

The object of the additional licence conditions is to reduce the risk of recurrence of breach of the following licence conditions:

- that the licensee will continue to represent the community interest that it represented at the time when the licence was allocated or was last renewed; (Paragraph 9(2)(b) of schedule 2 to the Act).
- that the licensee will encourage members of the community that it serves to participate in:
 - (i) the operations of the licensee in providing the service; and
 - (ii) the selection and provision of programs under the licence.(Paragraph 9(2)(c) of schedule 2 to the Act).

The additional licence conditions are as follows:

Commencement

The additional licence conditions are to commence on 22 June 2006.

Definitions

In the following conditions:

ACMA means Australian Communications and Media Authority;

Act means the *Broadcasting Services Act 1992*;

Additional licence conditions mean the licence conditions specified in this notice;

Governing Committee means the governing committee of the licensee established in accordance with section 13 of the licensee's *Rules of an Incorporated Aboriginal Association*;

Licensee means the Western Australian Aboriginal Media Association (Aboriginal Corporation).

Additional licence conditions

Continued representation for the community interests of the Perth Aboriginal Community

1. The licensee will undertake activities to identify the needs and interests of the Perth Aboriginal community. Such activities may include research:
 - a. assessing the Perth Aboriginal community's preferences in relation to indigenous news, current affairs, music genres, talk programs, general community information and other areas of interest; and
 - b. identifying and communicating with other community licence holders or community broadcasting associations to obtain information or practical experience in the representation of community interests.
2. Having regard to the needs and interests of the Perth Aboriginal community, the licensee will:
 - a. investigate programming options and improvements for the service in relation to indigenous news, current affairs, music genres, talk programs and general community information;
 - b. investigate programming options which might be sourced from other community broadcasting licensees with an indigenous focus or bodies such as the National Indigenous Radio Service (NIRS); and
 - c. on a quarterly basis, invite local indigenous organisations and individuals within the Perth Aboriginal community to provide the licensee with program ideas, input and direction for the service.
3. The licensee will publish on its website, and in local print media programming information which highlights and promotes indigenous content.

Encouraging the participation of members of the Perth Aboriginal Community in the operations of the licensee and the selection and provision of programs

4. The licensee will put in place and maintain policies that encourage the participation of the Perth Aboriginal community (both individuals and organisations) in the operation of the licensee, and the selection and provision of programs on the service.

Membership

5. Policies to encourage members of the Perth Aboriginal community to participate in the operation of the licensee should:
 - a. enable more members of the Perth Aboriginal community to become members of the licensee;
 - b. provide objective and transparent criteria for membership;
 - c. establish timeframes for the processing of membership applications;
 - d. provide for an appeal process for membership applications;
 - e. make available contact points for membership information and inquiries.

Volunteers

6. The licensee will develop a policy to enable volunteers to assist in the operation of the service.

Awareness of membership, volunteer and participation opportunities

7. The licensee will undertake activities to encourage members and volunteers to participate in the selection, presentation, and production of programming and content. Such activities may include the provision of assistance and training to members and volunteers, for example, to produce or present their own programs.
8. The licensee will make its membership policy, volunteering policy, membership forms, information and contact points available through its website.
9. The licensee will broadcast announcements concerning membership and volunteering. In scheduling these announcements, consideration should be given to the frequency and timing of announcements so as to ensure the information is heard by listeners who may listen to different programs and during different timeslots.

Programming committee

10. The licensee will establish and maintain the Programming Committee as described at paragraph 3.2 of its submission to ACMA dated 13 December 2005 (Annexed to these additional licence conditions). The Programming Committee will meet at least four times in each calendar year.

Awareness of licence conditions and code of practice

11. The licensee will undertake activities to ensure that its Governing Committee, staff, members and volunteers are aware of the requirements of the licence conditions set out at clause 9 of Schedule 2 to the Act, these additional licence conditions and the contents of the Community Broadcasting Association of Australia Code of Practice.

