EAST COAST DEEP WATER FIN FISH TRAWL FISHERY PROHIBITION OF TRAWLING

I, JOHN CHARLES KERIN, the Minister of State for Primary Industries and Energy, for the purposes of section 8 of the Fisheries Act 1952, hereby make the following notice.

CITATION

1. This Notice may be cited as Fisheries Notice No. ECF 1.

REVOCATION OF FISHERIES NOTICE NO. 201

2. Fisheries Notice No. 201, published in Gazette No. GN 31 dated 2 December 1987, is revoked.

INTERPRETATION

- 3.1 In this Notice, unless the contrary intention appears, words have the same meaning as in the *Fisheries Act 1952*, and "the Act" means the *Fisheries Act 1952*.

- 3.2 Where for the purposes of this Notice it is necessary to determine the position on the surface of the Earth of a point, line or area, that position shall be determined by reference to the Australian Geodetic Datum, that is by reference to a spheroid having its centre at the centre of the Earth and a major (equatorial) radius of 6,378,160 metres and a flattening of 1/298.25 and by reference to the Johnston

Geodetic Station in the Northern Territory of Australia. That station shall be taken to be situated at Latitude 25°56'54.5515" South and at Longitude 133°12'30.0771" East and to have a ground level of 571.2 metres above the spheroid referred to above.

PROHIBITION OF TRAWLING WITH CERTAIN TYPES OF NET

4. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(c) of the Act, the taking of fish from the area of proclaimed waters specified in Schedule 1 with the use of a trawl net, the mesh of which is greater than 60 millimetres when measured in accordance with Schedule 2 or Schedule 3 is prohibited.

ENDORSEMENT OF LICENCE

5. Pursuant to paragraph 8(4D) (b) of the Act, the activities prohibited by paragraph (a) are activities in respect of which an endorsement may be made under sub-section 9(4) of the Act.

SAVING

6. Pursuant to subsection 8(4DAA) of the Act, notwithstanding the revocation of Fisheries Notice No 201, any endorsement made under subsection 9(4) of the Act which would have effect in relation to the prohibitions contained in that notice shall continue to have effect until such time as an endorsement is issued pursuant to this Notice or until such time as the endorsement would otherwise have ceased to have effect.

SCHEDULE 1

Area of proclaimed waters

The area of proclaimed waters contained within an area bounded by the line:

- 1) commencing at the point of Latitude 33°35'South, Longitude 153°10'East;
- 2) thence running northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 30°South, Longitude 154°40'East;
- 3) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 27°30'South;
- 4) thence northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 27°15'South, Longitude 154°20'East;
- 5) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 24°30'South;
- 6) thence west along that parallel to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 154°East;
- 7) thence northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 21°South, Longitude 152°55'East;
- 8) thence north-westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 17°30'South, Longitude 147°East;
- 9) thence north-westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 15°South, Longitude 146°East;
- 10) thence northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 13°South, Longitude 145°East;
- 11) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 10°41'South;
- 12) thence westerly along the geodesic to the northern most intersection of the shore of Cape York Peninsula with the meridian Longitude 142°31'49"East;
- 13) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 10°41'17"South;
- 14) thence east along that parallel to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 144°East;
- 15) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 10°28'South;
- 16) thence east along that parallel to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 144°10'East;
- 17) thence northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 10°15'South, Longitude 144°12'East;
- 18) thence north-easterly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 9°54'South, Longitude 144°28'East;
- 19) thence north along the meridian of Longitude 144°28'East to its intersection with the outer limit of the Australian fishing zone;
- 20) thence generally southerly along the 200 mile Australian fishing zone boundary to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 33°35'South;

- 21) thence west along the parallel of Latitude 33°35'South to the point of commencement.

SCHEDULE 2

Manner of measuring mesh of net:

1. Immediately before a measurement is taken, the part of the net to be measured shall be soaked in fresh or salt water for not less than five minutes.
2. The part of the net to be measured shall then be suspended vertically and a weight of 3170 grams shall be suspended from one knot of that part of the net.
3. The distance between the surface of the knot from which the weight is suspended and the surface of the knot is the diagonally opposite corner of the mesh immediately above the first-mentioned knot shall be measured with a metal rule to the nearest millimetre.
4. The measurement of the mesh shall be taken to be the average measurement of ten adjacent meshes at any place in the net.

SCHEDULE 3

Manner of measuring mesh of net:

1. Immediately before a measurement is taken the part of the net to be measured shall be soaked in fresh or salt water for not less than five minutes.
2. The part of the net to be measured shall be suspended vertically. The distance between the surface of a knot and the surface of the knot diagonally opposite the first-mentioned knot in the same mesh shall be measured by means of a device designed for the measuring of the mesh of nets by means of two arms, the upper of which, when the device is in use, shall be fixed to the body of the device and the lower of

which when the device is in use shall:

- (a) be directly below the upper;
 - (b) move freely in relation to the upper; and
 - (c) have a weight of 3170 grams acting on it.
3. The device shall be suspended in such a manner as to ensure that the upper edge shall remain in a fixed position and that the lower edge may move freely in relation to the upper edge, within the confines of the mesh to be measured.
 4. The device shall be equipped with a scale from which the distance between the upper edge of the upper arm and the lower edge of the lower arm can be ascertained at any time to the nearest millimetre.

