



PR-137: Field test of pineapple plants modified for blackheart resistance

Organisation proposing release: Queensland Department of Primary Industries
GPO Box 46
Brisbane QLD 4001

Organism to be released: Pineapple (*Ananas comosus*)

Purpose of the release: The aim of the trial is to assess the commercial utility of pineapples genetically modified to control blackheart. Blackheart is a discolouration of the tissue of the pineapple fruit. In Australia, blackheart occurs in the field in winter-grown crops, causing heavy losses to industries due to downgrading of fruit quality, immature harvest of fruits and reduced winter production. The trial will involve testing of modified pineapple lines for agronomic performance, activity of gene control elements (promoters) and resistance to blackheart.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The modified pineapple lines contain additional copies of the pineapple polyphenol oxidase (PPO) gene. The addition of extra copies of the PPO gene is intended to reduce expression of the PPO enzyme, which is believed to be responsible for the tissue discolouration in blackheart.

The genetically modified pineapple lines also contain selectable marker genes which enable identification and selection of the modified plants in the laboratory.

The trial will also include a study of the activity of different promoters. Promoters are genetic 'switches' which, when coupled with a gene of interest, cause that gene to be expressed at high levels in particular tissues of a plant. The pineapple plants to be used in this study contain different promoters linked to marker genes.

Location and size of trial: Up to 735 plants on 0.12 hectares in south-east Queensland.

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PR-138: Evaluation of sub-clover stunt virus promoters under field conditions

Organism to be released: Cotton (*Gossypium hirsutum*)

Purpose of the release: The aim of the release is to trial cotton plants containing two new promoters isolated from a virus that infects subterranean clover plants. Promoters are genetic 'switches' which, when coupled to a gene of interest, cause that gene to be expressed at high levels in particular tissues of a plant.

Many of the genes, such as insect-resistance and herbicide-resistance genes, that have been used in field trials of genetically modified plants in the past have used a promoter from a virus that infects cauliflowers, the cauliflower mosaic virus. In glasshouse tests, the new promoters from sub-clover stunt virus seem to work as well as the cauliflower mosaic virus promoter. This trial aims to test the performance of the new promoters under field conditions.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: Most of the modified cotton plants to be trialled contain one of two promoters from the sub-clover stunt virus coupled to a marker gene. The marker gene encodes an enzyme, β -glucuronidase, from the bacterium *Escherichia coli* which enables the visual identification of plant tissues where the promoter is effecting the expression of this gene. The plants also contain another marker gene which confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

A small number of the modified cotton plants to be trialled will contain the same set of promoters driving the expression of an insecticidal gene (CryIA(b), derived

from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*) that is toxic to caterpillar pests of cotton. These plants contain a marker gene that confers tolerance to the herbicide Basta.

Location and size of trial: Approximately 6000 plants on an area of less than 0.1 hectares at the Australian Cotton Research Institute, Myall Vale, NSW.

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PR-139: Field evaluation of introgressed, genetically engineered barley

Purpose of the release: The aim of the trial is to assess the characteristics of barley that has been genetically modified for improved malting and brewing performance.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The modified barley plants contain additional copies of genes which encode two kinds of starch-degrading enzymes. The two enzymes are α -amylase and α -glucosidase. It is intended that this modification will increase production of the enzymes by the plants and hence improve the ability of the barley grain to degrade its own starch during malting and brewing. The inserted genes are derived from barley and function in the plant in the same way as native genes.

A selectable marker gene conferring resistance to an antibiotic was used in the initial stages development of the modified plants but has been removed from the lines to be trialled.

Location and size of trial: Up to 2940 plants in an area of 12 m x 14 m at Ginninderra Experiment Station, Hall, ACT.

Organism to be released: Cotton (*Gossypium hirsutum*)

Purpose of the release: The aim of the trial is agronomic evaluation and selection of new breeding lines of cotton which have been modified for tolerance to the herbicide glyphosate (Roundup®), as well as lines expressing the glyphosate-tolerance gene in combination with genes conferring resistance to insect attack. This includes multi-site yield and fibre trials and seed increase on new crossbred selections. It is expected that use of the herbicide-tolerant cotton will permit more effective control of weeds in cotton crops, while the insect-resistance trait has the potential to reduce the amount of insecticide applied to cotton crops.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The cotton plants have been modified to contain the 5-enolpyruvyl shikimate-3-phosphate synthase (EPSPS) gene from *Agrobacterium*. This gene confers tolerance to the herbicide glyphosate, the active ingredient of Roundup®. Some cotton lines will also contain a gene encoding CryIA(c), an insecticidal protein from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*, which confers tolerance to the major insect pests of cotton. In addition, some plants contain a combination of three genes: EPSPS, CryIA(c) and CryX. The CryX gene, derived from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*, also produces an insecticidal protein.

