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### OTHER ISSUES OF THE GAZETTE

**Australian Securities Commission** issues contain Notices under the Corporations Law and are published on the first Tuesday of each month and are sold at \$16.20 each or on subscription of \$71.50 (6 issues).

**Special issues** include notices which require urgent publication. All costs associated with producing Specials will be borne by the responsible department or authority. A limited number of Special Gazettes will be made available for sale from the Commonwealth Government Bookshop, Canberra, on the day of publication. General distribution of these notices will be by their inclusion in the next published issue of the Government Notices *Gazette* or Business *Gazette* as well as in the next published issue of the series of the Gazette in which the notice would normally have been published.

**Tariff concessions** issues contain notices of tariff concessions proposed, granted or revoked in accordance with the provisions of Part XVA of the *Customs Act 1901*. These issues are published each Wednesday and are sold at \$3.15 or on subscription only at \$62.00 for 25 issues including surface postage.

**Periodic issues** contain lengthy notices of a non-urgent nature, including the following: Australian Public Service conditions of entry and advancement; holders of import licences and tariff quotas; notification by Australian Securities Commission of intention to deregister defunct companies. Issues are made at

irregular intervals as required, at individual prices according to size. Advice of availability is given in the Government Notices and Business issues immediately following the day of publication. Periodic issues are not available on subscription, but standing orders are accepted for all selected issues.

**Index issues** contain references to entries in the Government Notices and the related Special and Periodic issues. Index issues are published quarterly, are available over the counter from Commonwealth Government Bookshops and are supplied without charge to annual subscribers to the Government Notices issues.

**Chemicals** issues of the *Gazette* provide information on the National Industrial Chemicals Notification and Assessment Scheme (NICNAS). These issues are published monthly and the cost is variable.

**National Registration Authority** issues of the *Gazette* contain details of the certificates for registration of chemical products issued by the National Registration Authority for Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals. These issues are published monthly and the cost is variable.

#### *National Transmission Network Sale Act 1998*

#### *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*

### Class exemption (No. 1 of 2000)

I, IAN GORDON CAMPBELL, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Communications, Information Technology and the Arts, under subsection 18(5) of the *National Transmission Network Sale Act 1998* (the Act) and subsection 46(2) of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*, exempt assets of a class specified in the Schedule from the operation of section 18 of the Act.

In this instrument:

***broadcasting service*** has the same meaning as in the *Broadcasting Services Act 1992*.

***broadcasting transmission tower*** has the same meaning as in Schedule 4 to the *Broadcasting Services Act 1992*.

***nominated customer*** has the same meaning as in the *National Transmission Network Sale Act 1998*.

***original asset*** has the same meaning as in the *National Transmission Network Sale Act 1998*.

***relevant local government authority***, for land in a State or Territory, means an authority of the State or Territory responsible for the local government of the area where the land is located.

***replacement asset*** has the same meaning as in the *National Transmission Network Sale Act 1998*.

***site*** has the same meaning as in Part 5 of Schedule 4 to the *Broadcasting Services Act 1992*.

*Class Exemption (No. 1 of 2000)*

**SCHEDULE**

Minor portions of land forming part of an original asset or a replacement asset (where that asset is a site of a broadcasting transmission tower) that are transferred to a relevant local government authority for the land for the purposes of that authority where the transfer does not jeopardise:

- (a) the provision of broadcasting services from the site; or
- (b) continued access to the site by:
  - (i) the owner or occupier of the site; or
  - (ii) a nominated customer.

*Note:* For this instrument, the purposes of a relevant local government authority include road widening and the creation of footpaths.

The ABA is required to renew these licences unless it decides that an applicant is no longer a suitable licensee. A company is a suitable licensee if the ABA does not decide that sub-section 41(2) (for commercial) or 83(2) (for community) of the Act applies to the company.

