ACMA is required to renew these licences unless it decides that an applicant is no longer a suitable licensee. A company is a suitable licensee if ACMA does not decide that sub-section 83(2) of the Act applies to the company.

ACMA may decide that sub-section 83(2) of the Act applies to a licensee if it is satisfied that allowing the licensee to provide or continue to provide either a commercial or a community broadcasting service under a licence would lead to a significant risk of: (a) an offence against the Act or the regulations being committed; (b) or a breach of the conditions of the licence occurring.

In deciding whether these sub-sections apply, ACMA is required by sub-section 83(3) of the Act, to take into account: (a) the business record of the company; and (b) the company's record in situations requiring trust and candour; and (c) (commercial) the business record of each person who is, or would be, if a licence were allocated to the applicant, in a position to control the licence; or (community) the business record of the chief executive and each director and secretary of the applicant; and (d) the record in situations requiring trust and candour of each such person; and (e) whether the company, or a person referred to in paragraph (c) or (d), has been convicted of an offence against this Act or the regulations.

Under sub-section 91(2A) of the Act, ACMA may also refuse to renew a community broadcasting licence if, having regard to matters in paragraphs 84(2)(a) to (f), it considers that it would not allocate such a licence if it were deciding whether to allocate the licence to the licensee.

The Act does not require ACMA to hold an investigation or a hearing into whether a community licence should be renewed (sub-section 91(3)).

ACMA is required to renew these licences unless it decides that an applicant is no longer a suitable licensee. A company is a suitable licensee if ACMA does not decide that sub-section 41(2) of the Act applies to the company.

ACMA may decide that 41(2) of the Act applies to a licensee if it is satisfied that allowing the licensee to provide or continue to provide a commercial broadcasting service under a licence would lead to a significant risk of: (a) an offence against the Act or the regulations being committed; (b) or a breach of the conditions of the licence occurring.

In deciding whether the sub-section applies, ACMA is required by sub-section 41(3) of the Act, to take into account: (a) the business record of the company; and (b) the company's record in situations requiring trust and candour; and (c) the business record of the chief executive and each director and secretary of the applicant; and (d) the record in situations requiring trust and candour of each such person; and (e) whether the company, or a person referred to in paragraph (c) or (d), has been convicted of an offence against this Act or the regulations.

The Act does not require ACMA to hold an investigation or a hearing into whether a commercial licence (sub-section 47(3)) should be renewed.

GRANT OF APPROVAL

I, Peter Robert Garrett, Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts, pursuant to section 13 of the Fuel Quality Standards Act 2000 (the Act), having consulted with the Fuel Standards Consultative Committee as required by section 24A of the Act, hereby grant this approval to ACB Group Pty Ltd (the approval holder).

This approval varies the fuel standard for petrol set out in the Fuel Standard (Petrol) Determination 2001 (Determination) such that leaded petrol, supplied as AVGAS or 'racing fuel 100', containing lead up to 0.85g/L and unleaded petrol containing aromatics up to 78 per cent v/v and/or ethanol up to 20.0 per cent v/v and/or oxygen up to 7.0 per cent m/m in petrol containing ethanol, will be taken to comply with the lead, aromatics, ethanol and oxygen parameters specified in the Determination where that petrol is supplied by the approval holder or by a regulated person specified in Annexure 1 of this approval to an individual who has been issued with and presents a valid and current motor sport organisation licence and/or identification card, or to an individual for the purpose of testing or tuning an engine used in legitimate motor racing activities.

This approval is granted subject to the conditions specified in section 17 of the Act and the conditions specified in Annexure 2 of this approval.

This approval comes into force on the date this instrument is signed and remains in force until 31 December 2010.

- The approval holder will annually report the quantity of fuel supplied from the date of the approval until the end of the approval period to the department by the end of February in each year following the year of supply
- 2) The fuel may only be supplied in sealed containers of up to 205 litres capacity, except avgas, supplied only for use in pre-1986 built racing vehicles, which may be dispensed from a bowser for the specific purpose of engaging in competition at a recognised motor sport event
- The fuel specified in this approval must be accompanied by written information relating to the safe handling of the fuel.

NOTICE UNDER SECTION 17A OF THE FUEL QUALITY STANDARDS ACT 2000 CONCERNING A DECISION UNDER SECTION 13 OF THAT ACT FOR APPROVAL FOR A VARIATION OF THE FUEL STANDARD (PETROL) DETERMINATION 2001

I, Peter Robert Garrett, Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts provide the following information concerning my decision to grant an approval under section 13 of the Fuel Quality Standards Act 2000 (the Act).

Name of approval holder

Approval has been granted to ACB Group Pty Ltd.

Period of operation

The period of operation of the approval is from the date of the approval until 31 December 2010.

Details of the approval

This approval varies the Fuel Standard (Petrol) Determination 2001 (the Petrol Determination) so that leaded and unleaded petrol containing the following parameters:

leaded petrol:

- Lead up to 0.85g/L and unleaded petrol:
- Aromatics up to 78 per cent v/v and/or
- Ethanol up to 20.0 per cent v/v and/or
- Oxygen up to 7.0 per cent m/m in petrol containing ethanol

will be taken to comply with the parameters specified in the Petrol Determination.

Approval is granted subject to the conditions specified in section 17 of the Act and in Annexure 2 of the approval.

