Determination of the following formulae for setting economy air fares over routes operated by Ansett Airlines of Australia (AAA) and Australian Airlines (Australian), effective 12 July 1988:

Trunk Route (Jet) Services:

[Jet aircraft having a capacity exceeding 90 passengers]

The formula for AAA and Australian jet services incorporating a flag-fall plus a distance rate will be:

Fare (\$) = A + BX + CX² + DX³ where:

A is the flag-fall (value 54.40)

B, C, D are the distance coefficients

(values B = 199.1268; C = -30.9303; D = 2.6100)

X is the journey distance expressed in thousands of kilometres

For multi-stage journeys the distance rate for kilometres in excess of 3611, where applicable, will be calculated at 7.7847 cents per kilometre.

This determination represents an average weighted fare increase of 5.75 per cent for trunk route air services.

Formula Calibration		
In determining the economy air fare formula for Trunk Route (Jet) Services, the Committee applied the relevant allocations of costs to flag-fall and distance components as determined for AAA and Australian in para 2.2.1 of the March 1987 Cost Allocation Reviews (CAR) Report.		
Sydney-Melbourne/Darwin Common Rating		
As provided for in para 2.15 of the March 1987 CAR Report, the Committee determined that the common rating of fares on the Sydney-Melbourne/Darwin routes will be based on a revised distance of 3380 kms.		
'Break of Journey' Rules		
The Committee determined that the rules specified in para 2.14 of the March 1987 CAR Report will not be implemented as part of this MAFR determination, pending further consultations with AAA and Australian.'		
The Committee was requested to undertake a Major air fares review covering Jet services operated by AAA and Australian, and F27/F50 services operated by AAA. Both airlines provided extensive operational and financial estimates for the 1987-88 and 1988-89 financial years.		
The Committee's review of the available results for 1987-88 showed that passenger traffic on trunk route (Jet) services was much higher than originally forecast by the airlines and that, after allowing for certain cost increases, this had led to an improved operating result for the year.		
Estimates submitted for the 1988-89 financial year indicated that the two airlines were facing higher cost levels in such areas as additional and replacement aircraft (including the introduction by Ansett of the A320, a new aircraft type); wages, salaries and superannuation; landing, enroute and security charges; upgraded communications and computer systems.		
The Committee made a number of downward adjustments to costs, e.g. aviation fuel, where it was not satisfied with the bases of the estimates presented. The Committee also made specific adjustments to estimated costs (upwards and/or downwards) depending on its assessment whether such costs were efficiently and economically incurred e.g. interest, flight crew and indirect operating costs generally.		
AAA and Australian each predict that passenger growth in 1988-89 will be much lower than in the year just completed. They submitted that the respective fare increases sought would not have an adverse effect on demand, but the Committee considered some detrimental effect was possible and this factor was taken into account in the final determination.		
After having regard to the specific cost and revenue estimates submitted by the airlines (as adjusted by the IAFIC), the Committee concluded that an average increase of 5.75 per cent was justified for trunk route (Jet) economy fares. As well, the Committee approved a 5.75 per cent fare increase for AAA's non-Jet services, recognising the capital costs of substituting new F50 for F27 aircraft.		
Because of the adjustments made by the Committee, the fare increases determined were substantially less than the levels requested by either airline.		
The Committee also determined a reduced notional distance (3380 kms) for calculating the common rated Sydney-Melbourne/Darwin fares, as more accurately reflecting recent travel patterns on these routes.

Employment, Education and Training

States Grants (Schools Assistance) Act 1984

I, ANDRE JOSEPH KASPURA, exercising delegation for the Minister of State for Employment, Education and Training, in accordance with section 3(9) of the Act, specify, for the purposes of the Act, in respect of each level of education at which education is provided by schools included in a specified class of schools, a number of students to be the minimum acceptable number of students for a school, or a school in so far as it provides education at a particular level as set out below.

1. For schools receiving provisional approval after 24 May 1988 the following apply:

- (i) Primary schools: a minimum enrolment of 50 students.
- (ii) A minimum of 25 students must be enrolled in each junior secondary years.
- (iii) A minimum of 20 students must be enrolled in each senior secondary years.
- (iv) The following principles underlie the minimum enrolment guidelines:

(a) in general, junior secondary schools are approved for years 7-10 (or 8-10). Senior secondary schools are approved for years 11-12;

(b) where junior secondary schools are approved for progressive single year intakes they are expected to undertake the extensions on a continuous basis achieving the final grade intake in the fourth year of operation at that level (third year for 8-10 schools);

(c) where senior secondary schools are approved for progressive intakes they are expected to undertake the extensions on a continuous basis achieving the final intake in the second year of operation at that level; and

(d) in the case of secondary schools the number of years of operation at a level will be taken into account in considering minimum enrolment requirements.

(e) schools comprising ungraded students will be treated as if they were offering a complete level.

2. Special schools: a minimum of 1 student.

3. The following minima will apply to Aboriginal community schools, schools currently holding provisional approval as at 24 May 1988 and existing schools covered by sections 6C(1) and 7C(1) of the Act:

- (i) Primary schools: a minimum of 20 students.

- (ii) Junior secondary schools must enrol an average of 10 students per years.
 - (iii) Senior secondary schools must enrol a minimum of 8 students in each years.
 - (iv) The principles set out in 1 (iv) above also apply to this class of schools.
4. For existing schools wishing to extend their levels of educational provision, new levels of education must meet respective minima.
5. Pursuant to section 6C (1) and 7C (1) of the Act a ten percent flexibility factor shall normally apply before funding eligibility for a level of education is reviewed once a school has established eligibility and is receiving funding.

