OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE



AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA AND THE STATE OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA CONCERNING HUMAN RIGHTS

THIS AGREEMENT is made the *15th* day of *October* 1991.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA (in this Agreement called "the Commonwealth") of the one part and

THE STATE OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA (in this Agreement called "the State") of the other part.

WHEREAS

- (a) there has been established under Western Australia law the office of Commissioner for Equal Opportunity (in this Agreement called "the Commissioner");
- (b) the Commissioner is charged under the Western Australia Equal Opportunity Act 1984 with the performance of certain functions, including the investigation and conciliation of complaints of prescribed discrimination;
- (c) the Commonwealth of Australia agrees to enter into an agreement with the State of Western Australia in terms of which:
 - (i) the Commissioner shall undertake:
 - to provide information and advice on the Federal Sex Discrimination Act 1984 and the Racial Discrimination Act 1975;
 - to receive and investigate complaints lodged under the Federal Racial Discrimination Act 1975 and Sex Discrimination Act 1984 and where, appropriate, endeavour to effect a settlement;
 - (ii) the Commonwealth shall pay certain sums to the State of Western Australia in recognition of this service.
- (d) the State of Western Australia agrees to enter into a co-operative arrangement in terms of Section 16 of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission Act 1986 under which the Commissioner will discharge certain complaint-related functions on behalf of the Commission;



IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

INTERPRETATION

- 1 In this Agreement unless the context otherwise requires or the contrary intention appears:
 - (a) "Commission" means the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission established under Section 7 of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission Act 1986;
 - (b) "Commissioner" means the Commissioner for Equal Opportunity established under Section 75 of the Western Australian Equal Opportunity Act 1984;
 - (c) "Human Rights Commissioner" means the Human Rights Commissioner appointed pursuant to Section 8(1)(6) of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission Act 1986;
 - (d) "Minister" means the respective Attorneys-General or Acting Attorneys-General for the Commonwealth or the State, or such other Minister of the Commonwealth or State having responsibility for the matters to which this Agreement relates;
 - (e) "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Attorney-General's Department of the State and includes a person for the time being occupying or performing the duties of the office;
 - (f) "Year" means a period of twelve months ending on 30 June.
- 2 In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise requires or a contrary intention appears:
 - (a) the Annexures referred to are the Annexures to this Agreement which shall be deemed to be an integral part of this Agreement;
 - (b) a reference to any legislation includes that legislation as amended from time to time and any statutory modification or re-enactment thereof.

Objective of the Arrangement

- 3 The objectives of this arrangement are to:
 - (a) provide one point of contact for advice and for the handling of complaints under both Federal and State legislation;
 - (b) facilitate efficient and economic handling of complaints by ensuring that available remedies are used in an effective and co-ordinated way; and



- (c) make the experience and expertise of the Commonwealth and Western Australian instrumentalities mutually available.
- 4 It will be made apparent to the public visiting the Commissioner's Office, and on correspondence despatched from the Office, that the Commissioner acts for the Commonwealth in handling complaints under the laws described in Clause 5 below.

Complaint Handling

- 5 For the purpose of dealing with any complaint under the Federal Racial Discrimination Act 1975 and the Federal Sex Discrimination Act 1984 the Commissioner is hereby authorised to perform the function of the Commission set out in:
- (a) Section 20(1)(a) of the Racial Discrimination Act (and is granted such powers as are necessary for, and incidental or conducive to, the performance of those functions); and
- (b) Section 48(1)(a) of the Sex Discrimination Act 1984.

The Commissioner is further charged with the functions and given the powers of a Federal Commissioner as conferred by the Federal Race Discrimination Commissioner and Sex Discrimination Commissioner and approved by the Commission pursuant to Section 40 of the Racial Discrimination Act and Section 104 of the Sex Discrimination Act in relation to the matters described in sub clauses (a) and (b) above.

- 6 The Commissioner shall, in handling complaints under the Federal legislation referred to in Clause 5, observe the general principles of complaint handling set out in Annexure A. The Commissioner agrees to consult with the Commission on complaints handling procedures.
- 7 The Commissioner will generally be responsible for advising on, investigating and conciliating complaints under the Federal legislation referred to in Clause 5 above, whether such complaints originate in the State of Western Australia or are referred to the Commissioner by the Commission. The Commissioner may, after consultation with the Commission, decline to handle any particular complaint under Federal legislation.
- 8 The Commissioner shall normally investigate and conciliate any complaint contemplated by this agreement, until, in accordance with the delegations granted by the Commission, the matter is required to be forwarded to the Commission for appropriate action.
- 9 The Commissioner agrees to provide the Commission with draft referral reports on complaints forwarded to the Commission pursuant to Clause 8 in accordance with the



guidelines set out in Annexure B or in such form as may be agreed.