Monitoring and Reporting

12. The licensee will provide the following plan and reports to ACMA:
 - a. a Compliance Plan setting out the licensee's plan for compliance with these additional licence conditions. The Compliance Plan will include the activities proposed to implement or progress each additional licence

- condition; and key dates or measurements for demonstrating fulfilment of the additional licence conditions. This report is due 31 July 2006.
- b. Compliance Reports on compliance or progress towards compliance with these additional licence conditions. Compliance Reports will address progress towards compliance with these additional licence conditions with reference to the Compliance Plan. These reports are due by 30 November 2006, 30 April 2007, and 31 August 2007.
13. The licensee's Compliance Plan and each Compliance Report must be approved by the licensee's Governing Committee.
14. The licensee will provide to ACMA any further information requested in writing by ACMA concerning any matter in these additional licence conditions, the Compliance Plan or Compliance Reports.



I hereby declare the operations for the harvesting of specimens that are, or are derived from, fish or invertebrates, other than specimens of species listed under Part 13 of the EPBC Act, taken in the Queensland Coral Fishery, as defined in the management regime in force under Queensland's *Fisheries Act 1994* and *Fisheries Regulation 1995*, to be an approved Wildlife Trade Operation, in accordance with section 303FN (2) and (10)(d), for the purposes of the EPBC Act.

Unless amended or revoked, this declaration:

- a) is valid from 1 July 2006 until 1 July 2008 and;
- b) is subject to the conditions applied under section 303FT specified in the Schedule.

1. Operation of the fishery will be carried out in accordance with the Queensland Coral Fishery management regime in force under Queensland's *Fisheries Act 1994* and *Fisheries Regulation 1995*.

The Queensland Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries (DPI&F) will inform the Department of the Environment and Heritage (DEH) of any intended amendments to the management arrangements that may affect sustainability of the target species or negatively impact on bycatch, protected species or the ecosystem.





- primary immune deficiency syndromes such as:
 - ❖ congenital agammaglobulinaemia and hypogammaglobulinaemia
 - ❖ common variable immunodeficiency
 - ❖ severe combined immunodeficiency

- myeloma or chronic lymphocytic leukaemia with severe secondary hypogammaglobulinaemia and recurrent infections.
- children with congenital acquired immunodeficiency syndrome and recurrent infections.

1. REVOKE Instrument number IMMI 05/095, signed on 30 November 2005, specifying residential postcodes, skilled occupations, relevant assessing authorities and points under the Skilled Australian Sponsored (Migrant) Visa under regulation 1.03 and subregulation 2.26B(1) of the Regulations;
2. SPECIFY each occupation that is in the Sydney and Selected Areas Skilled Shortage List referred to in Schedule A to this Instrument as a skilled occupation for the purposes of subparagraph (a)(iii) of the definition of *skilled occupation* in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations;
3. SPECIFY the number of points referred to in Schedule A to this Instrument for the corresponding occupation set out in Schedule A, for the purposes of subparagraph (a)(iv) of the definition of *skilled occupation* in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations;
4. SPECIFY each body referred to in Schedule A to this Instrument as the relevant assessing authority for the corresponding skilled occupation set out in Schedule A, for the purposes of subregulation 2.26B(1) of the Regulations;
5. SPECIFY the postcodes listed in Schedule B to this Instrument, for the purposes of subparagraph (a)(i) of the definition of *skilled occupation* in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations;
6. SPECIFY each occupation referred to in Schedule C to this Instrument as a skilled occupation for the purposes of paragraph (b) of the definition of *skilled occupation* in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations;
7. SPECIFY the number of points referred to in Schedule C to this Instrument for the corresponding occupation set out in Schedule C, for the purposes of paragraph (b) of the definition of *skilled occupation* in regulation 1.03 of the Regulations; AND

8. SPECIFY each body referred to in Schedule C to this Instrument as the relevant assessing authority for the corresponding skilled occupation set out in Schedule C, for the purposes of subregulation 2.26B(1) of the Regulations.

- NOTE 4: Regulation 1.03 provides that *relevant assessing authority* means a person or body specified under regulation 2.26B.
- NOTE 5: Subregulation 2.26B(1) provides the Minister may, by notice in the *Gazette*, specify a person or body as the relevant assessing authority for a skilled occupation if the person or body is approved in writing by the Minister or Education as the relevant assessing authority for the occupation.
- NOTE 6: *Education* is defined in Regulation 1.03 as the Department of Education, Science and Training.]

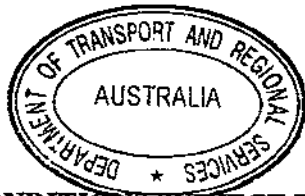



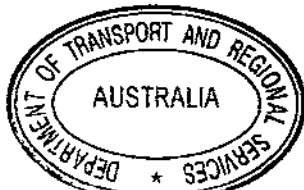

Service in Antarctica:

Mr Per Larsen has undertaken 26 voyages on the Aurora Australis in support of many aspects of the Australian Antarctic programme (AAP). His service includes well over 1000 days sea duty in support of the AAP, including about 580 days below 60 degrees south.

Since Mr Larsen's first voyage in the summer of 1994, he has demonstrated professional pride and commitment in his work, his ship and those he works with; both crewmates and expeditioners. His skills, leadership and concern for safety are evident in all the shipboard activities undertaken by the crew in support of our programs, on the trawl deck, in the cargo hold, and on the helicopter platform.

Mr Larsen's contribution in support of marine science programmes has been particularly significant. He has participated on most of the major marine science cruises within the AAP over the last 10 years. These include the first east Antarctic winter-time sea ice and oceanography study (July-August 1995); a large scale krill and oceanography survey (BROKE, January-March 1996); most of the WOCE SR3 oceanographic transects between Hobart and the Antarctic coast; a large sub-Antarctic Zone oceanographic study (September 1997); and the successful winter survey of the Mertz Glacier Polynya (July-August 1999). Many of the activities undertaken on these voyages were new and untried, and Mr Larsen's contribution to the innovations necessary to undertake these has been essential to the success of many major marine science activities. The Aurora Australis experiences a high turnover of crew. While they are highly skilled professional mariners, they usually lack the depth and breadth of experience in marine science methodology and equipment employed on the vessel, ie trawling, plankton sampling, CTD deployment, mooring deployment and recovery, sea-ice research and Geoscience studies. The same voyages also carry expeditioners who are unfamiliar with ship operations.

Mr Larsen's depth and breadth of knowledge plays a crucial role in the training and supervision of personnel engaged in marine science. He has demonstrated an ability to listen to the often novel requirements of scientists, in partnership with the ship's officers, and to translate these into safe and efficient plans of action, to share his skills and knowledge with other crew members, and to motivate through example the personnel under his supervision. His expressed attitude is one of wanting to make the science programs work and, not surprisingly, he is considered a mandatory member of any marine science team. He sets such a high standard of personal achievement that it flows through to the other members of the crew and those who serve alongside him.

The past and continuing successful performance of the ship, its crew and the marine science program can be attributed in a major part to Mr Larsen's efforts and dedication to the AAP.

About 2.5ha, King George Terrace, Parkes, comprising the area bounded by the centre lines of King George Terrace, Queen Victoria Terrace and Parliament Square, and including all of Sections 39, 42, 43 and 50 Parkes.

Criterion**Values**

- (a) the place has outstanding heritage value to the nation because of the place's importance in the course, or pattern, of Australia's natural or cultural history.

Old Parliament House as the Provisional Parliament House was the first purpose-built home for the Australian Parliament. It was central to the development of Australia as a nation from its opening in 1927 until the opening of the new Parliament House in 1988.

Old Parliament House is a site that has provided a physical focus for events that reflect Australian democratic values, and political and social rights. It demonstrates how the Australian federal government separated the legislative and judicial government functions and the growth of a party based democracy. It also stands for the right to argue and dissent, and reflects the orderly succession of governments through the democratic process, as reflected by the seven changes of government that took place during the years in which Parliament sat in the building.

The building set the pattern of combining the functions of the executive arm of government and the legislative function in the one building. This commenced with the Bruce-Page Government holding occasional Cabinet meetings in the building followed by Prime Minister Joseph Lyons moving his Cabinet into the building in 1932. These actions initiated the major expansion of the building to house both the legislative and executive functions of government, a pattern that continued in the design of (new) Parliament House.

The North Wing has historic importance as the main venue for parliamentary functions from 1927-88. The Senate Chamber, House of Representatives Chamber, and King's Hall are highly significant as venues for the debates, petitions and votes associated with 61 years of Australian legislature.

Old Parliament House is an important place in the story of the creation of the Australian democracy and has associations with several related defining events. Landmark political events associated with the building included legislation in 1942 adopting the *Statute of Westminster 1931* and the declarations of War in 1939 and 1941. The building was also the place of 61 years of national legislation shaping Australian society, the extension of the voting age to 18 year olds in 1973, and the establishment of new political parties such as the Democratic Labor Party in 1955 and the Australian Democrats in 1977.

(a) continued	<p>Old Parliament House saw the growth of Commonwealth responsibility for Aboriginal affairs. Key events included the Bark Petition sent by the Yirrakala community to the House of Representatives in August 1963 protesting bauxite mining in Arnhem Land, and the Referendum in 1967 that overwhelmingly supported Commonwealth power to legislate for Aboriginal people. Amongst other developments, the Referendum result led to the <i>Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976</i>, proclaimed on Australia Day 1977. With the new responsibilities arising from the 1967 Referendum, the Commonwealth Parliament became the focus of Aboriginal political protest. The siting of the Aboriginal Tent Embassy outside Parliament House in 1972 was a part of this protest.</p> <p>The front façade of Old Parliament House and the immediate grassed area to its north have been the scene of numerous events, gatherings, protests and demonstrations. Significant events included the formal opening of the Provisional Parliament House in 1927 and the address by the former Prime Minister, the Hon Gough Whitlam, on the front steps of the building after his dismissal by the Governor-General, Sir John Kerr, in November 1975.</p> <p>Old Parliament House, in particular King's Hall and Chambers, has been the venue of important ceremonial events including: the public mourning for the deaths of Prime Minister John Curtin in 1945 and former Prime Minister Ben Chifley in 1951; State receptions held in honour of Queen Elizabeth II in 1954 and 1963; and events associated with Royal visits in 1927, 1935, 1945, 1954, 1963 and 1974.</p> <p>Old Parliament House has a richness of internal fabric and collections that convey the way in which parliamentary functions were conducted and the everyday use of the building. In particular these features include the purpose-designed furniture and furnishings that maintained their original setting and purpose for over sixty years.</p> <p>King's Hall and the Chambers have features that reflect both the austerity of the time and a dignified formality. These features include the decorative skylights, elegant pendant lights, and parquet flooring, as well as the high ceilings accentuated by the raked galleries, the timber wall panelling, and the extensive, restrained and subtle decoration. The Hall features bas-relief busts of prominent personalities (related to Federation, the judiciary and of the first Parliament in 1901) on its colonnades, portraits of former Prime Ministers on the walls and a statue of King George V. The Chambers demonstrate (through their fabric, furnishing and objects) the growth of Parliament over 61 years, including the evolution of communications technology applied to the reporting of parliamentary debates and events to all Australians.</p>

Criterion**Values****(a) continued**

Significant furniture of Old Parliament House includes the John Smith Murdoch designed furniture and fittings; the HMAS Australia table; the Country Party Table and the first Australian Cabinet table and the furniture items which underlie the significance of Australia's role initially as a member of the British Empire and later as a member of the Commonwealth of Nations. Other significant furniture includes the President of the Senate's Chair (presented by the Dominion of Canada) and the Speaker's Chair (presented by the United Kingdom Branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association) and additional furniture and fittings designed or purchased for the extension or alterations to the building. In relation to the later items, the furniture associated with the Senate and House of Representative Wings and the President of the Senate and Prime Minister's suites are of particular value.

Old Parliament House has a rare record (documented in the Old Parliament House, KE Emu data base) which is made up of both furniture and a variety of documents of various sorts. The documents include initial design concepts, specifications, quotes and detailed drawings for manufacture.

The Old Parliament House Library is of heritage significance, in particular, the remaining features of the original library and the later additions or changes to the library up to and including the 1958 extension are of value.

(b) the place has outstanding heritage value to the nation because of the place's possession of uncommon, rare or endangered aspects of Australia's natural or cultural history.

Old Parliament House is uncommon in that it housed both the legislative and executive functions of government. This is reflected in the construction of the House of Representatives (southeast) and the Senate (southwest) Wings, the front pavilions and in a great number of internal changes.

The House of Representatives Wing provides extensive and relatively intact evidence of the accommodation provided for Members and Ministers at various periods and the working conditions of parliamentarians and staff over the period 1943-88.

The former Members' Private Dining Room contains the remains of the 1927 hand-painted wall features. These decorative features are rare. They are the only examples of these features in the building and are also rare within the ACT.

There are important records of both furniture and its documentation relating to initial design concepts, specifications, quotes and detailed drawings for manufacture.

Values

- (c) the place has outstanding heritage value to the nation because of the place's potential to yield information that will contribute to an understanding of Australia's natural or cultural history.
- Old Parliament House has a significant collection of documents which are associated with the (Old Parliament) House. This collection is an important source of historical information. The documents include plans, photographs and files that are directly related to the design, construction, use, and alteration of the Chambers and King's Hall. An inventory of the collection is documented in the Old Parliament House KE Emu data base.
- (d) the place has outstanding heritage value to the nation because of the place's importance in demonstrating the principal characteristics of: (i) a class of Australia's natural or cultural places; or (ii) a class of Australia's natural or cultural environments.
- Old Parliament House is a primary example of the Inter War Stripped Classical style of architecture. This style was dominant in Canberra's government architecture of the 1920s - 1940s. It is also an example of how this style was varied in Canberra during the 1920s-1940s. This style variation was a major stylistic feature of Federal Capital Architecture in Canberra.
- The Inter War Stripped Classical style of architecture was varied to include the influence of Garden City ideals. In the case of Old Parliament House, this included courtyards with loggias and pergolas, verandahs, internal courtyards and adjacent gardens. Despite these influences the central stylistic expression of the building remained its classical orderliness.
- The characteristics of the building's style and their expression in Old Parliament House's exterior and interior, are due to the design work of the Commonwealth's first government architect, John Smith Murdoch. Murdoch's design is modest, embracing classical symmetry and forms, having balanced masses with projected bays with arched bronze framed windows. The architectural detail between the storeys (spandrels) also emphasises the verticality of the elevations.
- Old Parliament House and its curtilage also forms the central feature of a precinct. This precinct includes the two Secretariat buildings (East and West Blocks), the Old Parliament House Gardens, Constitutional and Magna Carta Places and the National Rose Gardens. There is some commonality in the design of early buildings within this precinct. This precinct reflects a period when there was an increase in Commonwealth Government power and an increase in the public's interest in Canberra. The essential character and symmetry of Old Parliament House have remained intact despite several substantial additions. The design of the building and its layout, its curtilage spaces and its interior rooms all demonstrate the customs and functions of the Commonwealth Parliament.
- The building's Chambers reflect the roles of the House of Representatives and the Senate. The seating arrangements particularly indicate the formal and adversarial nature of debate in the House of Representatives Chamber compared with the more fraternal seating of Senators in the Senate Chamber. The Public and Press Galleries illustrate the nature of public and press

access to formal Parliamentary processes. This access is further demonstrated by the spaces allocated to the recording and administration of Parliamentary sittings. The presence of Executive Government staff indicate the major involvement of the Executive in the formal processes of Parliament in Australia.

The House of Representatives Wing comprises two blocks constructed in three phases: 1943, 1949 and 1965. The Senate Wing comprises two blocks and these were constructed in three phases: 1943, 1949 and 1972. These building Wings retain much of their internal layout and some fittings. They are an unusual physical record of the difficult working conditions of parliamentarians, staff and press representatives over the period 1943-88. Early surviving interiors of the building include King's Hall, the Library, Senate Chamber, House of Representatives Chamber, Dining Rooms, Senate Opposition Party Room, Ministerial Party Room, Clerk of the Senate's Office, Member's Bar, Government Party Room and Leader of the Government in the Senate's Office. King's Hall and the Chambers are important for reflecting the austerity of the times and the building's style. The rooms tend to be simple spaces with little decoration and have subtle and repeated classical references. For example, the use of Greek key patterning is evident in the Chambers and in the external metal and rendered balustrades. Some of the rooms have a certain grandeur resulting from generously proportioned spaces with clerestory windows. The use of timber for wall or ceiling panelling and furniture also distinguishes some rooms. These variations in interior detail highlight the hierarchy of Government.

The importance given to the Parliamentary Library as a source of information for Parliament is demonstrated by its location within the building. The key positional features are its location on the central axis of the building, its close proximity to both Chambers and its access to and from King's Hall. Its designated importance is also demonstrated by the design and fit-out of the Library rooms which feature extensive timber panelling and fittings. These fittings were normally reserved for high-status spaces such as the Chambers, the Party Rooms, and office holders' rooms.

The building is also of interest for surviving features consistent with, if not influenced by, Garden City ideals. These features include the courtyards with loggias and pergolas and the courtyards with verandahs. These features express aspects of the garden city principles and in particular the typical linking of internal spaces with the landscape setting. The adjacent Senate and House of Representatives gardens are a part of this landscape setting. These gardens have been substantially redeveloped but they contain the original garden layout.

(e) the place has outstanding heritage value to the nation because of the place's importance in exhibiting particular aesthetic characteristics valued by a community or cultural group.	<p>Old Parliament House is an iconic national landmark that has a major role in the symbolic physical representation of democracy in the Parliamentary Triangle. This landmark importance has been strengthened by the siting and design of (new) Parliament House. These two buildings are read together as part of the land axis vista and they are also a part of the planned aesthetic qualities of the Parliamentary Triangle. In particular the Griffin design sought to demonstrate the strict separation of the legislative, executive and judicial components of government and the hierarchical relationship between them. Old Parliament House demonstrates a high degree of achievement in combining built features into a designed landscape to achieve an aesthetic purpose.</p> <p>Erected at the base of the former Camp Hill on the main Land Axis, Old Parliament House symbolised the primacy of Parliament (or the legislature) over the executive and judicial arms of government. In this way the building contributed to the <i>planned democracy</i> symbolism of the Parliamentary Triangle now fulfilled with the construction of Parliament House on Capital Hill. Specific rooms and spaces within the building are directly associated with events that shaped the political and private lives of prominent individuals in Australia's political and social history. Many of the former parliamentarians' support staff and media representatives retain strong associations with the building and its contents.
- The importance of Old Parliament House to the Australian community was demonstrated when organizations and individuals rallied to support the retention of the place when it was threatened with demolition in the 1970s.

Rule 6 – Eligibility

The conditions of eligibility for membership of the Union are as follows:

Note: As a corresponding amendment, it is proposed that Appendix 'D' and Appendix 'E' of the Rules be removed.

Reasons for the proposed alterationsAlteration 'A'

The purpose of this alteration is to allow persons who are employed in positions of responsibility by the Union to become members of the Union. It is expected that this will instill and encourage a greater commitment to the welfare of the Union and its members.

Alterations 'B' - 'E'

Since the formation of the Union in 1911, the activities of Fire Services have significantly diversified and there has also been an increased reliance on new technologies to support traditional firefighting operations.

The past distinction between "Operational" and "Non Operational" staff has become blurred and has lost its significance and utility.

The Union believes that its eligibility Rules should be altered as proposed to reflect the changes in the industry.