All the plants also contain a selectable marker gene that confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: A total of 712 hectares in the cotton-growing regions of New South Wales and Queensland.

PR-51X(5): Agronomic yield trials, progeny row selection and seed increase of Bt cotton plants, 2000-2001

Organisation proposing release: Deltapine Australia Pty Ltd

Organism to be released: Cotton (*Gossypium hirsutum*)

Purpose of the release: The aim of this extension is to continue the agronomic evaluation of lines of transgenic cotton modified for resistance to insect pests. In addition, seed increase of some lines of the plants will be undertaken. The use of insect-resistant cotton plants has the potential to reduce the use of chemical pesticides on cotton crops.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The plants contain the CryIA(c) and CryX genes from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*. These genes produce proteins that are toxic to certain insects, including the major caterpillar pests that attack cotton. The presence of more than one insecticidal gene in a single plant is part of a long-term strategy for management of insect resistance to the insecticidal proteins.

In addition to the insecticidal genes, the plants contain a selectable marker gene that confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

The trial will also continue the process of breeding new cultivars with the herbicide-tolerance trait. It is expected that use of glyphosate-tolerant cotton plants will allow more effective weed control in cotton crops by allowing the crop to be sprayed with Roundup® to kill problem weeds without damaging the crop itself.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The cotton plants have been modified to contain a 5-enolpyruvyl shikimate-3-phosphate synthase (EPSPS) gene derived from a soil bacterium. This gene confers tolerance to the herbicide glyphosate, the active ingredient of Roundup®. In addition, the plants contain a selectable marker gene that confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: Approximately 550 000 plants in an area under 5.5 hectares spread over 16 sites in the cotton-growing regions of New South Wales and Queensland.

Purpose of the release: The aim of this extension is to continue integrated weed management studies with cotton plants modified for resistance to the herbicide bromoxynil. It is expected that the use of bromoxynil-tolerant cotton plants will allow more effective weed control in cotton crops by allowing spraying of the crop with bromoxynil to kill broadleaf weeds without damaging the crop itself.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The herbicide resistance gene introduced into the transgenic plants is a nitrilase gene from a soil bacterium (*Klebsiella*) that normally degrades bromoxynil in soil. When over-expressed in the plant, this enzyme breaks down the herbicide before it can cause any damage to the plant. In addition, the plants contain a selectable marker gene that confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: Approximately 80 000 plants in an area under 0.8 hectares at the Australian Cotton Research Institute, Myall Vale, NSW.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The cotton plants have been modified to over-produce two plant enzymes that are normally involved in helping plants survive long periods of waterlogging. The two enzymes are alcohol dehydrogenase from cotton and pyruvate decarboxylase

from rice. The modified plants contain an extra copy of either or both of these genes.

For comparison, genetically modified cotton plants are also being trialled which contain the alcohol dehydrogenase gene in the opposite or antisense orientation. This results in plants that have lower levels of the alcohol dehydrogenase enzyme than normal.

In addition, all of the genetically modified plants contain a selectable marker gene conferring resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: Approximately 40 000 plants in an area under 0.5 hectares at the Australian Cotton Research Institute, Myall Vale, NSW.

These genes encode toxins which act against lepidopteran (caterpillar) larvae, including two *Helicoverpa* species which are major pests of cotton.

The plants also contain a marker gene, which confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: A maximum of 40 hectares at 12 sites in the cotton-growing regions of New South Wales and Queensland.

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PR-123X: Preliminary field evaluation of transgenic cotton expressing the CryIA(c) and CryX delta-endotoxins from *Bacillus thuringiensis*

'Stacking' of the two genes in a single plant is expected to enhance the control of the pests and minimise the potential for the insects to become resistant to the insecticidal proteins. The use of insect-resistant cotton plants has the potential to reduce the use of chemical pesticides on cotton crops.

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The transgenic plants contain either the CryIA(c) or the CryX gene from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*, or both genes. These genes produce insecticidal proteins that are toxic to the major caterpillar species that attack cotton.

