- (a) the WDT01 Log must be used to record information about the taking of the fish; and
- (b) the SEF2B Catch Disposal Record must be used to record information about the sale or disposal of fish; and
- (c) where the fish is taken by more than one vehicle from the boat to the first person who receives them after they have landed - the SEF3B Transit Form must be used to record information about the carrying of the fish.

**4.2** When fish are taken using any method of trawling in the Norfolk Island Offshore Demersal Finfish Fishery:

- (a) the WDT01 Log must be used to record information about the taking of the fish; and
- (b) the SEF2B Catch Disposal Record must be used to record information about the sale or disposal of fish; and

- (c) where the fish is taken by more than one vehicle from the boat to the first person who receives them after they have landed - the SEF3B Transit Form must be used to record information about the carrying of the fish.

4.3 When fish are taken using any demersal line method in the Norfolk Island Offshore Demersal Finfish Fishery:

- (a) the GNO1A Log must be used to record information about the taking of the fish; and
- (b) from the commencement of this determination to the end of 30 June 2001, either the SAN2A Catch Disposal Record or the SAN2B Catch Disposal Record must be used to record information about the sale or disposal of the fish; and
- (c) from 1 July 2001 the SAN2B Catch Disposal Record must be used to record information about the sale or disposal of the fish; and
- (d) where the fish is taken by more than one vehicle from the boat to the first person who receives them after they have landed - the SAN3A Transit Form must be used to record information about the carrying of the fish.

[Note: The SAN2B Catch Disposal Record replaces the SAN2A Catch Disposal Record. The period from the commencement of this determination to 30 June 2001 is a changeover period during which either versions of the logbook may be used.]

4.4 When fish are taken by a boat using any method of trawling in the Western Deepwater Trawl Fishery the WDT01 Log must be used to record information about the taking of the fish.

**When must the logbook be used?**

5.1 Subregulations 33(1), 33(2) and 33(3) of the Fisheries Management Regulations apply in respect of the following logs during the period beginning on the commencement of this determination and ending at the end of 31 December 2003:

- (a) the GNO1A Log; and
- (b) the SAN2B Catch Disposal Record; and
- (c) the SAN3A Transit Form; and
- (d) the SEF2B Catch Disposal Record; and
- (e) the SEF3B Transit Form; and
- (f) the WDT01 Log.

5.2 Subregulations 33(1), 33(2) and 33(3) of the Fisheries Management Regulations apply in respect of the SAN2A Catch Disposal Record during the period beginning on the commencement of this determination and ending at the end of 30 June 2001.

- (c) from 1 July 2001 the SAN2B Catch Disposal Record must be used to record information about the sale or disposal of the fish; and
- (d) if more than one vehicle is used to carry the fish from the boat to the first receiver, the SAN3A Transit Form or the SAN3B Transit Form must be used to record information about the transportation of the fish; and

[Note: The SAN2B Catch Disposal Record replaces the SAN2A Catch Disposal Record. The period from the commencement of this determination to 30 June 2001 is a changeover period during which either versions of the logbook may be used.]

**When must the logbooks be used?**

5. Subregulations 33(1), 33(2) and 33(3) of the Fisheries Management Regulations apply in respect of:

- (a) the SAN2A Catch Disposal Record during the period beginning at the commencement of this determination and ending at the end of 30 June 2001; and

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**Section 1**

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**1 Name of Delegation**

This Delegation is the *Lands Acquisition Delegation 2001*.

**2 Commencement**

This Delegation commences on gazettal.

**3 Revocation**

The instruments of delegation of the Minister's powers and functions, made under section 139 of the Act on 29 April 1999 and 4 May 1999, are revoked.

**4 Definitions**

In this Delegation:

*Act* means the *Lands Acquisition Act 1989*.

*Agency* has the meaning given by section 7 of the *Public Service Act 1999*.

*Note* Section 7 of the *Public Service Act 1999* defines *Agency* as being a Department, Executive Agency or Statutory Agency. *Department*, *Executive Agency* and *Statutory Agency* are also defined in section 7 of that Act.

*Austrade position* means any of the following positions in the Australian Trade Commission:

- (a) Executive General Manager;
- (b) General Manager, Corporate Finance and Assets;
- (c) Group Manager, Corporate Budgets and Assets;
- (d) General Manager, Corporate Affairs.

*Category A position* means any of the following positions in the Department:

- (a) Secretary of the Department, position number 99999;
- (b) Senior Executive Band 3, Property Group, position number 00002;
- (c) Senior Executive Band 2, Property Group, position number 00006;
- (d) Senior Executive Band 1, Property Group, position number 01889;
- (e) Senior Executive Band 1, Property Group, position number 01901;
- (f) Senior Executive Band 1, Property Group, position number 70073;
- (g) Group Manager, Financial Framework Group, position number 70051;
- (h) Branch Manager, Competitive Tendering and Grants Branch, Financial Framework Group, position number 00205;
- (i) Branch Manager, Legislative Review Branch, Financial Framework Group, position number 00252.

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**Section 6**

**Category B position** means any of the following positions in the Department:

- (a) Finance and Administration Executive Level 2, Financial Framework Group, position number 00239 or 17863;
- (b) Finance and Administration Executive Level 2, Property Group, position number 01142, 01826, 01854, 01893, 71323, 72327 or 10856.