Within these broad objectives, the following specific reasons for each of the several alterations sought are as follows:

- (a) To enable the Union to continue to represent its members who move into positions which require them to perform more clerically focused rather than "on the ground" duties.
- (b) To enable the Union to represent employees, other than uniformed employees or traditional "Operational" employees, who are employed in connection with the industry in which the Union operates, even if their duties are largely clerical in nature and involve the use of business tools associated with such work.
- (c) To remove uncertainties in relation to the employees the Union may recruit.
- (d) To enable the Union to continue to represent its current members, notwithstanding any past, present or future functions those members' employers may acquire from Local Government Authorities. As the core of the UFU's membership has historically been and remains drawn from employees of public fire authorities in different jurisdictions, the present rule creates the potential for anomalies of coverage.
- (e) To enable the Union to represent employees, other than uniformed employees or traditional "Operational" employees, who are employed in connection with the industry in which the Union operates, even if their duties are similar to those of the callings and avocations referred to in Appendix E of the Rules.
- (f) To expand the Union's eligibility rule to all persons employed by public or private firefighting authorities provided that the requirements of Rule 6(b) and the exclusions not subject to this application are met.

Effect of the proposed alterations

Alteration 'A' will enable the Union's Industrial Relations employees to apply for membership to the Union and, as members, seek election to any position on the Branch Committee of Management. Absent the alteration, such employees were only entitled to seek election to the position of Branch Secretary or Branch Assistant Secretary.

Alteration 'B' will, subject to the remainder of the eligibility rule, enable employees in clerical positions to apply for membership to the Union.

Alteration 'C' will, subject to the remainder of the eligibility rule, enable persons described in Appendix "D" to the Rules to apply for membership to the Union.

Alteration 'D' will, subject to the remainder of the eligibility rule, enable persons described in Appendix "E" to the Rules to apply for membership to the Union.

Alteration 'E' will, subject to the remainder of the eligibility rule, enable persons employed in any clerical, administrative or professional capacity to apply for membership to the Union.





PROPOSED REDISTRIBUTION OF FEDERAL ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES IN QUEENSLAND

Following the determination of State and Territory entitlements made by the Electoral Commissioner on 17 November 2005, Queensland is entitled to 29 Members of the House of Representatives, one more than its previous entitlement. The Redistribution Committee for Queensland has made a proposed redistribution of federal electoral boundaries in Queensland.

Members of the public, political parties and other organisations are invited to inspect the suggestions and comments on those suggestions lodged with the Redistribution Committee for Queensland, along with the Report of the Redistribution Committee which contains reasons for the proposed redistribution and detailed maps showing the names and boundaries of each proposed electoral division.

What is a redistribution?

A redistribution is a redrawing of electoral boundaries to ensure that, as near as practicable, there are the same number of electors in each division within a state or territory. The boundaries must take into account community of interests, communication and transport links, natural features and current boundaries.

Why is a redistribution being held?

A redistribution of federal electoral boundaries in Queensland is required due to the change of entitlement to Members in the House of Representatives. In accordance with section 59 of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918, the Electoral Commission directed that a redistribution commence on 2 December 2005.

What has happened so far?

A Redistribution Committee was appointed on 14 March 2006. Notices inviting Suggestions and Comments were placed in the Commonwealth Gazette on 1 February 2006 and the press on 4 and 5 February 2006. Eleven Suggestions and twenty-six Comments on suggestions were received and considered by the Redistribution Committee in the development of its proposal.

The proposed divisions

Projected enrolment growth across the State means that divisional boundaries must be redrawn to ensure, as far as possible, there are equal numbers of electors in each division.

The Redistribution Committee's proposed boundaries make use of local government boundaries, locality boundaries, main roads, waterways and other geographical features. Particular attention has been paid to transport and communication links across and between communities. Although the State's entitlement has increased to 29 divisions, the Committee has sought to minimise the number of electors being moved from one division to another.

Names of proposed divisions

The Redistribution Committee proposes that all current divisional names be retained and that the new division is named Wright.

Want more information?