- 10 After consultation with the Commissioner, the Commission may assume or resume responsibility for handling a particular complaint under Federal legislation. It is recognised that complaints under Federal legislation more appropriately handled by the Commission include those where:
 - (a) the outcome is likely to require changes in Federal administration or to legislation;
 - (b) a significant point of Federal law is involved;
 - (c) a significant issue of national policy is raised;
 - (d) parties in more than one State are involved at the national level;
 - (e) a Federal Department or Agency is involved at the national level; or
 - (f) the complaint raises matters affecting Australia's relations with another country or other countries.
- 11 The Commissioner agrees to forward, upon request by the Commission, copies of any documents held by the Commissioner as part of any individual file of a complaint registered under Federal legislation.
- 12 The Commissioner agrees to advise the Commission as soon as possible of any possible controversy or public sensitivity which becomes apparent in relation to any complaint under Federal legislation. The Commission will similarly advise the Commissioner in respect of any such controversy or public sensitivity which comes to its attention in relation to the handling of a complaint under Federal legislation by the Commissioner or in the handling of a complaint originating in the State by the Commission.


Dissemination of Information

- 13 The Commission shall advise the Commissioner each year of its work program and in particular of major programs, projects and activities in respect of which her assistance will be sought. The Commissioner shall distribute literature, information and other promotional material of the Commission in the State of Western Australia and shall promote generally the Commission's programs, projects and activities. Basic costs of such distribution and promotion shall be borne by the Commissioner but the Commission shall meet travel and associated costs and expenses beyond basic or nominal costs.



- 14 The Commissioner shall provide the Commission with:
- (a) information, including statistics, on a quarterly basis about the administration of complaints under Federal legislation in the State of Victoria in the form set out in Annexure C or in such form as may be agreed to from time to time;
 - (b) a quarterly statement that all complaints under Federal legislation have been reviewed and that, except as reported in particular cases, the handling of those complaints is proceeding satisfactorily;
 - (c) information, at the request of the Commission, concerning any particular complaint under Federal legislation being handled by the Commissioner;
 - (d) an annual report within two months of the end of the financial year on all activities undertaken by the Commissioner on behalf of the Commission, including an evaluation report on the effectiveness of those activities;
 - (e) an authorised financial statement of expenditure of the Commissioner as soon as practicable after the end of the financial year.
- 15 For the purposes of statistical reporting:
- (a) only matters which are accepted as complaints under relevant Federal legislation are to be recorded as such and matters which are found to fall outside the jurisdiction of the Federal legislation should be recorded separately;
 - (b) no complaint shall be accepted and registered as a complaint under both State and Federal legislation.
- 16 The Commission shall provide to the Commissioner:
- (a) a copy of its Annual Report as soon as possible after tabling of the Report in the Federal Parliament;
 - (b) a copy of every determination of the Commission in any complaint under Federal legislation which would affect the way that such complaints should be handled by the Commissioner.

Funding

- 17 The parties agree that the amount payable by the Commonwealth to the State of Western Australia in 1991-92 will be \$239,400.
- 18 The amount payable by the Commonwealth in each subsequent year shall be the amount paid in the 1991-92 year adjusted by the price deflator applied from time to time by the Federal Government and subject to any decisions of the
- 

Federal Government on funding generally. The price deflator currently applied by the Federal Government to these payments is the mean of movements in Average Weekly Earnings and the year-on-year non-farm Gross Domestic Product deflator.

- 19 The parties agree that the amount payable by the Commonwealth should be no more than one-third of the total budget (including payroll tax and rent) for the Commissioner (excluding any and all expenditure associated with the Equal Opportunity Board) in any one year up to a maximum amount equal to the amount agreed to in Clauses 17 and 18. In the event of the amount paid by the Commonwealth in any year exceeding one-third of the Commissioner's actual expenditure in that year, a corresponding reduction shall be made to the amount payable by the Commonwealth in the following year.
- 20 Funds payable to the State of Western Australia by the Commonwealth in accordance with Clauses 17 and 18 will be paid in advance in four equal instalments, each such instalment being due within three weeks of the Commissioner submitting the preceding quarter's report pursuant to Clause 14.

Extension of Services

- 21 The parties agree that, should the Commonwealth amend or enact legislation requiring expansion of services provided by the State of Western Australia on behalf of the Commonwealth, any extension of services will not be undertaken without further negotiation and funding.

Consultation

- 22 Each party to this agreement agrees to consult the other party on matters of mutual interest and concern.

Commencement

- 23 This Agreement shall be deemed to have commenced to operate on and from 1 July 1991 for a duration of five years.

Termination

- 24 Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving notice in writing to the other party of not less than six months from the date on which notice is given.
- 25 If this Agreement is terminated by either party under Clause 24 and the other party is affected by the termination then the terminating party will pay to the other party such sum of money as both parties agree upon as adequate compensation for the other Party.