Plants with the CryX gene also express a marker gene, β -glucuronidase (GUS), from the bacterium *Escherichia coli*. This gene enables visual identification of tissues containing the CryX gene. Plants with the CryIA(c) gene contain a selectable marker gene which confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

Location and size of trial: A total of approximately 15 hectares over eight sites, at the Australian Cotton Research Institute, Myall Vale; the Plant Breeding Institute, Narrabri; and private farms at Warren, Bourke, Moree, Breeza and Boggabilla (NSW), and Biloela (Queensland).

Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification: The plants contain one of two genes conferring tolerance to glufosinate ammonium. Both genes encode the enzyme phosphinothricin acetyltransferase, which acts to detoxify the active ingredient of Basta®. The two genes have been isolated from two different species of the soil bacterium *Streptomyces*.

Location and size of trial: Approximately 40 000 plants in an area under 0.4 hectares at the Australian Cotton Research Institute, Myall Vale, NSW.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS – MATTERS AT FULL ASSESSMENT. The Authority has made preliminary assessments, accepted the following applications for further consideration and will now make full assessments of them. You are invited to present written submissions to the Authority, including the potential regulatory impact on consumers, industry and government, by 5 July 2000:

- **Maximum Residue Limits (A409)** An application from the National Registration Authority to amend Australian Maximum Residue Limits (MRLs) for a number of agricultural chemicals as currently prescribed in the Australian *Food Standards Code*.
- **Pasteurisation of Orange Juice (A411)** An application from the South Australian Department of Human Services to require all orange juice, other than freshly squeezed orange juice for immediate consumption on the same premises, to either undergo a pasteurisation process that would kill pathogenic bacteria; or labelled to ensure consumers are informed of the risks associated with the consumption of unpasteurised orange juice.

MATTERS BEFORE COUNCIL The Authority has made recommendations to the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Council that the following variations be adopted into the *Food Standards Code*:

- **Folate Health Claims (P218)** A proposal to amend the *Food Standards Code* to list additional products in the table to subclause (e) of Standard A1(19) and the folate/NTD health claims register.
- **Review of Standard T1 (P220)** A proposal to vary Standard T1 *Transitional Arrangements for the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Setting System*, to allow for the effective implementation of draft Standard 1.3.1 *Food Additives*.

With respect to these matters the Authority is satisfied, pursuant to section 36 of the ANZFA Act, that they raise issues of minor significance and complexity and that to omit to invite public submissions prior to making recommendations to the Council would not have a significant adverse effect on the interests of any person or body.

- **Ethylene Oxide in Herbs and Spices (A412)** An application to establish a maximum residue limit (MRL) of 20 mg/kg for ethylene oxide (EtO) in herbs and spices.

With respect to this matter ANZFA has decided, pursuant to section 37 of the ANZFA Act, to progress this application as a matter of urgency in order to avoid compromising the objective set out in subsection 10(1)(a) of the Act, namely the protection of public health and safety.

1. varies the description of the Unconditioned Local Loop Service (which was declared by the Commission pursuant to subsection 152AL(3) of the Act on 4 August 1999) so that the service is described in the manner set out in Annexure 1; and
2. varies the description of the Local PSTN Originating Service (which was declared by the Commission pursuant to subsection 152AL(3) of the Act on 4 August 1999) so that the service is described in the manner set out in Annexure 2; and
3. varies the description of the Local PSTN Terminating Service (which was declared by the Commission pursuant to subsection 152AL(3) of the Act on 4 August 1999) so that the service is described in the manner set out in Annexure 3.

This variation takes effect on the day on which it is notified in the *Gazette*.

Annexure 1

Unconditioned Local Loop Service

The Unconditioned Local Loop Service is the use of unconditioned communications wire between the boundary of a telecommunications network at an end-user's premises and a point on a telecommunications network that is a potential point of interconnection located at or associated with a customer access module and located on the end-user side of the customer access module.

Definitions

Where words or phrases used in this declaration are defined in the *Trade Practices Act 1974* or the *Telecommunications Act 1997*, they have the meaning given in the relevant Act.

In this Annexure:

boundary of a telecommunications network is the point ascertained in accordance with section 22 of the *Telecommunications Act 1997*;

communications wire is a copper or aluminium based wire forming part of a public switched telephone network;

customer access module is a device that provides ring tone, ring current and battery feed to customers' equipment. Examples are Remote Subscriber Stages, Remote Subscriber Units, Integrated Remote Integrated Multiplexers, Non-integrated Remote Integrated Multiplexers and the customer line module of a Local Switch;

public switched telephone network is a telephone network accessible by the public providing switching and transmission facilities utilising analogue and digital technologies.