THE SCHEDULE

A PROPOSED LAW

To alter the Constitution to provide for 4-year maximum terms for members of both Houses of the Commonwealth Parliament

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the approval of the electors, as required by the Constitution, as follows:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the *Constitution Alteration (Parliamentary Terms) 1988*.

The Senate

2. Section 7 of the Constitution is altered by omitting from the fourth paragraph "senators shall be chosen for a term of six years, and the".

Times and places

3. Section 9 of the Constitution is altered by omitting the second paragraph.

Issue of writs

4. Section 12 of the Constitution is altered by omitting "In case of the dissolution of the Senate the writs shall be issued within ten days from the proclamation of such dissolution" and substituting "The writs shall be issued within ten days from the expiry of a House of Representatives or from the proclamation of a dissolution thereof, but so that the polling day shall be the same day as the polling day for the election of members of the House of Representatives".

5. The Constitution is altered by omitting sections 13 and 14 and substituting the following section:

Terms of service of senators

- "13. (1) The terms of service of senators expire upon the expiry or dissolution of the House of Representatives.

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"(2) Subsection (1) applies in relation to the term of service of any senator, including:

- (a) a senator holding office at the commencement of this section; and
- (b) a senator chosen or appointed after that commencement in consequence of a vacancy existing at that commencement;

but, in the case of a senator appointed by the Governor of a State, this section does not extend the term of the appointment after the expiration of fourteen days from the beginning of the next session of the Parliament of the State following the making of the appointment."

Duration of House of Representatives

6. Section 28 of the Constitution is altered:

- (a) by omitting "three years" and substituting "four years"; and
- (b) by adding at the end the following paragraph:

"In relation to a House of Representatives whose first meeting occurred before the commencement of the *Constitution Alteration (Parliamentary Terms) 1988*, the last preceding paragraph has effect as if the reference to four years were a reference to three years."

A PROPOSED LAW

To alter the Constitution to provide for fair and democratic parliamentary elections throughout Australia

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the approval of the electors, as required by the Constitution, as follows:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the *Constitution Alteration (Fair Elections) 1988*.

Commencement

2. This Act commences on the day on which it receives the Royal Assent.

3. The Constitution is altered by omitting section 8 and substituting the following section:

Qualification of electors.

"8. Subject to this Constitution, the qualification of electors of senators shall be in each State or Territory that which is prescribed by the Parliament as the qualification of electors of members of the House of Representatives."

Provision as to races disqualified from voting

4. The Constitution is altered by omitting section 25.

5. The Constitution is altered by omitting sections 29 and 30 and substituting the following sections:

Electoral divisions.

"29. (1) Subject to this Constitution, the Parliament may make laws providing for electoral divisions for which members of the House of Representatives may be chosen and fixing the number of members to be chosen for each division.

"(2) A division shall not be formed out of parts of different States.

"(3) A division may be formed out of an area comprising two or more areas each of which is a Territory or part of a Territory.

Qualification of electors.

"30. Subject to this Constitution, the qualification of electors of members of the House of Representatives shall be, in each State or Territory, that which is prescribed by the Parliament."

Right of electors of States

6. The Constitution is altered by omitting section 41.

7. The Constitution is altered by inserting after section 107 the following section:

Election of State Parliaments.

"107A. (1) A House of the Parliament of a State shall be composed of members directly chosen by the people of the State."

"(2) Subject to this Constitution, the qualification of electors of members of a House of the Parliament of the State shall be that which is prescribed by the laws of the State."

8. The Constitution is altered by inserting after section 122 the following section:

Election of certain Territory legislatures.

"122A. (1) The legislature of a Territory forming part of Australia or a combination of such Territories shall be composed of members directly chosen by the people of the Territory or Territories."

"(2) Subject to this Constitution and to any law made by the Parliament of the Commonwealth, the qualification of electors of members of the legislature shall be that which is prescribed by the laws of the Territory or Territories."

9. The Constitution is altered by inserting after Chapter VI the following Chapter:

CHAPTER VIA FAIR ELECTIONS

Interpretation.

"124A. In this Chapter:

'election', means an election for choosing:

- (a) members of the House of Representatives for an electoral region;
- (b) members of a House of the Parliament of a State; or
- (c) members of the legislature of a Territory forming part of Australia or a combination of such Territories;

otherwise than for the purpose of filling casual vacancies;

'electoral region' means:

- (a) a State or Territory; or
- (b) an area comprising two or more areas each of which is a Territory or part of a Territory;

'fair distribution' means a determination of electoral divisions in accordance with section one hundred and twenty-four C.

Votes to have equal value.

"124B. (1) In:

- (a) an election held in an electoral division; or
- (b) an election held in an electoral region that is one electorate;

the method of voting shall be such that, with respect to the votes of all electors in the division, or in the electorate, as the case may be, votes shall not be weighted according to different classes of electors.

"(2) In this section, 'election' includes an election to choose senators.

Fair distributions of electoral divisions.

"124C. (1) Where a law provides for electoral divisions in an electoral region, the divisions shall be determined so

that the number of electors in each division does not depart to a greater extent than one-tenth more or one-tenth less from the number calculated under subsection (2).

"(2) For the purposes of subsection (1), a number, in relation to a particular electoral division, shall be calculated by:

- (a) dividing the total number of electors in all the electoral divisions in the electoral region by the total number of members to be chosen in all those divisions; and
- (b) multiplying the result by the number of members to be chosen for that electoral division.