Background

Section 15 of the Act provides that I must have regard to the following when deciding whether or not to grant or amend an approval:

- (a) the protection of the environment
- (b) the protection of occupational and public health and safety

- (c) the interests of consumers and
- (d) the impact on economic and regional development.

I may also have regard to any other matters I consider relevant.

Section 24A of the Act provides that I must consult, and have regard to the recommendations of, the Fuel Standards Consultative Committee (the Committee) before granting an approval under section 13. Before signing the instrument granting the approval, I consulted with the Committee and had regard to the recommendations of the Committee made in January 2009.

Findings on material questions of fact

1 Protection of the environment

The fuel subject to this approval is supplied and used in relatively small quantities for motor sport activities. In this context, higher levels of lead, aromatics and oxygenates are not expected to impact significantly on ambient air quality.

The fuel is expensive compared with normal fuels available to the public and the price provides a strong disincentive for any waste, misuse or spillage. It is therefore not expected that permitting the supply of the fuels covered by this approval for motor sport activities will have an adverse effect on the environment.

2 Protection of occupational and public health and safety

These fuels are not likely to have any impact on the health and safety of users as the volume of fuel used is minimal and for specific events. The fuel will be used by a small number of competitors and no contact with the public is expected. Leaded and unleaded racing fuels are generally supplied in sealed containers of up to 205 litres capacity and are used in small quantities, primarily in off-road activities, and in widely dispersed locations. Safe handling information will be provided with the fuel. In consequence, any significant occupational and public health and safety risks are not expected to result from use of these fuels.

3 Interest of consumers

Leaded and unleaded racing fuels meet the needs of a niche market for specific classes of motor racing. The consumers using these fuels seek the performance and operability characteristics provided by these fuels. Without them, motor sport competitors may not be able to operate their vehicles effectively.

4 Impact on economic and regional development

Many racing venues are located outside major population areas. Motor sport events provide an ongoing financial benefit to these regional communities. I, Susan Phillips, hereby give notice as follows:


The Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts, the Hon Peter Garrett AM MP, responsible for the administration of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (the Act), has received an application made under section 10 of the Act seeking the protection of Mammy Johnsons River and an area containing sites of significance to Garigal men and women contained within the proposed extension of the Duralie Coal Mine site in the Hunter Valley. Details of the application are outlined below.

The applican

The application has been lodged by the Garigal Aboriginal Community Inc.

The area sought to be protected

The applicant describes the area in need of protection as the area identified on the map below.



Claimed nature of significance

The applicant states that the area contains Mammy Johnsons River, 'a women's birthing place' and a sacred site 'sensitive to Aboriginal men of our community' and is therefore of particular significant to the Garigal people in accordance with their traditions.

Claimed threat of injury or desecration

The applicant states that the area specified above is under threat of injury and desecration because of the:

 'need for [Duralie Coal Pty Ltd] to excavate other areas on the mining lease, one of which is sensitive to Aboriginal men of our community' and which could also impact on Mamie Johnsons River'.

The Minister will consider a report under section 10 of the Act in relation to the area identified for protection before deciding whether to make a declaration under section 10 of the Act. The report will deal with:

- a) the particular significance of the area to Aboriginal people;
- b) the nature and extent of the threat of injury to, or desecration of, the area;
- c) the extent of the area that should be protected;
- d) the prohibitions and restrictions to be made with respect to
- e) the effects the making of a declaration may have on the proprietary or pecuniary interests of persons other than the Aboriginal people on whose behalf the application is made;
- f) the duration of any declaration; and
- g) the extent to which the areas are or may be protected by or under a law of the State of New South Wales, and the effectiveness of any remedies available under any such law.

DECLARATION OF SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES WHICH JUSTIFY AN INCREASE IN THE AMOUNT OF COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT SECURITIES ON ISSUE

I, WAYNE MAXWELL SWAN, Treasurer of the Commonwealth, declare that, under section 5A of the *Commonwealth Inscribed Stock Act 1911*, there are special circumstances which justify an increase in the limit of Commonwealth Government stock and securities on issue.

The global financial crisis has driven almost all major advanced economies into recession. Advanced economies are expected to experience the sharpest collective decline in gross domestic product in the post-war period. The emerging economies of China and India are now expected to slow markedly. The global commodity boom which has provided significant stimulus to Australian growth and incomes over recent years is unwinding.

The global recession and unwinding of the commodity boom has also resulted in substantial downward revisions to government revenue. As a result of the deteriorating global economy and consequent falling tax revenues, it will be necessary to increase Government borrowing.

This declaration will come into force on the day on which it is published in the *Gazette*. Once in force, the limit imposed by section 5 on the total face value of stock and securities that may be on issue under the *Commonwealth Inscribed Stock Act 1911* and the *Loans Securities Act 1919* at any time is taken to be increased by \$125 billion.

Note 1 Regulation 6 of the Financial Sector (Transfers of Business) Regulations 1999 provides that, for subsection 43(4) of the Business Transfer Act, the provisions of the Act apply in relation to a transfer of business as if section 13A were inserted after section 13 of the Act. Section 13A provides that a financial sector company to which more than 15% of the gross assets and liabilities of another financial sector company (the *transferring business*) is to be transferred under the Act, must apply to the Treasurer for approval to hold the transferring business and that Division 3 of Part 2 of the Act applies to the application as if the transferring business were a separate financial sector company.

Note 2 Under section 14 of the Act, the Treasurer must give written notice of the approval to the applicant and arrange for a copy of the notice to be published in the *Gazette* and given to the Company.