Note:

If a carrier or a carriage service provider supplies "declared services" (whether to itself or to other persons), the carrier or carriage service provider is taken to be an "access provider" and the declared services are taken to be "active declared services" (section 152AR(2) of the Act). The "standard access obligations" of access providers in relation to active declared services are set out in section 152AR of the Act.

All access provider must, if requested to do so by a service provider:

- a) supply an active declared service to the service provider in order that the service provider can provide carriage services and/or content services (section 152AR(3)(a) of the Act); and
- b) take all reasonable steps to ensure that the technical and operational quality of the active declared service supplied to the service provider is equivalent to that which the access provider provides to itself (section 152AR(3)(b) of the Act); and
- c) take all reasonable steps to ensure that the service provider receives, in relation to the active declared service supplied to the service provider, fault detection, handling and rectification of a

Local PSTN Originating Service

The Local PSTN Originating Service is a service for the carriage of telephone calls from customer equipment at an end-user's premises to a point of interconnection, or potential point of interconnection, located at or associated with a local switch and located on the outgoing trunk side of the switch.

Definitions

Where words or phrases used in this declaration are defined in the *Trade Practices Act 1974* or the *Telecommunications Act 1997*, they have the meaning given in the relevant Act.

In this Annexure:

CCS#7 signalling is signalling in accordance with the ACIF G500:2000 – I-ISUP Issue 2.0 specification for signalling between the networks of Australian carriers;

local switch is the switch with trunk side access that is closest to the end-user making the telephone call e.g. Local Access Switches in the Telstra Network;

public switched telephone network is a telephone network accessible by the public providing switching and transmission facilities utilising analogue and digital technologies;

telephone calls are calls for the carriage of voice (or data over the voice band) communications at 3.1kHz bandwidth by means of a public switched telephone network using CCS#7 signalling and include calls made with any of the following:

- a) access seeker specific codes;
- b) pre-selection in accordance with any instrument made by the Australian Communications Authority from time to time under Part 17 of the *Telecommunications Act 1997*;
- c) over-ride dial codes in accordance with any instrument made by the Australian Communications Authority from time to time under Part 17 of the *Telecommunications Act 1997*.

Note:

If a carrier or a carriage service provider supplies "declared services" (whether to itself or to other persons), the carrier or carriage service provider is taken to be an "access provider" and the declared services are taken to be "active declared services" (section 152AR(2) of the Act). The "standard access obligations" of access providers in relation to active declared services are set out in section 152AR of the Act.

An access provider must, if requested to do so by a service provider:

- a) supply an active declared service to the service provider in order that the service provider can provide carriage services and/or content services (section 152AR(3)(a) of the Act); and

Where words or phrases used in this declaration are defined in the *Trade Practices Act 1974* or the *Telecommunications Act 1997*, they have the meaning given in the relevant Act.

In this Annexure:

CCS#7 signalling is signalling in accordance with the ACIF G500:2000 – I-ISUP Issue 2.0 specification for signalling between the networks of Australian carriers;

local switch is the switch with trunk side access that is closest to the end-user to whom the telephone call is made e.g. Local Access Switches in the Telstra Network;

public switched telephone network is a telephone network accessible by the public providing switching and transmission facilities utilising analogue and digital technologies;

telephone calls are calls for the carriage of voice (or data over the voice band) communications at 3.1kHz bandwidth by means of a public switched telephone network using CCS#7 signalling.

CEO DIRECTIONS NO. 1 OF 2000

SUBSECTION 189A(2) OF THE *CUSTOMS ACT 1901*

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA

I, LIONEL BARRIE WOODWARD, under subsection 189A(2) of the *Customs Act 1901* give the following directions relating to the deployment of approved firearms and other approved items of personal defence equipment:

1. The commander of a Customs vessel may only issue approved firearms and approved items of personal defence equipment to officers of Customs ("officers") who hold a permit issued by an Australian Federal Police ("AFP") Defensive Skills Instructor in respect of that firearm or item (see note 1).
2. All approved firearms and approved items of personal defence equipment onboard a Customs vessel are the responsibility of the commander of the Customs vessel. The commander is responsible for their security and safety. No personal weapons are to be carried or stored on board Customs vessels.
3. When the commander of a Customs vessel issues an approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment to an officer:
 - (a) the officer must sign for the firearm or item; and
 - (b) the commander must record to which officer the firearm or item has been issued. This information shall be recorded on the form known as the Operational Safety Equipment Record of Issue and Return form (NMU 01).
4. Each firearm shall be recorded by its serial number and each item shall be recorded by its serial number if it has one.
5. If an approved firearm has been issued to an officer it must not:
 - (a) be left unattended; and
 - (b) must not leave the custody of the officer to which it was issued unless that officer transfers the firearm to another officer who holds a permit in respect of that firearm.
6. Approved firearms and approved items of personal defence equipment should be deployed and used in accordance with the "Australian Customs Service - National Policy on 'Use of Force'" (see note 2).
7. Before an approved firearm is recalled the officer who was issued the firearm or given the firearm after it was issued must:
 - (a) check the firearm for serviceability and cleanliness; and
 - (b) clean the firearm.