1. This Notice may be cited as Fisheries Notice No. ECC 2.

REVOCATION OF FISHERIES NOTICE NO. ECC1

2. Fisheries Notice No. ECC 1, published in Gazette No. S351 dated 14 November 1988, is revoked.

INTERPRETATION

- 3.1 In this Notice, unless the contrary intention appears, words have the same meaning as in the *Fisheries Act 1952* and -

"licence" means a licence granted to a person, in respect of a boat, under subsection 9(2) of the Act;

"the Act" means the *Fisheries Act 1952*.

- 3.2 Where for the purposes of this Notice it is necessary to determine the position on the surface of the Earth of a point, line or area, that position shall be determined by reference to the Australian Geodetic Datum, that is by reference to a

spheroid having its centre at the centre of the Earth and a major (equatorial) radius of 6,378,160 metres and a flattening of 1/298.25 and by reference to the Johnston Geodetic Station in the Northern Territory of Australia. That station shall be taken to be situated at Latitude 25°56'54.5515" South and at Longitude 133°12'30.0771" East and to have a ground level of 571.2 metres above the spheroid referred to above.

PROHIBITION OF TAKING CRUSTACEA

4. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(c) of the Act, the taking of fish of the Class Crustacea, in the area of proclaimed waters specified in Schedule 1, by the method known as trawling is prohibited.

PROHIBITION OF NET WITH MESH OF 60 MILLIMETRES OR LESS

5. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(da) of the Act, a person is prohibited from having in the person's possession or in the person's charge in a boat, in the area of proclaimed waters specified in Schedule 1, a trawl net the mesh of which is less than, or

equal to, 60 millimetres when measured in accordance with either Schedule 2 or Scheduled 3.

ENDORSEMENT TO LICENCE

6. Pursuant to paragraph 8(4D)(b) of the Act, the activities to which the prohibitions contained in paragraphs 4 and 5 of this Notice relate are activities in respect of which an endorsement may be made under subsection 9(4) of the Act.

SAVING

7. Pursuant to subsection 8(4DAA) of the Act, notwithstanding the revocation of Fisheries Notice No ECC 1, any endorsement made under subsection 9(4) of the Act which would have effect in relation to the prohibitions contained in that notice shall continue to have effect until such time as an endorsement is issued pursuant to this Notice or until such time as the endorsement would otherwise have ceased to have effect.

SCHEDULE 1

Area of proclaimed waters

The area of proclaimed waters contained within an area bounded by the line:

- 1) commencing at the point of Latitude 33°35'South, Longitude 153°10'East;
- 2) thence running northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 30°South, Longitude 154°40'East;
- 3) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 22°15'South;
- 4) thence north-westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 18°45'South, Longitude 152°35'East;
- 5) thence westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 18°20'South, Longitude 148°20'East;

- 6) thence north-westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 15°South, Longitude 146°East;
- 7) thence north-westerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 13°South, Longitude 145°East;
- 8) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the outer limit of the Australian fishing zone;
- 9) thence generally southerly along the 200 mile Australian fishing zone boundary to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 33°35'South;
- 10) thence west along the parallel of Latitude 33°35'South to the point of commencement.

SCHEDULE 2

Manner of measuring mesh of net

1. Immediately before a measurement is taken, the part of the net to be measured shall be soaked in fresh or salt water for not less than 5 minutes.
2. The part of the net to be measured shall then be suspended vertically and a weight of 3170 grams shall be suspended from one knot of that part of the net.
3. The distance between the surface of the knot from which the weight is suspended and the surface of the knot in the diagonally opposite corner of the mesh immediately above the first-mentioned knot shall be measured with a metal rule to the nearest millimetre.
4. The measurement of the mesh shall be taken to be the average measurement of 10 adjacent meshes at any place in the net.

SCHEDULE 3

Manner of measuring mesh of net

1. Immediately before a measurement is taken the part of the net to be measured shall be soaked in fresh or salt water for not less than 5 minutes.
2. The part of the net to be measured shall be suspended vertically. The distance between the surface of a knot and the surface of the knot diagonally opposite the first-mentioned knot is the same mesh shall be measured by means of a device designed for the measuring of the mesh of nets by means of two arms, the upper of which, when the device is in use, shall be fixed to the body of the device and the lower of which when the device is in use

shall:

- (a) be directly below the upper arm;
 - (b) move freely in relation to the upper arm; and
 - (c) have a weight of 3170 grams acting on it.
3. The device shall be suspended in such a manner as to ensure that the upper edge shall remain in a fixed position and that the lower edge may move freely in relation to the upper edge, within the confines of the mesh to be measured.
 4. The device shall be equipped with a scale from which the distance between the upper edge of the upper arm and the lower edge of the lower arm can be ascertained at any time to the nearest millimetre.

