Finding in relation to a review of anti-dumping measures

Public notice under s. 269ZDB(1) of the *Customs Act 1901*

The Australian Customs Service has completed its review of anti-dumping measures applying to exports of certain polyvinyl chloride homopolymer resin (PVC) from Hungary, Israel, and the Republic of Korea (referred to in this notice as “the goods”), which was commenced on 12 April 2005. Recommendations resulting from that review, reasons for the recommendations and material findings of fact and law in relation to the review are contained in Trade Measures Report No. 100 (referred to in this notice as “the Report”).

A concurrent review of the anti-dumping measures applying to PVC exported from Japan, Thailand and the United States of America was also conducted. Recommendations resulting from this review, reasons for the recommendations and material findings of fact and law in relation to the review are also contained in the Report.

I, CHRISTOPHER MARTIN ELLISON, Minister for Justice and Customs, have considered the Report and accepted the recommendations and reasons for the recommendations, including all material findings of fact or law set out in the Report.

Under s.269ZDB(1) of the *Customs Act 1901*, I DECLARE, for the purposes of the *Customs Act 1901* and the *Customs Tariff (Anti-Dumping) Act 1975*, to the extent that the anti-dumping measures concerned involved the publication of a dumping duty notice, that:

with effect from the date of publication of this notice, the dumping duty notice is to be taken to have effect, in relation to exporters of the goods from Hungary, Israel and the Republic of Korea, as if different variable factors had been fixed in respect of those exporters, relevant to the determination of duty.

To preserve confidentiality, the revised variable factors will not be published. Bona fide importers of the goods can obtain details of the new rates from the Regional Dumping Officer in their respective capital city. Other enquiries

regarding these changes may be directed to Operations 4, Trade Measures Branch, Australian Customs Service.

ACMA is required to renew these licences unless it decides that an applicant is no longer a suitable licensee. A company is a suitable licensee if ACMA does not decide that sub-section 41(2) (for commercial) or sub-section 83(2) (for community) of the Act applies to the company. ACMA may decide that either sub-section 41(2) or 83(2) of the Act applies to a licensee if it is satisfied that allowing the licensee to provide or continue to provide either a commercial or a community broadcasting service under a licence would lead to a significant risk of: (a) an offence against the Act or the regulations being committed; (b) or a breach of the conditions of the licence occurring. In deciding whether these sub-sections apply, ACMA is required by sub-sections 41(3) and 83(3) of the Act, to take into account: (a) the business record of the company; and (b) the company's record in situations requiring trust and candour; and (c) (commercial) the business record of each person who is, or would be, if a licence were allocated to the applicant, in a position to control the licence; or (community) the business record of the chief executive and each director and secretary of the applicant; and (d) the record in situations requiring trust and candour of each such person; and (e) whether the company, or a person referred to in paragraph (c) or (d), has been convicted of an offence against this Act or the regulations.

Under sub-section 91(2A) of the Act, ACMA may also refuse to renew a community broadcasting licence if, having regard to matters in paragraphs 84(2)(a) to (f), it considers that it would not allocate such a licence if it were deciding whether to allocate the licence to the licensee.

The Act does not require ACMA to hold an investigation or a hearing into whether a community licence (sub-section 91(3)) or a commercial licence (sub-section 47(3)) should be renewed.

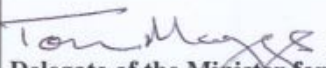

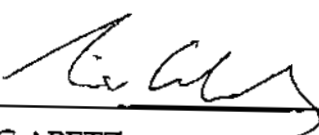

Goods that are not therapeutic goods

2. For the purpose of the *Therapeutic Goods Act 1989*, the following goods, being goods intended for use in humans, are declared not to be therapeutic goods:

- (a) hair bleaches, hair dyes, hair-colorants or hair-perming preparations;
- (b) household and personal aids, or furniture and utensils, for people with disabilities;
- (c) menstrual pads other than tampons;
- (d) incontinence pads, mattress overlays or mattress protectors;
- (e) dental bleaches or dental whiteners;
- (f) preparations that are applied topically to the nails to harden, or to deter biting of, the nails;
- (g) compressed gases when supplied for use as a power source for medical devices;