8. When the approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment is recalled the receiving officer must:

- (a) examine the firearm or item for serviceability;
- (b) complete a safety check of the firearm or item;
- (c) report any damage to the firearm or item; and
- (d) record the receipt of the firearm or item on the NMU 01 form.


9. Approved firearms and approved items of personal defence equipment shall be stored in the armoury or defensive equipment locker on board the Customs vessel. Any failures to store approved firearms or approved items of personal defence equipment in the armoury or defensive equipment locker must be reported to the commander of the Customs vessel.

10. Officers must report on a form known as a Customs Use of Force Report the following:

- (a) use of an approved firearm;
- (b) use of an extendable baton against a person;
- (c) use of oleoresin capsicum spray against another person;
- (d) use of a firearm, extendable baton or oleoresin capsicum spray on an animal.

These directions take effect on and from gazettal.

Note 1

AFP Defensive Skills Instructors conduct separate tests in the use of all approved firearms and approved items of personal defence equipment. All phases of the relevant test must be completed within a 30 day period. If an officer is unsuccessful within that time, recognition will not be given for the phases successfully completed - the full test for a particular approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment must be attempted again until all phases of the test are successfully completed within the 30 day period.

A permit will be deemed to have expired one year after it was issued.

The AFP Commissioner, AFP Deputy Commissioner, CEO of Customs and the National Marine Unit Superintendent may revoke a permit.

If an officer undertakes retesting for a particular approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment and they hold a permit in respect of that approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment that permit is deemed to have expired at the time that the officer undertakes the test.

A permit is automatically revoked if an officer is suspended from duty.

The AFP Defensive Skills Instructor may issue a permit in respect of an approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment to an officer if the officer has met the appropriate training and test criteria. The permit will display:

- (a) the classification of the relevant approved firearm or approved item of personal defence equipment;
- (b) the name of the officer
- (c) the date of issue
- (d) the signature of the appropriate AFP Defensive Skills Instructor; and
- (e) the expiry date.

Note 2

Australian Customs Service – National Policy on ‘Use of Force’

Customs conflict management strategies are based around a commitment to the ethic of minimum necessary force. In pursuit of this commitment, principles of negotiation and conflict de-escalation are emphasised, with physical force being used only when circumstances dictate its necessity, and then only to the minimum extent necessary to effect self defence, defence of others, arrest or apprehension. The use of lethal force is an option of last resort, only to be used when unavoidable in order to protect life.

Customs officers in the National Marine Unit (NMU) are provided with specific equipment, including firearms, for their personal protection, and for the protection of other people who may be faced with an immediate threat of violence. A consequence of law enforcement is the proposition that, from time to time, NMU officers may be required to exercise reasonable force in the discharge of their duty to enforce Commonwealth law. Reasonable force is defined as force which is necessary and proportionate to the threat or resistance offered. Reasonable force does not include excessive force such as:

- Any force when none is necessary;
- More force than is needed;
- Knowingly wrongful use(s) of force; or
- Well-intentioned mistakes that result in undesired use(s) of force.

The law does not afford any general immunity to NMU officers in relation to the use of force and NMU officers must comply with the high level of accountability expected by the Australian Customs Service and the communities we serve in protecting Australia's borders.

NMU operations, particularly those involving confrontation management, can be dynamic and unpredictable. Customs Operational Safety and General Instructions (OSGI's) provide NMU officers with a guide to response options and accompanying factors to be considered in conflict resolution. Particular emphasis is attached to the necessity for active and ongoing communication in resolving conflict, the continual re-assessment of situations as they evolve and the need for sensitivity with regard to the persons and issues involved.

The discretionary powers of NMU officers with regard to use of force are reinforced by relevant learning and development programs.

Negotiation is the primary and preferred means of confrontation management and wherever practicable, prior intelligence gathering and evaluation is conducted with a view to reducing the need for later 'use of force'.