SAVING OF FISHERIES NOTICE 120

2.1 Fisheries Notice No. 120, published in *Gazette* No. S1 dated 6 January 1984, is not revoked by this Notice.

2.2 The Fisheries Notice specified in paragraph 2.1 shall cease to have effect until the revocation of this Notice.

REVOCATION

3. Fisheries Notice No. 121, published in *Gazette* No. S129 dated 9 April 1984, and Fisheries Notice No. BSS2, published in *Gazette* No. GN 46 dated 21 November 1990 are revoked.

INTERPRETATION

4.1 In this Notice, unless the contrary intention appears, words have the same meaning as in the Act, and:

- (a) "scallops" means bivalve molluscs of the family Pectinidae; and
- (b) "the Act" means the *Fisheries Act 1952*.

4.2 Where for the purposes of the Notice it is necessary to determine the position on the surface of the Earth of a point, line or area, that position shall be determined by reference to the Australian Geodetic Datum, that is to say, by reference to a spheroid having its centre at the centre of the Earth and a major (equatorial) radius of 6,378,160 metres and flattening of 1/298.25 and by reference to the Johnston Geodetic Station in the Northern Territory of Australia. That station shall be taken to be situated at Latitude 25°56'54.5515" South and at Longitude 133°12'30.0771" East and to have a ground level of 571.2 metres above the spheroid referred to above.

PROHIBITION OF DREDGING OR TRAWLING FOR SCALLOPS

5.1 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(c) of the Act, the taking of scallops from the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule which is west of the line commencing at the point of Latitude 39°08' South, Longitude 146°25' East and running generally south to the point of Latitude 41°07.2' South, Longitude 146°32' East, by dredging or trawling with the use of a boat using dredge or trawling equipment designed or adapted for the taking of scallops:

- (a) during the period commencing on 1 December in any year and expiring at the end of 31 March in the following year;
- (b) during the period commencing on 1 April in any year and expiring at the end of 30 November in the same year,

is prohibited.

5.2 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(c) of the Act, the taking of scallops from the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule which is east of the line commencing at the point of Latitude 39°08' South, Longitude 146°25' East and running generally south to the point of Latitude 41°07.2' South, Longitude 146°32' East, by dredging or trawling with the use of a boat using dredge or trawling equipment designed or adapted for the taking of scallops:

- (a) during the period commencing on 1 December in any year and expiring at the end of 31 March in the following year;
- (b) during the period commencing on 1 April in any year and expiring at the end of 30 November in the same year,

is prohibited.

PROHIBITION OF TAKING SMALL SCALLOPS

6. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(b) of the Act, the taking of scallops that are less than 80 millimetres wide at the widest point across the shell in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule is prohibited.

PROHIBITIONS OF PROCESSING AND CARRYING SCALLOPS

7.1 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(a) of the Act, the processing of scallops (including shucking) on a boat in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule is prohibited.

7.2 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(a) of the Act, the carrying of scallops taken with the use of another boat in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule is prohibited.

PROHIBITIONS OF CARRYING SCALLOP DREDGES

8.1 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(e) of the Act, a person is prohibited from having in that person's possession or charge in a boat, a dredge designed or adapted for the taking of scallops unless the dredge is out of the tipper and on the deck and has been disconnected from the winch cable in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule which is west of the line commencing at the point of Latitude 39°08' South, Longitude 146°25' East and running generally south to the point of Latitude 41°07.2' South, Longitude 146°32' East.

8.2 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(e) of the Act, a person is prohibited from having in that person's possession or charge in a boat, a dredge designed or adapted for the taking of scallops unless the dredge is out of the tipper and on the deck and has been disconnected from the winch cable in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule which is east of the line commencing at the point of

Latitude 39°08' South, Longitude 146°25' East and running generally south to the point of Latitude 41°07.2' South, Longitude 146°32' East.

8.3 Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(da) of the Act, as from 1 January 1992, a person is prohibited from having in that person's possession or charge in a boat, a dredge designed or adapted for the taking of scallops that is of a width that is greater than 3.66 metres, in the area of proclaimed waters specified in the Schedule.

ENDORSEMENT OF LICENCES

9.1 Pursuant to paragraph 8(4D)(b) of the Act, the activities prohibited by subparagraph 5.1(b) and paragraph 8.1 are activities in respect of which a licence granted under subsection 9(2) of the Act may be endorsed.

9.2 Pursuant to paragraph 8(4D)(b) of the Act, the activities prohibited by subparagraph 5.2(b) and paragraph 8.2 are activities in respect of which a licence granted under subsection 9(2) of the Act may be endorsed.

EXEMPTION

10. Pursuant to paragraph 8(2)(d) of the Act, a person using a boat in respect of which a permit has been issued pursuant to section 6B of the Act is exempt from the prohibitions described in paragraphs 5, 8.1 and 8.2.