26 Notices of termination of this Agreement may be signed:

- (a) in the case of the Commonwealth, by or on behalf of the Human Rights Commissioner;
- (b) in the case of the State of Western Australia, by or on behalf of the Minister for Justice.

PUBLIC SUGGESTIONS AND COMMENTS

Members of the public, political parties and other organisations are invited to make suggestions to the Redistribution Committee for the Australian Capital Territory on changes to the boundaries and names of Electoral Divisions for the House of Representatives. Comments are also invited on these public suggestions.

WHY A REDISTRIBUTION?

Every seven years the electoral boundaries in each State in Australia and the Australian Capital Territory are reviewed. The Australian Capital Territory's current electoral boundaries were created on 23 August 1984. As seven years have now elapsed, the Australian Electoral Commission has directed that a redistribution be held to review the boundaries of the Australian Capital Territory's two Electoral Divisions. A Redistribution Committee has been appointed to prepare a proposed redistribution.

WHO IS ON THE REDISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE?

The Redistribution Committee for the Australian Capital Territory consists of the Electoral Commissioner (Mr Brian Cox), the Divisional Returning Officer for Canberra (Mr Bill Chivers), the Commonwealth Surveyor General (Mr Grahame Lindsay) and the Director, Federal Bureau of Consumer Affairs (Mr John Wood). The Committee has the task of producing a proposed set of boundaries and names of Electoral Divisions for the House of Representatives for the Australian Capital Territory.

THE REDISTRIBUTION PROCESS

The redistribution is carried out in accordance with the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*. There is a number of stages and opportunities for public participation.

Step 1 - Public suggestions

Before the Redistribution Committee makes its proposal, any interested persons or organisations who wish to make suggestions regarding the redistribution, and in particular possible boundaries or names of Divisions, are given 30 days to forward them in writing to the Redistribution Committee. The Committee will formally invite public suggestions in the *Commonwealth Government Gazette* on Tuesday 22 October 1991. Suggestions must be received by Thursday 21 November 1991.

Step 2 - Comments on the public suggestions

These suggestions will then be made available for public inspection. Any comments on the suggestions must be lodged in writing within 14 days. The closing date for comments is Thursday 5 December 1991.

Step 3 - The first proposed redistribution

The Committee considers the public suggestions and comments before making a proposed redistribution. Maps showing the proposed boundaries and names of Divisions will then be published and exhibited at Offices of the Australian Electoral Commission in the Territory.

Step 4 - Objections to the proposed redistribution

Following the publication of the first proposed redistribution there will be 28 days within which initial objections to the proposed redistribution may be lodged by members of the public or organisations.

Step 5 - Objections considered by the augmented Electoral Commission

The objections are considered by the augmented Electoral Commission for the Australian Capital Territory. The augmented Electoral Commission comprises the Chairperson of the Electoral Commission (the Hon. Mr Justice Trevor Morling) and the third Commissioner (Mr Ian Castles, Australian Statistician) sitting together with the members of the Redistribution Committee.



Step 6 - The second proposed redistribution

After it has considered all the initial objections lodged, the augmented Electoral Commission makes a second proposed redistribution.

Step 7 - Further objections

If this second proposed redistribution is significantly different from the proposal made by the Redistribution Committee, the augmented Electoral Commission will invite further objections from the persons or organisations who made suggestions, comments or initial objections.

Step 8 - Final determination

The augmented Electoral Commission will then consider (within 60 days of the close of initial objections) any further objections. It will make a final determination of boundaries and names of the Electoral Divisions in the Territory.

GUIDELINES FOR PUBLIC SUBMISSIONS

Written suggestions relating to the redistribution in the Australian Capital Territory must be lodged with the Redistribution Committee on or before 21 November 1991.

It would assist the Redistribution Committee if persons or organisations proposing to make suggestions in the form of maps could do so on standard electoral maps, available from the Office of the Redistribution Committee.

Copies of all suggestions received by the Committee will be available for public inspection at that office from 22 November 1991. They will also be available for inspection at the offices of the Divisional Returning Officers for Canberra (Penrhyn House, Bowes St, Woden) and Fraser (Melbourne Building, West Row, Civic).

Written comments relating to any of the suggestions lodged may be made at this stage. Comments must be lodged with the Committee by 5 December 1991.

