare Our pleasure that the above-mentioned Letters Patent dated 14 February 1975, as amended by Letters Patent dated 24 May 1976, by Letters Patent dated 14 March 1981, and by Letters Patent dated 3 March 1986, be further amended, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, as set out in the Schedule:

AND WE DO ordain that the Order shall henceforth consist of the Sovereign, Our Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, His Royal Highness Charles, Prince of Wales, and such persons as have been appointed, or shall hereafter be appointed, to the Order:

AND WE DO further ordain that, notwithstanding the amendments to be made to the Constitution of the Order, a person who was a member of the Order immediately before the issue of these Our Letters Patent shall, subject to the Constitution of the Order, remain a member of the Order in the class of membership that the person held at that time:

IN WITNESS whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent.

SCHEDULE

AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ORDER OF
AUSTRALIA

1. Section 4 is amended:

- (a) by omitting from paragraph (1) (c) "the Special Minister of State" and substituting "Administrative Services";
- (b) by omitting paragraph 1 (e) and substituting the following paragraph:
 - "(c) not more than 15 persons appointed by the Governor-General, of whom—
 - (i) not more than 6 shall be persons nominated by the States of the Commonwealth of Australia;
 - (ii) one may be a person nominated by the Northern Territory of Australia; and
 - (iii) one may be a person nominated by the Minister of State responsible for the administration of the Australian Capital Territory."

2. Section 4 is further amended by adding at the end the following sub-section:

"(4) A member of the Council who is referred to in paragraph (1) (a), (b), (c) or (d) or sub-paragraph (1) (e) (i), (ii) or (iii) may, in the event that the member is absent or unable to act in that capacity, be represented on the Council by a person chosen, in accordance with arrangements made by the Governor-General, to act in the member's place as a member of the Council."

3. Section 30 is amended by omitting paragraph (c) and substituting the following paragraph:

SCHEDULE

REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE AWARD OF
THE AUSTRALIAN FIRE SERVICE MEDAL**Short title**

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Australian Fire Service Medal Regulations.

Interpretation

2. In these Regulations—

“Australian fire service” means a Commonwealth fire service or a fire service of a State or Territory of the Commonwealth;

“Commonwealth fire service” means a fire service of a Commonwealth agency (other than a fire service of the Australian Capital Territory);

“external Territory” means any of the Territories of Christmas Island, Cocos (Keeling) Islands and Norfolk Island;

“Medal” means the Australian Fire Service Medal;

“responsible Minister” means—

- (a) in the case of a fire service of a State—the Premier of that State or a Minister of the Crown of that State acting for and on behalf of the Premier;
- (b) in the case of a fire service of the Northern Territory of Australia—the Chief Minister of that Territory or a Minister of that Territory acting for and on behalf of the Chief Minister;
- (c) in the case of a fire service of the Australian Capital Territory—the Minister of State for the time being responsible for administering that Territory;
- (d) in the case of a Commonwealth fire service, the Minister of State for the time being responsible for administering the relevant agency; and
- (e) in the case of a fire service of an external Territory, the Minister of State for the time being responsible for administering that Territory.

Design of the Medal

3. The design of the Medal shall be as prescribed.

Conditions for award of the Medal

4. (1) The Medal shall be awarded only for distinguished service by a member of an Australian fire service.

- (2) The number of awards of the Medal in respect of each State in each calendar year shall be—

- (a) one award for each 1,000, or part of 1,000, full-time permanent members of the fire service or combined fire services (as the case may be) of that State serving on 30 June in the year immediately preceding that calendar year;
- (b) one award for each 25,000, or part of 25,000, part-time, volunteer or auxiliary members of the fire service or combined fire services (as the case may be) of that State serving on 30 June in the year immediately preceding that calendar year; and
- (c) one additional award.

- (3) One award of the Medal shall be made in each calendar year in respect of the fire services or combined fire services (as the case may be) in each of the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory of Australia.

- (4) One award of the Medal shall be made in each calendar year in respect of a Commonwealth fire service.

- (5) An occasional award (not exceeding one per calendar year) may be made in respect of the fire service of an External Territory as determined by the responsible Minister.

Making of awards

5. (1) An award of the Medal shall be made by the Governor-General and notified in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette*.

(2) The Medal shall only be awarded upon the nomination of a responsible Minister.

Wearing of the Medal

6. The manner of wearing the Medal shall be as determined by the Governor-General.

Designation of holder of the Medal

7. Persons to whom the Medal has been awarded are entitled to have the letters "AFSM" placed after their names on all occasions when the use of such letters is customary.

Registrar of Awards

8. (1) There shall be a Registrar of Awards who shall be appointed by the Governor-General and shall maintain a Register of the names of persons to whom the Medal has been awarded.

(2) The Registrar shall keep such other records relating to the award of the Medal as the Governor-General directs.

Cancellation and reinstatement

9. (1) The Governor-General may cancel the award of the Medal to a person and may reinstate an award so cancelled.

(2) Where an award of the Medal is cancelled, the name of the person to whom the award was made shall be erased from the Register and the person shall return the Medal to the Registrar.

(3) Where an award that has been cancelled is reinstated, the Registrar shall restore the entry in the Register that had been erased.

- (B) Emperor Mines Limited ('Emperor Mines') a company incorporated or formed under a law of the Isle of Man and having its head office c/- Coopers & Lybrand, 12 Finch Road, Douglas, in the Isle of Man, is a foreign person;
- (C) I, PETER FREDERICK MORRIS, Minister of State for Transport and Communications Support, acting for and on behalf of the Treasurer, am satisfied that Emperor Mines proposes to acquire all the issued ordinary shares in Southern Resources that it does not already hold:

Now therefore, for the purpose of enabling consideration to be given to whether an order should be made under sub-section 18 (2) of the Act, I prohibit the proposed acquisition for a period of ninety days after this order comes into operation.