The ABA may decide that either section 41(2) or 83(2) of the Act applies to a licensee if it is satisfied that allowing the licensee to provide or continue to provide either a commercial or a community broadcasting service under a licence would lead to a significant risk of:

- (a) an offence against the Act or the regulations being committed; or
- (b) a breach of the conditions of the licence occurring.

In deciding whether these sub-sections apply, the ABA is required by sections 41(3) (commercial) and 83(3) (community) of the Act, to take into account:

- (a) the business record of the company; and
- (b) the company's record in situations requiring trust and candour; and
- (c) (commercial) the business record of each person who is, or would be, if a licence were allocated to the applicant, in a position to control the licence; or (community) the business record of the chief executive and each director and secretary of the applicant; and
- (d) the record in situations requiring trust and candour of each such person; and
- (e) whether the company, or a person referred to in paragraph (c) or (d), has been convicted of an offence against this Act or the regulations.

The Act does not require the ABA to hold an investigation or a hearing into whether a licence should be renewed.


#### DECLARATION OF CONTROLLED SPECIMENS

I, ROBERT MURRAY HILL, Minister for the Environment and Heritage, having considered comments as required by subsection 9B(3) of the *Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982* (the Act) and having taken into account advice from the Designated Authority on those matters specified in Regulation 5A(1) for the purposes of subsection 10A(5) of the Act, hereby declare products derived from *Crocodylus porosus* and *C. novaeguineae* taken in Papua New Guinea to be 'controlled specimens' for the purposes of subsection 10A(3) of the Act, subject to the following conditions:

1. specimens are to be taken in Papua New Guinea only in accordance with the provisions of the Papua New Guinea *Crocodile Trade (Protection) Act Ch. 213*;
2. operations will be carried out in accordance with the document entitled "Papua New Guinea Crocodile Management Plan - 2000-2004" produced by the Papua New Guinea Office of Environment and Conservation.

This declaration has effect from 1 October 2000 until 31 December 2004.

*Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982*

DECLARATION OF CONTROLLED SPECIMENS

I, ROBERT MURRAY HILL, Minister for the Environment and Heritage, having considered comments as required by subsection 9B (3) of the *Wildlife Protection (Regulation of Exports and Imports) Act 1982* (the Act) and having taken into account advice from the Designated Authority on those matters specified in Regulation 5A(1) for the purposes of subsection 10A (5) of the Act, hereby declare Cycads (Cycadaceae) harvested from Northern Territory Crown and private land in accordance with the management arrangements outlined in the document entitled 'A trial Management Program for Cycads in the Northern Territory of Australia', submitted by the Parks and Wildlife Commission of the Northern Territory, to be "controlled specimens" for the purposes of subsection 10A (2) of the Act, subject to the following conditions:

1. The export of *Macrozamia macdonnellii* (including seeds) is prohibited.
2. The harvest of seeds of *Macrozamia macdonnellii* is limited to 25% of seeds of any one plant of 25% of adult plants of any one population, at no more than 34% of populations (excluding reserved populations), in any 12 month period. A conservation benefit to the species, as agreed by the Designated Authority, must be demonstrated prior to any harvesting occurring of this species.
3. There is to be no harvest of whole plants of *Cycas brunnea* or *Cycas maconochiei viridis*.
4. Foliage harvesting and seed harvesting of *Cycas brunnea* or *Cycas maconochiei viridis* is limited to 25% of seeds and foliage of any one plant of 25% of adult plants of any one population, at no more than 34% of populations (excluding reserved populations), in any 12 month period. Foliage harvesting is not permitted from plants containing seeds. A conservation benefit to the species, as agreed by the Designated Authority, must be demonstrated prior to any harvesting occurring of these species.
5. Whole plant harvesting of other species is limited to salvage harvesting, except for *Cycas angulata*, *C. armstrongii*, *C. arnhemica*, *C. orientis* and *C. calciola*. Salvage harvesting is defined as harvesting in conjunction with, or immediately prior to, road or firebreak construction, where that construction is approved by the Northern Territory government.
6. An experimental non-salvage harvest of *Cycas angulata*, *C. armstrongii*, *C. arnhemica*, *C. orientis* and *C. calciola* is limited to 500 plants of each species within the life of this approval.
7. An annual report is to be provided by the Parks and Wildlife Commission of the Northern Territory by 31 July each year, and is to include:
  - details of licenses issued to harvest (ie number, areas, quantities);
  - harvest records by area and taxa;
  - enforcement activities, including breaches of permit conditions, cancelled permits, prosecutions etc.