- (h) piped medical gas systems installed to comply with **AS 2896-1998/Amdt No. 1-1999 : Medical gas systems - Installation and testing of non-flammable medical gas pipeline systems**;
- (i) disinfectant and sterilant gases;
- (j) equipment for use in the purification or treatment of drinking water;
- (k) sanitation, environmental control or environmental detoxification equipment;
- (l) goods for the measurement of alcohol level either in body fluids or exhaled air;
- (m) goods related to colostomy and ileostomy that are adhesive removers or non-medicated skin cleansers;
- (n) goods for retail sale to the ultimate consumer for retention, cushioning or repairing of dentures;
- (o) fresh viable:
 - (i) human tissue, other than blood; or
 - (ii) human organs; or
 - (iii) parts of human organs; or
 - (iv) human bone marrow;
 intended for direct donor-to-host transplantation and used in accordance with applicable laws and standards.

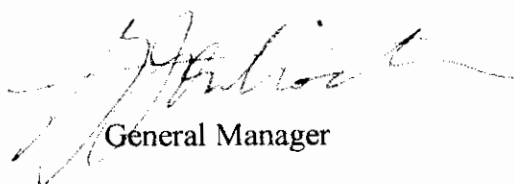

Auditing Standards

Preface

The Australian National Auditing Office (ANAO) Auditing Standards prescribe the minimum standards of professional audit work performed by:

- the Auditor-General;
- staff of the ANAO; and
- contractors appointed to assist in the performance of an Auditor-General function.

ANAO Auditing Standards are formulated having regard to the Australian Auditing and Assurance standards. These latter standards were issued by the former AuASB and subsequently endorsed by the Auditing and Assurance Board (AUASB).

I have determined the ANAO Auditing Standards should incorporate the Australian Auditing and Assurance Standards and Auditing and Assurance Guidance Statements. These ANAO Auditing Standards are effective from the date of publication in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* and will apply for all audits reported after that date. They replace the ANAO Auditing Standards published in the *Gazette* of 1 May, 2002.

In addition to these pronouncements, additional directions or instructions to auditors to whom these Standards apply, may be issued, for example, where it is considered necessary to expand on or modify the Australian Auditing and Assurance Standards or Auditing and Assurance Guidance Statements in particular circumstances.

Members of professional accounting bodies are bound by rules relating to ethical conduct. While recognising these rules, it is important to note that public servants, or those working for the Commonwealth, are expected to adhere to the highest standards of ethical behaviour. The expected standard of behaviour for those working for the Commonwealth has been formally set out in the *Public Service Act 1999*. Specifically, Section 13 of the *Public Service Act 1999* details the Code of Conduct. The ANAO Guide to Conduct, which contains the ANAO Code of Conduct, incorporates the requirement of the *Public Service Act 1999* Code of Conduct and provides further guidance in the context of the ANAO's specific responsibilities. It is important all auditors performing audit functions under the authority of the *Auditor-General Act 1997* make themselves aware of and adhere to these expectations.

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PART 1 - INTRODUCTION

Mandate of the Auditor-General of the Commonwealth

The Office of Auditor-General is a statutory office created by the *Auditor-General Act 1997* (the Act). The Auditor-General is appointed to audit, and report to the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia on, the activities and performance of the Australian Government and its agencies, authorities, companies and their subsidiaries.

The Act sets the terms and conditions of the Office of the Auditor-General and states the functions and powers of the Auditor-General. Those functions and powers include those contained in relevant provisions in the enabling legislation of some individual Commonwealth authorities.

The Act creates the Australian National Audit Office (ANAO), which consists of the Auditor-General and staff appointed under the *Public Service Act 1999*. The function of the ANAO is to assist the Auditor-General in performing Auditor-General functions, which are specified in legislation. The Auditor-General may also engage people under contract to assist in the performance of any Auditor-General function.

Establishment and application of the ANAO Auditing Standards

Section 24 of the Act requires the Auditor-General to set auditing standards to be complied with by auditors performing:

- the audit of the annual financial statements prepared by the Finance Minister in relation to the Commonwealth;
- financial statements audits of Commonwealth agencies, authorities, companies and their subsidiaries;

- performance audits of Commonwealth agencies, authorities, companies and their subsidiaries, including general performance audits; and
- financial statement and performance audits of the ANAO.