**Department** means the Department of Finance and Administration.

**5 Delegation**

- (1) The power or function of the Minister under a provision of the Act mentioned in Schedule 1 is delegated to the person for the time being holding, occupying, or performing the duties of, the positions specified.
- (2) A delegate may exercise the power or function mentioned in item 20 of Schedule 1 only if:
  - (a) the delegate has discussed the proposed amount of the final offer with the claimant; and
  - (b) the claimant has indicated in writing that he or she will accept the amount offered.

**6 Acquisition and disposal of land — delegation (Act s 40, s 119)**

The following powers of the Minister are delegated to the person for the time being holding, occupying, or performing the duties of, a position mentioned, or identified by a position number, in Schedule 2:

- (a) the power of the Minister under subsection 40 (1) of the Act to authorise the acquisition by agreement of a leasehold interest in land, other than land in a public park, if the interest to be acquired is available in the market; within the meaning of subsection 40 (5) of the Act;
- (b) the power of the Minister under subsection 40 (1) of the Act to authorise the acquisition by agreement of an interest in land, other than land in a public park, if the interest to be acquired:
  - (i) is available in the market, within the meaning of subsection 40 (5) of the Act; and
  - (ii) is for residential accommodation for persons engaged or employed to perform services in an Agency;
- (c) the power of the Minister under subsection 119 (1) of the Act:
  - (i) to authorise the disposal of an interest in land by sub-letting, assigning or terminating a lease, or an interest in a lease, on the land; and
  - (ii) to authorise the disposal of an interest in land acquired or used for residential accommodation for persons engaged or employed to perform services in an Agency.

**Section 7**

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**7 Interests in overseas land — delegation (Act s 125)**

- (1) The power of the Minister under subsection 125 (3) of the Act to authorise, in writing, the acquisition or disposal of an interest in overseas land by an acquiring authority is delegated to the person for the time being holding, occupying, or performing the duties of, any of the following positions:
  - (a) a Category A position;
  - (b) an Austrade position.
- (2) The power of the Minister under subsection 125 (3) of the Act to authorise, in writing, the acquisition or disposal of a leasehold interest in overseas land for residential accommodation is delegated to the person for the time being holding, occupying, or performing the duties of, a position mentioned in Schedule 3.
- (3) The power of the Minister under subsection 125 (3) of the Act to authorise, in writing, the acquisition or disposal of a leasehold interest in overseas land for office accommodation is delegated to the person for the time being holding, occupying, or performing the duties of, a position mentioned, or identified by a position number, in Schedule 4.

**8 Exercising power to acquire or dispose of land**

- (1) This section applies to a person who:
  - (a) has been delegated the Minister's power under section 40, 119 or 125 of the Act to acquire or dispose of land or an interest in land; and
  - (b) exercises that power to acquire or dispose of land or an interest in land.
- (2) The person must give a written statement about the acquisition or disposal of the land, or the interest in the land, to the appropriate person in the Department who is responsible for matters related to the Act not later than 14 days after the person acquires or disposes of the land or the interest.

**9 Restriction on delegations**

Nothing in this Delegation allows the Minister to delegate any of his or her powers or functions under the Act to a person who:

- (a) has not been appointed or engaged under the *Public Service Act 1999*; and
- (b) does not have executive authority in relation to the affairs of the Commonwealth authority in which the person's delegation may be exercised.

**Qualifications for a witness.** The following categories of people may witness a postal vote application for an election:

- An elector on the Commonwealth of Australia electoral roll;
- If the voter is voting overseas -
  - An Australian citizen or elector;
  - An officer of the armed forces or a Justice of the Peace of Australia or another Commonwealth country;
  - A public servant of Australia (Federal or Territory) or another Commonwealth country; or

- your employment responsibilities will prevent you attending a polling booth.

**Applying for a Postal Vote.** An application for a postal vote must be made in writing and may be made to any Divisional Returning Officer (DRO) after the announcement of, or issue of the writ for, an election. Applications need to reach the DRO in time for voting material to be sent to you to complete and post back before the close of voting. Applications must be received by the Thursday prior to polling day. Late applications will not be processed.

More Postal Vote Applications and Reply Paid envelopes for posting the applications are available at any Post Office in the by-election Division. 

## **MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING**

### **(On Transmission of Advance Passenger Information)**

#### **A. OBJECTIVE OF THIS MEMORANDUM**

The objective of this Memorandum is to agree on the transmission of Advance Passenger Information (API) on travellers at the time they join aircraft in Australia for travel to Malaysia. Benefits to passengers will include expedited immigration clearance including the use of express lanes. Border control agencies benefit by being able to engage in higher and faster levels of screening and clearances.

#### **B. THE UNDERSTANDING**

DIMA agrees to provide the Department of Immigration Malaysia the following information in respect of individual passenger travelling to Malaysia:

- (a) name;
- (b) date of birth;
- (c) citizenship;
- (d) passport number;
- (e) date of departure from Malaysia and Australia;
- (f) flight number;

- (g) place of intended disembarkation;
- (h) ultimate destination.

### **TERMS OF IMPLEMENTATION**

Formal transmission of Advance Passenger Information will commence from signature of this Memorandum and following Ministerial approval and publication of arrangements in Australia's *Commonwealth Gazette* as required by Australia's Migration Regulation 3.10.

### **PERIOD OF UNDERSTANDING**

The understanding contained in this document will be operative from when it is signed by both participants until 30 June 2001 or until such other date as agreed in writing by the participants.

### **USE AND SAFEGUARD OF INFORMATION**

Advance passenger information transmitted by DIMA is only for entry facilitation purposes for use by border control agencies, and will not be used or disclosed for any other purposes:


