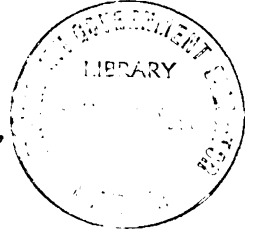

OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE

Public Service issues contain notices concerning administrative matters, including examinations, vacancies, transfers and promotions within the Australian Public Service and the Services of the Australian Postal Corporation and Defence Force

appointments etc. These issues are published weekly at 10.30 am on Thursday, and sold at \$8.95 each or on subscription of \$395.00 (50 issues), \$206.00 (25 issues) or \$103.00 (12 issues).

Business issues, published each Tuesday, containing Notices under the Corporations Law, Bankruptcy Act and Private Notices and sold at \$4.95 each or on subscription of \$220.00 (50 issues), \$116.00 (25 issues).

Australian Securities Commission issues contain Notices under the Corporations Law and are published on the first Tuesday of each month and are sold at \$14.95 each or on subscription of \$132.00 (12 issues).

Special issues include notices which require urgent publication. All costs associated with producing Specials will be borne by the responsible department or authority. A limited number of Special Gazettes will be made available for sale from the Commonwealth Government Bookshop, Canberra, on the day of publication. General distribution of these notices will be by their inclusion in the next published issue of the Government Notices *Gazette* or *Business Gazette* as well as in the next published issue of the series of the *Gazette* in which the notice would normally have been published.

Tariff concessions issues contain notices of tariff concessions proposed, granted or revoked in accordance with the provisions of Part XVA of the *Customs Act 1901*. These issues are published each Wednesday and are sold at \$2.95 or on subscription only at \$115.00 for 50 issues including surface postage.

Periodic issues contain lengthy notices of a non-urgent nature, including the following: Australian Public Service conditions of entry and advancement; holders of import licences and tariff quotas; notification by Australian Securities Commission of intention to deregister defunct companies. Issues are made at irregular intervals as required, at individual prices according to size. Advice of availability is given in the Government Notices and Business issues immediately following the day of publication. Periodic issues are not available on subscription, but standing orders are accepted for all selected issues.

Purchasing and Disposals issues of the *Gazette* provide information on Commonwealth purchases and disposals and other matters of general interest to persons buying from or selling to the Commonwealth. These issues are published each Wednesday and sold at \$3.95 or on subscription of \$220.00 including postage for 50 issues.

Index issues contain references to entries in the Government Notices and the related Special and Periodic issues. Index issues are published quarterly, are available over the counter from Commonwealth Government Bookshops and are supplied without charge to annual subscribers to the Government Notices issues.

Citation

1. This Determination may be cited as the Health Insurance (Pathology—Licensed Collection Centres) Determination (No. 3).

2 *Health Insurance (Pathology—Licensed Collection Centres)
Determination (No. 3)*

Interpretation

2. In this Determination, unless the contrary intention appears:
“**APA**” means an approved pathology authority within the meaning of Division 4A of Part IIA of the Act;
“**business**” means the business of providing pathology services, including the services provided by at least 1 LCC;
“**LCC**” means a licensed collection centre within the meaning of Part IIA of the Act;
“**LCC allocation**” means a determination by the Minister under subsection 23DNB (1) or (4) of the Act;
“**specimen collection centre**” has the same meaning as in Part IIA of the Act;
“**temporary collection centre**” has the same meaning as in Part IIA of the Act;
“**the Act**” means the *Health Insurance Act 1973*.

Principles determined

3. (1) This Determination sets out the principles with which the Minister must comply in making a determination under subsection 23DNB (1) or (4) or subsection 23DNC (1) of the Act.

(2) This Determination applies subject to the general principle that, despite anything else in this Determination, an LCC allocation in respect of an APA must not exceed 0 if:

- (a) the APA does not operate at least 1 accredited pathology laboratory; or
- (b) any accredited pathology laboratory operated by the APA is a Category 5 pathology laboratory for the purposes of section 23DN of the Act.

**PART 2—DETERMINATIONS UNDER SUBSECTION
23DNB (1): YEARS BEGINNING ON 1 FEBRUARY**

Division 1—Preliminary

Interpretation

4. In this Part, unless the contrary intention appears:
“**patient episode**” has the same meaning as in the pathology services table;
“**recognised pathologist**” means a medical practitioner recognised as a specialist in pathology by a determination under subsection 61 (3) of the Act;
“**treating practitioner**” has the same meaning as in paragraph 16A (1) (a) of the Act.