These Standards, which may be referred to as the ANAO Auditing Standards, are set by the Auditor-General and express the minimum standard of audit work expected of auditors conducting audits on behalf of the Auditor-General.

The Auditor-General may delegate and authorise auditors to conduct audits on his or her behalf and provide auditors with the necessary powers to conduct such audits. In making delegations and authorisations, the Auditor-General is able to issue directions regarding the manner in which any audit is conducted under these appointments.

These Standards apply to all audits performed under the authority of the Auditor-General in accordance with Division 1 or 2 of Part 4 or Division 2 of Part 7 of the Act or in accordance with section 56 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*.

All audit or audit-related services provided under section 20 of the Act will also be carried out in accordance with these Standards. The arrangement for work under section 20 will specifically set out the application of these standards, and staff of the ANAO and contractors will need to apply these standards when carrying out work under Section 20 arrangements.

PART 2 - THE ANAO AUDITING STANDARDS

Relationship with the Auditing and Assurance Standards and the Auditing and Assurance Standards Board

The reconstituted Auditing and Assurance Standards Board (AUASB) as established by the *Corporate Law Economic Reform Program (Audit Reform & Corporate Disclosure) Act 2004* will progressively re-issue the Auditing and Assurance Standards issued by the former Auditing and Assurance standards Board. Re-issued Auditing and Assurance Standards by the AUASB will be legislative instruments under the *Legislative Instruments Act 2003* with effect under the *Corporations Act 2001*.

A majority of the Auditing and Assurance Standards issued by the former board were granted interim legal endorsement under section 1455 (1) of the *Corporations Act 2001* for financial periods ending on and prior to 30 June 2006. After this time the standards will be made auditing standards under section 336 of the *Corporations Act 2001* for the purposes of the corporations legislation. The proposed new auditing standards are intended, as previously, to apply to all audits in the private and public sectors conducted by independent auditors.

The AUSs set out the basic principles and essential procedures, together with relevant guidance, to be applied to all financial report audits and as far as possible to all audits of other financial and non financial information and all audit related services. The AGSs provide guidance on the performance standards expected on individual components of an audit.

The AUASB uses International Standards issued by the International Auditing and Assurance Standards Board (IAASB) on Auditing as the basis for developing AUSs. The AuASB had a long- standing policy of convergence and harmonisation of its AUSs with ISAs issued by the IAASB.

The Auditor-General recognises there is commonality in the auditing standards expected of the reporting entities under the *Corporations Act 2001* and all Australian Government reporting entities and wishes to conform to the greatest extent possible with the Auditing Standards promulgated by the AUASB. The AUSs and AGSs are applicable as an expression of the minimum standard of audit work expected of auditors for all Australian Government reporting entities.

The ANAO is a member of the International Organisation of Supreme Audit Institutions (INTOSAI). Members of INTOSAI are encouraged to publish auditing standards consistent with the INTOSAI Auditing Standards. The AUSs and AGSs are consistent with the principles expressed in the INTOSAI Auditing Standards.

ANAO Auditing Standards

The Auditor-General adopts, as the ANAO Auditing Standards, the auditing pronouncements issued by the AUASB known as the AUSs and AGSs. It should be noted that the requirement in AUS 806 *Performance Auditing*, paragraph 15 for terms of engagement to be agreed between the auditor and the entity is satisfied in the ANAO's performance audit context by the entity's acknowledgment of the legislative mandate of the Auditor-General.

The ANAO Auditing Standards incorporate all amendments issued from time to time by the AUASB.

The ANAO Auditing Standards must be complied with for all audits reported after the Standards are published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette*. They replace the ANAO Auditing Standards published in the *Commonwealth of Australia Gazette* of 1 May, 2002.

The Auditor-General may issue additional directions or instructions to auditors to whom these Standards apply which expand on, or modify, the AUSs or AGSs where it is appropriate.

Appendix A

Extracts from Relevant Legislation

Auditor-General Act 1997

PART 4 - MAIN FUNCTIONS AND POWERS OF THE AUDITOR-GENERAL

Division 1- Statement audits

Agencies

11. The Auditor-General's functions include auditing financial statements of Agencies in accordance with the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*.

