CUSTOMS ACT 1901 - PART XVB

ANTI-DUMPING MEASURES RELATING TO CERTAIN COATED PAPER EXPORTED TO AUSTRALIA FROM FINLAND AND AUSTRIA

The Australian Customs Service has completed its Section 269TAG inquiry into woodfree (≤10% mechanical pulp content) white papers coated both sides and sold in sheets. These sheets have a nominal weight from 90 to 150 grams per square metre (gsm) generally referred to as A1 and A2 grade coated paper (A1 grade has a coating weight of more than 20gsm per side and A2 has approximately 14 to 20 gsm per side). The inquiry re-examined whether anti-dumping measures should be imposed on exports of the goods by Sappi Gratkorn GmbH (Sappi Gratkorn) of Austria and whether the price undertaking applying to Metsa-Serla Oy (Metsa-Serla) (now Forest Alliance Ltd) of Finland was set at the appropriate level. The inquiry commenced on the 29 October 1999.

In respect of Sappi Gratkorn, Customs inquiry found that the volume of dumped exports from Austria, over a reasonable examination period, did not exceed 3 per cent of the total Australian imports. Customs also considered there was no imminent and foreseeable threat of substantially increased dumped exports of the goods from Austria. The minister accepted this recommendation and the inquiry in respect of Sappi Gratkorn was terminated.

In respect of Metsa-Serla, Customs found that the level of some of the variable factors included in the price undertaking had changed. Accordingly, Customs recommended in its report to the minister (Trade Measures Report No. 19) that the terms of a price undertaking offered by Metsa-Serla (and Forest Alliance Ltd), which reflected these changed variable factors, be accepted. The minister has accepted this recommendation which is formally notified below. The undertaking took affect on 7 September 2000.

Bona fide importers of the goods subject to the inquiry may obtain details of the revised measures from the Customs Dumping Liaison Officer in their respective capital city.

Explanatory Statement

Native Title Act 1993

Recognition under subsection 203AD(1)

No. 10:2000

This instrument is made under subsection 203AD(1) of the amended *Native Title Act 1993* (the Act).

The subsection provides that the Commonwealth Minister may, by written instrument, recognise, as the representative body for an area, an eligible body that has applied under section 203AB to be the representative body for the area.

The instrument provides that the representative body has satisfied the Minister that it will satisfactorily represent persons who hold or may hold native title in the area, that it will be able to consult effectively with Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islanders living in the area, that it satisfactorily performs its existing representative body functions and that it would be able to perform satisfactorily the functions of a representative body. Under subsection 203AD(2) the date specified in the instrument of recognition for its commencement must not precede the commencement of Division 3 of Part 11 of the amended *Native Title Act 1993*.

Under a proclamation made on 13 October 1999 Division 3 of Part 11 commences on 1 July 2000.



No. 11:2000

This instrument is made under subsection 203AD(1) of the amended Native Title Act 1993 (the Act).

The subsection provides that the Commonwealth Minister may, by written instrument, recognise, as the representative body for an area, an eligible body that has applied under section 203AB to be the representative body for the area.

The instrument provides that the representative body has satisfied the Minister that it will satisfactorily represent persons who hold or may hold native title in the area, that it will be able to consult effectively with Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islanders living in the area, that it satisfactorily performs its existing representative body functions and that it would be able to perform satisfactorily the functions of a representative body. Under subsection 203AD(2) the date specified in the instrument of recognition for its commencement must not precede the commencement of Division 3 of Part 11 of the amended Native Title Act 1993.

Under a proclamation made on 13 October 1999 Division 3 of Part 11 commences on 1 July 2000.





NOTICE is given that the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority ("APRA"), under subsection 11AF(4) of the Banking Act 1959 (the "Act"), has determined ten standards in relation to prudential matters to be complied with by Authorised Deposit-taking Institutions (ADIs) under subsection 11AF(1) of the Act.

A brief summary of the purpose and effect of each of these prudential standards follows:

- APS 110 Capital Adequacy outlines the overall framework adopted by APRA to assess the capital adequacy of locally incorporated ADIs.
- APS 111 Capital Adequacy: Measurement of Capital stipulates the qualifying criteria for various types of Tier 1 and Tier 2 capital elements for inclusion in an ADI's capital base for capital adequacy purposes.
- APS 112 Capital Adequacy: Credit Risk prescribes the manner in which on- and off-balance sheet credit exposures are risk weighted for capital adequacy purposes.
- APS 113 Capital Adequacy: Market Risk details the alternative approaches for ADIs to manage and measure the risks associated with potential movements in market prices. ADIs may adopt an internal model or use the standard method to calculate capital requirements to cover market risks in their trading book.
- APS 120 Funds Management and Securitisation lays down the prudential requirements for ADIs involved in funds management and securitisation activities to ensure that the risks arising from these activities are prudently managed.
- APS 210 Liquidity sets out alternative approaches for ADIs to monitor and control liquidity risk. The approaches involve either putting in place strategies to manage liquidity under different scenarios or maintaining prescribed minimum holdings of high quality liquid assets.
- APS 220 Credit Quality sets out the prudential requirements for monitoring credit risk (or asset quality) to ensure that ADIs adopt prudent practices with respect to the measurement and reporting of, and provisioning for, impaired assets.

- APS 221 Large Exposures retains the existing prudential requirements for ADI groups in their management of large credit exposures to individual counterparties or groups of related counterparties.
- APS 222 Equity Associations sets out the prudential requirements for ADIs in respect of their equity associations and dealings with subsidiaries or associates.
- APS 310 Audit and Related Arrangements for Prudential Reporting establishes the tripartite arrangements between APRA, an ADI and its external auditor.

The acronym "APS" (short for ADI prudential standard) is used to indicate that the prudential standards are in relation to ADIs, since APRA will shortly be making other prudential standards to be complied with by APRA regulated entities other than ADIs.

NOTICE is also given that APRA, under subsection 11AF(4) of the Act and paragraph 16(2)(a) of the Financial Sector Reform (Amendments and Transitional Provisions) Regulations 1999 (the "Regulations"), has varied the APRA transitional prudential standards under paragraph 16(1)(a) of the Regulations, to remove those parts that cover matters addressed by the prudential standards listed above.

The standards and the variation were made on 8 September 2000, and will commence to have effect on 1 October 2000.

CUSTOMS ACT 1901 - PART XVB

FINDINGS IN THE REVIEW OF ANTI-DUMPING MEASURES APPLYING TO CERTAIN COATED PAPER EXPORTED TO AUSTRALIA FROM JAPAN

Notice under s. 269ZDB(1) of the Customs Act 1901

The Australian Customs Service has completed its review of the level of measures applying to exports of woodfree (<10% mechanical pulp content) white papers, coated both sides and sold in sheets with a nominal weight from 75-150 grams per square metre (gsm) (coated paper) from Japan which commenced on 29 October 1999.

Customs investigation found that the level of the variable factors relevant to the taking of measures have changed. These variable factors are the export prices, normal values and non-injurous prices. Accordingly, Customs recommended in its report to the minister (Trade Measures Report No. 18) that the level of the variable factors should either decrease or not change. The minister accepted the recommendations.

Changes to the level of the measures took effect on 31 August 2000. The reascertained measures will not be published as publication may adversely affect the business or commercial interests of certain interested parties.

Bona fide importers of the goods subject to the review may obtain details of the revised measures from the Customs Dumping Liaison Officer in their respective capital city.
