

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA Health Insurance Act 1973

ORDER UNDER SUBSECTION 6 (1)

- I, BEN HUMPHREYS, Acting Minister of State for Community Services and Health, in pursuance of subsection 6 (1) of the *Health Insurance Act 1973* (the Act) hereby:
- (a) revoke with effect from the date of this order, the order made under the above subsection on 28 March 1984;
- (b) revoke, with effect from 1 February 1989, the order made under the above subsection on 25 August 1986;
- (c) declare that every person included in the following class of persons, namely, foreign students undertaking courses of study in Australia and their accompanying dependants, being a person who, but for this order, would not be an eligible person for the purposes of

- the Act, shall be treated as being an eligible person for the purposes of the Act; and
- (d) declare that this order shall not apply to a foreign student (or to his or her accompanying dependants) undertaking a course of study in Australia who is paying full tuition fees in relation to that course and:
 - (i) has been issued with an Australian visa for study purposes on or after 1 March 1989; or
 - (ii) has been granted, on or after 1 March 1989, an extension of stay in Australia for the purpose of continuing the above course of study.

Employment, Education and Training

States Grants (Schools Assistance) Act 1988

I, NICK VAN WEELDEN, exercising delegation for the Minister of State for Employment, Education and Training, in accordance with Section 3(2) of the Act, specify, for the purposes of the Act, in respect of each level of education at which education is provided by schools included in a specified class of schools, a number of students to be the minimum acceptable number of students for a school, or a school in so far as it provides education at a particular level as set out below.

The following principles underlie the minimum enrolment guidelines:

- (a) in general, junior secondary schools are approved for years 7-10 (or 8-10). Senior secondary schools are approved for years 11-12;
- (b) in the case of secondary schools the number of years of operation at a level will be taken into account in considering minimum enrolment requirements;
- (c) schools comprising ungraded students will be treated as if they were offering a complete level;
- (d) schools offering both primary and secondary levels must meet the enrolment minima for each of the levels offered.
- For existing schools not covered by the enrolment minima specified at 2 or 3, a minimum of 1 student at each level of education offered applies.
- The following minima will apply to Aboriginal community schools and schools holding provisional or final approval dated at or before
 May 1988 in respect of a proposal for 1985 or a later date.
 - (i) Primary schools; a minimum of 20 students.
 - (ii) Junior secondary schools must enrol an average of 10 students per grade level
 - (iii) Senior secondary schools must enrol a minimum of 8 students per grade level.
 - (iv) For schools provisionally approved for a progressive extension to the junior secondary level of education the following enrolment minima apply:
 - (a) in the first year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 10 students enrolled at that level;
 - (b) in the second year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have an average of 10 students enrolled in each of the two grade-levels offered;

- (c) in the third year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have an average of 10 students enrolled in each of the three grade-levels offered;
- (d) where applicable, in the fourth year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have an average of 10 students enrolled in each of the four grade-levels offered.
- (v) For schools provisionally approved for a progressive extension to the senior secondary level of education the following enrolment minima apply:
 - (a) in the first year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 8 students enrolled;
 - (b) in the second year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 8 students enrolled in each of the two grade-levels offered.
- 3. For schools receiving provisional approval in respect of their commencement or change in operation after 24 May 1988 the following apply:
 - (i) Primary schools; a minimum enrolment of 50 students.
 - (ii) A minimum of 25 students must be enrolled in each junior secondary grade level.
 - (iii) A minimum of 20 students must be enrolled in each senior secondary grade level.
 - (iv) for schools provisionally approved for a progressive extension to provide the junior secondary level of education the following enrolment minima apply:
 - (a) in the first year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 25 students enrolled at that level;
 - (b) in the second year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 25 students enrolled in each of the two grade-levels offered;
 - (c) in the third year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 25 students enrolled in each of the three grade-levels offered;
 - (d) where applicable, in the fourth year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 25 students enrolled in each of the four grade-levels offered.

- (v) For schools provisionally approved for a progressive extension to provide the senior secondary level of education the following enrolment minima apply:
 - (a) in the first year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 20 students enrolled;
 - (b) in the second year for which the progressive extension has been approved, the school must have 20 students enrolled in each of the two grade-levels offered.
- 4. Special schools must have a minimum of 1 student.
- For existing schools wishing to extend their levels of educational provision, new levels of education must meet respective minima.