SCHEDULE

AREA OF THE BASS STRAIT SCALLOP FISHERY

The area of proclaimed waters contained within the area bounded by a line:

- (1) commencing at the point of Latitude 40°45' South, Longitude 140°57.9' East;
- (2) running thence east along the parallel of Latitude 40°45' South to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 144°15' East;
- (3) thence north along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 40°20' South;
- (4) thence north-easterly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 40°04' South, Longitude 144°47' East;

- (12) thence northerly along the geodesic to the point of Latitude 39°36' south, Longitude 147°32' East;
 - (13) thence south-easterly along the geodesic running through the point of Latitude 39°36' South, Longitude 147°32' East and the point of Latitude 39°44' South, Longitude 147°51' East to its intersection with the outer limit of coastal waters adjacent to Flinders Island;
 - (14) thence generally northerly and south-easterly along that outer limit to its intersection east of Flinders Island with the parallel of Latitude 39°56' South;
 - (15) thence east along the parallel of Latitude 39°56' South to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 150°25' East;
 - (16) thence northerly along the meridian of Longitude 150°25' East to its intersection with a point 20 nautical miles seaward of the nearest point of the baseline from which the coastal waters of Victoria are measured;
 - (17) thence generally southerly and westerly along the line, every point on which is 20 nautical miles from the baseline from which the coastal waters of Victoria are measured to the point of intersection of the parallel of Latitude 39° South;
 - (18) thence west along the parallel of Latitude 39° South to the point of intersection of that parallel with the eastern shore of Wilson's Promontory;
 - (19) thence generally southerly and westerly along the shore of Wilson's Promontory to the intersection of the shore with the meridian of Longitude 146° East;
 - (20) thence south along that meridian to a point which is 20 nautical miles seaward of the nearest point of the baseline from which the coastal waters of Victoria are measured;
 - (21) thence generally westerly along the line, every point on which is 20 nautical miles seaward of the nearest point of the baseline from which the coastal waters of Victoria are measured, to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 140°57.9' East; and
 - (22) thence south along that meridian to the point of commencement.

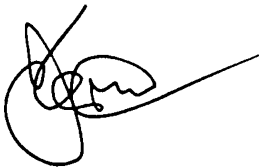

FREQUENCY BAND PLAN FOR THE VHF HIGH BAND (148 TO 174 MHz)

TABLE OF PROVISIONS

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10. FIGURE 1 : VHF HIGH BAND PLAN DIAGRAM
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General

1. The VHF High Band (148 to 174 MHz) has for many years supported a large proportion of Australia's land mobile services, as well as a number of other services. The current structure of the band can be traced back to the early 1950s when a decision was taken to utilise the VHF High Band principally for privately operated and government operated land mobile services. At that time, the mode of operation was single frequency. In accord with evolving technology, to improve the productivity of the band the channelling was progressively reduced from 240 kHz in the late 1940s, through 120 kHz, then 60 kHz and finally 30 kHz, which was phased in from 1962. Half channel offsetting (15 kHz) in locations peripheral to major cities was introduced a few years later.

In addition to the original single frequency land mobile service, other services were introduced in these bands during the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s, as community needs developed:

- . privately operated fixed links used mainly to control remote single frequency base stations;
- . rural fixed telephone services, operated by Telecom Australia;
- . two frequency land mobile services;
- . low powered fixed and mobile services;
- . interior and exterior paging services; and
- . miscellaneous services.

To continue to provide for new technology and evolving community requirements, the VHF High Band has been restructured. The restructuring has increased capacity to meet the growing demand for land mobile services and for two frequency operation.

The VHF High Band Plan provides for additional services and new types of services. The principal changes to the VHF High Band provide for:

- . predominant use of the band for the land mobile service;
- . a band structure which accommodates predominantly two frequency systems to facilitate more efficient use of radiocommunications sites;
- . the introduction of trunked land mobile services and amplitude companded single sideband services to increase the long term productivity of the band; and
- . existing 30 kHz channelling to be replaced by a more spectrum efficient 12.5 kHz channelling to increase the short and medium term productivity of the band.

The conversion of existing services to accord with this Band Plan will commence on the date of notification of the Band Plan in the Commonwealth Gazette. To permit time for conversion to the new arrangements and to mitigate the cost impact, conversion time frames are specified for rural and non-rural areas of each Region.

Each Regional Office will develop and manage the detailed programme for conversion of services to conform with the Band Plan in that region. Conversion to the Band Plan will generally require modification or replacement of existing equipment and a change in operating frequency.

To ensure completion of the programme for conversion by the conversion dates specified in clause 4, individual users will be required by the relevant Regional Office to convert earlier than the relevant State or Territory conversion date. Disruption of user operations will be minimised by:

- . generally moving small users ahead of major users;
- . clearing fixed link assignments early in the programme;
- . implementing conversion in periods when operational demands upon the user's communications system are lowest; and
- . a progressive and systematic clearance and conversion on an area by area and channel by channel basis.

Citation

2. This Band Plan for the 148 to 174 MHz band may be cited as the VHF High Band Plan.

Interpretation

3.(1) Unless the contrary intention appears, where any expression used in this Band Plan is defined in the Radiocommunications Act 1983, the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, or the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations, that expression has the same meaning in this Band Plan as in that Act, that Spectrum Plan, or those Regulations, as the case may be.

(2) In this Band Plan, unless the contrary intention appears:

"ACSSB" means amplitude companded single side band;

"authorised area" means the geographic area in which services specified in this Band Plan are permitted to operate;

"Band Plan" means the VHF High Band Plan;

"bandwidth" means the frequency difference between the upper frequency limit and the lower frequency limit of a sub-band;

"base station receive segment" means a segment which may be used by a base station for reception only;

"base station transmit segment" means a segment which may be used by a base station for transmission only;

"BR" means base station receive segment;

"BT" means base station transmit segment;

"channel" means a sub-band in a segment, with a specified centre frequency;

"channelling" refers to the frequency separation between two consecutive channel centre frequencies in the same segment;

"HSD area" means an area on or inside a High Spectrum Demand contour as set out in clause 11;

"interior paging talkback channel" means a channel in a single frequency land mobile service which is used in conjunction with an interior paging service, but which may not be used for transmissions between ambulatory stations on land;

"land mobile service" means a radiocommunications service between ambulatory stations on land and:

(a) land stations; or

(b) other ambulatory stations on land;

"miscellaneous service" means a service in the land mobile service or fixed service, but does not include an interior paging service, an exterior paging service, a two frequency land mobile service, a single frequency land mobile service, a trunked land mobile service, or a two frequency fixed service;

"non-rural area" means an area inside (ie on the High Spectrum Demand side) of a rural contour as set out in clause 11;

"primary basis" has the same meaning as in Part 3 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan;

"Regional Office" means a State or Territory Office of the Department of Transport and Communications;

"rural area" means an area on or outside all the rural contours, excluding Tasmania, as set out in clause 11;

"secondary basis" has the same meaning as in Part 3 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan;

"segment" is a sub-band of the VHF High Band, represented by a letter in the range 'A' to 'V', as indicated in Column 2 of an item in Tables 2 and 3, to which the frequency range in Column 3 of Table 2 corresponds;

"single frequency land mobile service" means a land mobile service:

- (a) in which information can be transmitted between the base station and one or more ambulatory stations on land, or between ambulatory stations on land, in either one or both directions, but not simultaneously in both directions; and
- (b) to which only one frequency is assigned;

"sub-band" means any part of the VHF High Band;

"transmit/receive split" means the frequency separation between the transmit frequency and receive frequency of a station in a two frequency service;
[NOTE: refer to specification in subclause 6(1)(e)]

"two frequency fixed service" means a fixed service:

- (a) in which information can be transmitted between two fixed stations; and
- (b) to which two frequencies are assigned where one frequency is used to transmit information from the first fixed station to the second and the other frequency is used to transmit information from the second fixed station to the first;

"two frequency land mobile service" means a land mobile service:

- (a) to which two frequencies are assigned;
- (b) in which one frequency is principally used to transmit information from a base station to ambulatory land stations, but may also be used to transmit information between ambulatory land stations; and
- (c) in which the other frequency is used to transmit information from ambulatory land stations to a base station; and
- (d) in conjunction with which the operation of a remote control station is permitted;

"VHF High Band" is the range of frequencies from 148 MHz (exclusive) to 174 MHz (inclusive).

Commencement and Conversion Dates

- 4.(1) Implementation of conversion to the VHF High Band Plan commences on the date of notification of the making of the Band Plan in the Commonwealth Gazette.
- (2) In this plan, "conversion date" means the date by which all users in rural and non-rural areas of each State or Territory are required to have completed conversion to the new VHF High Band Plan.
- (3) The conversion date for non-rural areas of each State or Territory, specified in Column 2 of an item in Table 1, is the date specified in Column 3 of that item.
- (4) In Tasmania, there being no areas classified as rural or non-rural, the conversion date is 1 July 1998.
- (5) All Australian Territories, except the Northern Territory, are classified as rural areas.
- (6) The conversion date for rural areas of each State or Territory is 1 July 2001.

General Purposes for Each Band Segment

- 6.(1) Subject to clause 4 and subclause 6(2) of this Band Plan, and Part 4 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, the VHF High Band, represented diagrammatically in Figure 1, may only be used for services:
- (a) which transmit signals on a frequency in the range specified in Column 3 of an item in Table 2, to which range the segment in Column 2 corresponds, and;
 - (b) which receive signals on a frequency within the receive segment designated in Column 5 of the corresponding item; and
 - (c) whose purpose is specified in Column 4 of the corresponding item; and
 - (d) in a geographic area specified in Column 6 of the corresponding item; and
 - (e) with a transmit/receive split of 4.6 MHz.
- (2) Any segment of the Band Plan may be used temporarily up to the relevant conversion date for purposes or with technical or operational characteristics other than those specified in the Band Plan for that segment on a transitional basis to facilitate the implementation of the Band Plan, with the approval of the First Assistant Secretary, Communications Operations Division in the Department of Transport and Communications, or an officer of the Department authorised in writing by the First Assistant Secretary.

Channelling Arrangements

7. Subject to clause 4 and subclause 6(2) of this Band Plan and Part 4 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, the VHF High Band may only be used for services which operate in a channel:
- (a) whose centre frequency is determined by the formula specified in Column 3 of an item in Table 3, where the values of "n" in the formula are specified in Column 4 of the corresponding item; and
 - (b) which has a bandwidth as specified in Column 5 of the corresponding item.

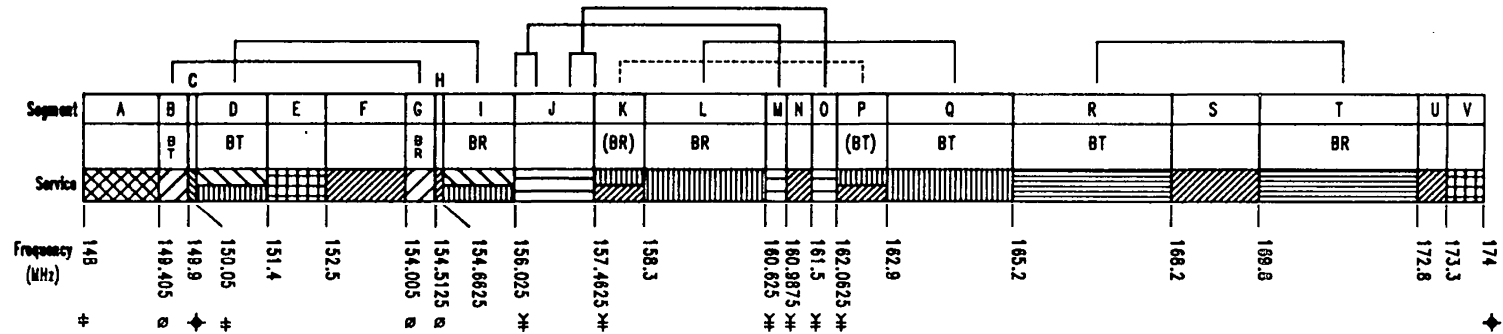

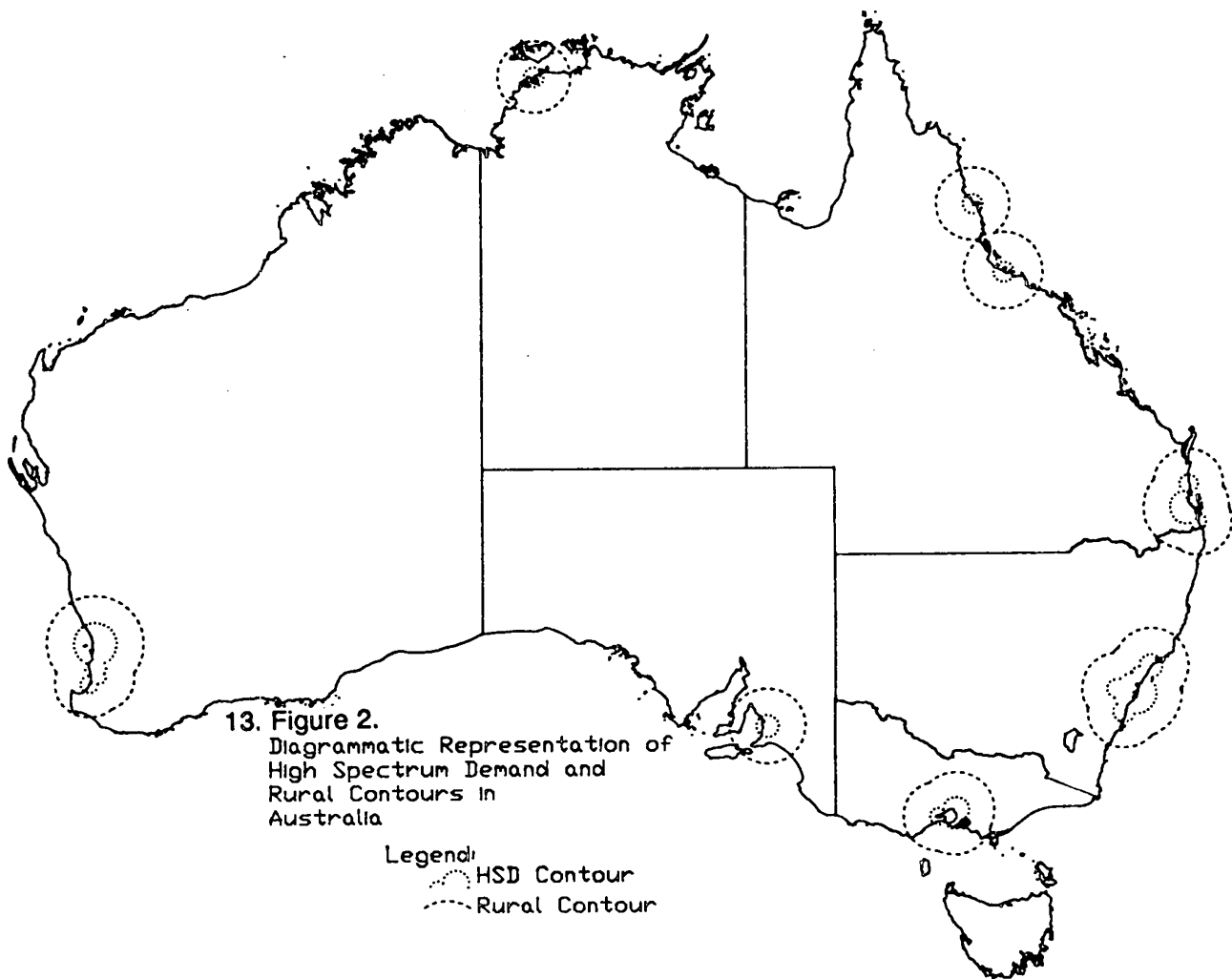

- (2) The centre point is nominally described by reference to a nearby town in Column 3 of the State or Territory specified in Column 2 of that item.
- (3) Where adjacent contours overlap, the HSD contour then becomes the combination of those adjacent contours.
- (4) The Rural contour is defined by a contour which lies 100 km outside the HSD contour and encloses the HSD contour.

1. The VHF Mid Band (70 to 87.5 MHz) has for many years supported a large proportion of Australia's land mobile services, as well as a number of other services. The current structure of the band can be traced back to the early 1950s when a decision was taken to utilise the VHF Mid Band principally for privately operated and government operated land mobile services. At that time, the mode of operation was single frequency. In accord with evolving technology, to improve the productivity of the band the channelling was progressively reduced from 240 kHz in the late 1940s, through 120 kHz, then 60 kHz and finally to 30 kHz, which was phased in from 1962. Half channel offsetting (15 kHz) in peripheral locations to major cities was introduced a few years later.

In addition to the original single frequency land mobile service, other services were introduced in these bands during the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s, as community needs developed:

- . privately operated fixed links used mainly to control remote single frequency base stations;
- . two frequency land mobile services;
- . low powered fixed and mobile services;
- . miscellaneous services; and
- . defence tactical systems.

To continue to provide for new technology and evolving community requirements, the VHF Mid Band has been restructured. The restructuring has increased capacity to meet the growing demand for land mobile services and for two frequency operation.

The VHF Mid Band Plan provides for additional services and new types of services. The principal changes to the VHF Mid Band provide for:

- . predominant use of the band for the land mobile service;
- . a band structure which accommodates predominantly two frequency systems to facilitate more efficient use of radiocommunications sites;

To permit time for conversion to the new arrangements and to mitigate the cost impact, conversion time frames are specified for rural and non-rural areas of each Region.

Each Regional Office will develop and manage the detailed programme for conversion of services to conform with the Band Plan in that region. Conversion to the Band Plan will generally require modification or replacement of existing equipment and a change in operating frequency.

To ensure completion of the programme for conversion by the conversion dates specified in clause 4, individual users will be required by the relevant Regional Office to convert earlier than the relevant State or Territory conversion date. Disruption of user operations will be minimised by:

- . generally moving small users ahead of major users;
- . clearing fixed link assignments early in the programme;
- . implementing conversion in periods when operational demands upon the user's communications system are lowest; and
- . a progressive and systematic clearance and conversion on an area by area and channel by channel basis.

Citation

2. This Band Plan for the 70 to 87.5 MHz band may be cited as the VHF Mid Band Plan.

Interpretation

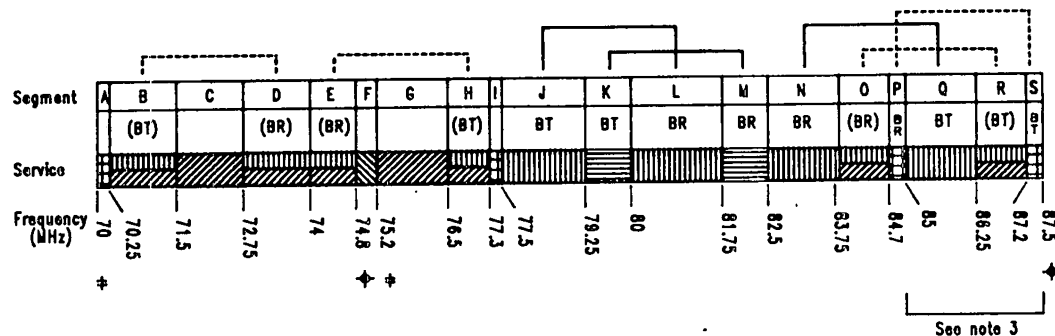

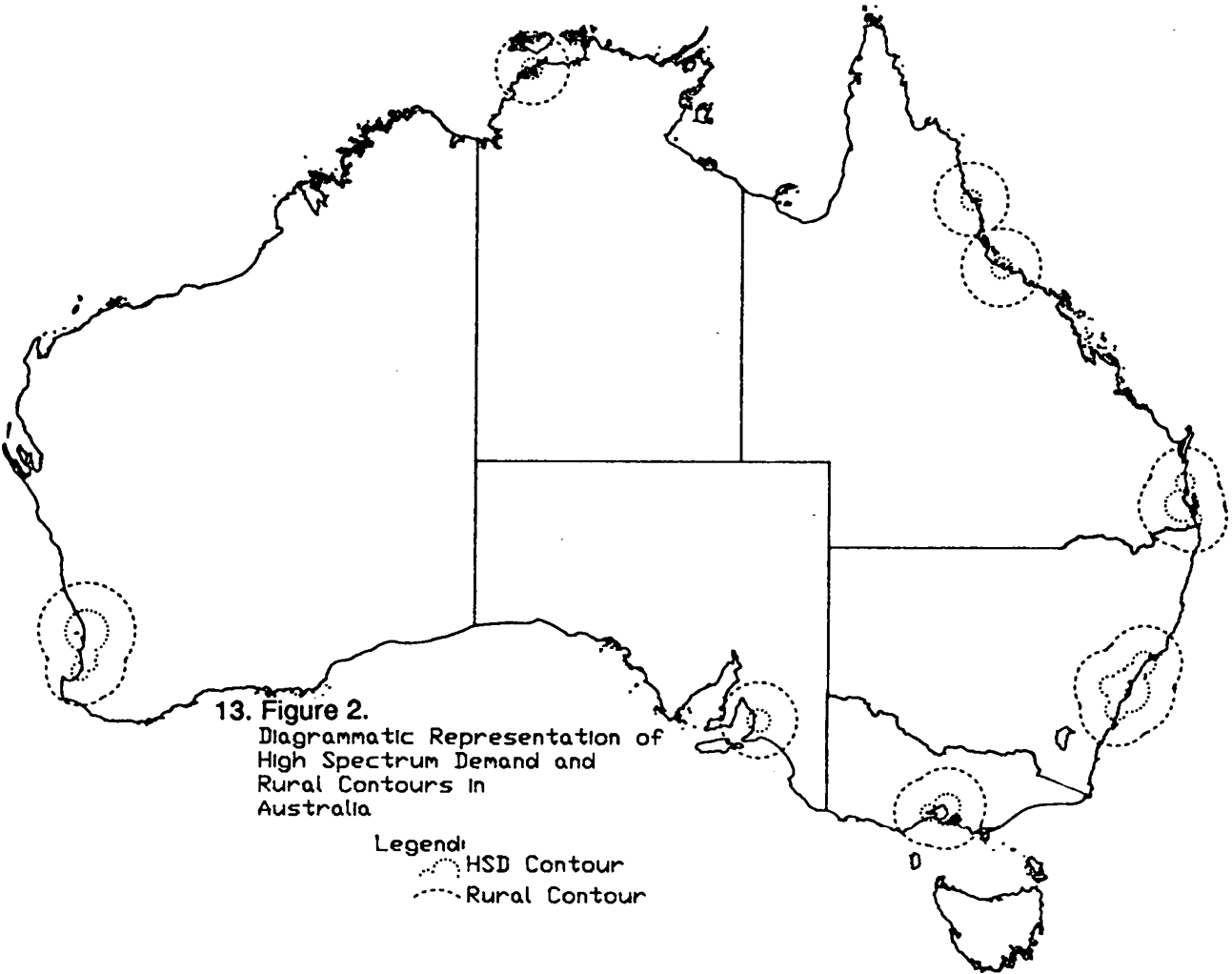

High Spectrum Demand And Rural Contours

11. (1) A High Spectrum Demand (HSD) contour is defined by a circular contour drawn with a radius specified in Column 5 of an item in Table 4, centred on a point specified as an Australian Map Grid coordinate in Column 4 of that item.
- (2) The centre point is nominally described by reference to a nearby town in Column 3 of the State or Territory specified in Column 2 of that item.
- (3) Where adjacent contours overlap, the HSD contour then becomes the combination of those adjacent contours.
- (4) The Rural contour is defined by a contour which lies 100 km outside the HSD contour and encloses the HSD contour.
- (5) A diagrammatic representation of the HSD and Rural contours is set out in Figure 2.

- (k) where there are two or more suitable applicants, which of the applicants is the most suitable.

 - (i) the applicant is a fit and proper person to hold the licence;
 - (ii) the applicant has the financial, technical and management capabilities necessary to provide an adequate and comprehensive service;
 - (iii) the applicant is otherwise capable of complying with the conditions of the licence;

- (d) whether it would be advisable in the public interest to refuse consent because of the need to avoid undue concentration of influence;
- (e) whether, if consent was given:
- (1) a contravention, amounting to an offence under s.90C (limitations of radio interest) or s.92JB (limitations of cross-media interests) would likely occur;
 - (2) a person would be contravening s.90F (limitations of directorships) or s.92JD (limitations of cross-media directorships);
 - (3) a condition specified in s.90G (foreign control provisions) would be contravened.

Any person wishing to make a submission on these issues may lodge it with the Tribunal by Wednesday 29 May 1991.

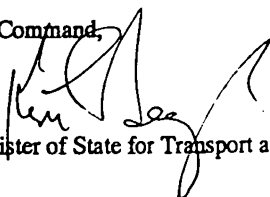