9. A report is to be provided two months prior to the end of this declaration by the Parks and Wildlife Commission of the Northern Territory which outlines:
- results and progress with field/monitoring/surveys;
  - any changes in population status/dynamics;
  - new ecological and biological information relating to relevant Cycads;
  - results of the experimental harvest;
  - any artificial propagation occurring of the species;
  - a report on the level and extent of illegal harvesting of Cycads and cycad products occurring in the Northern Territory.

10. This declaration is valid until 31 December 2002.

2. The maximum number of *Dicksonia antarctica* and *Cyathea australis* plants which may be harvested is limited to the number specified on the permits issued by the Victorian Department of Natural Resources and Environment.
2. A report on the total number of plants harvested (detailing both domestic and export quantities) must be provided annually to the Designated Authority.
3. For *Dicksonia antarctica* and *Cyathea australis* the tag numbers on each stem/plant proposed for export are to be specified in the applications for permits to export.
4. This declaration is valid until 30 June 2001, or until superseded by the declaration of a Statewide Management Program relating to these species, whichever is the earlier.



#### **PR-105X(2): Field evaluation of a transgenic line of field pea (*Pisum sativum* L.) with resistance to pea weevil (*Bruchus pisorum*)**

**Organisation proposing release:** CSIRO Plant Industry

**Organism to be released:** Field pea (*Pisum sativum* L.)

**Purpose of the extension to the release:** The peas have been genetically modified with the aim of conferring resistance to pea weevil attack. Pea weevil is a major insect pest of peas that is responsible for great losses in pea production in Australia. The aim of this extension is to produce commercial quantities of seed for further evaluation prior to general release.

**Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification:** The peas contain a gene that confers resistance to attack by the pea weevil (*Bruchus pisorum*). The gene codes for a protein (an  $\alpha$ -amylase inhibitor) found in the seeds of the common bean (*Phaseolus vulgaris*). In addition, the peas also contain a selectable marker gene that confers resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin.

**Location and size of trial:** Approximately 10 million seeds will be sown on 10 hectares in December 2000 in the Naracoorte/Lucindale Shire of South Australia; and 500 million plants will be sown on 100 hectares in the winter of 2001, on a site to be determined.

**PR-131X(2): Agronomic assessments and seed increase in northern Australia of transgenic cotton expressing the CryIA(c) or CryIA(c) and Cry2A(b) genes from *Bacillus thuringiensis***

**Organisation proposing release:** CSIRO Plant Industry

**Organism to be released:** Cotton (*Gossypium hirsutum*)

**Purpose of extension to the release:** The aim of this extension is to evaluate insect-resistant cotton lines and produce commercial quantities of seed for further evaluation prior to general release. The use of insect-resistant cotton has the potential to reduce the use of chemical pesticides on cotton crops.

**Brief description of the nature and effect of the genetic modification:** The genes introduced into the cotton plants are the CryIA(c) and/or Cry2A(b) (previously called CryX) genes from the bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis*. The Cry genes produce proteins that are toxic to certain insects, including the major caterpillar pests that attack cotton. INGARD<sup>®</sup> cotton, which has been released commercially, contains only a single insecticidal gene, CryIA(c). The presence of more than one insecticidal gene in a single plant may give better insect control and reduce the potential for the insect pests to become resistant to the toxins. Some of the plants also contain the 5-enolpyruvylshikimate-3-phosphate synthase (EPSPS) gene from the soil bacterium *Agrobacterium*. The EPSPS gene produces a protein which confers tolerance to the herbicide glyphosate, the active ingredient of Roundup<sup>®</sup>. RoundupReady<sup>®</sup> cotton has been released commercially.

The plants also contain a selectable marker gene conferring resistance to the antibiotics kanamycin and neomycin. Plants with the Cry2A(b) gene also contain a marker gene coding for the enzyme  $\beta$ -glucuronidase which enables visual identification of plant tissues in which this gene is being expressed.

**Location and size of trial:** A maximum of 56 hectares (approximately 5,600,000 modified cotton plants) at Kununurra (WA) and Katherine, Darwin, Douglas-Daly, Adelaide River, Larrimah and Mataranka (NT).

**5 Pathologist-determinable services**

For paragraph 4BA (b) of the Act, the following classes of pathology services are pathologist-determinable services for the purposes of the Act:

- (a) a pathology service that:
  - (i) is specified in an item in the pathology services table; and
  - (ii) is rendered by, or on behalf of, an APP for a person who is the patient of the APP;
- (b) a pathology service that:
  - (i) is specified in an item in the pathology services table that is mentioned in column 1 of the following table; and
  - (ii) is rendered for a person by, or on behalf of, an APP; and
  - (iii) is a service that the APP considers necessary as a consequence of the information resulting from a pathology service that:
    - (A) was rendered for that person under a request made or confirmed in accordance with subsection 16A (4) of the Act; and
    - (B) is a service specified in an item in the pathology services table that is mentioned in column 2 of the following table in relation to the items mentioned in column 1 of that table.

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT****HEALTH INSURANCE ACT 1973  
SECTION 4BA****HEALTH INSURANCE (PATHOLOGIST-DETERMINABLE SERVICES) DETERMINATION 2000**

Section 4BA of the *Health Insurance Act 1973* (the Act) provides for the Minister to determine that a particular pathology service, or pathology services included in a class of pathology services, be considered as pathologist-determinable services. The Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia have been consulted on this process, which is also specified under Section 4BA of the Act.

Section 16A of the Act provides for the payment of Medicare benefits in relation to pathology services with subsection 16A(6) providing the authority for Medicare benefit payment to pathologist-determinable services. Section 16A of the Act also specifies that certain requirements have to be met for a benefit to be payable for a pathology service listed in the Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS). In particular, subsection 16A(3) provides that a Medicare benefit is not payable in respect of a pathology service, except for a pathologist-determinable service, unless the service was rendered pursuant to a request.

The purpose of the pathologist-determinable services determination is to obviate the need for a request and allow for the payment of Medicare benefits to cover specific circumstances where:

- services are requested and performed by an Approved Pathology Practitioner (APP) such as a specialist pathologist, for their own patients; and
- services which an APP has deemed necessary to perform in the interest of the patient, in light of results obtained from earlier tests performed in response to a request from the requesting practitioner.

An example of the former is a haematologist or immunologist performing pathology services on their own patients. An example of the latter is the receipt of a request by a histopathologist for the examination of a biopsy specimen from an operation and following examination, determine that further tests are necessary to complete the diagnosis. The histopathologist would be able to undertake further testing without the need to seek another request from the treating practitioner.

The current pathologist-determinable services determination, approved by the then Minister for Health on 21 July 1987, now only covers services requested and performed by an APP such as a specialist pathologist, for their own patients. The second type of pathologist-determinable service is no longer covered as the determination refers to a series of 4 digit Medicare pathology service items, which were current in 1987, but which lapsed and were not renewed at the time of introduction of the 5 digit Medicare pathology service items.

Pathologists have identified a need to reinstate pathologist-determinable services for tissue pathology and cytology. Designating certain tissue pathology and cytology items as pathologist-determinable services to allow them to determine whether further testing is necessary, without the need for an additional request from the treating medical practitioner.

The designated pathologist-determinable services are Medicare items 72846 and 72847 (immunohistochemical examination) and Medicare items 73059 and 73060 (immunocytochemical examination). These could be performed following a request for tissue examination (Medicare items 72813 to 72836) or cytology (Medicare items 73045 to 73051).

The commencement date for the new determination is 1 November 2000.

**HEALTH INSURANCE (PRESCRIBED PATHOLOGY SERVICES) DETERMINATION 2000**

Section 4BB of the *Health Insurance Act 1973* (the Act) provides for the Minister to determine that a pathology service, or pathology services included in a class of pathology services, be considered as prescribed pathology services. Section 16A of the Act provides for the payment of Medicare benefits in relation to pathology services with subsection 16A(7) providing the authority for Medicare benefit payment to prescribed pathology services.

The purpose of the prescribed pathology services determination is to provide for simple basic pathology services which may be performed by:

- a medical practitioner in their own surgery on their own patients; or
- a medical practitioner on behalf of another medical practitioner, both of whom are members of a group of practitioners, on the requesting practitioner's patients.

These services are exempted from the usual Medicare requirements of Section 16A of the Act, for instance, the need for the medical practitioner to have Approved Pathology Practitioner status and for their surgeries to be accredited as pathology laboratories.

There are currently eleven services in this category under Group P9 of the Pathology Services Table (PST) of the Medicare Benefits Schedule.

The current prescribed pathology services determination, approved by the then Minister for Health on 21 July 1987, refers to a list of prescribed services in 'Division 9' of the PST. A new determination is required to replace the term 'Division 9' with 'Group P9'.

The commencement date for the new determination is 1 November 2000.



**SPECIFICATION OF SKILLED OCCUPATIONS AND RELEVANT ASSESSING  
AUTHORITIES FOR THE PURPOSES OF REGULATIONS 1.03 AND 2.26B**

I, *PHILIP RUDDOCK*, Minister for Immigration and Multicultural Affairs, acting under regulations 1.17, 1.03 and 2.26B of the Migration Regulations 1994 ("the Regulations"), hereby:

- (1) REVOKE the gazette notice specifying the skilled occupations and relevant assessing authorities for the purposes of regulations 1.03 and 2.26B signed on 17 May 2000;
- (2) SPECIFY each occupation referred to in the Schedule as a skilled occupation for the purposes of the definition of "skilled occupation" in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations; and
- (3) SPECIFY each person or body referred to in the same Schedule as the relevant assessing authority for a skilled occupation for the purposes of regulations 1.03 and 2.26B of the Regulations.

This notice comes into effect on and from 1 November 2000.

NOTE: (5) An occupation classification listed in ASCO (second edition) not referred to in the Schedule is not to be regarded as a skilled occupation for the purposes of regulation 1.03 of the Regulations.]

economy, including issues relating to technology and industry convergence;


- (v) assistance to public and private sector bodies to deliver services online;

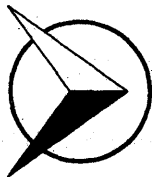

## **SCHEDULE**

### **REGIONAL EQUALISATION PLAN**

#### **Introduction**

Subclause 64(1) of Schedule 4 to the *Broadcasting Services Act 1992* (the Act) requires the Minister to formulate a written Regional Equalisation Plan which specifies the measures proposed to be taken by the Minister or the Commonwealth Government:

- (a) to facilitate the provision of commercial television broadcasting services transmitted in digital mode in regional licence areas; and
- (b) to facilitate the provision of datacasting services transmitted in digital mode in regional licence areas by the holders of commercial television broadcasting licences.

In formulating or varying the regional equalisation plan, the Minister under subclause 64(2) of the Act, must have regard to the following objectives:

- (a) the objective of maximising the diversity of choice in television services provided in regional licence areas;
- (b) the objective of bringing to regional licence areas a similar range of entertainment and information services as are available in metropolitan licence areas;
- (c) the objective of maintaining the financial viability of the commercial television broadcasting industry in regional licence areas;
- (d) the objective of providing commercial television broadcasting services in regional licence areas that are relevant to, and responsive to, local needs in those areas;
- (e) the objective of discouraging the concentration of media ownership in regional licence areas.