Newspaper advertisements showing maps of the proposed electoral divisions will appear in the Courier Mail and the Sunday Mail on Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 June 2006. Advertisements with maps showing proposed changes in local areas only will also appear in some regional newspapers from Saturday 25 June 2006.

How to lodge an objection to the proposed Redistribution

Interested persons or organisations may lodge written Objections to the proposed redistribution with the Australian Electoral Commission. Objections must be lodged in writing at the office of the Australian Electoral Officer for Queensland no later than 6pm on Friday 21 July 2006.

Persons or organisations who are considering making objections to the proposed Redistribution are urged to take account of the requirements of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918, copies of which can be obtained from Commonwealth Government bookshops. It can also be accessed at www.aec.gov.au.

What happens next?

The Objections will be available for inspection at the office of the Australian Electoral Officer for Queensland from 9am on Monday 24 July 2006.

Persons or organisations may then lodge written Comments on these public objections. Written Comments must be received at the office of the Australian Electoral Officer for Queensland no later than 6pm on Friday 4 August 2006.

All public objections and comments on those objections will be considered by the augmented Electoral Commission for Queensland. The augmented Electoral Commission for Queensland may hold public hearings and, if necessary, will make a revised proposal, in which case it will consider any further Objections before making a final determination of divisional boundaries and names.

Details of the determination will be published and tabled in Federal Parliament.

The final determination is not subject to appeal.

When will the new boundaries come into effect?

The new boundaries will come into effect at the next General Election.

(REGULATIONS 1.20B, 1.20G(2) AND 1.20GA(1)(a)(i))

I, *AMANDA VANSTONE*, Minister for Immigration and Multicultural Affairs, acting under regulations 1.17 and 1.20B, subregulation 1.20G(2) and subparagraph 1.20GA(1)(a)(i) of the *Migration Regulations 1994* ("the Regulations"):

1. REVOKE Instrument number IMMI 06/028, signed on 24 April 2006, specifying minimum salary levels for the purposes of regulation 1.20B and occupations for the purposes of subregulation 1.20G(2) and subparagraph 1.20GA(1)(a)(i) of the Regulations;
2. SPECIFY a gross annual salary of AUD 41,850 EXCLUDING those items listed in Schedule A to this Instrument, calculated on a 38 hour week, as the minimum salary level for the purposes of the definition of *minimum salary level* in regulation 1.20B of the Regulations, for the occupations listed in Schedule B to this Instrument;
3. SPECIFY a gross annual salary of AUD 57,300 EXCLUDING those items listed in Schedule A to this Instrument, calculated on a 38 hour week, as the minimum salary level for the purposes of the definition of *minimum salary level* in regulation 1.20B of the Regulations, for the occupations listed in Schedule C to this Instrument;
4. SPECIFY a gross annual salary of AUD 37,665 EXCLUDING those items listed in Schedule A to this Instrument, calculated on a 38 hour week, as the minimum salary level for the purposes of the definition of *minimum salary level* in regulation 1.20B of the Regulations, for all occupations listed in Schedule D to this Instrument;
5. SPECIFY a gross annual salary of AUD 51,570 EXCLUDING those items listed in Schedule A to this Instrument, calculated on a 38 hour week, as the minimum salary level for the purposes of the definition of *minimum salary level* in regulation 1.20B of the Regulations, for all occupations listed in Schedule E to this Instrument;
6. SPECIFY each occupation listed in Schedules B and C to this Instrument as an occupation for the purposes of subregulation 1.20G(2) of the Regulations; AND
7. SPECIFY each occupation listed in Schedule D and E to this Instrument as an occupation for the purposes of subparagraph 1.20GA(1)(a)(i) of the Regulations.

- NOTE 5: Subregulation 1.20GA(1) relevantly provides that a person mentioned in subregulation 1.20GA(2) may nominate to the Minister an activity in which an individual is proposed to be employed by the person in Australia, if the tasks of the nominated activity correspond to the tasks of an occupation specified in a Gazette Notice for the purposes of paragraph 1.20GA(1)(a)(i).]