5. (1) Subject to Division 4, in making a determination under subsection 23DNB (1) of the Act for the year beginning on 1 February 1994 in respect of a person that, as an APA, operated specimen collection centres immediately before 11 December 1991, the Minister must determine as the maximum number of LCCs that the person may operate a number that is not less than 3 and not more than the number calculated in accordance with the formula:

$$\frac{A + B + C}{3} + 1$$

where:

A is one 50th of the daily average of the number of patient episodes in relation to which the person rendered pathology services in any 62 days specified by the person in the relevant period of 13 weeks; and

B is one 30th of the number of treating practitioners who requested the person to render pathology services in relation to more than 15 patient episodes in the relevant period of 13 weeks; and

C is 4 times the notional number of full-time recognised pathologists who worked for the person in the relevant period of 13 weeks, calculated on the basis of:

- (a) taking a full-time recognised pathologist to be a recognised pathologist who works for 40 hours in each of those 13 weeks; and
- (b) disregarding any time worked in a week that does not exceed 4 hours; and
- (c) disregarding the time worked in a week after the recognised pathologist has worked for a total of 40 hours for an APA; and
- (d) disregarding the total time worked in a week that exceeds a whole number of hours.

(2) In subclause (1), the relevant period of 13 weeks is:

- (a) unless the person is a person mentioned in paragraph (b)—the period of 13 weeks in the months of April, May and June 1991; or
- (b) if the person became an APA on or after 1 July 1990 and, before 1 February 1993, gave to the Minister notice of the person's choice to have substituted for that period in relevant calculations a period of 13 weeks, specified in the notice, in the year immediately preceding the person's application for the grant of a licence—the period of 13 weeks so specified.

4 **Health Insurance (Pathology—Licensed Collection Centres)
Determination (No. 3)**

(3) If any step (except the last step) in the application of the formula in subclause (1) produces a fraction of less than 0.1, the fraction is to be rounded off correct to the first decimal place by:

- (a) disregarding a fraction of less than 0.05; and
- (b) treating a fraction of 0.05 and above that is less than 0.1 as 0.1.

(4) The number finally produced by the application of the formula in subclause (1) is to be rounded off to a whole number:

- (a) if the number finally produced is less than 5, by:
 - (i) disregarding a fraction of less than 0.4; and
 - (ii) treating a fraction of 0.4 and above that is less than 1 as 1; and
- (b) if the number finally produced is 5 or more, by:
 - (i) disregarding a fraction of less than 0.8; and
 - (ii) treating a fraction of 0.8 and above as 1.

- (a) 4; or
- (b) the number calculated in accordance with the formula:

 - (ii) 1.5 multiplied by the maximum number of LCCs that the person may operate at any time in the year beginning on 1 February 1994;

whichever is the lesser; and

B is the maximum number of LCCs that, in accordance with subclause 5 (1), the person may operate at any time in the year beginning on 1 February 1994.

(3) The number produced by the application of the formula in subclause (1) is to be rounded off to a whole number:

- (a) if the number finally produced is less than 5, by:

- (e) if the request is delivered to the Minister less than 2 months before a 1 February, make the determination required to be made under subsection 23DNB (1) in respect of the person for the year commencing on that 1 February in accordance with subclause (2); or
 - (f) in any other case, revoke the determination currently in force under section 23DNB in respect of the person and make a new

determination for the remainder of the period to which that determination relates that is in accordance with subclause (2).

(2) A determination is in accordance with this subclause if it provides that the maximum number of LCCs that the APA may operate in the year to which the determination relates is the number calculated in accordance with the formula in subclause 5 (1), as if the references in that subclause to the relevant period of 13 weeks were references to the period of 13 weeks specified in the request.

Acquisition and disposal of APA business

10. (1) If, by agreement, an APA acquires business from another APA, or from other APAs, the acquiring APA may make a request in writing to the Minister for its LCC allocation to be varied from a date, not earlier than 1 month after delivery of the request to the Minister, specified in the request.

(2) A request under subclause (1) must specify, in respect of the period commencing on the date of effect of the determination currently in force under section 23DNB in respect of the APA and ending on the date of the request:

- (a) the name of each other APA from which the APA has acquired business and the nature and extent of the business acquired; and
- (b) the name of each other APA to which the APA has disposed of business and the nature and extent of the business disposed of.

(3) If the date specified in the request is a 1 February, the Minister may, in making a determination under subsection 23DNB (1) in respect of the APA for the year commencing on that date, vary the LCC allocation of the APA to take account, as nearly as is practicable, both of the business acquired by the APA and of any business disposed of by the APA.

(4) If the date specified in the request is a date other than a 1 February, the Minister may revoke the determination currently in force under section 23DNB in respect of the APA and make a new determination for the remainder of the period to which that determination relates that takes account, as nearly as is practicable, both of the business acquired by the APA and of any business disposed of by the APA.

(5) If the Minister makes a determination referred to in subclause (3) or (4) that has the effect of increasing the LCC allocation of an APA, the Minister must also make similar determinations that have the effect, as nearly as is practicable, of correspondingly decreasing the LCC allocations of the APAs from which the acquiring APA acquired business so that the variations in the LCC allocations of the acquiring APA and the other APAs

do not have the effect of increasing the total entitlement of APAs generally to LCCs.

**PART 3—DETERMINATIONS UNDER SUBSECTION

APAs having no previous association with APA business

11. In making a determination under subsection 23DNB (4) of the Act in respect of an APA that:

- (a) does not own or control any accredited pathology laboratory that has previously been owned or controlled by another APA; and
- (b) has not, since becoming an APA, acquired, by agreement, any business from another APA; and
- (c) does not conduct any operations that are in any way connected with the former operations of another APA or of a former APA;

the Minister must not determine a number greater than 3.

APAs having previous association with APA business

12. (1) In making a determination under subsection 23DNB (4) of the Act in respect of an APA other than an APA of the kind to which clause 11 relates, the Minister must determine a number that takes account, as nearly as is practicable, of:

- (a) the nature and extent of the operations carried on by the APA using any accredited pathology laboratory owned or controlled by the APA that was previously owned or controlled by another APA and the nature and extent of the operations of that other APA; and
- (b) the nature and extent of any business acquired, by agreement, from another APA; and
- (c) any connection between the operations of the APA and any former operations of another APA or of a former APA.

(2) When the Minister makes a determination referred to in subclause (1), the Minister must also make determinations that have the effect, as nearly as is practicable, of correspondingly decreasing the LCC allocations of the other APAs referred to in subclause (1) so that the total entitlement of APAs generally to LCCs is not increased.

The Government has been advised that following the calling of tenders for the remaining MDS channels, major commercial interests have developed plans to provide extensive subscription television broadcasting services through this medium.

MDS has always been seen by the Government as providing a useful competitive ancillary to a national satellite or cable system, but because of its inherent limitations of audience reach and its technical inferiority it was not envisaged that it would provide the backbone of a national subscription television broadcasting service.

The Government has been advised that any such MDS-based services could not be available in all areas and would be of inferior technical quality. Nevertheless, the Government is concerned that the early development of an extensive MDS subscription television broadcasting network



may inhibit the subsequent provision of high quality subscription television broadcasting services on a national basis through satellite transmission or a cable system. Furthermore, the Government considers that if MDS services are to provide the basis of a national subscription television service the service should be subject to the same sorts of rigorous controls on concentration of ownership and cross media ownership or the Australian industry development requirements which apply to satellite subscription television broadcasting services.

The growth of subscription television broadcasting services delivered primarily by MDS could have long term impact on the market shares subsequently available to participants involved in the provision of such services delivered through other media such as satellite or cable. Further, it could prejudice the ability of the ABC to provide an effective nationally available service as has been expressly provided for under the satellite regime.

For these reasons, the Government's policy in relation to the use of MDS for delivery of subscription television broadcasting services is that:

no licences should be issued for subscription television broadcasting services relying predominantly on MDS for delivery prior to;

- a) the award of licences for satellite Pay TV services and the determination of the digital transmission standard for satellite subscription television broadcasting services; or
- b) the award of a licence for the provision of a national subscription television broadcasting service by cable;

whichever is the earlier.

The Government's policy is intended to ensure that the incentive remains to develop a truly national subscription television broadcasting system of the highest technical quality. It will protect the pro-competitive ownership and cross media arrangements we have in place and ensure that Australian industry development receives an appropriate impetus. It will not prevent the continued use and development of MDS for narrowcasting services or the progressive development of cable services. In time it will allow for MDS to play its proper role as an ancillary competitor for satellite and cable subscription television services. In that ancillary role there may not be the same need for the same rigorous ownership, cross media and industry development provisions as apply to the nationally available satellite technology.