Commonwealth authorities and subsidiaries

12. The Auditor-General's functions include auditing financial statements of Commonwealth authorities and their subsidiaries in accordance with the *Commonwealth Authorities and Companies Act 1997*.

Commonwealth companies and subsidiaries

13. The Auditor-General's functions include auditing financial statements of Commonwealth companies and their subsidiaries in accordance with the *Commonwealth Authorities and Companies Act 1997*.

Division 2 - Performance audits

Agencies

15.(1) The Auditor-General may at any time conduct a performance audit of an Agency.

(2) As soon as practicable after completing the report on the audit, the Auditor-General must:

- (a) cause a copy to be tabled in each House of the Parliament; and
- (b) give a copy to the responsible Minister.

(3) For the purposes of this section, an Agency is taken not to include any persons who are employed or engaged under the *Members of Parliament (Staff) Act 1984* and who are allocated to the Agency by regulations for the purposes of the definition of *Agency* in section 5 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*.

Commonwealth authorities and subsidiaries

16.(1) The Auditor-General may at any time conduct a performance audit of a Commonwealth authority (other than a GBE), or of any of its subsidiaries.

(2) The Auditor-General may conduct a performance audit of a Commonwealth authority that is a GBE, or of any of its subsidiaries, if the responsible Minister, the Finance Minister or the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit requests the audit. The Finance Minister is to consult with the responsible Minister before making a request.

(3) Nothing prevents the Auditor-General from asking a responsible Minister, the Finance Minister or the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit to make a particular request under subsection (2).

(4) As soon as practicable after completing the report on an audit under this section, the Auditor-General must:

- (a) cause a copy to be tabled in each House of the Parliament; and
- (b) give a copy to the responsible Minister.

Commonwealth companies and subsidiaries

17.(1) The Auditor-General may at any time conduct a performance audit of a Commonwealth company (other than a GBE), or of any of its subsidiaries.

(2) The Auditor-General may conduct a performance audit of a wholly owned Commonwealth company that is a GBE, or of any of its subsidiaries, if the responsible Minister, the Finance Minister or the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit requests the audit. The Finance Minister is to consult with the responsible Minister before making a request.

(3) Nothing prevents the Auditor-General from asking a responsible Minister, the Finance Minister or the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit to make a particular request under subsection (2).

(4) As soon as practicable after completing the report on an audit under this section, the Auditor-General must:

- (a) cause a copy to be tabled in each House of the Parliament; and
- (b) give a copy to the responsible Minister.

(5) In this section:

wholly-owned Commonwealth company has the same meaning as in the *Commonwealth Authorities and Companies Act 1997*.

General performance audit

18.(1) The Auditor-General may at any time conduct a review or examination of a particular aspect of the operations of the whole or part of the Commonwealth public sector, being a review or examination that is not limited to the operations of only one Agency, body or person.

(2) As soon as practicable after completing the report on an audit under this section, the Auditor-General must:

- (a) cause a copy to be tabled in each House of the Parliament; and
 - (b) give a copy to the Finance Minister.
- (3) The Auditor-General may give a copy of the report to any other Minister who, in the Auditor-General's opinion, has a special interest in the report.
- (4) In this section:

Commonwealth public sector means Agencies, Commonwealth authorities (other than GBEs) and their subsidiaries and Commonwealth companies (other than GBEs) and their subsidiaries.

Division 5-Miscellaneous functions and powers

Auditing standards

24. The Auditor-General must, by notice in the *Gazette*, set auditing standards that are to be complied with by persons performing any of the following functions:

- (a) an audit referred to in Division 1 or 2;
- (b) an audit under Division 2 of Part 7;
- (c) an audit under section 56 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*.

PART 7 - AUDIT OF THE AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL AUDIT OFFICE

Division 2 –Audit of the Australian National Audit Office

Audit of annual financial statements

44.(1) After preparing the annual financial statements for the Audit Office under section 49 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*, the Auditor-General must give the statements to the Independent Auditor.

(2) The Independent Auditor must audit the statements in accordance with section 57 of the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*. For this purpose, references in that section to the Auditor-General are to be read as references to the Independent Auditor.

