





The Anti-Dumping Authority (Authority) has completed its review of the Australian Customs Service's (ACS) negative Preliminary Finding on exports of low density polyethylene from Italy, the Republic of Korea, Sweden, Taiwan Province, Thailand and the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia.

In its report of January 1991, the ACS concluded that the goods under reference were being exported to Australia at dumping prices from the six countries. However the ACS also concluded that material injury suffered by the Australian industry could not be linked to the dumped goods and found that there was no threat of material injury to the Australian industry from future exports of low density polyethylene at dumping prices from these countries.

The Authority has revoked the ACS finding. The Authority has found that there are sufficient grounds for the publication of a dumping duty notice in respect of the goods from these six countries.







Citation

1. This Band Plan for the 820 - 960 MHz Band may be cited as the 900 MHz Band Plan.

General

2. The 820 - 960 MHz Band currently supports a large variety of radiocommunications services, including:
 - . the analogue cellular mobile telephone service;
 - . the trunked land mobile radio service;
 - . single channel, low capacity and wideband fixed services;
 - . radio broadcasting studio to transmitter links;
 - . miscellaneous low power fixed and mobile services; and
 - . radiolocation services.

The purpose of this Band Plan is primarily to facilitate the extension of public mobile telecommunications competition in Australia. In particular, it provides spectrum allocations for public access cordless telephone services and provides for the transition from analogue cellular mobile telephone services to digital cellular mobile telephone services. The issue of any additional mobile telephone licences will be considered by the Government in 1995.

The Band Plan aims to provide for the orderly continuation of existing services affected by the above allocations for public mobile telecommunications services. Wherever possible, this is to be achieved by:

- . providing alternative allocations for displaced services;
- . allowing for transitional arrangements within the 820 - 960 MHz Band; and
- . allowing continued operation of existing services on a secondary basis where such operation will not inhibit the introduction of primary services.

The spectrum allocations in this Band Plan will affect most existing services to some extent. Some existing equipment may require replacement or modification and/or a change in operating frequency to comply with the new Band Plan. In some cases existing services will not be able to be accommodated in the 820 - 960 MHz Band and will need to be accommodated in other bands.

Interpretation

3. (1) Unless the contrary intention appears, where any expression used in this Band Plan is defined in the Radiocommunications Act 1983, the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, or the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations, that expression has the same meaning in this Band Plan as in that Act, that Spectrum Plan, or those Regulations, as the case may be.

- (2) In this Band Plan, unless the contrary intention appears:

"allocation" means the purpose for which a segment or sub-band may be used;

"analogue cellular mobile telephone service" means a cellular mobile telephone service within the meaning of the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations which incorporates analogue modulation techniques to provide that service;

"authorised area" means the geographical area in which services specified in this Band Plan are permitted to operate;

"Band Plan" means the 900 MHz Band Plan;

"bandwidth" means the frequency difference between the upper frequency limit and the lower frequency limit of a sub-band;

"base receive" means a segment which may be used by a base station for reception only;

"base transmit" means a segment which may be used by a base station for transmission only;

"channel" means a sub-band in a segment, with a specified centre frequency;

"channelling" refers to the frequency separation between two consecutive channel centre frequencies in the same segment;

"cordless telephone service" means a service consisting of:

- (a) a base station, not forming part of a cellular mobile telephone service, which is:
 - (i) able to communicate by means of radiocommunications with; or
 - (ii) connected by a line to:
a public switched telephone network; and
- (b) one or more handsets:
 - (i) not connected by a line to a base station; and
 - (ii) by means of which communication may be made through the base station with other users of the public switched telephone network by a transmission of radio signals between the handset and the base station;

"digital cellular mobile telephone service" means a cellular mobile telephone service within the meaning of the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations which incorporates digital modulation techniques to provide that service;

"digital short range radio" is a short range multi channel mobile radio system as specified in the European Technical Standards Institute draft interim technical standard IETS DI/RES-7001;

"fixed service (low capacity)" means a fixed service which uses a frequency channel width of greater than 25 kHz but not exceeding 200 kHz;

"fixed service (wideband)" means a fixed service which uses a frequency channel width of greater than 200 kHz but not exceeding 2 MHz;

"land mobile service" means a radiocommunications service between ambulatory stations on land and either or both of:

- (a) land stations; or
- (b) other ambulatory stations on land;

"point-to-multipoint" means transmissions between a specified fixed station (control station) and two or more associated fixed stations (remote stations);

"point-to-point" means transmissions between two specified fixed stations;

"primary service" has the same meaning as in Part 3 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan;

"radio frequency identification transmitter" means a transmitter included in the class of transmitters provided for in item 12 of Schedule 3 of the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations;

"secondary service" has the same meaning as in Part 3 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan;

"segment" is a sub-band of the 820 - 960 MHz Band as indicated by an item in Table 1 or 2, to which the frequency range in that item applies;

"single channel" means a transmission capacity of one analogue voice channel (or digital equivalent);

"single frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted between two stations in either one or both directions, but not simultaneously, and to which only one frequency is assigned;

"sound outside broadcast link" is a fixed service established for the purpose of radio broadcasting coverage of an event such as a sporting match;

"spread spectrum" is a modulation technique in which the average energy of the transmitted signal is intentionally spread over a wide bandwidth;

"studio to transmitter link" is a fixed service which transmits radio broadcasting programme material from a broadcasting studio to a broadcasting transmitter;

"sub-band" means any part of the 820 - 960 MHz Band;

"two frequency service" means a service in which information can be transmitted simultaneously between two stations, and to which two frequencies are assigned;

"wireless audio transmitter" means a transmitter included in the class of transmitters provided for in item 2 of Schedule 3 to the Radiocommunications (Licensing and General) Regulations.

General Purposes for Band Segments

- 4.(1) Subject to subclause 4(2) of this Band Plan and Part 4 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, the 820 - 960 MHz Band may only be used for services:
- (a) which transmit or receive signals on a frequency in the range specified in an item in Column 2 of Table 1 or 2; and

- (b) in a geographical area specified in Column 4 in that item; and
 - (c) whose allocation is specified in Column 3 in that item.
- (2) Any segment of the 820 - 960 MHz Band may be used temporarily, with the approval of the Secretary or an officer of the Department authorised in writing by the Secretary, for purposes or with technical or operational characteristics other than those specified in the Band Plan for that segment on a transitional basis to facilitate the implementation of the Band Plan.

Allocation Commencement Dates

5. (1) Subject to subclause 5(2), the allocations specified in this Band Plan take effect on commencement of the Band Plan.
- (2) An allocation specified in Column 2 of an item in Table 3 to a sub-band specified in Column 3 of that item, is to have effect from the date specified in Column 4 in that item.

Allocation Cessation Dates

6. An allocation specified in Column 2 of an item in Table 4 to a sub-band specified in Column 3 of that item, is to cease to have effect on the date specified in Column 4 in that item.

Channelling Arrangements

7. (1) Subject to subclause 4(2) of this Band Plan and Part 4 of the Radiocommunications - Australian Spectrum Plan, channelling arrangements for an allocation specified in an item in Column 2 of Table 5 to a sub-band specified in Column 3 in that item are to be as determined by:
- (a) the channel centre frequencies formula specified in Column 4 of an item in Table 5, where the range of values for 'n' in the formula is specified in Column 5 in that item; and
 - (b) the bandwidth as specified in Column 6 in that item.

2. It should be noted that AUSTEL Technical Standard TS 005 applies to equipment used in this service.

The telescope has a receive bandwidth of 843 +/- 1.5 MHz. While an allocation has not been made to the radioastronomy service in this band, all practicable steps will be taken to protect the MOST radio telescope from harmful interference.

5. No new assignments will be made for the fixed service (single channel, two frequency) in this segment.
6. Allocation commencement dates apply; see Table 3.

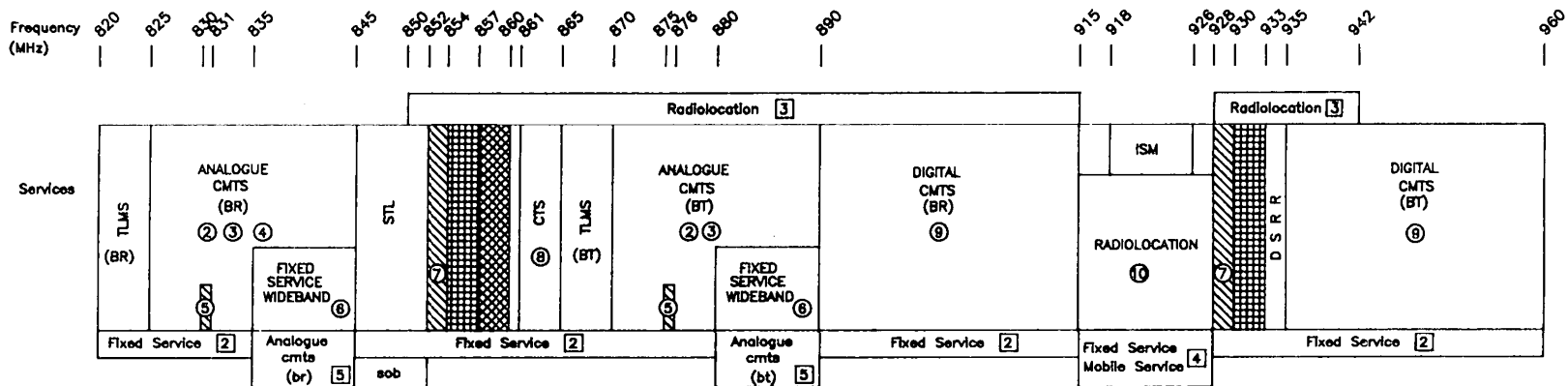

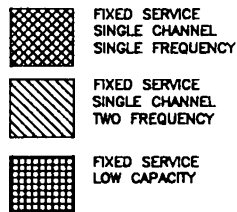

PUBLIC SUGGESTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members of the public, political parties and other organisations are invited to make suggestions to the Redistribution Committee for New South Wales on changes to the boundaries and names of Electoral Divisions for the House of Representatives. Comments are also invited on these public suggestions.