"(3) If, in relation to a determination of electoral divisions:

- (a) no proceedings challenging the determination have been instituted as provided by this Chapter; or
- (b) any proceedings so instituted have been withdrawn or dismissed;

the determination shall be taken to have been made in accordance with this section.

Elections in divisions.

"124D. (1) An election in an electoral region may be held in electoral divisions only if:

- (a) the divisions have been determined by a fair distribution made after the commencement of this Chapter and not more than seven years before the election; and
- (b) subsection (2) does not apply in relation to the electoral divisions.

"(2) Subject to subsection (3), this subsection applies to electoral divisions for an election if, on the last day of each of any two or more successive months since the last fair distribution before that election, the numbers of the electors in more than one-third of the divisions were such that, if the divisions had been determined with those numbers of electors, the determination would not have been a fair distribution.

"(3) In ascertaining whether subsection (2) applies in relation to electoral divisions for an election, a particular month shall be disregarded if the last day of the month occurs within twenty-six weeks before the date of expiry, by effluxion of time, of the terms of service of all or any of the members of the House concerned.

"(4) This section does not apply to an election held before the end of one year after the commencement of this Chapter.

"(5) In this section:

'House' means:

- (a) the House of Representatives;
- (b) a House of the Parliament of a State; or
- (c) a chamber (by whatever name called) of the legislature of a Territory or combination of Territories;

'month' means one of the twelve months of the year.

Elections where electoral region to be one electorate.

"124E. (1) Where an election in an electoral region is not to be held in electoral divisions or, if so held, is or would be contrary to section one hundred and twenty-four D, the region shall be one electorate.

"(2) Where a region is to be one electorate, an election in the electorate shall be held:

- (a) if the election is for the purpose of choosing members of the House of Representatives—as the Parliament provides; or
- (b) if the election is for the purpose of choosing members of a House of the Parliament of a State or the legislature of a Territory or a combination of Territories—in accordance with the law of the State, Territory or Territories, as the case requires, or, if there is no such law, as the Parliament provides;

but so that the method of choosing those members shall be a system of proportional representation.

Casual vacancies.

"124F. Nothing in this Constitution prevents the filling of a casual vacancy in the membership of:

- (a) a House of the Parliament of a State; or
- (b) the legislature of a Territory forming part of Australia or a combination of such Territories;

in the manner provided by the Parliament of that State or, subject to any law made by the Parliament of the Commonwealth, by that legislature, as the case requires.

Right to challenge determinations of electoral divisions.

"124G. (1) Subject to subsection (2), a determination of electoral divisions may be challenged by an elector in a court of competent jurisdiction on the ground that the determination was not a fair distribution.

"(2) An elector shall not institute proceedings under subsection (1) after the end of forty days after both of the following have been notified to the public, namely:

- (a) the results of the determination; and
- (b) all statistics necessary to ascertain whether or not the determination was a fair distribution.

"(3) In this section, 'elector', in relation to a determination of electoral divisions, means a person whose name is on a roll of electors qualified to vote at an election in those divisions.

Right to vote.

"124H. (1) Laws prescribing the qualifications of electors for elections shall be such that each Australian citizen who:

- (a) complies with reasonable conditions prescribed by those laws as to residence and enrolment; and

- (b) has reached the age of eighteen years;

is entitled to vote, subject to any disqualification prescribed by those laws as to persons who:

- (c) because of unsoundness of mind, are incapable of understanding the nature and significance of enrolment and voting; or

- (d) are undergoing imprisonment for an offence.

"(2) If:

- (a) a person applies to a court of competent jurisdiction for an order under this subsection; and

- (b) the person would be qualified as an elector as provided by this section but for the fact that the relevant law is inconsistent with this section;

the court may order that the person shall be enrolled, and is entitled to vote, as if the person were so qualified.

"(3) This section does not apply in relation to an election held before the end of one year after the commencement of this Chapter.

Electors to have only one vote.

"124J. In the choosing of:

- (a) senators;
- (b) members of the House of Representatives;
- (c) members of a House of Parliament of a State; or
- (d) members of the legislature of a Territory forming part of Australia or a combination of such Territories;

each elector shall vote only once."

A PROPOSED LAW

To alter the Constitution to recognise local government

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the approval of the electors, as required by the Constitution, as follows:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the *Constitution Alteration (Local Government) 1988*.

2. The Constitution is altered by inserting after section 119 the following section:

Local Government.

"119A. Each State shall provide for the establishment and continuance of a system of local government, with local government bodies elected in accordance with the laws of the State and empowered to administer, and to make by-laws for, their respective areas in accordance with the laws of the State."

A PROPOSED LAW

To alter the Constitution to extend the right to trial by jury, to extend freedom of religion, and to ensure fair terms for persons whose property is acquired by any Government

BE IT ENACTED by the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the approval of the electors, as required by the Constitution, as follows:

Short title

1. This Act may be cited as the *Constitution Alteration (Rights and Freedoms) 1988*.

2. The Constitution is altered by omitting section 80 and substituting the following section:

Trial by jury.

"80. (1) The trial of a person for an offence, where the accused is liable to imprisonment for more than two years or any form of corporal punishment, shall be by jury except in the case of a trial for contempt of court or a trial of a member of the Defence Force of the Commonwealth before a court-martial under a law relating to the discipline of the Defence Force of the Commonwealth.

"(2) The trial by jury of an offence against a law of the Commonwealth that:

- (a) was not committed in a State or Territory;
- (b) was committed in two or more of the States and Territories; or
- (c) was committed at a place or places unknown;

shall be held at such place or places as the Parliament prescribes.

"(3) The trial by jury of any other offence against a law of the Commonwealth shall be held in the State or Territory where the offence was committed.

"(4) At any time during a trial referred to in subsection (2) or (3), the court may, on application by the accused or the prosecution, transfer the trial to a court of competent jurisdiction in another State or Territory.

"(5) Nothing in subsection (1) prevents the making, or affects the operation, of a law to the extent that the law:

- (a) permits waiver by the accused of trial by jury;
- (b) regulates the size or composition of the jury; or
- (c) provides for majority verdicts."

3. The Constitution is altered by inserting after section 115 the following sections:

Acquisition of property under State law.

"115A. A law of a State may not provide for the acquisition of property from any person except on just terms.

Acquisition of property in Territories.

"115B. A law made under section one hundred and twenty-two or a law of a Territory may not provide for the acquisition of property from any person except on just terms."

4. The Constitution is altered by omitting section 116 and substituting the following section:

No establishment etc. of religion.

"116. The Commonwealth, a State or a Territory shall not establish any religion, impose any religious observance or prohibit the free exercise of any religion, and no religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office or public trust under the Commonwealth, a State or a Territory."

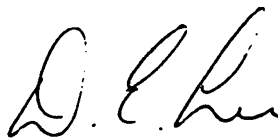

ASRB 1012: FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATION

NOTICE is hereby given that the Accounting Standards Review Board -

- (a) pursuant to sub-section 266B(1) of the Companies Act 1981 and the corresponding laws of the participating States and Northern Territory (collectively "the Code"), hereby revokes the approved accounting standard ASRB 1012: Foreign Currency Translation which was approved by notice published in Gazette No. S257 on 30 September 1987; and
- (b) pursuant to sub-section 266B(1) of the Code, hereby approves for the purposes of Part VI of the Code, the accounting standard ASRB 1012: Foreign Currency Translation, which replaces the approved accounting standard referred to in paragraph (a) and applies in relation to the first financial year of a company that ends after the expiration of two calendar months from the day on which this notice is published and in relation to subsequent financial years of the company.

Copies of the replacement approved accounting standard may be obtained by contacting the office of the ASRB (02) 964 1417.

An explanation of the purpose of the replacement approved accounting standard is set out in the Schedule.

SCHEDULE

EXPLANATORY NOTE

ASRB 1012: FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATION

The replacement approved accounting standard is similar to the approved accounting standard ASRB 1012: Foreign Currency Translation (approved Gazette No. S257, 30 September 1987), revoked by the above notice, except that amendments have been made to clauses .02, .34, .71 and a new .72(b) has been inserted.

The text of the amended paragraphs, as they appear in the replacement approved accounting standard, together with the consequential changes to the relevant parts of the commentary, are as follows:

.02 This approved accounting standard -

- (a) applies to -
 - (i) accounting methods and disclosure for the translation of foreign currency financial statements and foreign currency transactions other than transactions arising from speculative dealings; and
 - (ii) accounting disclosure for transactions arising from speculative dealings;

- (b) applies in relation to the first financial year of a company that ends after the expiration of two calendar months from the day on which this notice is published in the Gazette and in relation to subsequent financial years of the company; and
- (c) replaces the approved accounting standard ASRB 1012: Foreign Currency Translation which was approved by notice in Gazette No. S257, 30 September 1987.

This replacement standard was published in the Gazette on 29 July, 1988 and therefore applies to the financial years of a company that end on or after 30 September, 1988. Pursuant to sub-section 266C(2) ASRB 1012 (1987) will continue to apply to the immediately preceding financial year. In all cases, compliance with a requirement of an approved standard is subject to any relevant provision of the Code.

Section 273 of the Code provides that the National Companies and Securities Commission may in certain cases make an order relieving the directors of a company from any specified requirements relating to accounts or group accounts.

- .34 In respect of hedge transactions intended to hedge the purchase or sale of goods or services-
- (a) exchange differences, to the extent that they occur up to the date of purchase or sale; and
 - (b) costs or gains arising at the time of entering into the transactions,
- shall be deferred and included in the measurement of the purchase or sale.

Previously clause 34 covered "the purchase or sale of specific goods or services". This has now been amended to read "the purchase or sale of goods or services".

- .71 There shall be shown separately in the accounts and group accounts any adjustments pursuant to clauses .70 or .72(a) relating to -
- (a) retained profits or accumulated losses; and
 - (b) qualifying assets.

Previously this clause only covered adjustments pursuant to clause .70 rather than both clauses .70 and .72(a).

A new paragraph is to be inserted as clause .72(b) and the original clause .72(b) is to be described as clause .72(c).

- .72 (a) any deferred exchange differences existing in the balance sheet at the commencement of the first financial year of a company to which this standard applies which, had this standard previously applied, would have been taken to the profit and loss account, shall be taken directly to the balance of retained profits or accumulated losses as at that date;

- (b) any deferred exchange differences existing in the balance sheet at the commencement of the first financial year of a company to which this standard applies which had this standard previously applied, would have been taken directly to the foreign currency translation reserve, shall be taken directly to the balance of that reserve as at that date; and,
- (c) exchange differences arising from translating non-monetary assets at the current rate at balance date rather than at historical rates shall be taken directly to the foreign currency translation reserve.