Performance audit

45.(1) The Independent Auditor may at any time conduct a performance audit of the Audit Office.

(2) After preparing a proposed report on an audit, the Independent Auditor must give a copy of the proposed report to the Auditor-General. If the Auditor-General gives written comments to the Independent Auditor within 28 days after receiving the proposed report, the Independent Auditor must consider those comments before preparing a final report.

(3) As soon as practicable after completing the report on the audit, the Independent Auditor must:

- (a) cause a copy to be tabled in each House of the Parliament; and
- (b) give a copy to the responsible Minister.

Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997

56 Audit of Finance Minister's annual financial statements

(1) As soon as practicable after receiving financial statements under section 55, the Auditor-General must examine the statements and prepare an audit report in accordance with the regulations.

(2) Instead of preparing a single report, the Auditor-General may prepare an initial report and one or more later supplementary reports.

(3) The Auditor-General must give a copy of each report to the Finance Minister.

(4) The Finance Minister must cause a copy of each report to be tabled in each House of the Parliament as soon as practicable after receipt. Except in the case of a supplementary report, the copy that is tabled must be accompanied by a copy of the annual financial statements.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO GRANT STATUTORY FISHING RIGHTS

WESTERN TUNA AND BILLFISH FISHERY MANAGEMENT PLAN 2005

AFMA intends to grant Statutory Fishing Rights (SFRs) under the *Western Tuna and Billfish Fishery Management Plan 2005* (the WTBF Plan). In accordance with sections 24 & 25 of the *Fisheries Management Act 1991* (the Act), AFMA invites interested persons to register as eligible for a grant of SFRs under the Management Plan.

The Western Tuna and Billfish Fishery Management Plan

SFRs issued under the Management Plan allow a quantity of fish to be taken in the area of the fishery (which covers all of the current Southern & Western Tuna and Billfish Fishery area) and in adjacent high seas areas by Australian fishers. Fishing methods permitted under the Management Plan are pelagic longline and minor line, and purse seining. A total weight of fish for each quota species will be allocated to the WTBF for each fishing season. Fishers will then be limited in the amount of a specific fish species they can take each year by the number of SFRs they hold for each species.

If you are eligible for a grant of SFRs, the number of SFRs you will be granted for the WTBF:

- is set out in the Management Plan, and
- will be determined by reference to your catch levels during 1997 to 2001 (inclusive).

Two types of SFRs will be granted for the WTBF: quota SFRs and Boat SFRs. AFMA has set the notice period, for the purposes of section 23 of the Plan, as the period from the date of this notice to 30 November 2005. You may be eligible to register for the grant of quota and/or boat SFRs if on **30 November 2005** you hold an old longline, minor line, or purse seine permit, or a high seas only fishing permit for the Southern & Western Tuna and Billfish Fishery.

To fish in the WTBF, once SFRs are granted and come into effect, you must hold both a Boat SFR and quota SFRs.

How to apply to be registered

You may register as eligible for a grant of SFRs by completing an application form and returning it to AFMA by **30 November 2005**.

There is no fee for applying to be registered, or for the grant of SFRs. Application forms are available through the contact details below.

AFMA will assess your application against the criteria for eligibility set out in the Management Plan. If you have satisfied the eligibility criteria, AFMA will register you as

an eligible person for a grant of SFRs in accordance with section 26 of the Act. All applicants will be advised in writing if they have been registered or not. If you are unsatisfied with AFMA's decision you may ask for a review by AFMA. You also have the right to review by the Administrative Appeals Tribunal in accordance with section 165 of the Act.

The process for granting Statutory Fishing Rights

If you have been registered as eligible, AFMA will assess the number of SFRs to be granted to you and will make a provisional grant to you. You will be advised of the provisional grant in writing and the provisional grant will be advertised in the *Gazette* in accordance with section 23 of the Act. If you are unsatisfied with AFMA's decision you have a right to review by the Statutory Fishing Rights Allocation Review Panel (SFRARP) under section 143 of the Act.

AFMA cannot grant any SFRs until all requests for review have been dealt with.

SFRs granted under the Management Plan will be valid for the life of the Management Plan. An SFR will cease to exist if the SFR holder surrenders it to AFMA.

Other information

Anyone fishing in the WTBF must comply with the conditions attached to SFRs and any requirements under the Management Plan. The Management Plan may be amended from time-to-time to impose new requirements. The Management Plan also gives AFMA the power to make Directions and Determinations that may restrict fishing activity in the fishery.

Management and research costs for the WTBF will be fully recovered from the fishery. These costs are necessary for the ongoing management of the fishery and will be recovered through annual levies on SFRs.

1. REVOKE the Instrument signed on 20 June 2005 specifying classes of persons for the purposes of subparagraph 1222(1)(aa)(i) of the Regulations; AND
2. SPECIFY the following classes of persons for the purposes of subparagraph 1222(1)(aa)(i) of the Regulations:

Class 1

Persons who seek a student visa and who:

- (a) are not in immigration clearance; and
- (b) are at least 6 years of age; and
- (c) either:
 - (i) hold a subclass 570, 571, 572, 573, 574, 575 or 576 visa; or
 - (ii) are the holder of a passport issued by a foreign country set out in Schedule 1 to this Notice, and who:
 - (A) seek to satisfy the primary criteria of the subclass of student visa that corresponds to that passport as set out in Schedule 1 of this Notice; and
 - (B) are the holder of a relevant visa identified in Schedule 2 of this Notice; and
- (d) either:
 - (i) are enrolled in one or more registered courses:
 - (A) of a kind that has been gazetted under regulation 1.40A; and
 - (B) the provider of which is not a suspended education provider; or
 - (ii) are enrolled, or intending to enrol, in one or more full-time course of study or training, where the person is:
 - (A) an AusAID student who meets the requirement in subparagraph 1.04A(3)(b)(ii) of the Regulations; or
 - (B) a Defence student who meets the requirement in subparagraph 1.04B(b)(ii) of the Regulations; or
 - (C) a secondary exchange student; and

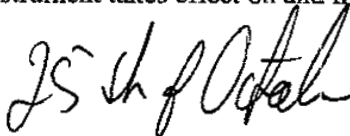
- (e) apply no more than 93 days before their first course commences.

Class 2

Persons who:

- (a) are not in immigration clearance; and

- (d) seek to apply for a student visa at the same time and place as, and combined with, the primary person.

I, **JOHN COBB**, Acting Minister for Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs, acting under regulation 1.17 and subparagraph 1222(1)(a)(ii) of the *Migration Regulations 1994* ('the Regulations'):

1. **REVOKE** the Instrument signed on 10 August 2005 specifying classes of persons for the purposes of subparagraph 1222(1)(a)(ii) of the Regulations; AND
2. **SPECIFY** the following classes of persons for the purposes of subparagraph 1222(1)(a)(ii):

Class 1

Persons who apply for a student visa and who:

- (a) are the holder of a passport issued by a foreign country set out in Schedule 1 to this notice;
- (b) seek to satisfy the primary criteria of the subclass of student visa corresponding to that passport set out in Schedule 1 to this notice;
- (c) are six years of age or above;
- (d) are the subject of an electronic confirmation of enrolment for at least the first course they propose to undertake; and
- (e) apply for a student visa not more than one hundred and twenty four days prior to the date of commencement of the first course specified on the electronic confirmation of enrolment(s).

Class 2

Persons who apply for a student visa and who:

- (a) are the holder of a passport issued by a foreign country;
- (b) seek to satisfy the secondary criteria of a subclass of student visa; and
- (c) claim to be a member of the family unit of, and make an application for a student visa at the same time and place as, and combined with, a person in Class 1 who is an applicant for a student visa and seeks to satisfy the primary criteria of the same subclass of visa.

Class 3

Persons who apply for a student visa and who:

- (a) are the holder of a passport issued by a foreign country set out in Schedule 2 to this notice;
- (b) are in the foreign country that issued the passport;
- (c) seek to satisfy the primary criteria of the subclass of student visa corresponding to that passport set out in Schedule 2 to this notice;
- (d) make their application through the services of an agent who is party to an agreement with Immigration to use an Internet facility for offshore student visa applications;
- (e) are six years of age or above;
- (f) are the subject of an electronic confirmation of enrolment for at least the first course they propose to undertake; and
- (g) apply for a student visa not more than one hundred and twenty four days prior to the date of commencement of the first course specified on the electronic confirmation of enrolment(s).