WHY A REDISTRIBUTION?

On 1 March 1991 the Electoral Commissioner determined that, as a result of population changes between the States, New South Wales will be entitled to 50 Members of the House of Representatives at the next general election. Currently, New South Wales has 51 Members. The Australian Electoral Commission has directed that a redistribution be held to redraw the boundaries of Electoral Divisions in New South Wales into 50 Electoral Divisions. A Redistribution Committee has been appointed to prepare a proposed redistribution.

WHO IS ON THE REDISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE?

The Redistribution Committee for New South Wales consists of the Electoral Commissioner (Mr Brian Cox), the Australian Electoral Officer for New South Wales (Mr Brian Nugent), the New South Wales State Surveyor-General (Mr Donald Grant) and the New South Wales State Deputy Auditor-General (Mr Kevin Fennell). The Committee has the task of producing a proposed set of boundaries and names of Electoral Divisions for the House of Representatives for New South Wales.

THE REDISTRIBUTION PROCESS

The redistribution is carried out in accordance with the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*. There is a number of stages and opportunities for public participation.

Step 1 - Public suggestions

Before the Redistribution Committee makes its proposal, any interested persons or organisations who wish to make suggestions regarding the redistribution, and in particular possible boundaries or names of Divisions, are given 30 days to forward them in writing to the Redistribution Committee. The Committee will formally invite public suggestions in the Commonwealth Government Gazette on 29 April 1991. Suggestions must be received by 29 May 1991.

Step 2 - Comments on the public suggestions

These suggestions will then be made available for public inspection. Any comments on the suggestions must be lodged in writing within 14 days. The closing date for comments is 12 June 1991.

Step 3 - The first proposed redistribution

The Committee considers the public suggestions and comments before making a proposed redistribution. Maps showing the proposed boundaries and names of Divisions will then be published and exhibited at Offices of the Australian Electoral Commission.

Step 4 - Objections to the proposed redistribution

Following the publication of the first proposed redistribution there will be 28 days within which initial objections to the proposed redistribution may be lodged by members of the public or organisations.

Step 5 - Objections considered by the augmented Electoral Commission

The objections are considered by the augmented Electoral Commission for New South Wales. The augmented Electoral Commission comprises the members of the Redistribution Committee sitting together with the Chairperson of the Electoral Commission (the Hon. Mr Justice Trevor Morling) and the third Commissioner (Mr Ian Castles, the Australian Statistician).

Step 6 - The second proposed redistribution

After it has considered all the initial objections lodged, the augmented Electoral Commission makes (within 60 days) a second proposed redistribution.

Step 7 - Further objections

If this second proposed redistribution is significantly different from the proposal made by the Redistribution Committee, the augmented Electoral Commission will invite further objections from the persons or organisations who submitted initial objections.



Step 8 – Final determination

The augmented Electoral Commission will then consider any further objections and make a final determination of boundaries and names of the Electoral Divisions in the State.

GUIDELINES FOR PUBLIC SUBMISSIONS

Written suggestions relating to the redistribution in New South Wales must be lodged with the Redistribution Committee on or before 29 May 1991.

It would assist the Redistribution Committee if persons or organisations proposing to make suggestions in the form of maps could do so on standard electoral maps, available from the Office of the Redistribution Committee.

Legal requirements for a redistribution

In making its proposed redistribution, the Redistribution Committee is bound by section 66(3) of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*, which provides that the Redistribution Committee –

"(3) ...

(a) shall, as far as practicable, endeavour to ensure that, if the State or Territory were redistributed in accordance with the proposed redistribution, the number of electors enrolled in each Electoral Division in the State or Territory would not, 3 years and 6 months after the State or Territory had been redistributed, be less than 98% or more than 102% of the average divisional enrolment of that State or Territory at that time; and

(b) subject to paragraph (a), shall give due consideration, in relation to each proposed Electoral Division, to –

- (i) community of interests within the proposed Electoral Division, including economic, social and regional interests;
- (ii) means of communication and travel within the proposed Electoral Division;
- (iv) the physical features and area of the proposed Electoral Division; and
- (v) the boundaries of existing Divisions in the State or Territory"

and that no proposed Division may have in it a number of electors which differs from the State average enrolment, to be calculated at 12 June 1991, by more than 10%.

Persons or organisations making submissions to the Redistribution Committee are urged to take account of the requirements of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*. Copies of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act* can be obtained from Commonwealth Government Bookshops.