Insert the following text as commentary paragraph (xxxvii) and renumber existing paragraph (xxxvii) to (xxxviii):

"Speculative dealing is defined as activity undertaken solely for the purpose of gaining through movements in foreign exchange rates (refer to definition in clause .06). This is to be contrasted with hedging, which is undertaken with a view to mitigating existing or anticipated exposures, and with other transactions such as purchasing, selling or raising finance which are undertaken for the other operating purposes of companies. It is recognised that some transactions will have dual purposes (that is, partially to hedge and partially to speculate) and that some allocations may be necessary."

Cross reference contained in italicised material following clause .60 would require amendment.

THESE ARRANGEMENTS are made in pursuance of section 39 of the Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987 of the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia between HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL of the COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, and HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR of the STATE OF VICTORIA, acting with the advice of the Executive Council of the State of Victoria.

WHEREAS:

- A. Sub-section 39(1) of the Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987 of the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia provides that the Governor-General may make arrangements with the Governor of a State or the Administrator of the Northern Territory with respect to the administration of that Act, including arrangements for the performance of the functions of a Magistrate under that Act by a Magistrate of that State.
- B. It is desired to make arrangements for the administration of that Act in the State of Victoria including measures for the efficient making, and carrying out, of requests for mutual assistance of the kind for which that Act provides.
- C. It is intended that the Governor-General will make arrangements similar to these with the other States and with the Northern Territory of Australia.
- D. The parties to this Arrangement have agreed to co-operate and consult with each other to ensure the implementation and effective enforcement of that Act:

NOW, pursuant to section 39 of the Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987 of the Commonwealth Parliament, IT IS HEREBY ARRANGED AS FOLLOWS.

Interpretation

1. In these Arrangements:

- (a) "Act" means the Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987 of the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia;**
- (b) "Attorney-General" means the Attorney-General for the Commonwealth and includes any other Minister of the Commonwealth acting, for the time being, for and on behalf of the Attorney-General;**
- (c) "Central Office" means the Attorney-General's Department, Canberra, or, if another authority is designated as the Central Office pursuant to a mutual assistance treaty between Australia and a foreign country, that other authority but only in relation to matters arising under these Arrangements in respect of that country;**
- (d) "Committee" means the Committee established by paragraph 4;**
- (e) "Commonwealth" means the Commonwealth of Australia;**
- (f) "Liaison Officer" in relation to the State of Victoria means the Liaison Officer appointed in respect of that State pursuant to paragraph 17;**

- (g) "Other Arrangements" mean arrangements similar to these Arrangements which the Governor-General has made or intends to make with the other States or with the Northern Territory of Australia;
- (h) "State" means a State of the Commonwealth and includes the Northern Territory; and
- (i) "State Minister" means, in relation to the State of Victoria, the Minister of that State responsible for the matters dealt with in these Arrangements and includes any other Minister of the State acting, for the time being, for and on behalf of that Minister.

2. Except where defined in these Arrangements, words and expressions defined in the Act shall have the same meaning when used in these Arrangements as they have in the Act.

3. Nothing in these Arrangements will prevent the provision or obtaining of international assistance in criminal matters otherwise than as mentioned in the Act or otherwise than pursuant to a treaty or other arrangement between Australia and a foreign country.

National Consultative Committee

4. There is established for the purposes of these Arrangements and the Other Arrangements a body to be known as the National Consultative Committee to which each of the Attorney-General and the State Minister for Victoria and the other State Ministers under Other Arrangements will appoint one member. A member may, at any time, authorize in writing another person to represent him at a meeting of the National Consultative Committee where that member is unable to attend that meeting.

5. The Committee will meet:

- (a) at least once each year;
- (b) on such additional occasions as the Attorney-General or any State Minister may request by notice in writing to the other Ministers; and
- (c) at such other times as the Committee may decide.

6. The function of the Committee is to consider:

- (a) issues and procedures relating to the Act, these Arrangements and Other Arrangements;
- (b) matters referred to it by the Attorney-General, the State Minister or any other State Minister under Other Arrangements; and
- (c) the Commonwealth program for negotiation of mutual assistance treaties and other arrangements.

7. Subject to these Arrangements the Committee is responsible for the overall conduct of its operations including the making of rules for its practices and procedures and for the calling and conduct of meetings.

8. In order that the Committee may effectively consider the Commonwealth program for mutual assistance under the Act, the Attorney-General will ensure where possible that the Committee is informed in reasonable time:

- (a) of proposals relating to the program for negotiation of mutual assistance treaties; and
- (b) of proposals to apply the Act to specified foreign countries pursuant to section 7(2)(b) of the Act.

9. The Commonwealth will continue to advise the States of its general programs for the negotiation of treaties, in accordance with practices already in force in that regard.

Requests for Assistance in Australia

- (a) a foreign country makes a request pursuant to the Act for assistance of a kind referred to in the Act; and
- (b) the carrying out of that request may involve the jurisdiction, or affect the interest, of the State of Victoria,

the Central Office will, before any action is taken under the Act in relation to that request, inform the Liaison Officer of that State of that request at the earliest practicable stage after receipt by the Commonwealth of the request and consult with that Liaison Officer in regard to that request as soon as convenient thereafter.

12. Without limiting the requirements of paragraph 11, the Attorney-General will, in considering a request described in paragraph 11 pursuant to the Act, ensure that:

- (a) the Liaison Officer is consulted by Central Office before any decision is taken to refuse that request pursuant to section 8 of the Act on grounds relating to the interests of that State; and

- (b) where a request (if granted on conditions) would be carried out within the jurisdiction of the State of Victoria or would affect its interests, there is consultation by Central Office with the Liaison Officer as to the form and nature of those conditions before any decision is taken pursuant to the Act to grant that request subject to conditions.

For these purposes, the Attorney-General will, in relation to the request, take particular account of the relevance to the State of the request in regard to the matters specified in paragraphs 8(2)(d) and (f) of the Act.

13. In any case where the interests of a foreign country are to be represented in an Australian court in matters arising under the Act the Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions shall represent those interests in that court.

14. Subject to paragraphs 13 and 16 where the Attorney-General agrees to provide assistance to a foreign country in response to a request made by it pursuant to the Act in relation to an offence, the action necessary to provide that assistance will, if the offence would in Australia be regarded as an offence against a law of:

- (a) the Commonwealth, be carried out by the appropriate authorities of the Commonwealth; and
- (b) the State of Victoria, be carried out by the appropriate authorities of that State subject to paragraph 15.

15. where:

- (a) in accordance with paragraph 14 the authorities of the State of Victoria would be expected to carry out the action necessary to meet a request; but

- (b) the State Minister has made representations to the Attorney-General in the consultations under paragraph 11 that the request should be refused,

then the Attorney-General will not require that State to carry out the necessary action and, if the State refuses to, or does not within a reasonable time, carry out that action the authorities of the Commonwealth will carry out that action.

16. Where, in accordance with paragraph 14, the authorities of the Commonwealth, or of the State of Victoria, would be expected to carry out the action necessary to meet a request, those authorities may, through the Central Office and the Liaison Officer, arrange that the action will be carried out by the authorities of, respectively, the State, or by the Commonwealth.

State Liaison Officers

17. The State Minister will appoint a Liaison Officer to liaise, for the purposes of these Arrangements, with:

- (a) the Central Office;
- (b) the State Liaison Officer of each other State which may participate under Other Arrangements; and
- (c) other agencies as appropriate,

in relation to the making and carrying out of requests made pursuant to the Act.

18. The Liaison Officer will be the principal co-ordinator, within the State of Victoria, of matters arising under these Arrangements and in particular will:

- (a) receive from Central Office all requests made by a foreign country pursuant to the Act, that concern that State;
- (b) receive from Central Office notice of other requests of that kind for which action is to be carried out by Commonwealth authorities in the State;
- (c) ensure that requests referred to in sub-paragraph (a) are carried out by appropriate State authorities in accordance with the Act;
- (d) pass to Central Office requests by the State for mutual assistance by foreign countries, in accordance with the Act; and
- (e) liaise with the appropriate Commonwealth authorities whenever arrangements of the kind referred to in paragraph 16 are contemplated.

Resolution of Disputes

19. The Central Office and the Liaison Officer will attempt to resolve by consultation any dispute as to whether a request made by a foreign country pursuant to the Act should be carried out by authorities of the Commonwealth or of the State of Victoria. Should the dispute not be resolved within a reasonable time by that means, the matter will be referred to the Committee. If the matter cannot be resolved by the Committee within a reasonable time, the Attorney-General and the State Minister, together with any other relevant Ministers of the Commonwealth and the State, will jointly determine the matter.

20. Where the Attorney-General and the State Minister are unable to agree on the settlement of a dispute referred to in paragraph 19 and the Attorney-General determines that the request should be granted then the authorities of the Commonwealth will carry out the necessary action in regard to the request.

Costs and Resources

21. Where a request is made pursuant to the Act by the Commonwealth for itself or on behalf of the State of Victoria to a foreign country, the Commonwealth or the State, whichever is seeking the assistance, will meet the costs of:

- (a) translation services;
- (b) travel by witnesses, foreign prisoners and custodial officers to and from Australia and that foreign country; and
- (c) board and lodging and sustenance of those witnesses, foreign prisoners or custodial officers while they are in Australia.

Where such a request is made by a foreign country, that country would meet those costs in relation to that request.

22. Subject to paragraph 13, the responsibility for costs incurred in Australia in carrying out a request made by a foreign country pursuant to the Act will be borne according to the nature of the offence concerned. If the offence is of a kind that, if it were committed in Australia, would be an offence against a law of the Commonwealth, the Commonwealth will meet those costs; if the offence would be an offence against the law of the State of Victoria and the action to carry out the request is taken by the authorities of that State, the State will meet those costs.

23. Where, in accordance with paragraph 22, the State of Victoria would be required to meet the costs incurred in carrying out a request made by a foreign country but that State considers that that requirement imposes or is likely to impose an undue burden on its financial, personnel or other resources, the Central Office and the Liaison Officer will, at the request of the State, seek to resolve the matter in consultation. In resolving the matter, consideration will extend to the question of recommending to the Attorney-General refusal of the request concerned pursuant to paragraph 8(2)(f) of the Act, reimbursing the State for the cost of carrying out the request, and carrying out the request either by Commonwealth agencies under an arrangement pursuant to paragraph 16, or by other assistance by the Commonwealth to the State.

24. If in the consultations referred to in paragraph 23, the Central Office and the State of Victoria do not resolve the difficulties of the State in regard to costs relating to a request, the matter will be referred if appropriate to the Committee. If not then resolved, the Attorney-General and the State Minister will arrange for consultations between relevant Ministers of the Commonwealth and the State to determine the matter.

Rotation of Officers

25. The Attorney-General and the State Minister may arrange for the officers of the Central Office and of the appropriate authorities of the State of Victoria to exchange duties from time to time, to the effect that officers of the State shall gain experience in the functions of the Central Office that relate to these Arrangements and officers of the Central Office shall gain experience in operations in the State relevant to those functions.

Review of Arrangements

26. The Attorney-General and the State Minister will arrange for the operation of these Arrangements to be reviewed not later than the expiration of 3 years after the date on which these Arrangements are made.

27. Whenever the Attorney-General or the State Minister requests consultations to discuss methods whereby the implementation of these Arrangements may be improved, each Minister may arrange for representatives to participate in discussions for that purpose.

Termination

28. The State Minister may give to the Attorney-General at any time notice that the State of Victoria will no longer participate in the procedures set out in these Arrangements. Where such notice is given, it will take effect 6 months after the date on which it is given. These Arrangements will, however, continue to apply in relation to that State after a notice of termination is given by that State, in respect of any action under these Arrangements that was commenced or required to be taken prior to the expiry of that period of 6 months. At the expiry of that notice these Arrangements will continue to operate in respect of the Commonwealth and other States which are participating under Other Arrangements.

29. The Attorney-General may, at any time, give to the State Minister notice of termination of these Arrangements. Where such notice of termination is given it will take effect 6 months after the date on which it is given. These Arrangements will, however, continue to apply in respect of any action under these Arrangements that was commenced or required to be taken prior to the expiry of that period of 6 months notice.

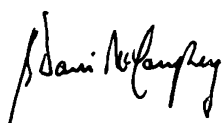
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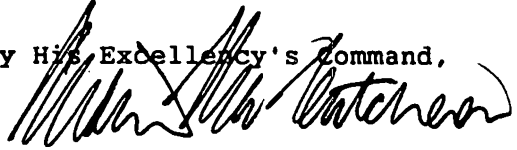

If the matter cannot be resolved by the Committee within a reasonable time, the Attorney-General and the State Minister, together with any other relevant Ministers of the Commonwealth and the State, will jointly determine the matter.

20. Where the Attorney-General and the State Minister are unable to agree on the settlement of a dispute referred to in paragraph 19 and the Attorney-General determines that the request should be granted then the authorities of the Commonwealth will carry out the necessary action in regard to the request.

Costs and Resources

21. Where a request is made pursuant to the Act by the Commonwealth for itself or on behalf of the State of South Australia to a foreign country, the Commonwealth or the State, whichever is seeking the assistance, will meet the costs of:

- (a) translation services;
- (b) travel by witnesses, foreign prisoners and custodial officers to and from Australia and that foreign country; and
- (c) board and lodging and sustenance of those witnesses, foreign prisoners or custodial officers while they are in Australia.

Where such a request is made by a foreign country, that country would meet those costs in relation to that request.

22. Subject to paragraph 13, the responsibility for costs incurred in Australia in carrying out a request made by a foreign country pursuant to the Act will be borne according to the nature of the offence concerned. If the offence is of a kind that, if it were committed in Australia, would be an offence against a law of the Commonwealth, the Commonwealth will meet those costs; if the offence would be an offence against the law of the State of South Australia and the action to carry out the request is taken by the authorities of that State, the State will meet those costs.

23. Where, in accordance with paragraph 22, the State of South Australia would be required to meet the costs incurred in carrying out a request made by a foreign country but that State considers that that requirement imposes or is likely to impose an undue burden on its financial, personnel or other resources, the Central Office and the Liaison Officer will, at the request of the State, seek to resolve the matter in consultation. In resolving the matter, consideration will extend to the question of recommending to the Attorney-General refusal of the request concerned pursuant to paragraph 8(2)(f) of the Act, reimbursing the State for the cost of carrying out the request, and carrying out the request either by Commonwealth agencies under an arrangement pursuant to paragraph 16, or by other assistance by the Commonwealth to the State.

24. If in the consultations referred to in paragraph 23, the Central Office and the State of South Australia do not resolve the difficulties of the State in regard to costs relating to a request, the matter will be referred if appropriate to the Committee. If not then resolved, the Attorney-General and the State Minister will arrange for consultations between relevant Ministers of the Commonwealth and the State to determine the matter.

Rotation of Officers

25. The Attorney-General and the State Minister may arrange for the officers of the Central Office and of the appropriate authorities of the State of South Australia to exchange duties from time to time, to the effect that officers of the State shall gain experience in the functions of the Central Office that relate to these Arrangements and officers of the Central Office shall gain experience in operations in the State relevant to those functions.

Review of Arrangements

26. The Attorney-General and the State Minister will arrange for the operation of these Arrangements to be reviewed not later than the expiration of 3 years after the date on which these Arrangements are made.

27. Whenever the Attorney-General or the State Minister requests consultations to discuss methods whereby the implementation of these Arrangements may be improved, each Minister may arrange for representatives to participate in discussions for that purpose.

Termination

28. The State Minister may give to the Attorney-General at any time notice that the State of South Australia will no longer participate in the procedures set out in these Arrangements. Where such notice is given, it will take effect 6 months after the date on which it is given. These Arrangements will, however, continue to apply in relation to that State after a notice of termination is given by that State, in respect of any action under these Arrangements that was commenced or required to be taken prior to the expiry of that period of 6 months. At the expiry of that notice these Arrangements will continue to operate in respect of the Commonwealth and other States which are participating under Other Arrangements.

29. The Attorney-General may, at any time, give to the State Minister notice of termination of these Arrangements. Where such notice of termination is given it will take effect 6 months after the date on which it is given. These Arrangements will, however, continue to apply in respect of any action under these Arrangements that was commenced or required to be taken prior to the expiry of that period of 6 months notice.

