OPINION ON CATEGORY OF BROADCASTING SERVICE

We have considered the information provided by Western Visitor Radio in an application made under section 21 of the *Broadcasting Services Act* 1992 ("the Act"). The application was for an opinion to be formed by the Australian Broadcasting Authority ("ABA") in relation to the category of broadcasting service of a proposed tourist information radio service.

This opinion is based on information provided by the applicant in its application received by the ABA on 11 July 1996 and further information requested by the ABA on 10 July 1996 and submitted by the applicant on 6 November 1996 and the ABA's own investigations. The ABA has also had regard to the existing service operated by Western Visitor Radio in Dubbo which was the subject of an ABA complaint investigation which was resolved on 10 October 1996.

The service proposed is a Tourist Information radio service operating in a live to air format for up to 24 hours per day, seven days per week. The service focuses on tourist information and includes up to eight tracks of Australian country music per hour, weather reports but no news and constrains advertising to that of direct relevance to tourists or visitors. The service is identified on-air and otherwise promoted as a "tourist information" service.

It is our opinion that the proposed service falls within the open narrowcasting category. This opinion is given having regard to the criteria set down in sections 18 and 22 of the Act. Matters considered by the ABA in reaching this opinion include that reception of the service will be limited:

18(a)(i) by being targeted to special interest groups;

18(a)(iv) because it provides programs of limited appeal.

Under subsection 21(5)(a) of the Act, this opinion is binding for five years while the circumstances relating to the broadcasting service remain substantially the same as those advised to the ABA in relation to the application for the opinion.

Pursuant to Section 33 of the Hazardous Waste (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1989, notice is given that on 17 December 1996 a permit was granted to GNB Technologies Ltd (ACN 000 023 003), Peachy Road, Elizabeth West, SA 5113 (phone 08 8307 4447, Facsimile 08 8255 9989), to export no more than 15,000 tonnes of used lead-acid batteries whole or crushed from Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Perth, or Melbourne, to GNB Batteries Ltd (NZ), Gracefield, Wellington, New Zealand. The waste will be disposed of by recycling/reclamation of metals and metal compounds and organic substances.

The material will be packaged on pallets and placed in shipping containers and transported by road to be loaded onto a ship at either Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Perth, or Melbourne, to be offloaded at Wellington Port, New Zealand. From there it will be transported by road. The waste will not transit through any other country. The export will take place in approximately 60 shipments from 17 December 1996 to 11 December 1997.

It is a condition of the permit that any requirements lawfully imposed by State or Territory Departments and Agencies in areas under their jurisdiction, relative to the storage, handling, transport, disposal, and labelling of the material, are met.

Pursuant to Section 33 of the <u>Hazardous Waste</u> (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1989, notice is given that on 18 December 1996 a permit was granted to TCS Antarctic Services (ACN 009 494 893), Gladstone House, 2A Gladstone Street, Hobart, TAS 7000 (Phone 03 6223 5177, Facsimile 03 6223 6319), to import no more than 150 tonnes of wastes comprising sump oil, compacted plastic waste, broken glass from bottles, steel from plated steel cans, ashes from the incineration of wood and by-products, empty kerosene 200L drums, former copper electrical wires, and steel and some insulating plastic from a building removal. 

ANTI-DUMPING AUTHORITY

FINAL FINDING ON SODIUM STEAROYL LACTYLATE FROM MALAYSIA

The Anti-Dumping Authority has completed its inquiry into the export of sodium stearoyl lactylate (SSL) from Malaysia.

The Authority concluded that:

- exports of SSL from Malaysia by Danisco Ingredients (Malaysia) Sdn Bhd
 (Danisco) have been dumped;
- the Australian industry producing SSL has suffered material injury caused by that dumping; and
- there is a threat of further material injury to the Australian industry producing SSL from future imports of SSL from Malaysia by Danisco at dumped prices.

Towards the end of the inquiry, Roger D Simpson & Associates Pty Ltd, on behalf of its client, provided the Authority with an offer of a price undertaking that future trade to Australia in SSL from Malaysia would be conducted in a manner such as to avoid material injury or threat thereof to the Australian industry producing SSL.

The Authority considered the offer and recommended to the Minister that he accept it and defer his decision to take anti-dumping action against future exports of SSL from Malaysia by Danisco.

The Minister has decided to impose interim dumping duties rather than accept the offer of an undertaking.

Date of effect of these determinations

Fees payable for services

3. Subject to paragraphs 4, 5 and 6, the fee payable in respect of a service specified in an item in Column 2 of the Schedule is the amount specified in Column 3 of the Schedule adjacent to that item.

Minimum fee

4. Where a fee specified in Column 3 of the Schedule is expressed to be subject to a minimum fee, the fee payable shall not be less than the amount of that fee.

Maximum fee

5. Where a fee specified in Column 3 of the fee Schedule is expressed to be subject to a maximum fee, the fee payable shall not exceed the amount of that fee.

Multiple fees

6. Where more than one fee in Column 3 of the Schedule is applicable to a service, the fee payable shall be calculated by adding together the fees that are applicable to that service.

Date due for payment

- 7. A fee imposed by these determinations must be paid:
 - (a) if the amount of the fee is determined before the provision of the service - on demand for payment; or
 - (b) in any other case on the due date shown on an invoice issued by the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service.

Late Payment Fees

8. A penalty fee at the rate of 20% per annum applies where fees payable for quarantine services remain unpaid at any time after the due date for payment.

Determinations not to apply to certain services

- **9.** These Determinations do not apply in relation to services provided:
 - a. to diplomatic staff of a country other than Australia;

QUARANTINE ACT 1908

DETERMINATIONS UNDER SECTION 86E OF THE QUARANTINE ACT 1908

Determinations No. 1 of 1997

Subsection 86E (1B) of the *Quarantine Act 1908* (the Act) provides that the Minister may, by notice published in the Gazette, determine that fees of amounts set out in the notice are payable in respect of specified examinations or services carried out or provided by or under the Act, the issue by quarantine officers of specified certificates by or under the Act, the management and maintenance of animals at a quarantine station in the Cocos (Keeling) Islands and the granting of approvals by the Chief Quarantine Officer under subsection 44A(5) or 44B(1).

Subsection 86E (4) of the Act provides that section 48 (other than paragraphs (1)(a) and (b) and subsection (2)) and sections 49 and 50 of the Acts Interpretation Act 1901 apply in relation to determinations made under section 86E. Determinations No. 3 of 1996 replace Determinations No. 2 of 1996 which were published in Gazette No 34, 28 August 1996 and provide for fees for various quarantine examinations and services and other matters within subsection 86E (1) of the Act.

An increase is required to the container clearance fee to fund a cost recovery shortfall in AQIS's Quarantine Import Clearance Program. The container clearance sector has been identified as the main area contributing to the program's cost recovery problems. The required increase to the container clearance fee has been endorsed by industry representatives through the AQIS/Industry Cargo Consultative Committee (AICCC).

Item 4(b) refers to the quarantine clearance of non-empty containers. The charge for the clearance of each container unit has increased from \$6.00 to \$10.50. The required increase has been calculated on the basis of industry-based estimates of container traffic for the remainder of the financial year.

The new Clause 8 of the determinations provides for the application of penalty fees where fees payable for quarantine services remain unpaid at any time after the due date for payment. A penalty fee at the rate of 20% per annum will apply.

Determinations No. 1 of 1997 will come into effect on 28 January 1997.

 - " Meaning of "unclaimed money"

- (d) the trustee is unable to pay those benefits to the member because the trustee, after making reasonable efforts, is unable to find the member;
- any amount payable to the member is taken to be unclaimed money.

(1A) If:

- (a) a member of a fund has died; and
- (b) the trustee determines that, under the governing rules of the fund, a benefit (other than a pension or annuity) is immediately payable in respect of the member; and
- (c) the member had not applied to the trustee to have the amount of his or her benefits in the fund paid to him or her or has died after making such an application; and
- (d) the trustee is unable to pay those benefits in respect of the member because the trustee, after making reasonable efforts, is unable to find a person (the "beneficiary") to whom the trustee is required to pay those benefits;

any amount payable to the beneficiary is taken to be unclaimed money.

Trustee must make reasonable efforts to find the person entitled to the unclaimed money

- (1B) If paragraphs (1)(a), (b) and (c) are satisfied in relation to a member of a fund, the trustee must make reasonable efforts to find the member and pay the benefits to him or her.
- (1C) If paragraphs (1A)(a), (b) and (c) are satisfied in relation to a member of a fund, the trustee must make reasonable efforts to find the beneficiary and pay the benefits to him or her."

c. By adding after subsection 225(2):

"[NOTE: The approved form may require the trustee to set out:

(a) the tax file number of any beneficiary of the fund to whom the statement relates, who has quoted his or her tax file number to the trustee; and

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(b) the tax file number of the fund. The first file (a) the forestern a part of the file (b) See subsection 299U(4).]"

d. By adding after subsection 225(2A) (which was added by modification declaration number 13):

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- "Statement must include particulars of unclaimed money paid after the end of the half-year
- (2B) If, between the end of the half-year and the day on which the statement is given to the Commissioner, the trustee pays any of the unclaimed money to a person who is entitled to it, the statement must contain such particulars relating to the amounts so paid as are required by the form.

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Commissioner may extend time for lodging statement

- (2C) The Commissioner may, in writing, provide for a later day to apply under paragraph (2)(a) or (b). This may be done before or after the day specified in the paragraph concerned."
- e. By omitting subsection 225(5) and substituting:
 - "Payment of unclaimed money to Commissioner
 - (5) The trustee must, when the statement is given, pay to the Commissioner an amount worked out using the following formula:

amount of unclaimed money unclaimed money specified in statement paid by trustee

where:

"amount of unclaimed money specified in statement" means any amounts specified in the statement in accordance with subsection (2);

"unclaimed money paid by trustee" means any amounts specified in the statement in accordance with subsection (2B)."

f. By adding "or to a State or Territory authority" after "to the Commissioner" in subsection 225(8).

- g. By omitting subsection 225(9) and substituting:
 - "Payment of unclaimed money to a State or Territory authority
 - (9) If a law of a State or Territory satisfies the requirements of subsections (9A) and (9B), then the trustee must, instead of complying with subsections (2) and (5), pay the amount worked out under paragraph (9A)(c) to a State or Territory authority in accordance with that law.
 - (9A) The first requirement is that the law requires:
 - (a) a trustee to prepare, at the end of each half-year, a statement, in a form approved by a State or Territory authority, of all unclaimed money (within the meaning of subsection (1) or (1A)) in the fund; and
 - (b) that the statement be given to a State or Territory authority on or before:
 - (i) in relation to a half-year ending on 30 June in a calendar year 31 October in that calendar year; and
 - (ii) in relation to a half-year ending on 31 December in a calendar year 30 April in the following calendar year; and

- (c) the trustee to pay to the State or Territory authority, when the statement is given, an amount worked out in accordance with a formula corresponding to the formula in subsection (5); and
- (d) the State or Territory authority to keep a register that contains particulars of:
 - (i) the unclaimed money paid to it by the trustee; and
 - (ii) the member in respect of whom the unclaimed money was payable.

(9B) The second requirement is that the law contains provisions:

- (a) corresponding to subsection (2B), that require the statement to contain such particulars relating to any unclaimed money paid after the end of the half-year as are required by the form approved by the State or Territory authority; and
- (b) corresponding to subsection (2A), that authorise the approval of the form of the statement to require or permit the statement to be given on a data processing device; and
- (c) corresponding to subsection (2C), that empower the State or Territory authority to extend the period in which the statement must be lodged; and
- (d) corresponding to subsection (6), that require the State or Territory authority to pay unclaimed money to a person in circumstances corresponding to those set out in that subsection; and
- (e) corresponding to subsection (7), that require the State or Territory authority to return amounts in circumstances corresponding to those set out in that subsection."

h. By omitting paragraph 226(b) and substituting:

"(b) particulars of the members in respect of whom there is unclaimed money.

[NOTE: The particulars of a member may include the member's tax file number. See subsection 299U(5).]"

- 2. The Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Regulations are to have effect, in relation to regulated superannuation funds and approved deposit funds, and their trustees, as if they were modified by adding after paragraph (c) of the definition of "superannuation system" in subregulation 5.01(1) (which was modified by modification declaration number 13):
 - "(ca) a State or Territory, or State or Territory authority, in its role as the recipient of unclaimed money under subsection 225(9) of the Act; and "

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

ACCOMPANYING

MODIFICATION DECLARATION No 19

PURPOSE OF THE DECLARATION

- The main purpose of modification declaration number 19 is to modify Part 22 of the Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Act 1993 (the "SIS Act") to ensure that trustees of regulated superannuation funds and approved deposit funds can pay unclaimed money to a State or Territory government or authority (hereafter called a "State or Territory authority") under unclaimed money legislation of the State or Territory, provided that that unclaimed money legislation relevantly mirrors the requirements of Part 22.
- 2. The declaration also makes various minor improvements to Part 22.
- 3. Lastly, the declaration modifies the definition of "superannuation system" in subregulation 5.01(1) of the *Superannuation Industry (Supervision)*Regulations (the "SIS Regulations") to ensure that a payment of unclaimed money to a State or Territory authority in accordance with Part 22 constitutes a payment within the "superannuation system".

BACKGROUND

4. Part 22 of the SIS Act, as modified by modification declaration number 13, requires the trustees of regulated superannuation funds and approved deposit funds to pay unclaimed money belonging to members of their funds to the Commissioner of Taxation, or to a State or Territory authority pursuant to a law of the State or Territory dealing with unclaimed money.

5. Modification declaration number 16 deferred the commencement of the requirements of Part 22 for one year. As a result of that declaration, trustees are now obliged to make the first payment of unclaimed money to the Commissioner of Taxation, or to a State or Territory authority, after 30 June 1997 and before 1 November 1997.

REASON FOR THE DECLARATION

- 6. Modification declaration number 19 implements the changes to Part 22 that were foreshadowed when the Insurance and Superannuation Commissioner signed modification declaration number 16. The reason why that declaration deferred the commencement of the requirements of Part 22 for one year was to allow time for inconsistencies between Part 22 and State and Territory unclaimed money legislation to be remedied.
- 7. At present, State and Territory laws requiring the payment of unclaimed money to State or Territory authorities differ significantly from the provisions of Part 22. For example, those laws define unclaimed money differently from the way it is defined in Part 22. Also, while Part 22 requires unclaimed money to be paid to the Commissioner of Taxation shortly after the end of the half-year in which it becomes payable to the member, many of the State and Territory laws only require unclaimed money to be paid to the State or Territory authority concerned 6 years after it becomes payable to the member.
- 8. Modification declaration number 19 is designed to ensure that all unclaimed money (as defined in Part 22 of the SIS Act) in regulated superannuation funds and approved deposit funds is treated in the same manner. The result of the declaration is that unclaimed money, as defined in Part 22, will have to be paid to the Commissioner of Taxation unless a law of a State or Territory requires it to be paid to a State or Territory authority in similar conditions and on similar terms to those set out in Part 22, in which case it will have to be paid to that State or Territory authority rather than to the Commissioner of Taxation.

EXPLANATION OF THE DECLARATION

- 9. Part 1 of modification declaration number 19 makes a number of modifications to Part 22 of the SIS Act.
- 10. The declaration adds to section 224 a definition of "State or Territory authority".

- 11. The declaration omits subsection 225(1) of the SIS Act, which defines "unclaimed money", and inserts new subsections 225(1) and (1A) which contain a new and expanded definition of "unclaimed money". The main significance of the new definition is that the new subsection 225(1A) makes it clear that unclaimed death benefits are included in the definition.
- 12. The declaration also inserts new subsections 225(1B) and (1C), which make it clear that a trustee must make reasonable efforts to find the member (or, in the case of unclaimed death benefits, the beneficiary) to whom the unclaimed money is payable.
- 13. The declaration adds a note at the end of subsection 225(2), which serves as a reminder that, by virtue of subsection 299U(4) of the SIS Act, the approved form of statement of unclaimed money may require the trustee to include the tax file numbers of the beneficiaries to whom the statement relates, as well as the tax file number of the fund.
- 14. The declaration adds a new subsection 225(2B), which requires the statement of unclaimed money given to the Commissioner of Taxation under subsection 225(2) to specify particulars of any unclaimed money that has been paid out of the fund (under subsection 225(6)) since the end of the half-year to a person entitled to it.
- 15. The declaration adds a new subsection 225(2C), which enables the Commissioner of Taxation to extend the deadlines specified in subsection 225(2) for the lodgment of the statement of unclaimed money. The discretion in subsection (2C) recognises the difficulties often faced by trustees when they have to meet a new regulatory requirement. It also allows some flexibility to be exercised in relation to funds which, for reasons beyond their control, are unable to meet the deadline.
- 16. The declaration omits subsection 225(5) and substitutes a new one. The new subsection (5), like the old one, requires the unclaimed money in the fund as at the end of the half-year to be paid to the Commissioner of Taxation, but unlike the old one it recognises the possibility that a member or beneficiary entitled to unclaimed money may be found and paid the unclaimed money after the end of the half-year but before the unclaimed money has to be given to the Commissioner. It allows any unclaimed money so paid out to be deducted from the total amount of unclaimed money that has to be paid to the Commissioner of Taxation.
- 17. The declaration also modifies subsection 225(8) so that it discharges the trustee from any further liability in respect of unclaimed money that is paid to a State or Territory authority in accordance with section 225, not just in respect of unclaimed money that is paid to the Commissioner of Taxation.

- 18. The declaration omits the existing subsection 225(9) and substitutes new subsections 225(9), (9A) and (9B) in its place. These new subsections specify the conditions with which State and Territory legislation must comply before subsection 225(9) requires unclaimed money to be paid to a State or Territory authority under that legislation instead of to the Commissioner of Taxation. In essence, the new subsections ensure that the State or Territory legislation, so far as it relates to unclaimed superannuation money, mirrors the provisions of section 225.
- 19. The declaration also omits paragraph 226(b) and substitutes a new paragraph 226(b), which makes it clear that the register of unclaimed money kept by the Commissioner of Taxation is only required to contain particulars of the *members* in respect of whom the unclaimed money was payable, not particulars of *all persons* to whom the unclaimed money was payable, which, in the case of unclaimed death benefits, could include a large number of dependants and beneficiaries of the member.
- 20. Part 2 of the declaration modifies the SIS Regulations by adding a new paragraph (ca) to the definition of "superannuation system" in subregulation 5.01(1). The effect of the new paragraph is to ensure that a payment of unclaimed money to a State or Territory authority in accordance with subsection 225(9) of the SIS Act constitutes a payment within the "superannuation system". (The definition of "superannuation system" is relevant to the definition of "rolled over" in subregulation 5.01(1).)

COMMENCEMENT

21. Modification declaration number 19 commences on the day it is made.

- (ii) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service as such a member for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, as part of the contribution of a foreign Defence Force to the prescribed operations while on secondment or exchange with the foreign Defence Force;
- (iii) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service as such a member during the period that commenced on 1 May 1993 by performing operational sorties for a period of 30 days, or periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, over Somalia as a member of the crew of a military aircraft operating in connection with the Second United Nations Operation in Somalia;
- (iv) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service as such a member for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, for official visits, inspections or other occurrences of a temporary nature while assigned for duty with the military contribution in the prescribed operations;
- (v) the Medal may be awarded to civilian members of the Department of Defence, civilian contractors of the Department of Defence, accredited members of the Australian Red Cross and accredited members of the Salvation Army, attached in an official capacity for full time duty with the Australian military contribution in the prescribed operations for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days;
- (vi) the qualifying period of service as described in subparagraphs (c)(i), (c)(ii), (c)(iii), (c)(iv) or c(v) may be deemed by the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate to have been established notwithstanding that the member has not met the qualifying periods described;
- (vii) the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate in exercising his discretion to deem under subparagraph (c)(vi) shall take into account whether service in relation to the prescribed operation:
 - (A) was terminated owing to the death, evacuation due to illness or injury or other disability due to service, of a member as described above;
 - (B) was terminated due to Government or Defence Force reasons; or

(C) was terminated due to foreign Government or foreign Defence Force reasons.

DETERMINATION UNDER SUBREGULATION 4 (2)

I, WILLIAM PATRICK DEANE, Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting under the Australian Service Medal Regulations set out in the Schedule to the Letters Patent dated 13 September 1988, and on the recommendation of the Minister for Defence Industry, Science and Personnel, hereby:

- (a) revoke the Declaration and Determination made on 16 February 1994 under Regulation 3 and Subregulation 4(2) respectively of the Australian Service Medal Regulations set out in the Schedule to the Letters Patent dated 13 September 1988;
- (b) declare under Regulation 3 of those Regulations that the Multinational Force and Observers Activity in the Sinai in the period that commenced on 9 February 1982 and extended to 28 April 1986 and in the period that commenced on 6 January 1993 to be a prescribed operation for the purpose of those Regulations; and
- (c) under Subregulation 4(2) of those Regulations, determine that the conditions for award of the Australian Service Medal with Clasp 'SINAI' in respect of the prescribed operation are:
 - (i) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service while posted to or serving as a member of the Australian element of the prescribed operation for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days;
 - (ii) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service as such a member for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, as part of the contribution of a foreign Defence Force to the prescribed operation while on secondment or exchange with the foreign Defence Force;

- (iii) the qualifying period of service as described in subparagraphs (c)(i) or (c)(ii) may be deemed by the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate to have been established notwithstanding that the member has not met the qualifying periods described; and
- (iv) the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate in exercising his discretion to deem under subparagraph (c)(iii) shall take into account whether service in relation to the prescribed operation:

 - (C) was terminated due to foreign Government or foreign Defence Force reasons.

DETERMINATION UNDER SUBREGULATION 4(2)

- (a) revoke the Declaration and Determination made on 10 February 1995 under Regulation 3 and Subregulation 4(2) respectively of the Australian Service Medal Regulations set out in the Schedule to the Letters Patent dated 13 September 1988;
- (b) declare under Regulation 3 of those Regulations the United Nations Operation in Rwanda that commenced on 29 July 1994 to be a prescribed operation for the purpose of those Regulations; and
- (c) under Subregulation 4(2) of those Regulations, determine that the conditions for award of the Australian Service Medal with Clasp 'RWANDA' in respect of the prescribed operation are:
 - (i) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service while posted to or serving as a member of the Australian element of the prescribed operation for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days;
 - (ii) the Medal may be awarded to a member of the Australian Defence Force who rendered service as such a member for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, as part of the contribution of a foreign Defence Force to the prescribed operation while on secondment or exchange with the foreign Defence Force;

- (iii) the Medal may be awarded to civilian members of the Department of Defence, civilian contractors of the Department of Defence, civilian members of the Australian Customs Service, civilian members of the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service and accredited members of the Australian Red Cross, attached in an official capacity for full time duty to the Australian military deployment for a period of 30 days, or for periods amounting in the aggregate to 30 days, in the prescribed operational area;
- (iv) the qualifying period of service as described in subparagraphs (c)(i), (c)(ii) or (c)(iii) may be deemed by the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate to have been established notwithstanding that the member has not met the qualifying periods described; and
- (v) the Chief of the Defence Force or his delegate in exercising his discretion to deem under subparagraph (c)(iv) shall take into account whether service in relation to the prescribed operation:
 - (A) was terminated owing to the death, evacuation due to illness or injury or other disability due to service, of a member as described above;
 - (B) was terminated due to Government or Defence Force reasons; or
 - (C) was terminated due to foreign Government or foreign Defence Force reasons.