Class 4

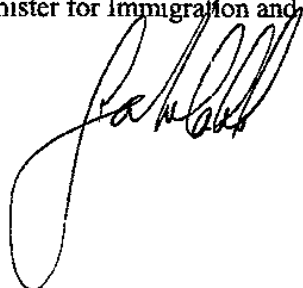

- (b) seek to satisfy the secondary criteria of a subclass of student visa;
- (c) make their application through the services of an agent who is party to an agreement with Immigration to use an Internet facility for offshore student visa applications; and

Notice Pursuant to section 8(5)

I, CHRISTOPHER MARTIN ELLISON, Minister for Justice and Customs, pursuant to subsection 8(5) of the *Customs Tariff (Anti Dumping) Act 1975*, DIRECT that the element of interim dumping duty referred to in paragraph (4)(a) in respect of sodium hydrogen carbonate which is also known as sodium bicarbonate or baking soda exported from the People's Republic of China (China) to Australia be ascertained by reference to a measure of the quantity (by weight) of those particular goods.

If the non-injurious price of goods of that kind as ascertained or last ascertained for the purposes of the dumping duty notice is less than the normal value of goods of that kind as so ascertained, or last so ascertained, a lesser amount of interim dumping duty is fixed, pursuant to subsection 8(5A) of the *Customs Tariff (Anti Dumping) Act 1975*. I have had regard to the desirability of fixing a lesser amount of duty such that the sum of:

- (i) the export price of goods of that kind as so ascertained, or last so ascertained, and
- (ii) that lesser duty,

does not exceed that non-injurious price.

This notice applies to sodium hydrogen carbonate which is also known as sodium bicarbonate or baking soda and like goods entered for home consumption on or after 22 August 2005.

FINDING IN RELATION TO A DUMPING INVESTIGATION

Public notice under section 269TG(1) & (2) of the *Customs Act 1901*

The Australian Customs Service (Customs) has completed its investigation into the alleged dumping of sodium bicarbonate as set out in the following table.

In Trade Measures Report No. 98 Customs has recommended the imposition of anti-dumping measures. The report outlines the investigations carried out by Customs, material findings of fact and the reasons for the recommendations made by Customs. It is available on request from the Trade Measures Office, Australian Customs Service, Canberra, telephone 02 6275 6547, or on the Internet.

I, CHRISTOPHER MARTIN ELLISON, Minister for Justice and Customs, have considered the recommendations of Customs, the reasons for the recommendations and the material findings of fact on which the recommendations are based.

I have accepted the recommendations of Customs, the reasons for the recommendations and the material findings of fact on which the recommendations are based. The factors relevant to my determination of material injury to the Australian industry are the size of the dumping margins, the quantity of goods exported from the country under investigation and the effect of dumped imports on prices in the Australian market and the consequent impact on the Australian industry.

I declare that s. 8 of the *Customs Tariff (Anti Dumping) Act 1975* applies to sodium hydrogen carbonate, which is also known as sodium bicarbonate, or baking soda; and

- under s. 269TG(1) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act), like goods exported to Australia on or after 22 August 2005, to the extent permitted by s. 269TN of the Act, by all exporters from China; and
- under s. 269TG(2) of the Act, in respect of like goods that are exported to Australia after the date of publication of this notice, by all exporters from China.

Interested parties may request a review of this decision by lodging an application for review with the Trade Measures Review Officer in the approved form and manner within 30 days of the publication of this notice. The legislation relating to the review of Ministerial decisions is set out in the Act commencing at s. 269ZZA.

Export prices, non-injurious prices, normal values and the company names of 'specialty' pack exporters will not be published in this notice as they may reveal confidential information. Customs

calculated a dumping margin for Ihju by comparing quarterly weighted average export prices for the investigation period with quarterly weighted average normal values over the investigation period. For other exporters Customs calculated dumping margins by comparing the weighted average export price for the investigation period with the weighted average normal value for the investigation period.

This notice should be read in conjunction with Trade Measures Report No. 98.