Under subclause 6(3)(b) of Schedule 4 to the Act, holders of commercial television broadcasting licences in regional licence areas ("broadcasters") are required to commence transmitting in digital mode during the period commencing 1 January 2001 and ending immediately before 1 January 2004.

In considering measures to be taken by the Commonwealth under the Plan, the Minister considered legislative and regulatory measures, direct funding, and measures resulting in reductions to revenues returned to the Commonwealth.

The Plan was developed at the same time as a broad range of proposed amendments to the Act relating to the digital conversion of existing commercial television broadcasters and the introduction of new datacasting services. A number of these provisions were agreed to by the Parliament in June 2000, and are intended to encourage existing broadcasters to provide additional commercial television services

in those regional markets with fewer than the three commercial television services available in most metropolitan markets. These measures include:

**Solus** - Broadcasters in each solus market have already applied to the Australian Broadcasting Authority (ABA) for a licence to operate a second commercial analog television service, under s.38A of the Act. The solus licensees will be permitted to multichannel the digital transmission of their two analog services, thus minimising conversion costs. These services will also be exempt from HDTV requirements, subject to review by 2005.

**Two-service markets** - The provision of a third digital-only commercial television service by either one of the existing licensees, or in a joint venture by both licensees. If only one of the licensees provides the new service, it can elect to do so by multichannelling, with exemption from HDTV requirements, subject to review by 2005.

### **Independent analysis**

In its 1998 election policy statement *Communications: Making Australia Stronger*, the Government undertook to finalise details of assistance to regional commercial broadcasters after an independent analysis of the transition costs to digital broadcasting.

The independent analysis of the costs to regional commercial broadcasters of introducing digital broadcasting and datacasting services was completed in 1999. Regional commercial television broadcasters were consulted extensively during this process. The independent analysis estimated the total costs (capital and operating) of conversion for regional and remote broadcasters at \$519 million - this included \$331.8 million, \$103.9 million, and \$17.6 million for the aggregated, two service and solus markets respectively.

### **Financial assistance package**

Having regard to the analysis, and the objectives defined in the Act for the Regional Equalisation Plan, the Commonwealth Government determined that a package of financial assistance would be the most appropriate means of facilitating services required in legislation.

The Government announced in the 2000-01 Budget that up to \$260 million will be provided over 13 years to assist regional and remote broadcasters with the introduction of digital broadcasting and datacasting services. This represents 50 per cent of the overall cost of digital conversion.

Assistance will be available from 2000-01, with individual broadcasters able to access assistance in the fiscal year in which the broadcaster commences digital transmissions. The assistance will be provided in the form of a capped annual rebate against licence fees payable. If annual licence fees in any year are below the rebate cap, then that unused rebate may be carried forward and claimed in future years. In several of the solus markets where a licence fee rebate arrangement alone would

necessitate assistance being provided for a period longer than 13 years, licence fee rebates are to be supplemented by a grants program.

Regulations will be made under the *Television Licence Fees Act 1964* to allow for the rebate of licence fees. The licence fee rebate arrangements are to be administered by the ABA.

Arrangements for individual broadcasters in remote markets will be finalised once the ABA has completed a digital conversion scheme for remote licence areas. The level of assistance to be provided to remote broadcasters is estimated at more than \$30 million.

The financial assistance provided under the Regional Equalisation Plan will assist commercial television broadcasters in all parts of regional Australia. The commencement of digital television services in these areas will improve viewing quality and provide the option of interactive television. It will ensure that a similar range of entertainment and information services are available as in metropolitan licence areas, and help maximise diversity of choice. It will also contribute to the continued viability and independence of the regional commercial television sector which faces relatively higher digital conversion costs than the major metropolitan stations.
