LANDS ACQUISITION ACT 1989 PRE-ACQUISITION DECLARATION (SECTION 22)

I, John Frederick Wilson, State Manager of the Australian Property Group, a person to whom the Minister administering the Lands Acquisition Act 1989 (the Act) has by delegation dated the Twenty third day of October 1991 delegated his powers and functions under subsection 22(1) of the Act, DECLARE that:

- I am considering the acquisition by the Commonwealth of the interest in the land specified in the schedule, as part of the easement required for the public purpose of the construction operation and maintenance of a pipeline for conveyance of ethane and other hydrocarbons from Moomba in South Australia to Botany in New South Wales
- 2. the land appears to me to be suitable for development for use for that public purpose
- the particulars of the use for which the land will be developed is the construction, operation and maintenance of a pipeline for conveyance of ethane and other hydrocarbons
- 4. the reasons why the land appears to be suitable for that use are that:
 - (a) it is the shortest most practicable route to keep clear of facilities at the control centre at Young and for connection to the existing Moomba to Wilton natural gas pipeline easement
 - the location of the proposed pipeline has been selected to minimise the affect on properties and the environment

DISABILITY DISCRIMINATION ACT 1992 (CTH)

SECTION 55(1)

GRANT OF EXEMPTION

By this instrument the President of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission (the "Commission"), in accordance with a delegation of power from the Commission to him on 23 August 1994 pursuant to section 121(1) of the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth) (the "Act"), grants an exemption ("the exemption") to The State of Western Australia (the "State") pursuant to section 55(1) of the Act 1992 (Cth) from the operation of sections 15, 22, 23, 24, 25, 27, 28 and 30 of the Act, such exemption to be to the extent only as provided hereinafter:

- 1. The exemption is effective from and including 29 August 1994 until on and including 30 November 1994.
- 2. The State is granted liberty to apply in respect of the exemption from 21 November 1994.
- 3. Findings on material questions of facts
- 3.1 A decision of the Equal Opportunity Tribunal of Western Australia dated 15 July 1994 (Complainant and Complainant v The State of Western Australia) held that particular treatment of HIV positive prisoners at Casuarina Prison was discriminatory under the Equal Opportunity Act 1984 (WA).
- 3.2 The State was exempted from the operation of various provisions of Part IV A of the Equal Opportunity Act 1984 (WA) on 12 August 1994 by force of the Equal Opportunity (Infectious Diseases) Regulations 1994.
- 3.3 The State is potentially in breach of the provisions in Divisions 1 or 2 of the Act.
- 3.4 The State made an application on 12 August 1994 to the Commission for an exemption under section 55(1) of the Act from the operation of sections 15, 22, 23, 24, 25, 27, 28 and 30 of the Act.
- 3.5 The State is implementing an action plan to fully accord with the decision of the Equal Opportunity Tribunal and the duty of care for non-HIV positive prisoners and staff and requires until 31 January 1995 to fully implement the action plan.
- 3.6 It would be feasible for the suggested action plan to be implemented by 30 November 1994 rather than 31 January 1995.
- 4. These findings were based on the following evidence:
- 4.1 Application for exemption from the State dated 12 August 1994.

- 4.2 Letter from David Grant, Director General of Ministry of Justice to the President received on 29 August 1994.
- 4.3 Draft Infectious Diseases Management Policy received by Executive Director of Corrective Services on 16 March 1994.
- 4.4 Oral evidence taken by the Commission from Ian Vaughan, Assistant Director of Prison Management, and Dr Denzil McCotta, Executive Director of Corrective Services Division, on 29 August 1994.
- 5. The reasons for the making of the decision
- 5.1 The power to grant an exemption under section 55(1) of the Act should be exercised with caution and reserve. This is particularly the case when during the duration of the an exemption, HIV positive prisoners may suffer discrimination but be unable to seek relief from the Commission.
- 5.2 The State has shown an intention to rectify the situation that has been held to be discriminatory by the Equal Opportunity Tribunal of Western Australia and that is potentially discriminatory under the Act.
- 5.3 Whilst it is acknowledged that some period of time is needed for the implementation of an action plan by the State, that time should be no longer than is necessary and should be limited to three (3) months so as to reduce the time that potential complainants under the Act are denied relief by way of the exemption.

6. Review

Application may be made to the Administrative Appeals Tribunal, subject to the Administrative Appeals Tribunal Act 1975, for a review of the decision to which this notice relates by or on behalf of any person or persons whose interests are affected by the decision.

OPINION ON CATEGORY OF BROADCASTING SERVICE

We have considered the information provided by the Totalisator Agency Board of Western Australia in an application made under section 21 of the Broadcasting Services Act 1992 (the Act) for an opinion to be formed by the Australian Broadcasting Authority in relation to the category of broadcasting service proposed by the applicant.

It is our opinion that the proposed service falls within the open narrowcasting service category. This opinion is made having regard to the criteria set down in sections 14 and 22 of the Act. Matters considered by the Australian Broadcasting Our reasons for this opinion are:

- the proposed service will targeting a special interest group (racing enthusiasts)
- the proposed service will provide programs of limited appeal - programming will be limited to racing coverage and associated information.

Under subsection 21(5)(a) of the Act, this opinion is binding for five years, so long as the circumstances under which the service is proposed to be provided remain substantially the same as those advised in the application for an opinion.

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA DEFENCE FORCE REGULATIONS NOTICE UNDER REGULATION 49

I, ROBERT FRANCIS RAY, Minister for Defence, pursuant to sub-regulation 49(1) of the Defence Force Regulations, hereby declare the area of land in Australia described in the Schedule, being land under pastoral lease from the Northern Territory Government, the leaser of which has consented in writing to this notice, to be a defence practice area for carrying out military operation or practice of the kind specified in the Schedule. This declaration is to remain in force until the expiration of 22 October 1994.

SCHEDULE

Area of Land

That piece of land in the Northern Territory of Australia containing an Area of 1706 square kilometres more or less being Northern Territory Portion 3991 (East Mathison) and bounded by lines described as follows: commencing at the intersection of meridian of east longitude 131 degrees 53 minutes 26 seconds with the southeastern boundary of the Victoria Highway, being the most northern corner of Northern Territory Portion 3991; thence south to parallel of south lattitude 15 degrees 4 minutes 9 seconds; thence east to meridian of east longitude 132 degrees 5 minutes 28 seconds; thence south to parallel of south latitude 15 degrees 24 minutes 43 seconds; thence west to meridian of east longitude 131 degrees 42 minutes 15 seconds; thence north to parallel of south latitude 15 degrees 10 minutes 14 seconds; thence northwesterly on a bearing of 298 degrees 39 minutes to intersect the southeastern boundary of the Victoria Highway; thence generally northeasterly by the said boundary to the point of commencement.

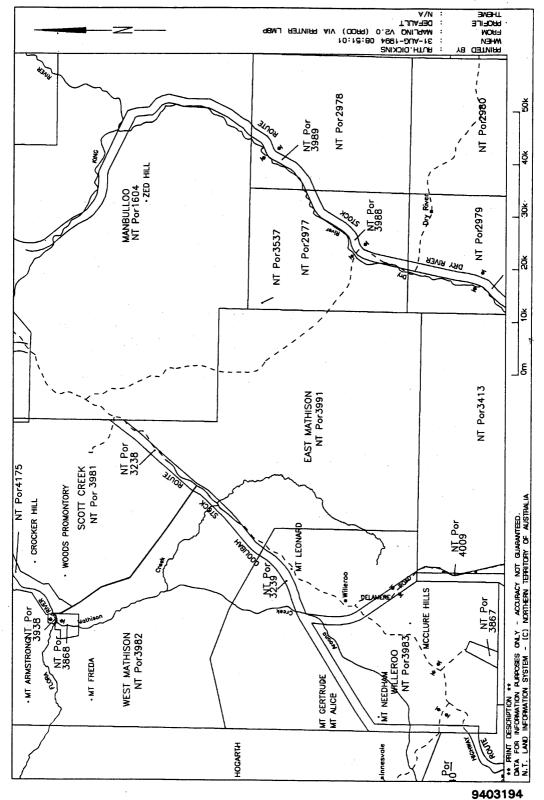

DECLARATION OF CONTROLLED SPECIMENS

I, JOHN PHILIP FAULKNER, Minister for the Environment, Sport and Territories, having considered comments as required by subsection 9B(3) of the Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982 (the Act) and having taken into account advice from the Designated Authority on those matters specified in subsection 10A(5) of the Act, hereby declare Xanthorrhoea plants harvested from private land at Taloumbi, New South Wales, by W & A Bruinsma Grasstrees, to be 'controlled specimens' for the purposes of subsection 10A(2) of the Act, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Harvesting operations are to be carried out in accordance with the document entitled "Proposal for Harvest and Export of Native Wildlife Under the Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982 Xanthorrhoea spp. by W & A Bruinsma Grasstrees, revised 22 August 1994".
- 2. The harvest is restricted to a total of 1,000 plants per year, for distribution to domestic or export markets.
- 3. Recording of yearly harvest figures is to be undertaken and figures submitted annually to the Designated Authority.
- 4. This declaration is valid until 31 October 1996.

DECLARATION OF CONTROLLED SPECIMENS

I, JOHN PHILIP FAULKNER, Minister for the Environment, Sport and Territories, having considered comments as required by subsection 9B(3) of the Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982 (the Act) and having taken into account advice from the Designated Authority on those matters specified in subsection 10A(5) of the Act, hereby declare each of the specimens specified in Column 2 of the Schedule, in an item in the Schedule, to be controlled specimens in relation to the circumstances specified in Column 3 of the Schedule in that item, for the purposes of subsection 10A(2) of the Act, and subject to the following conditions:

- 1. This declaration is limited to harvesting carried out by Mr Brian Richards of Crows Nest, Queensland.
- 2. Recording of harvest figures is to be undertaken and figures are to be submitted annually to the Designated Authority.
- 3. This declaration is valid until approval of a state-wide management program or 31 December 1995, whichever is the earliest.

The applicant seeks to vary Standard A12 - Metals and Contaminants in Food, by creating a new food section "Raw Potatoes" separately from "All Other Foods" and to change the maximum permitted concentration (MPC) of cadmium from 0.05 mg/kg to 0.10 mg/kg with the MPC determined on the raw product, whether the potatoes are to be used for fresh consumption or for processing.

The Authority has made a preliminary assessment, accepted the application and will make a full assessment. To assist this process, the Authority invites submissions on matters relevant to the application.

Cadmium in Crustaceans (A223)

Revocation earlier determinations

 Determinations No 1 of 1994 made pursuant to section 86E of the Quarantine Act 1908 and published in the Gazette No GN34, of 31 August 1994 is hereby revoked.

Date of effect of these determinations

2. These determinations are to take effect on publication in the Gazette.

Fees payable for services

3. Subject to paragraphs 4, 5 and 6, the fee payable in respect of a service specified in an item in Column 2 of the Schedule is the amount specified in Column 3 of the Schedule adjacent to that item.

Minimum fee

4. Where a fee specified in Column 3 of the Schedule is expressed to be subject to a minimum fee, the fee payable shall not be less than the amount of that fee.

Maximum fee

5. Where a fee specified in Column 3 of the fee Schedule is expressed to be subject to a maximum fee, the fee payable shall not exceed the amount of that fee.

Multiple fees

6. Where more than one fee in Column 3 of the Schedule is applicable to a service, the fee payable shall be calculated by adding together the fees that are applicable to that service.

Date due for payment

- 7. A fee imposed by these determinations must be paid:
 - (a) if the amount of the fee is determined before the provision of the service on demand for payment; or
 - (b) in any other case on the due date shown on an invoice issued by the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service.

Determinations not to apply to certain services

- 8. These Determinations do not apply in relation to services provided:
 - a. to diplomatic staff of a country other than Australia;
 - b. to foreign vessels and equipment undertaking combined exercises with the Australian defence forces;
 - c. for examination of personal luggage arriving in Australia aboard the same vessel as the owner or importer of the goods;
 - d. for surveillance of parcel post items containing goods that are for private/non-commercial use.

(c) that, in the purchase and sale of foreign currency, AEII and TRS shall comply with any direction which may be given by the Reserve Bank of Australia.

Handphone Stations (27 MHz) Class Licence

I, ROGER NEIL SMITH, Acting Spectrum Manager, issue on behalf of the Spectrum Management Agency the following Class Licence under subsection 132 (1) of the *Radiocommunications Act 1992*.

Dated 15 September, 1994.

Acting Spectrum Manager

Citation

1. This Class Licence may be cited as the Handphone Stations (27MHz) Class Licence.

Commencement

2. This Class Licence commences on 3 October 1994.

Interpretation

3. In this Class Licence, unless the contrary intention appears:

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"AM" means amplitude modulation that employs double sideband transmission without the carrier or either the upper or lower sideband being suppressed;

"handphone station" means a station that:

- (a) is designed to be carried personally; and
- (b) uses a carrier frequency specified in the Schedule;
- "LSB" means lower sideband, being an SSB radio emission of which the sideband above the carrier is suppressed;
- "Ministerial Standard 316" means the standard for radiocommunications equipment used in the 27MHz handphone service that was published in the Gazette on 2 March 1989;
- "necessary bandwidth" means the maximum width of a frequency band that is just sufficient to ensure the transmission of desired information;
- "pX" means peak envelope power, being the average power supplied to an antenna transmission line by a transmitter during 1 radio frequency cycle at the crest of the modulation envelope under normal operating conditions;
- "pZ" means carrier power, being the average power supplied to an antenna transmission line by a transmitter during 1 radio frequency cycle under the condition of no modulation;
- "RB 242" means the document entitled "Minimum Technical Requirements of Radio Equipment (Type A3 Emission) Accepted for Licensing Purposes in Connection with Medium and High Frequency Radiotelephone Services" that was published by the Postal and Telecommunications Department of the Commonwealth in August 1976;
- "SSB" means single sideband, being a radio emission of which the carrier, and either the lower or upper sideband, are suppressed;
- "USB" means upper sideband, being an SSB radio emission of which the sideband below the carrier is suppressed.

Class licence

4. A person may operate a handphone station that transmits speech to, or audio tones to initiate communication with, another handphone station:

- (a) on a carrier frequency specified in column 2 in an item in the Schedule; and
- (b) subject to any restriction specified in column 3 in the item.

General conditions

- 5. A person must not:
- (a) operate a handphone station that:
 - (i) in the case of a handphone station that was manufactured before 2 March 1989—does not comply with RB 242; and
 - (ii) in any other case—that does not comply with Ministerial Standard 316; or
- (b) when operating on a carrier frequency specified in column 2 in item 2 in the Schedule—cause interference to a station to which the Citizen Band Radio Stations Class Licence applies; or
- (c) operate a handphone station that was manufactured after 2 March 1989 on a carrier frequency specified in column 2 in item 2 in the Schedule; or
- (d) operate a handphone station unless it is equipped with an antenna that is an integral part of the handphone station; or
- (e) connect or couple to the handphone station:
 - (i) a separate antenna; or
 - (ii) a combination of an external radiofrequency amplifier and antenna; or
- (f) if a handphone station transmits in a form other than speech—transmit for more than 3 seconds in any period of 60 seconds; or
- (g) make an alteration to a handphone station, or to accessory apparatus used in the operation of the station, that is likely to cause interference to radiocommunications, except:
 - (i) in accordance with a direction given under subparagraph 7 (2) (a) (i); or
 - (ii) with the consent in writing of an inspector who is reasonably satisfied that the alteration has been made to test the operation of the handphone station.

Other conditions

- **6.** A person must not:
- (a) operate a handphone station:
 - (i) in a way that would be likely to cause a reasonable person, justifiably in all the circumstances, to be seriously alarmed or seriously affronted; or
 - (ii) for the purpose of harassing a person; or
- (b) fail to comply with a direction given under clause 7.

Directions

- 7. (1) A person must comply with a direction that:
- (a) relates to the operation of a handphone station by the person; and
- (b) is given to the person by a person referred to in subclause (3); and
- (c) is described in subclause (4).
- (2) A person must comply with a direction that:
- (a) relates to interference to radiocommunications that:
 - (i) is likely to be caused by the alteration, installation or maintenance of a handphone station, or of accessory apparatus for use with a handphone station, by the person; or
 - (ii) is, or is likely to be, caused by the operation of a handphone station by the person; and
- (b) is given to the person in writing by an inspector.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph (1) (b), a direction may be given by:
 - (a) a member of the Australian Federal Police; or
 - (b) a member of the police force of a State or Territory; or
 - (c) an officer of the Defence Force; or
 - (d) an officer of the Australian Coastal Surveillance Centre; or
 - (e) an officer mentioned in Schedule 2 to the Radiocommunications Regulations;

who is acting in the performance of his or her duties.

(4) A direction that is referred to in subclause (1) must be reasonably necessary to:

- (a) secure the safety of an aircraft or a vessel that is in danger; or
- (b) deal with an emergency that involves a serious threat to the environment; or
- (c) deal with an emergency that involves the risk of death of, or injury to, a person; or
- (d) deal with an emergency that involves the risk of substantial damage to, or substantial loss of, property.

[NOTE: Operation of a handphone station under this Class Licence is also subject to the provisions of the *Radiocommunications Act 1992*. Substantial penalties apply to breaches of the Act.]

"RB234A" means:

- (a) an edition of the document entitled "Specification for radio equipment employed in land and harbour mobile radio telephone service" that was published:
 - (i) by the Postmaster-General's Department of the Commonwealth in January 1974; or
 - (ii) in a revised form by the Postal and Telecommunications Department of the Commonwealth in October 1976; or
- (b) the document entitled "Equipment Specification for Land and Harbour Mobile Services (403-420MHz & 450-470MHz, 470-500MHz and 500-520MHz)" that was published by the Department of Transport and Communications of the Commonwealth in November 1988;

"RB234B" means the document:

(a) entitled "Specification for radio equipment employed in land and harbour mobile radiotelephone services" that was published by the Postal and Telecommunications Department of the Commonwealth in December 1977; or

- (b) entitled "Equipment Specification for Land and Harbour Mobile Services (403-420MHz, 450-470MHz, 470-500MHz and 500-520MHz)" that was published by the Department of Transport and Communications of the Commonwealth in November 1988;
- "RB 249" means the document entitled "Specification for 27MHz radiotelephony equipment employed in the citizen band radio service" that was published by the Postal and Telecommunications Department of the Commonwealth in October 1978;
- "RB 249A" means the document entitled "Specification for 40 channel 27MHz radiotelephony equipment employed in the citizen band radiocommunication service" that was published by the Department of Communications of the Commonwealth in December 1981:
- "RB 250" means the document entitled "Specification for UHF radio equipment employed in the citizen band radio service" that was published by the Postal and Telecommunications Department of the Commonwealth in October 1978;
- "SSB" means single sideband, being a radio emission of which the carrier, and either the lower or upper sideband, are suppressed;
- "UHF" means ultra high frequency, being a frequency that exceeds 300 megahertz but does not exceed 3 gigahertz;
- "USB" means upper sideband, being an SSB radio emission of which the sideband below the carrier is suppressed.

Class licence

- 4. A person may operate a CB station that, directly or through a CB repeater station, transmits speech to, or audio tones to initiate communication with, another CB station:
 - (a) on a carrier frequency specified in column 3 in an item in the Schedule; and
 - (b) subject to a restriction specified in column 4 in the item.

General conditions

- 5. A person must not:
- (a) operate a CB station:
 - (i) in the case of a CB station that was manufactured before 29 April 1988—that does not comply with

RB234, RB234A, RB234B, RB249, RB249A or RB250; and

- (ii) in any other case—does not comply with Ministerial Standard 250 or Ministerial Standard 312; or
- (b) except in an emergency—operate a CB station on:
 - (i) carrier frequency 27.065 megahertz; or
 - (ii) carrier frequency 476.525 megahertz; or
 - (iii) carrier frequency 477.275 megahertz; or

[NOTE: In an emergency mentioned in subsection 49 (1) of the *Radiocommunications Act 1992*, if a carrier frequency mentioned in this paragraph is not accessible, it is preferable that a carrier frequency mentioned in paragraph (c) should be used.]

- (c) except to initiate contact with another CB station—operate a CB station on:
 - (i) carrier frequency 27.085 megahertz; or
 - (ii) carrier frequency 27.155 megahertz; or
 - (iii) carrier frequency 476.675 megahertz; or
- (d) use with a transmitter a device that encrypts speech transmission in transmitting:
 - (i) a radio signal on a carrier frequency that is referred to in paragraph (b) or (c); or
 - (ii) through a CB repeater station; or
- (e) if a CB station transmits in a form other than speech—transmit for more than 3 seconds in any period of 60 seconds; or
- (f) make an alteration to a CB station, or to accessory apparatus used in the operation of a CB station, that is likely to cause interference to radiocommunications, except:
 - (i) in accordance with a direction given under subparagraph 8 (2) (a) (i); or
 - (ii) with the consent in writing of an inspector who is reasonably satisfied that the alteration has been made to test the operation of the CB station.

Other conditions

- **6.** A person must not:
- (a) operate a CB station:
 - (i) in a way that would be likely to cause a reasonable person, justifiably in all the circumstances, to be seriously alarmed or seriously affronted; or

- (ii) for the purpose of harassing a person; or
- (b) fail to comply with a direction given under clause 8.

Conditions relating to CB stations that operate through CB repeater stations

- 7. A person must not:
- (a) except for the purpose of operating through a CB repeater station, operate a CB station on a channel specified in column 2 in item 5 in the Schedule within the operational range of the CB repeater station; or
- (b) transmit to a CB repeater station except on a channel specified in column 2 in item 5 in the Schedule by a number from 1 to 8 (inclusive); or
- (c) receive a transmission from a CB repeater station except on a channel specified in column 2 in item 5 in the Schedule by a number from 31 to 38 (inclusive).

Directions

- **8.** (1) A person must comply with a direction that:
- (a) relates to the operation of a CB station by the person; and
- (b) is given to the person by a person referred to in subclause (3); and
- (c) is described in subclause (4).
- (2) A person must comply with a direction that:
- (a) relates to interference to radiocommunications that:
 - (i) is likely to be caused by the alteration, installation or maintenance of a CB station, or of accessory apparatus for use with a CB station, by the person; or
 - (ii) is, or is likely to be, caused by the operation of a CB station by the person; and
- (b) is given to the person in writing by an inspector.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph (1) (b), a direction may be given by:
 - (a) a member of the Australian Federal Police; or
 - (b) a member of the police force of a State or Territory; or
 - (c) an officer of the Defence Force; or
 - (d) an officer of the Australian Coastal Surveillance Centre; or

- (e) an officer mentioned in Schedule 2 to the Radiocommunications Regulations; who is acting in the performance of his or her duties.
- (4) A direction that is referred to in subclause (1) must be reasonably necessary to:
 - (a) secure the safety of an aircraft or a vessel that is in danger; or
 - (b) deal with an emergency that involves a serious threat to the environment; or
 - (c) deal with an emergency that involves the risk of death of, or injury to, a person; or
 - (d) deal with an emergency that involves the risk of substantial damage to, or substantial loss of, property.

[NOTE: Operation of a CB station under this Class Licence is also subject to the provisions of the *Radiocommunications Act 1992*. Substantial penalties apply to breaches of the Act.]