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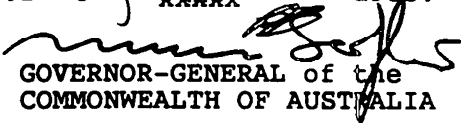
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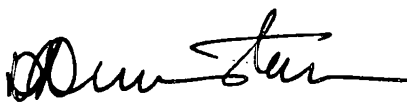
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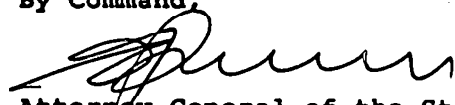

NOW, pursuant to section 39 of the Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987 of the Commonwealth Parliament, IT IS HEREBY ARRANGED AS FOLLOWS.

Interpretation

1. In these Arrangements:

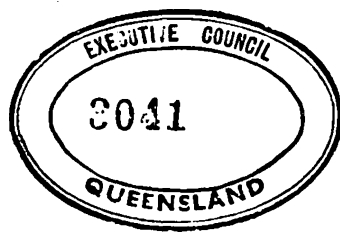

- (i) "State Minister" means, in relation to the State of Queensland, the Minister of that State responsible for the matters dealt with in these Arrangements and includes any other Minister of the State acting, for the time being, for and on behalf of that Minister.

National Consultative Committee

A member may, at any time, authorize in writing another person to represent him at a meeting of the National Consultative Committee where that member is unable to attend that meeting.



5. The Committee will meet:

- (a) at least once each year;
- (b) on such additional occasions as the Attorney-General or any State Minister may request by notice in writing to the other Ministers; and
- (c) at such other times as the Committee may decide.

6. The function of the Committee is to consider:

- (a) issues and procedures relating to the Act, these Arrangements and Other Arrangements;

the Central Office will, before any action is taken under the Act in relation to that request, inform the Liaison Officer of that State of that request at the earliest practicable stage after receipt by the Commonwealth of the request and consult with that Liaison Officer in regard to that request as soon as convenient thereafter.

12. Without limiting the requirements of paragraph 11, the Attorney-General will, in considering a request described in paragraph 11 pursuant to the Act, ensure that:

- (a) the Liaison Officer is consulted by Central Office before any decision is taken to refuse that request pursuant to section 8 of the Act on grounds relating to the interests of that State; and



- (b) where a request (if granted on conditions) would be carried out within the jurisdiction of the State of Queensland or would affect its interests, there is consultation by Central Office with the Liaison Officer as to the form and nature of those conditions before any decision is taken pursuant to the Act to grant that request subject to conditions.

For these purposes, the Attorney-General will, in relation to the request, take particular account of the relevance to the State of the request in regard to the matters specified in paragraphs 8(2)(d) and (f) of the Act.

13. In any case where the interests of a foreign country are to be represented in an Australian court in matters arising under the Act the Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions shall represent those interests in that court.

14. Subject to paragraphs 13 and 16 where the Attorney-General agrees to provide assistance to a foreign country in response to a request made by it pursuant to the Act in relation to an offence, the action necessary to provide that assistance will, if the offence would in Australia be regarded as an offence against a law of:

- (a) the Commonwealth, be carried out by the appropriate authorities of the Commonwealth; and
- (b) the State of Queensland, be carried out by the appropriate authorities of that State subject to paragraph 15.

15. where:

- (a) in accordance with paragraph 14 the authorities of the State of Queensland would be expected to carry out the action necessary to meet a request: but



- (b) the State Minister has made representations to the Attorney-General in the consultations under paragraph 11 that the request should be refused,

then the Attorney-General will not require that State to carry out the necessary action and, if the State refuses to, or does not within a reasonable time, carry out that action the authorities of the Commonwealth will carry out that action.

16. Where, in accordance with paragraph 14, the authorities of the Commonwealth, or of the State of Queensland, would be expected to carry out the action necessary to meet a request, those authorities may, through the Central Office and the Liaison Officer, arrange that the action will be carried out by the authorities of, respectively, the State, or by the Commonwealth.

State Liaison Officers

17. The State Minister will appoint a Liaison Officer to liaise, for the purposes of these Arrangements, with:

- (a) the Central Office;
- (b) the State Liaison Officer of each other State which may participate under Other Arrangements; and
- (c) other agencies as appropriate,

in relation to the making and carrying out of requests made pursuant to the Act.

18. The Liaison Officer will be the principal co-ordinator, within the State of Queensland, of matters arising under these Arrangements and in particular will:



- (a) receive from Central Office all requests made by a foreign country pursuant to the Act, that concern that State;

- (a) Subsection 39(1) of the *Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters Act 1987* of the Commonwealth (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") provides that the Governor-General may make arrangements with the Governor of a State with respect to the administration of the Act, including the performance of the functions of a Magistrate under the Act by a Magistrate of that Territory.
- (b) It is desired to make such arrangements for the performance of the functions of a Magistrate under that Act by Magistrates of the Northern Territory of Australia.

NOW, IT IS HEREBY ARRANGED in pursuance of section 39 of the Act that any person who, from time to time, holds office as a Magistrate of the Northern Territory may perform the functions of a Magistrate under the Act.

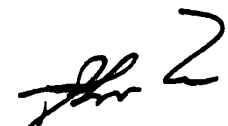

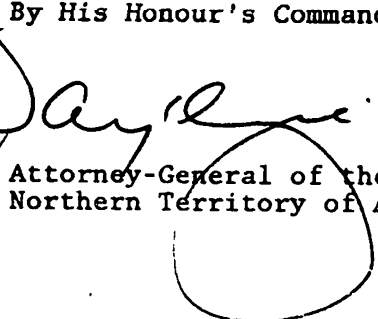