Legal requirements for a redistribution

In making its proposed redistribution, the Redistribution Committee is bound by section 66(3) of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*, which provides that the Redistribution Committee -

- "(3) . . .
- (a) shall, as far as practicable, endeavour to ensure that, if the State or Territory were redistributed in accordance with the proposed redistribution, the number of electors enrolled in each Electoral Division in the State or Territory would not, 3 years and 6 months after the State or Territory had been redistributed, be less than 98% or more than 102% of the average divisional enrolment of that State or Territory at that time; and
- (b) subject to paragraph (a), shall give due consideration, in relation to each proposed Electoral Division, to:
- (i) community of interests within the proposed Electoral Division, including economic, social and regional interests;
 - (ii) means of communication and travel within the proposed Electoral Division;
 - (iv) the physical features and area of the proposed Electoral Division; and
 - (v) the boundaries of existing Divisions in the State or Territory"

and that no proposed Division may have in it a number of electors which differs from the Territory average enrolment, to be calculated as at 5 December 1991, by more than 10%.

Persons or organisations making submissions to the Redistribution Committee are urged to take account of the requirements of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918*. Copies of the *Commonwealth Electoral Act* can be obtained from Commonwealth Government Bookshops.

More information

The Australian Electoral Commission is making available electoral enrolment information for use by interested persons and organisations. Statistics relating to current enrolment and projected enrolment at 3 years and 6 months after the expected completion date of the redistribution are being made available at the Census Collection District, Statistical Local Area and Electoral Division levels. This information can be obtained in booklet form or on computer magnetic tape.

Statistics, electoral maps and any other information related to the redistribution can be obtained from the Redistribution Committee secretariat at the above address.

**ORANGE ROUGHY FISHERY
PROHIBITION OF TAKING**

I, Simon Crean, the Minister of State for Primary Industries and Energy, for the purposes of section 8 of the Fisheries Act 1952, hereby make the following notice.

CITATION

- 1. This Notice may be cited as Fisheries Notice No. ORF 20.

INTERPRETATION

- 2.1 In this Notice, unless the contrary intention appears, words have the same meaning as in the Fisheries Act 1952 and "the Act" means the Fisheries Act 1952.
- 2.2 Where for the purposes of this Notice it is necessary to determine the position on the surface of the Earth of a point, line or area, that position shall be determined by reference to the Australian Geodetic Datum, that is by reference to a spheroid having its centre at the centre of the Earth and a major (equatorial) radius of 6,378,160 metres and flattening of 1/298.25 and by reference to the Johnston Geodetic Station in the Northern Territory of Australia. That station shall be taken to be situated at Latitude 25°56'54.5515" South and at Longitude 133°12'30.0771" East and to have a ground level of 571.2 metres above the spheroid referred to above.

PROHIBITION OF TAKING ORANGE ROUGHY

- 3. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(a) of the Act, the taking of Orange Roughy in the area of proclaimed waters

specified in Schedule 1 to this Notice is prohibited with effect from 12:00 hours on 24 October 1991 and concluding at midnight on 31 December 1991.

PROHIBITION OF TRAWLING

- 4. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(c) of the Act, the taking of fish by the method known as trawling in the area of proclaimed waters specified in Schedule 1 to this Notice is prohibited with effect from 12:00 hours on 24 October 1991 and concluding at midnight on 31 December 1991.

PROHIBITION OF CARRYING TRAWLING EQUIPMENT

- 5. Pursuant to paragraph 8(1)(da) of the Act, a person is prohibited with effect from 12:00 hours on 24 October 1991 and concluding at midnight on 31 December 1991, from having in that person's possession or charge in a boat, in the area of proclaimed waters specified in Schedule 2 to this Notice equipment used for trawling.

ENDORSEMENT OF LICENCES

- 6. Pursuant to paragraph 8(4D)(b) of the Act, the activities prohibited by -
 - (a) paragraph 3; or

- (b) paragraph 4; or
(c) paragraph 5

are activities in respect of which an endorsement may be made under subsection 9(4) of the Act.

EXEMPTION

7. Pursuant to paragraph 8(2)(d) of the Act any vessel in respect of which a permit has been granted pursuant to subsection 6B(1) is exempt from the prohibitions contained in paragraphs 3, 4 & 5.

SCHEDULE 1

The area of proclaimed waters contained within the area bounded by a line:

- (1) commencing at the intersection of the parallel of Latitude 43° South with the eastern shore of the mainland of Tasmania at the low-water mark;
- (2) running thence east along that parallel of Latitude to its intersection with the outer boundary of the Australian fishing zone;
- (3) thence generally southerly along the outer boundary of the Australian fishing zone to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 43°10' South;
- (4) thence west along that parallel to its intersection with the meridian of Longitude 149°30' East;
- (5) thence south along that meridian to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 45° South;
- (6) thence west along that parallel to its intersection with the outer boundary of the Australian fishing zone;
- (7) thence generally northerly along the outer boundary of the Australian fishing zone to its intersection with the parallel of Latitude 43° South;
- (8) thence east along that parallel to its intersection with the western shore of Tasmania at the low-water mark;
- (9) thence following the coast of Tasmania at the low-water mark generally southerly, easterly and northerly to the point of commencement.
